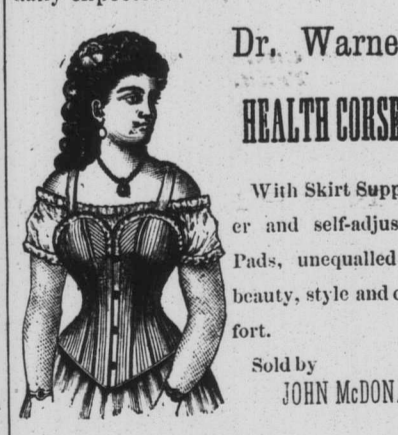

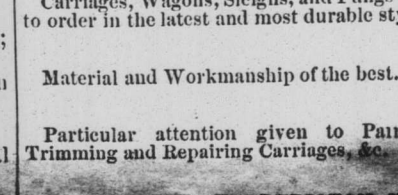

Pleasing People.

The man who tries to please everybody must surely do so at the sacrifice of his own principles and independence. Such a man is not worthy of notice. Lower still in the grade he comes if he be a journalist, for those to whom much has been given, much hath been required of.

We run a tri-weekly and a weekly paper in this little city. Heaven knows a tri-weekly is not too great a luxury for it. The crowd who would have us please them is legion. Just so soon as you try to be as independent as you can, you get on some fellows big foot and hurt his corn. Immediately he withdraws his support. And this is not all. Each and every such clown has a friend or two. If you happen to stand on one fellows' toe, you give a mortal wound to the whole ring. Now we have spite to-day against no one living, thank Heaven, and yet there are plenty we "go for" just because they deserve it. And just so soon as the STAR does come out, speaking fearlessly and honestly what it thinks to be true and right, some miserable clown turns up his nose, calls it a "vile sheet" and if he happen to have a few inches of advertisement—by the way something that he is very often in justice to his creditors not able to pay for—immediately withdraws. God help us! Things are come to a pretty pass when creatures like these wearing God's image only to turn it into a mockery, supports and controls the press.

But listen. Sink or swim, live or die, go "up" or "down," we shall be independent. We shall be outspoken. Because we have been honest, mounded nothing, nor hid anything, mongrel creatures have withdrawn their patronage. These same brainless boobies speak of personalities. Do they know what that term means? Is it less a crime to say a man is politically rotten, and thievish than to throw off the conventionality and show him up to his teeth where he did wrong? But why should we put these questions? The intelligent and the discriminating, the solid men of the community are with us and know all this as well as we. Why waste words to the others?

Newfoundland's Treasures.

We start in wonder as we hear of the discovery, every now and again, of the buried bullion and Mexican dollars of Capt. Kidd and Black Beard. Who has not been held rapt as he read Dumas' account of the Cave of Treasures on the Island of Monte Christo? Yet wealth greater than this—hills of copper nickel and lead, mixed with silver, are almost every day discovered in Newfoundland. The almost uninhabited regions of Green Bay, Tilt Cove, Betts' Cove and White Bay, prove to contain undreamt of wealth. The carpet of earth covers hills of copper, tons in thousands, of lead repose in the cliffs and the hills yet untouched. Accidentally some of these are being discovered, and to the owner, or he who is fortunate enough to purchase, it means millions. As if by the enchanter's touch houses and villages rise in these desolate spots. Ships from across the sea lie at the wharves taking in the precious cargoes. The sound of the blast, the hammer and the chisel now bursts upon nature's ear where once reigned primitive quiet. Mr. Ellerhausen is the central figure in the mining operations.

The key to Newfoundland's wealth has been found. Her fisheries are gradually on the decline, not so much on account of the quantities taken as the disturbance to the fishes; and indeed the late discoveries may be hailed as a God-send. People's attention will be attracted thither, settlements will soon be made and skilled agricultural and other labor will be introduced. With Newfoundland's mines in full blast, her shore fishery followed up, her forests opened and her thousands of fertile soil tilled, she will indeed be a happy colony. Men of pluck and capital only are required.

The Elections.

The elections are billed for to-day, and Mr. Blair and Thompson will be elected. They have gone over the field the second time like men, and can independently take their place in the next House unchargeable with fraud or bought influence. They take away the body of Stewart, three years buried, and hide it from the keenest detective's eye. Wondrous daring are the deeds,—barefaced and adroit as the far famed English highwaymen.

He gave other hints that the students as well as ourselves don't remember just now. The Dr. should be careful to remove temptation from the students. Keep those papers under lock next time D.

