C. APARKER B. W. SAWYER THE NEWSPAPER A NECESSITY.

The Greensburg, Indiana, Daily News says:—On an appeal, the Conscription Board at Syracuse, N. Y. has ruled that a man employed on a newspaper is connected with "a necessary industrial enterprise," and therefore should be placed in class three.

In this decision the Board took the same view that is at this day and age shared by almost everyone. 

1882—Negotiations between Parnell and Gladstone halted by the murder of Lord Frederick Cavendish and Under Secretary Burke, in Phoenix, Dublin.

1886—Gladstone introduced his first Home Rule bill, and it was rejected by thirty votes.

1893—Gladstone succeeded in having his second Home Rule bill passed by the House of Commons, only to have it killed in the House of Lords.

By the terms of this Order, responsibility is laid upon private citizens to see that no food is lost by being kept too long or kept in improper conditions. If a private citizen has reason to believe that a cold storage warehouse, store, restaurant or hotel is wasting food in any way, he has now the opportunity of making a complaint to the municipal authorities with the knowledge that the law is behind him.
