 The *fourth* is a Partial Eclipse of the Moon, August 12, partly visible in the United States.
 The Transit of Mercury, May 6, will be visible in the United States.



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

Sir :—We have received yours of the 6th inst. The forked stream, the mucopurulent discharge, with other symptoms you enumerate, not contraindicated by the twelve days of incubation, all point to an ordinary case of gonorrhœa.

The best advice we can give you is to follow strictly what we prescribe under the head of "Veneral Gonorrhœa" in our Resolvent directions. We advise hot water applications to the parts, if there be scalding micturition, as *not* as can be borne. 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THE LATEST POSTAGE LAWS.

The rate of Postage on a letter posted in the Dominion of Canada, to any place in Canada, is three cents per half ounce and to the United Kingdom 5 cents per half ounce, but this must be *pre-paid* by postage stamp, at the time of posting the letter.

Any such letter posted *un-paid*, cannot be forwarded to its destination, but will be sent to the Dead-Letter Office.

The rate for *drop-letters* is one cent per half ounce, to be *pre-paid* by stamp.

Newspapers and Periodicals, *printed and published* in Canada, addressed and posted by the Publishers to regular subscribers, or News-agents, may be posted at the rate of one cent for each pound weight, or fraction of a pound, but must be *pre-paid*.

On all Newspapers and Periodicals posted in Canada, other than those addressed to regular Subscribers, the rate of postage will be, one cent per four ounces, to be prepaid by stamp. Newspapers weighing *less* than one ounce each may be posted *SINGLY*, if prepaid by postage-stamp, one half cent each.

Newspapers posted in Canada, for the United States or Newfoundland, are to be prepaid the same rates as if addressed to places within the Dominion.

Miscellaneous Postal Matter.

II. On books, pamphlets, occasional publications, printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, book and newspaper manuscripts, printers' proof sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, drawings, engravings, lithographs, photographs when not on glass or in cases containing glass, sheet music printed or written, documents wholly or partly printed or written, such as deeds, insurance policies, militia and school returns, or other documents of like nature, packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, or grafts, patterns or samples of goods or merchandise, when posted in Canada, for any place in Canada the rate of postage will be one cent per four ounces in weight, to be prepaid by postage stamp, or by stamped post-bands when suitable for the purpose. No letter or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter must be sent or enclosed in any article of miscellaneous mail matter; and all transmissions authorised by this regulation must be put up in covers, open at the ends or sides, or in such manner as to admit of inspection to ensure compliance with this condition.

Miscellaneous mail matter as above specified when addressed to the United States or to Newfoundland, may be forwarded, when prepaid the one cent per 4 oz. rate, as if addressed to a place in Canada, with the exception of packets or samples and patterns of merchandise addressed to the United States, on which the special rate of ten cents must continue to be prepaid as at present:
