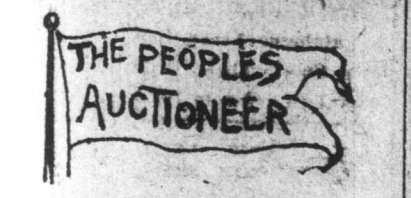

tacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet

## No Fielding in Newfoundland.

Negotiations for reciprocity with Newfoundland are not to be entered upon by the United States Government until the issue of those concluded with Canada is settled. It is but natural that President Taft and his Secretary of State should desire to finish the Canadian business before dealing with Newfoundland.

In the first place, reciprocity with Canada is incomparably more important to the United States than reciprocity with Newfoundland. Canada extends over half of the continental area of North America; she is coterminal for upwards of 3,000 miles with the United States; she has a population of 8,000,000; she has transcontinental railway systems and has made great improvements on her waterways; her natural resources are wonderfully rich and diversified; she has made remarkable advances in the work of developing them; and she has a market of five-sevenths of the capacity per head than any other country. Newfoundland, on the other hand, is but one of the islands of North America; she is separated from the United States by a wide tract of sea; she has a population of less than a third of a million; while she has an important railway system, and magnificent and varied natural resources, she has no great general industrial development, and has no considerable prospects as an agricultural country. She has, it is true, advantages for the commercial exploitation of the fisheries of her own favored waters and of the famous cod "banks" that are economically tributary to her—advantages that give her the leadership in that field over all competitors. But in the calculations of the United States the benefits of reciprocity with Newfoundland would be an almost negligible quantity by comparison with those of reciprocity with Canada. In the second place, it is manifest that such an agreement as that arranged with Canada would not be acceptable to either party if proposed for Newfoundland and the United States. The former country would desire concessions in respect to fish in all marketable forms, and the latter would require free entrance for its manufactured products, and might be more inconsistent for the removal of checks on the exportation of pulpwood from Newfoundland. To have an agreement of one type pending with Newfoundland while one of a different type is being considered at Ottawa might increase the difficulties in the way of enactment. For these reasons, not until the efforts to establish the Knox-Fielding agreement had ended in success or failure will Newfoundland be approached by the United States.

If the Canadian agreement is ratified by both the national Legislatures concerned, then the bargaining can be commenced the more confidently with Newfoundland, and also the more differently by the United States. If, again, the Canadian agreement is not established, the United States diplomats will offer larger inducements to Newfoundland than they would otherwise have thought of proposing. Raw material to eke out the United States domestic supply must be obtained somewhere, or certain of the country's industries will have to emigrate. In particular, the pulpwood of Newfoundland will be reached out for. It seems improbable, however, that the present Newfoundland Government will make any concessions at variance with the new spirit of enterprise now working for the island's national development.—Mail and Empire.

Very Sad Case.

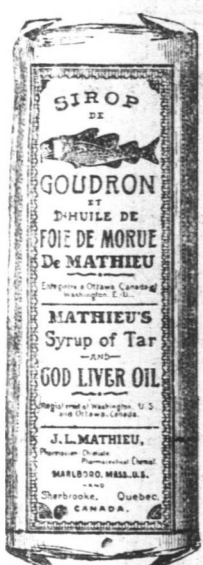

The Engineer will see to David Dempsey's complaint re the dilapidated condition of a house on Flower Hill. He will also attend to the request of Williams & Moore who want to erect a sign.

Reply to Preacher.

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir,—I ask the privilege of answering your correspondent from Carbonear who signs himself "Preacher" a Methodist. Should he be in your issue of yesterday, I would do so as I am one of those whom the matter of which he writes concerns and who certainly has great respect for the Commandments of God.

If "Preacher" is going to abide by the testimony of the Ten Commandments which God handed to Moses upon tables of stone, he will perform to abide by the remainder of his days with the "ring of a steamboat's donkey wheel in his ears," etc. etc. The flight occupied 915 minutes, and beats all records with a passenger for both distance and duration.

