> The ease of the Queen vs. Emil Rodenbach, wherein the defendant was charged with havng secured from Hermine Dupauvy, by false pretenses, the sum of \$10,700, came to an end in the territorial court on Tuesday, when the court adjudged the accused guilty and sentenced him to five years imprisonment? Judge Dugas, in passing sentence, scored Rodenbuch unmercifully for his mode of life which made him despised by air decent people in the community. The evidence proved beyond question that for years he had been living upon the avaits of prostitution, and belonged, to a class of men who are despised. Rodenbach became hysterical during the judge's roasting and frequently applied a handkerchief to his eyes. As he was led away by an officer many bystanders were heard to say, "served him right."
