### St. John's Municipal Board.

#### Public Notice!

The following was adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Board, held March 19th, 1915, and ordered to be published:—

WHEREAS—The 1510 Amendment to the Municipal Act, Sections 11, 12, 13, provides as follows:—

- (1) All tenements of a lesser rental value than \$50.00 shall be maintained by the owner or lessee in all respects reasonably fit for habitation.
- (2) The Council to have power to order any house not fit for habitation to be removed as a nuisance.
- (3) The Council to have power to make Rules and Regulations for putting and keeping dwelling houses in wholesome and sanitary condition.

BE IT RESOLVED:—

- (1) A house reasonably fit for habitation shall have its roof, outer walls, windows and doors sound and watertight.
- (2) Upon complaint being made to the Council by the Occupier of any tenement of a yearly rental value not exceeding fifty dollars, that the tenement occupied by him is not in a habitable condition, for reasons specified, and if upon investigation by the Council's Inspector such proves to be the case, notice shall be given to the owner of the said tenement to have repairs effected within a time to be stipulated or the Council may direct the Inspector to inspect such dilapidated dwellings with the view of having the same repaired or condemned. If repairs are not effected within the time specified in said notice, the said owner shall be subject to a penalty of \$5.00 per day for every day during which the specified repairs are not effected, to be recovered in a prosecution before a Magistrate. ## Free Churchmen and the War.

### SHAME OF A PATCHED PEACE.

The Council of the Evangelical Free Churches discussed the problems at the twentieth annual assembly held at Manchester recently.

Sir Joseph Compton-Rickett, M.P., who presided, spoke on "The Church and the State in time of war." He said that the present was the day of judgment, to which the nations, great and small, were summoned. The cry of outraged millions went up for justice and a vast host of dead moved in procession before the Great White Throne. Common life was touched by a new emotion and a strange dignity. In every home there was an altar upon which a sacrifice was offered. The Church could not remain unmoved when women and children were outraged and killed.

The war had suggested, said Sir Joseph, that the Churches of Christendom should co-operate. But how were they to begin? Denied organic unity, such co-operation could only be found in a federal system: it might be that the federalism of Christendom would prove to be the pattern for the State. Peace at any price was an immorality, for peace must always be relative to righteousness.

### "ODIOUS MILITARISM."

The Rev. T. Phillips, discussing the war problem from the Christian standpoint, said that the present conflict had divided the Christian's soul. Frustationism was the most odious expression of militarism. By hideous butchery and unspeakable atrocities militarism was proving itself intolerable. In the present strife the nation was as one. Mr. Lloyd George and Mr. Austen Chamberlain were fraternising like two Baptist deacons.

The question of the militant Churchman was touched upon by the Rev. J. R. Gillies, Moderator of the Presbyterian Church of England. He unhesitatingly said that ministers should not enlist.

### THE CALL OF DUTY.

The council adopted a resolution addressed to the tens of thousands of men who have offered themselves for their country. "We recognize what you have done in obedience to the call of duty," ran the resolution, "sacrificing prospects, surrendering tasks and facing most ungenial conditions because you believe your country needs you. . . . We are with you in faith and love. You are offering yourselves in a cause which touches the welfare of the world, a cause on which the progress of the human race depends."

"We pledge ourselves, if you are taken away by death, to walk in your footsteps."

Sir Joseph Compton-Rickett announced that in the event of the war being over within a year it might be necessary to call a meeting of the council in order that its legitimate influences might be applied to the question of peace terms.

## German Drugs Needless Now.

British Laboratories Are Manufacturing Full Supply.

London, March 25.—Successful work is reported from various British laboratories in the matter of manufacturing drugs and proprietary medicines which have hitherto come from Germany. This will mean entire independence of Germany in the matter of these supplies after the war.

In an address before the governors of the London Hospital yesterday, Secretary Morris stated that a London firm has begun to supply the hospital with salicylate of soda, a drug used in great quantities. The firm is constructing a new plant with a view to increasing its output.

The secretary of the Pharmaceutical Society said experiments are now proceeding in laboratories all over the country. "There is not at present," he said, "a great dearth of drugs, because we have been able to obtain supplies of such drugs as bromides from America and ergot from Russia, and every day brings news of fresh successes in the British laboratories."

### No Glad Tidings for Quitters.

(The Outlook, New York.)

