SHIPMENTS 1,950 TONS

The British America Corporation Beginning to Push Work.

The shipments for the week aggregated 1,950 tons, barely under the 2,000 mark, divided after this fashion: Le Roi 1,200, War Eagle 600, Centre Star 60.

The work in the No. 1 shaft was progressing steadily during the week; good bunches of ore are being met with.

The Sunset No. 2 was playing in great luck last week. Work was resumed on the discovery shaft, 500 feet west of the No. 1 shaft.

The Jumbo. Superintendent Vanderford, who is now in charge of the Jumbo, has nearly reached the 825-foot station in the lower tunnel.

The Waverley Group. The stripping of the vein on the Waverley group continues and the outlook is that when more work is done a pay chute will be found.

The Nickle Plate. The new compressor plant is in operation, and Superintendent Hastings will commence work in the shaft tomorrow.

The Deer Park. Sinking is continuing. There has been no important change in the showing which remains very encouraging.

The Big Four. Work has been resumed on the Big Four property and the showing continues to be of a high character.

The No. 1. Superintendent Long has a small force of men at work building a road to the property.

The Crown Point. The War Eagle company expects to commence work shortly on the Crown Point.

The Santa Rosa. The main tunnel is being continued to catch one of the leads.

The Gertrude. The shaft which is well under way, is showing some good ore.

The Coxy. The long crosscut tunnel is continuing, but there are no developments.

The Centre Star. The shipments for the week amounted to 60 tons.

ROSSLAND'S MILLIONAIRES. Rossland is now the Mecca of the larger sort of mining investor. There was a time in the early history of the camp when a man with a thousand dollars wrapped in the folds of his blankets was hailed with more demonstration of joy than is now accorded to the millionaire when he comes here in his palace car.

Yesterday George Crocker, the second vice-president of the great Southern Pacific railway system, arrived in this city in his private car from New York. The Southern Pacific is one of the largest systems of railways in the United States, and those connected with it count their wealth by the millions.

OST OF SMELTING. The main point in the successful operation of the mines of the Rossland camp is the cost of smelting. The camp cannot prosper and pay a high rate for ore reduction. The Trail smelter is quoting a flat freight and treatment rate

of \$7.00 on Rossland ore. Those who are in a position to know confidently assert that at this rate the smelter company will enjoy a very good profit. We have, however, the assurance of the C. P. R. that smelting will be done at Trail at cost or thereabouts, as soon as that plant is in operation.

THE LOAN BY-LAW. Today the taxpayers of Rossland will have the opportunity to vote on the General Street Improvement by-law. This measure is for the purpose of borrowing \$35,000 on the credit of the municipality.

As things are at present, it looks as though the world needed copper more than gold. It is predicted that copper will sell for 13c before January 1st, '99. It is being produced at a total cost of less than one-half that figure.