HUNTING.—Mr. H. Braithwaite has returned after a six weeks fishing excursion in Northumberland. He has brought back considerable spoils from the chase. On the south-west Miramichi, 20 miles above Boiestown, he took canoe and pole about 30 miles farther up. The river here abounds with trout, on its surface quietly sails the duck. He visited beaver towns and deer leads, ponds and gullies, and the result of his trip he sums up as follows: 25 beavers, 9 otter, 2 minks, 9 sable, 1 loupcevier, 4 wild geese, 8 ducks, 60 partridges, some muskrats and other "varment." He was completely taken with his stay in our fertile New Brunswick wilderness.

SERGEANT WOODWARD.—As the brazen tongue of midnight spoke at the close of our last Sabbath, Sargt. Woodward and force heard a rumpus. They arrived upon the scene, but the actors had fled. The principal party took refuge in Mr. Aitken's domicile. Thither went the police. Their Sargt. asked admission, and was refused. A window was near and this Sargt. quickly utilized. He jumped in and stood in the bar room. Two were just taking "an eye opener." They were all in for it next day. Mr. Aitken was summoned, and on the following day the action was brought on. Defendant had in the meantime cleared out. A fine of \$30 was imposed, and to satisfy that amount a cask of Sherry and a half cask of Brandy were seized and put in a cell of the police office, where they now are.

THE VICE-REGAL LANDING.—The following is said to be the programme for the Vice-Regal landing: The Sarmation will be escorted up the harbor by the fleet, formed in two lines, led by the Belvedere and Black Prince. On the arrival of the Sarmation outside, a royal salute will be fired from the fleet. As the ships pass up the harbor, the various forts will fire salutes. The Sarmation will anchor off the Dockyard, the ships of the fleet anchoring in a double line, and when the time for landing, which will probably be about half-past one, arrives, the Marquis of Lorne and Her Royal Highness Princess Louise will embark, under a Royal salute, on board the Admiral's barge. A procession will then likely be formed by the ships' boats and will pass down between the double line of men-of-war and round to the landing stage at the Dockyard, where the various authorities will be in waiting to receive the illustrious personages.

EARLY CLOSING.—A meeting of the dry goods' clerks was held in Murray & Burkhardt's photographic studio last night. Chas. E. Perks was called to the chair, and Jas. W. Cousidine acted as secretary. The chairman explained the object of the meeting—namely to devise means to induce an up-town dry goods' establishment to close at 7 p. m., as is the custom with the trade. A committee consisting of W. B. Coulthard, Jas. W. Cousidine and Daniel Hennessey was appointed to wait on the proprietor and urge him to close early. The committee visited Mr. M.—and presented their case, but of no avail. They were positively informed that early closing was out of the question until January 1st, 1879. We are sorry for this. The result of the refusal will likely be that all the shops will return to the usual late hour of closing. We sympathize with the young gentlemen who are anxious to have the evenings for culture, amusement, etc. Very little business is done after seven, especially at this season of the year, and we see no reason why a few persons should thwart what seems to be the desire of the majority.

MR. FOSTER.—Dr. Jack, of the N. B. University, it seems, has no knowledge of Mr. Foster's "turn out" either. It does seem strange that an event of that sort should have taken place and that Dr. Jack know nothing of it. Prof. Foster has sent a communication to a local paper which he might have sent long ago to the STAR, and tries to prove that the story of his dismissal was a slander. Here is what kind hearted Dr. Jack says on the matter:—

PROF. FOSTER:—I have learned with astonishment that an utterly unfounded rumor has been circulated to the effect that you were compelled to resign the Chair of Classics and History in this University. On the contrary, for reasons affecting only yourself and future prospects, you first signified to me your intention of resigning; and when you did so I was so taken by surprise that I begged you to reconsider the matter for a few days, in hopes that you might change your mind. As you still persisted in your resolution, I was ultimately constrained to give a provisional acceptance of your resignation. I am, dear sir, Yours very truly, W. BRYDENE JACK.