F. M. G. P. in a letter to the New York Sun criticizes Bill Sunday because he "reaches human goodness." He summarizes his letter in the following closing sentence: "God cannot work until man quits the job."

He says that he has committed forty chapters of the New Testament to memory. We wonder what he did that for. We should have thought that quite a job.

"Where did F. M. G. P. get his notion that God cannot work until man quits the job? Perhaps from a certain type of the old evangelism which sang a verse something like the following:

"Nothing either great or small Remains for me to do. Jesus died and paid it all. All the debt I owe."

"Which is no better theology than poetry."

"Certainly he did not get it from the Bible. The message of the Bible from cover to cover is like that of the old Greek motto: The gods help those who help themselves.

Moses leads Israel to the edge of the Red Sea. The rocks bar their way on the right. The sea blocks their way in front. Pharaoh's army is in the rear and on their left flank. "Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord," cries Moses.

"Not so," The Lord replies: "Wherefore criest thou unto me? Speak unto the children of Israel, that they go forward."

"God helps those who help themselves."

Moses dies. Joshua, who has been Moses' body servant, is told to take his master's place. No wonder that he hesitates. What is the message to him? God can do nothing if you undertake the job? No! It is this: "Be strong and of a good courage; be not afraid, neither be thou dismayed; for the Lord thy God is with thee whithersoever thou goest." God is the companion not of the cowards but of the brave. He is with the men who do not quit the job. He has no use for quitters.

David is riding alone. He comes to a turn in the road. A troop of the enemy lie out from their hiding and stand athwart his path. There is no escape. He does not stop to pray. He prays as he rides. He dashes through the troop of would-be captors, leaps over the wall at their back, and is gone before they have recovered from their surprise. And afterward he celebrates the event in a psalm of thanksgiving.

"By my God I have run through a troop."

"By my God I have leaped over a wall."

God helps those who help themselves.

Israel has spent seven years in captivity. The time planned by God for their deliverance is at hand. Isaiah tells them so. "Her warfare is accomplished, her iniquity is pardoned." But to accept deliverance will cost the people a long journey across the desert, and the perils and discomforts of a pioneer life in the abandoned land of their fathers. A new generation has arisen in whom Jerusalem is little more than a tradition. They have their homes and their business in the land of their exile. Some are disinclined to the adventure. Others are inert, hard to move. Why change? Isaiah strives to awaken in them patriotism; to enkindle in them hope; to inspire in them their father's faith in their fathers' God; to arouse them to action. "Prepare ye the way of the Lord," he cries; "make straight in the desert a highway for our God." They need not wait for him. He is waiting for them. They must prove the earnestness of their desire by the vigor of their endeavor. God will not work until they undertake the job.

God helps those who help themselves.

When Christ helped men he always gave them something to do. He told the paralytic to stretch forth his hand and in stretching it forth it was healed. He told the impotent man at the Pool of Bethesda to take up his bed and walk, and power came with his setting up. He told the lepers to go to the Temple at Jerusalem and report to the priests, and as they went they were healed.

And before Jesus finally left his disciples he gave them their mission and laid on them their responsibility. "As the Father has sent me," he said, "even so send I you. Whosoever sins ye remit, they are remitted unto them; and whosoever sins ye retain, they are retained." What is this but saying to us: You are to do the work. The world will be what you make it. You can purify the world if you will. If you do not do it, it will not be done. What is this but repeating the message of Isaiah: "They that wait upon the Lord"—not wait for him, wait on him, are his servants, do his work—"shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings as eagles; they shall run, and not be weary; they shall walk, and not faint."

## Getting Stale and Coming Back.

"I'm worried to death about my work at the office," a bright little girl said to me the other day. "What is usually easy comes hard, and I don't seem to put the snap into it that I used to. I think I must be getting stale."

And she looked as if she had lost both her last penny and her last friend.

Poor little girl. She's only nineteen and she has been working a little less than a year. This is probably her first experience with going stale and she thinks it's something tragic and final, something peculiar that has singled her out as a victim.

### Whether We Cook or Financier.

She doesn't know that we all, every mother's son and daughter of us, whether our profession be stenography, home making, writing, engineering, making millions in business, or cooking, and no matter how sincerely we love that profession, find ourselves going stale every once in a while.