Your correspondent does not reveal in his letter whether he is an Episcopalian or a Methodist. He says he is one or the other I would submit the following for his consideration. The first is from a prominent Churchman, the Rev. Isaac Williams, B.D. He says: "We are commanded to keep holy the seventh day... the seventh day is Saturday. It may be said we keep the first day instead, but surely this is not the same thing; the first day cannot be the seventh day; and where we are told in Scripture that we are to keep the first day at all? We are commanded to keep the seventh; but we are nowhere commanded to keep the first." "Plain Sermons on the Catechism."

In case "Preacher" is a Methodist I beg leave to submit the following: "It is true there is no positive command for infant baptism... it is a duty to keep the first day; the first day of the week."—Binney's Theological Compendium (Methodist) p. 180, 181. Again: "It must be confessed that there is no law in the New Testament concerning the first day of the week."—Buck's (Methodist) Theological Dictionary. Article, "Sabbath." In the light of these testimonies it is quite clear that however rigidly or devoutly we may spend Sunday, we are not keeping the Sabbath. The Sabbath was founded upon a specific command. We can plead no such command for the obligation to observe Sunday. There is not a single sentence in the New Testament to suggest that we incur any penalty by violating the supposed sanctity of Sunday. (The black type is mine). Now here are three testimonies, Mr. Editor, from three eminent divines belonging to three different denominations which unanimously confess that there is absolutely no connection between the Fourth Commandment and Sunday. They, however, furnish a definite answer to "Preacher's" question, and explain most clearly why the steam whistles, etc. are heard on Sunday.

"Preacher" however, may reply that while it is true that the Commandment specifies the seventh day, yet its obligations are fulfilled by keeping another day. Can they not would reply that when he appeals to the ten commandments for authority for the Sabbath he should be willing to accept its authority as to the precise day. It is sheer presumption, which does not suggest very great respect for the Commandments of God, on his part to change the literal scripta of that Divine Code. And if he and his fellow-preachers presume to do this without Scriptural authority what fault can they find when others go a step further and virtually say, "If I do not keep the right day I will make no difference if I do not keep any day at all." Can they not see that they themselves are the chief offenders, and that they are setting the example for the doing of the very things of which "Preacher" in his letter complains?

Now if "Preacher" will but conform his practice of Sabbath keeping to the Commandment to which he appeals, and for which he confesses a great respect, he will never again be found complaining as he does of Sunday labor and at which he is greatly offended. And he certainly never will complain nor be offended in regard to the Seventh day, for it is written: "Great peace have they that love thy law; and nothing shall offend them."—Psa. 119:166. Dear Sir,—Reverting to the question of a Children's Festival in connection with the Coronation, I should like to say that personally I consider the calling together of all the children of the city under the circumstances infeasible. There is, however, in all probability a number of young children in the city who seldom get a treat, and whose daily life is not often brightened by the conditions under which they are brought up to live. What a delightful thing it would be to gather such together during the Coronation week and give them a real "jolly good time!"

The S. S. Benedick sailed for Sydney to-day.

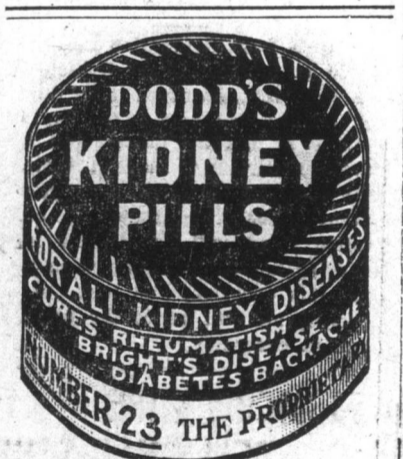
## Splendidly Kept Park.

A hitch has developed in respect to awarding contracts for the construction of warships in the Canadian Naval Service. Tenders called some time ago were sent in by British firms. There will be no special issue of stamps by the Dominion Government at the Coronation. The head of King George will appear on the regular issue of stamps within a few months. In England the issue bearing the new King's head will be placed on sale on June 1st.

PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said:—"Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for offices, consulting rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had nothing else in my office for the last thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to them."  
Gas fires are universally used by Medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients.  
The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainment, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests with gas fires, etc., in May and June, 1906.

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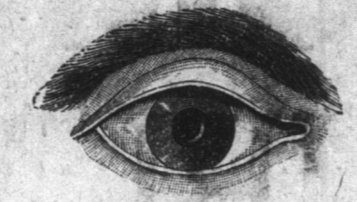
