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



### Bi-Centenary of Newfoundland.

"King Edward Memorial Park." The notes already published by the "King Edward Memorial Park" at Castle Hill, Placentia, also contribute towards centreing public attention in Canada on the variety and extent of Newfoundland history. Mr. H. F. Shortis in a very popular and learned lecture given prior to the Guy Tercentenary in Coughian Hall, Harbor Grace, made a strong and eloquent presentation of the heroism of New foundland pioneers. The same lesson would be conveyed in the open ing of a "King Edward Peace Memor ial Park" at Castle Hill, Placentia It would be a page of history of broad international interest and opened by this means to the whole public.

Hitherto Castle Hill has been a little remote from the ordinary route of Placentia tourist traffic, but a short road opened from the railway station would save the need of walking along the steeper sides of the hill to reach the crest of the Castleone of the most spectacular outlooks even on the picturesque coasts of Newfoundland.

Then there is to be considered the archaeology of Castle Hill Park, Excavations made in opening such a park on the summit of Castle Hill might easily place our Newfoundland Historical Society in possession of some very interesting military relics of the past. The ground has never been thoroughly explored, so that if it were found to contain old weapons of warfare or ammunition in use two hundred or more years ago it would repay the efforts of the Historical Society to recover and preserve them. n fact the history of Castle Hill reads like a drama such as Kirby might have written. It was built by nature for purposes of defence-a veritable 'Native bulwark of the pass,

An hundred men might hold the host With hardihood against a host."

The waves of warfare raged around it over two centuries ago. I saw the contests of hostile battle vessels and invading armies. From its crests and along its slopes there 'flashed the red artillery." Its "Tros sachs" were such as to impede the march of an attacking army. In front it descends almost straight into the sea. Its military stronghold was indeed as-


"In native swords and native ranks However, the chief reason why Newfoundland would be inspired to open a Placentia Castle Hill Memor ial Park to King Edward is best expressed in the words, "Peace hath its victories no less renowned than war.' This is the keynote to the agitation to open a King Edward Park on Castle Hill, Placentia. It is best that old battle grounds of the Empire should be marked by peace memorials, and very happily the name of "Edward the Peacemaker" is one that bridges the gulf between once hostile nations King Edward the Peacemaker is truly a name both to conjure with and to onquer with. This question is nonpolitical. Public men of all political views or of no political views would join in any movement to honor the nemory of a sovereign who was as popular in Paris as in London and as revered in Washington as in any city in his own dominions. Not often does it happen in history that what the old Romans called the "Temple of Janus' is closed. And yet the figurative "Temple of Janus" enclosing the demons of horrid war as by bronze doors -was closed during the nine years' reign of Edward the Pacific. From the day of Edward's coronation in Westminster Abbey to the day of his funeral in London the whole world was at peace with Britain and Britain was at peace with all the world. This is too exceptional an event in history to be ignored. If people honored warriors for hundreds of years, why not now as a change of programme honor a king, who was a world's peacemaker? Nations do not grow strong y successful wars; they grow strong by peaceful industries, and beyond all by the art and science of agriculure, which is the foundation stone of rade and commerce. The natural reources of a country precede the arldest and most prominent of indusries. An agricultural exhibition at the opening of a King Edward Menorial Park on Castle Hill, Placentia would be quite possible as shown in ur last letter. By such agricultural lisplays are the people of all coun-

exhibition in Prince Edward Island, are proofs of this, Newfoundland is rightly regarded as one of the finest pasturage countries in the British Empire. Statistics show that its meadow crops surpass in value its Sydney Record on the subject of a far-famed seal fisheries. The organization of such a celebration as the opening of a Peace Memorial Park on Castle Hill, Placentia, with a possible agricultural exhibition in conjunction with that celebration would give a tremendous impulse to a new interest in agricultural tuition. This would influence public opinion and have beneficial results on the industrial life of the whole country. These points are of interest to the people of Sydney because of its proximity to Newfoundland, and then, too, because some of its most prosperous and enternrising citizens are themselves Newfoundlanders, either by birth or by descent. There has been hitherto some little reason for the complaint that the Canadian press has not always given as much prominence to Newfoundland interests as it might have given to a friendly though separate nationality, under separate local governments but saluting the same imperial flag of Great Britain.-Com.

### **Found a Picture** of Rarest Value.

Purvis Carter, Who Was in Halifax Some Time Ago, Still Finding Valuable Pictures.

Montreal, Sept. 13 .- It is announced that one of the greatest artistic finds of the century has just been made by Purvis Carter, the English art expert, who for some time past has been making researches amongst the archives of religious institutions in this province. This is an authentic portrait of Sir Thomas Moore, the painted by Albert Durer, the famous German compere of Raphael, and one of the greatest painters the world has ever known. The picture was discovered in the possession of an Ontario family purely by accident, and with the dirt of centuries, but when cleaned it revealed the signature of 'Albert Durer, A.D. 1521," and later the inscription of "Sir Thomas Moore." A discovery had been made, and further work disclosed a magnificent portrait of the English chancellor who was beheaded by Henry VIII. because he opposed his king's matrimonial eccentricities and stood firm by the Catholic doctrines. Further work secured documentary evidence of the authenticity of the which is regarded as one of the greatest artistic finds of the time, and practically priceless.

The picture was brought to Mon treal, where it has been inspected by Cardinal Vannutelli, Archbishop Bruchesi and other church dignitaries and accepted as genuine. It will be sent to England for further proof, and later forwarded to Rome, where, when its authenticity is secured, it will probably be consecrated as holy relic of the English chancellor whose canonization is only a matte



### Is Hudson Bay **Exclusively British?**

Special to the Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, Sept. 20. That Canada has exclusive rights in Hudson Bay is now conceded by many people here. Any possible trouble as to this, having been removed by the Hague Tribunal, which ruled on the headland to headland question. Light is thrown upon the meaning of this decision by the subsequent treatment of the larger bays on the coast. The Bay Chaleurs, for instance, is declared to be a closed Bay, and the line is to be drawn from the points where the Bay ends, that is from th two headlands from the mouth of the bay. These headlands are 20 or 2 miles apart. Fortune Bay, in Newfoundland, is also a closed Bay. The land to headland, is 30 miles wide, thus notwithstanding the width of the entrance to the Bay, the Bay is recognized as exclusively British pronarrow, probably 40 miles wide, and from 1891 to 1909. is Brittish territory. 