And she doesn't know the happy ending of this sad sounding story, which is that in nine thousand, nine hundred and ninety-nine cases out of every ten thousand, we gradually find ourselves coming back to our old love and zest and power for work.

There are times when it seems to me that I can never write another word, and certainly not one even remotely worth reading. Years ago these moods used to worry me. I was sure they presaged the end of the world,—my world, I mean. And

then I found that, sometimes gradually, sometimes suddenly, the old love and zest came flooding back.

### Even the Mother Sometimes Gets Stale.

A mother surely ought to love her profession as much as anyone in the world, yet sometimes mothers get stale at their supreme profession. Perhaps they don't put it in just those words but that is what is really happening to them when they find themselves growing irritable and impatient, when they punish in unreasoning anger instead of trying to be just, when the prattle of little voices grates on their ears instead of making music for them.

When a trainer finds that the athletes under him are getting stale from over-training he sometimes has them give up their strict routine for a day or two.

If we could all do this when we get stale we'd come back more quickly than we do. The best thing for my little friend would be to leave her office work for a few days, put it out of her mind and her life and do something absolutely different. The best thing for me would be to shut up my desk; the best thing for the mother would be to go away from her children for a few days. We would all gain infinitely more than we lost.

### Even the Mother Sometimes Gets Stale.

But alas, some of us cannot steal these precious few days, and most of us think we can't.

Well, then, do the next best thing; get some change into your life by hook or crook. Go away for one day; spend it with someone you like and whom you do not often see. Spend a day out of doors. Nothing in the world will blow away staleness so quickly as fresh air. Treat yourself

to some luxury. Do anything to get your mind out of its rut.

And above all things, don't worry about being stale. Nothing keeps you stale so surely as worrying about it. Courage, comrade, to-morrow may find you your old self. Or if not to-morrow, at least the day after.

## TERRITORIAL EXPANSION FOR ITALY DEMANDED.

Rome, March 14.—Territorial expansion for Italy with new dominions "beyond the seas, especially on the Mediterranean," must be obtained, declared the Giornale d'Italia in a long article, regarded here as of a semi-official nature, in which the present crisis is discussed. Italy's seven months' neutrality, the paper says, was not lost for not only have her interests been defended but the nation has acquired greater political and military force.

"Since the beginning of the war," the Giornale d'Italia says, "Italy has declared her neutrality only until her own interests are in question thus intending to exclude any renunciation of her rights and proclaiming for her the amplest liberty of action. Neutrality has been maintained despite foreign flatteries and the pressure of internal agitation. The forces of the belligerents gradually are wearing out, while our energies are augmented."

"All have slowly recognized Italy's right to have the amplest liberty of action against any one. Thus foreign countries have abandoned the strange idea that they would be able to enlist Italy in the name of sentimentalism, like the romantic knight errant, or in the aid of great powers aspiring to the domination of the world."

"There is now beginning the second phase of the war which probably will be decisive. Italy has a frontier problem which for fifty years has oppressed her like a yoke, as the result of the unfortunate war of 1866, which forced Italy when she took the Venetian province to accept a confine which has been a threat. Now that the configuration of Europe, perhaps of a great part of the world, is about to be decided, we must and will obtain by every means, a frontier which politically and from a military viewpoint is in no sense a menace."

"Her anti-Italian policy in the Italian provinces within her borders was Austria's fatal mistake. It cannot and must not continue. These Italians must be saved from destruction. A nation of 37,000,000 inhabitants, bordered almost entirely by the sea, a great exporter of men, and with agricultural, industrial and commercial interests which are constantly developing, needs expansion beyond the seas; especially on the Mediterranean."

The newspaper says this statement summarizes the great problem which Italy must solve "by sacrificing blood and money, if necessary." It declares the nation must be constantly prepared for any eventuality.

## Russians Inflict an Overwhelming Defeat

**UPON GERMAN TROOPS.**  
Petrograd, March 25.—Complete destruction of two German battalions in the fierce fighting north of the Narw river in Poland is announced in an official statement issued at the Russian War Office to-day. In addition to annihilating these battalions the Russians put a third to flight and also captured four thousand prisoners.

This Russian victory was won on Tuesday along the battlefield extending from Mysyniec, near the East Prussian frontier, to Kasidlo, near the Russian fortress of Ostrolenka on the Narw.

