In Memoriam.

The columns of the ACADIAN have a duty to perform in recording the death of Joseph B. Davison.

The life of the deceased has been a busy one. Wherever advice was needed in times of doubt or legal perplexity, the rich and the poor alike ever found him a generous and cheerful counsellor.

At the time of his death Mr Davison was one of the oldest justices of the peace in the county, having been appointed at the time when the county was governed by a "court of sessions."

In 1880 he was appointed Collector of Customs for the port of Wolfville, which position he has since filled.

In the civic elections of 1894 the citizens of Wolfville elected him town alderman. In this as in all his fields of public work he strove to do his duty.

During the last twenty years of his life the deceased has been subject to a racking and almost constant cough.

With admirable courage, however, he bore up against disease and attended his daily duties. But to the observer his step year by year appeared more slow, his breath more labored.

Yet their grief is not without consolation, for in the words of the sorrowing bard they are able to declare:

"I trust he lives in thee and there I find him worthier to be loved."