Nothing is so meritorious in some cases as to try to hide the faults and cover the humiliations of a brother.—Ed. An Editor's Agony. It was evening. The dark shadows of night began to creep down over the Editor and he took off his glasses to depart. Just then a knock came at the door. He is so courteous that before he stopped he asked the unknown five or six times to come in. It was a woman,—and a virago at that. She had a pair of "new bred" hens, and wanted the doctor to give them a puff. She held them fast by the wings. The doctor put on his glasses, lit the glim, was just in the act of laying his hand on the comb of one, when the creature got loose, flew at the editors face, upset his glasses and

scared him. The second now had released itself and too got on the doctor's head "Take off your hens, woman, would you have me devoured?" The woman trembled and caught her birds after they had thrown down all the loose books and sent the newspaper M. S., flying through all parts of the room. What's your hens' age. A Niagara Story. When Bloudin came in 1859 he had his rope stretched about a mile below the falls, and even there it was 1,200 feet long. On both sides of the river inclosures were built around the rope, into which ticket buyers were admitted, and where the acrobat had his dressing-rooms. He was to start on the first occasion from the Canadian side, and within the inclosures there were a number of invited guests, among them Henry W. Faxon, then the local editor of the Buffalo Republic. Faxon was a wit of more than local renown, and Bloudin had, for some reason, taken a great liking to him. While Faxon stood—laughing and jesting, as was his way—on the edge of the precipice overlooking the river 140 feet below, Bloudin appeared a few feet behind. He was just about to attempt the most daring feat upon a tight rope that had ever been performed, and what took place will show his iron nerve and reckless temper. He saw that Faxon, gazing out across the river, was unconscious of his presence. Motioning to the bystanders for silence by pressing his fingers to his lips, he seized Faxon under both arms and held him out for a second or two over the verge. Faxon must have weighed 165 pounds. His countenance when Bloudin laid hold of him was irradiated with mirth. When Bloudin drew him back and dropped him on the green sward, he sank there in a heap, horror-stricken by a shock from the effects of which his nervous system never fully recovered. In the next instant, Bloudin grasping his heavy balancing-pole danced out upon his rope beyond the fearful precipice, and turning to enjoy the effect of his manoeuvre, saluting his indignant friend with a gesture indescribably outre. He then continued his first walk across the Niagara chasm, experiencing not the least tremor or emotion.

GENERAL NEWS. THE CZAR is re-appearing. Dean Stanley sailed for Europe on Wednesday last. A silk manufactory is soon to be started at St. Catharines, Ontario. Sportsmen who do not reside in New Brunswick will now have to take out a license at an annual expense of \$20, before they can frequent the hunting grounds of this Province. The licenses date from the first day of September in each year. A MEMORIAL, signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Bishop of Gibraltar, and a large number of the Church of England Temperance Society, has been forwarded to Sir Garnet Wolsey, asking him to prevent the extension of the number of drinking-houses in the Island. Five men drew revolvers, entered Johnson's jewelry store on 8th Avenue, last evening, intimidated the clerks and outsiders, stole \$2,000 worth of Jewelry, jumped into a cab and fled.

The Mr. Skinner, a missionary of the Methodist Church of Canada, was accidentally killed by his gun on the journey between Carleton and Fort Pitt.

A Battleford despatch says that reliable couriers from the plains report an outbreak of war between the Assiniboines and the Sioux. Eight of the latter were killed. The Assiniboines also stole a band of horses from the Blackfeet, and killed a Blackfeet chief.

The Rev. L. G. MacNeil, M. A., of Maitland, Hants, Co., N. S., has received a unanimous call from the congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, St. John's, Nfld. The salary is \$2,000 with a manse.

A thoroughbred bloodhound was employed in St. Mark's churchyard, New York, on Saturday to trace the exit of the Stewart grave robbers. It has been suggested that the body may have been carried to New Jersey. Detectives are scouring Newark for the missing body, and are reported to have a sure clue.

AUSTRIA. PESTH, Nov. 13. Count Schouvaloff held a private interview with the Emperor. He had subsequently informed him by an interview that he was bearer of no new proposals, but that he came to Pesth to settle some minor matters, and repeated the assurances of the Czar's desire to faithfully observe the treaty of Berlin.

TURKEY. CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 13. It is stated that England is earnestly supporting the Porte, in his endeavours to conclude a loan to be guaranteed on the revenue of Syria and surgus tribute.

INDIA. BOMBAY, Nov. 13. A serious insurrection has broken out in Negil against the Turks. LONDON, Nov. 13. The Marquis of Lorne and Princess Louise, accompanied by the Duke of Connaught and Prince Leopold left St. Pancras for Liverpool at midnight. Crowds witnessed the departure and repeatedly cheered them.

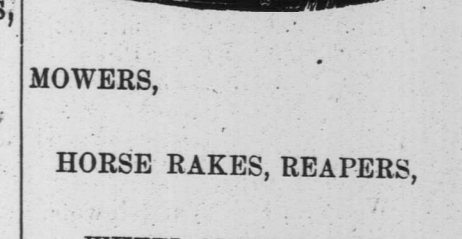