"The Germans are making desperate efforts to break our front in the Narw region," says the official statement. "Their artillery subjects us to a perfect hurricane of fire, but the shells cause few losses because of the nature of our trenches. After bombarding our positions, the enemy makes attack in force. These are repelled."

"In one of these assaults we entirely annihilated two German battalions and put a third to disorderly flight on Tuesday near Vakh, on the road from Mysyniec to Kasidlo. A little wood there changed hands several times, but finally remained in our possession."

"The Germans operating in this region counter-attacked and, subjected to our machine-gun fire, suffered extremely heavy losses on their flank. "In the district between Kalwaria and Suwalki we captured a German convoy and a post car laden with correspondence."

**Messages Received Previous to 9 a.m.**

**OFFICIAL.**

LONDON, March 31.  
The Governor, Newfoundland:  
The French Government reports obstinate fighting in the Argonne, without any appreciable result on either side. The French captured a line of trenches and one hundred prisoners near Bois-les-Pretre. Seven hundred German dead were found on the scene of fighting at Hartmanns Weilerkopf.  
The Russian Government reports that German warships have shelled Liban. Fighting continues on the Niemen and in Northern Poland. In the Carpathians the Russian offensive is developing with perfect success.

**HARCOURT.**

**DOCKERS ENLISTING.**

LIVERPOOL, March 31.  
Lord Derby announced to-day that the Government was planning to organize the dock workers of Liverpool under the name of the First Dock Battalion of the Liverpool Regiment, the men to be dressed in khaki overalls. This plan is to be adopted to prevent further delay in handling war supplies. Labor troubles among the workers on the Mersey, recently, have caused serious embarrassment. The battalion is to be made up of 2,000 Union men, who will be enlisted under military law, with army pay, in addition to a guaranteed minimum wage of 35 shillings weekly. It is said that both ship-owners and Union officials favor the plan. The men are to enlist voluntarily, while the battalion will be for Home service only. Lord Derby will be in command of the regiment. Guarantees will be given that the organization will not be used for strike-breaking.

**INDIAN TRIBESMEN REVOLT.**

SIMLA, India, March 31.  
A revolt of ten thousand tribesmen at Tochi has resulted in a battle with the Government troops. The tribesmen were repulsed. Following is the official statement issued to-day: Ten thousand tribesmen composed of Zadrakis, collected with a view of attacking Tochi. Government troops under Brigadier-General Vane, engaged the natives at dawn on the 29th, repulsing them, killing two hundred and wounding three hundred. A subsequent reconnaissance showed no trace of the band.

**BRITISH STEAMER DAMAGED.**

LIVERPOOL, March 31.  
Badly damaged, but able to navigate, the British steamer City of Cambridge crept into port to-day with battered sides and superstructure, giving mute evidence of the effectiveness of an attack made by a German submarine on Sunday evening.

**ANOTHER STEAMER SUNK.**

LIVERPOOL, March 31.  
The Glasgow steamer Crown of Castle, 4,500 tons, is reported to have been torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine off Scilly Islands.

**THE 'CROWN OF CASTLE'**

CARDIFF, March 31.  
The Cardiff Echo declares that the British steamer Crown of Castle has been torpedoed off Scilly Islands. She was engaged in the trans-Atlantic trade, and sailed from St. John, N.B., on March 19. She was built and owned in Glasgow.

**'PRINCE EITEL FRIEDRICH'**

NEWPORT NEWS, March 31.  
Barge loads of coal for the German auxiliary cruiser Prince Eitel Friedrich, were brought down Hampton Roads this afternoon. The commander plans to begin coaling to-day.

**LORD ROTHSCHILD DEAD.**

LONDON, March 31.  
Lord Rothschild, head of the English branch of the family, died in London to-day.

**ANOTHER PIRATE SUNK.**

PARIS, March 31.  
A statement, indicating that a German submarine may have been sunk by a French cruiser, was given out by the Minister of Marine as follows: Yesterday a French light cruiser sighted a German submarine on the surface, off Dieppe. The cruiser gave chase, forcing the submarine to dive, firing meanwhile at periscope and timing, in order to ram it with the bow. The cruiser passed above the submarine at the moment the periscope disappeared, and from the spot where the submarine was last seen, quantities of oil floated on the surface.
