Recent announcements that emigraon on a large scale from Germany ould soon begin are seemingly coroborated by the news that a shipoad of Germans has just arrived at Buenos Aires, and that a representative of the German Government is making in Mexico City arrangements for the reception of something like 30,-000 of them.

It is easy to understand why Germans should want to escape the taxation they will have to bear at home, but that they should be allowed, and even encouraged, to go is decidedly nysterious.
