A small circle inclines Jeanne, plans are being made for the morrow. There is some talk of meeting the shooting party at luncheon; would

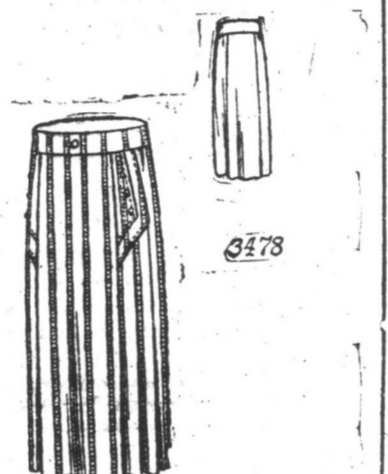

Forty-Two Years in the Public Service --- The Evening Telegram

Anglo-Russian Trade Negotiations Broken Off.

France and Poland Establish Entente--Dublin Has Night of Horror--Essex Shipwrights Will Build Schooner For Race--Japan Denies Agreement With Mexico.

NEGOTIATIONS BROKEN OFF.
LONDON, Feb. 6. The Moscow newspaper *Investia*, the official organ of the Soviets, is quoted in an exchange telegraph despatch from Berlin as stating that Anglo-Russian trade negotiations have broken off. The break, it is declared, was over Great Britain's demands that the Soviet Government carry on no propaganda in Persia or Afghanistan.

FRANCO-POLISH ENTENTE.
PARIS, Feb. 6. Highest importance is attached by the newspapers this morning to the Franco-Polish declaration yesterday that a "community of interests united these two friendly countries." The understanding is explained as "not an alliance, nor a screen for an alliance, but for the maintenance of existing relations of friendship." These ties, the *Petit Parisien* calls "stronger than a written alliance."

SATURDAY NIGHT HORROR.
BELFAST, Feb. 6. Dublin despatches to-day revealed that last Saturday night that city experienced a sensation when loud explosions and continuous volleys, resembling the sounds of battle on a small scale, became audible from three suburbs. It turned out that three ambushes had occurred, one of which resulted in the killing of a four-year-old child. The first ambush was in the neighborhood of Merrion Square, shortly before eight o'clock. Explosions which shook some of the older houses to their foundations were followed by fusillades of rifles and revolver fire. The inhabitants took refuge in their cellars, while persons in the street were stampeded by the firing. What happened was that three bombs were fired from a lorry filled with soldiers. This precipitated an exchange of shots which lasted several minutes without effect, except for the wounding of two civilians by bomb splinters. The second ambush occurred on the south side of the city, where two military lorries were bombed, and there was a similar brisk exchange of firing. A child of four years was shot through the head and a woman was wounded and taken to hospital. The third ambush occurred at nine p.m., when two military lorries were attacked at Rathmines, in the South suburbs in the vicinity of the Catholic chapel. An officer of the military was slightly wounded and some civilians, including a boy received serious injuries. Their report from Dublin Castle claims that several civilians were hit in the affair at Merrion Square, five civilians in the South Side incident and two young men in the Rathmines encounter.

WANTON DESTRUCTION.
LONDON, Feb. 6. Summerhill House, 25 miles from Dublin and one of the most beautiful homes in Ireland, was burned yesterday with a loss of \$100,000, according to weekly despatch. Several men entered the rear of the castle and set fire to thirty gallons of petrol with which they fired two wings of the building, which the police found a roaring furnace upon their arrival.

JAPAN DENIES RUMORED AGREEMENT WITH MEXICO.
TOKIO, Feb. 5. Denial is made by Foreign Office reports that the Japanese and Mexican Governments have reached an agreement under which Japanese, desiring to purchase land in Mexico, would be given every facility by Mexico.

TO LAY MAYFLOWER'S KEEL.
ESSEX, Mass., Feb. 6. The keel of the fishing schooner *Mayflower*, which is to be a contender for the International Cup next fall, will be laid next Monday, according to an announcement to-night by Everett James, the builder. Under present plans, Governor Cox, next Thursday, will drive the first spike. Work on the schooner will be rushed, Mr. James said, in the effort to have the vessel ready by April 30th so that she may have a season on the fishing banks, as required by the rules governing the race.

RAILWAY SMASH IN AUSTRIA.
VIENNA, Feb. 6. Twenty-five persons were killed and forty seriously injured yesterday when a freight train drawn by three engines collided with the Tarvis-Vienna express train near Felzendorf.

GREEK CABINET RESIGNS.
ATHENS, Feb. 5. The Greek Cabinet formed on November 18th, by Premier Rallis has resigned, as the result of a controversy between the Premier and Minister of War Gounares as to which one would head the delegation which will attend the next Peace Conference to be held in London next month.

EARTHQUAKE AT TEHUANTEPEC.
MEXICO CITY, Feb. 5. Considerable property damage was done by earthquake on Thursday night in districts centering about the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, according to newspaper advices received here last night. It is believed many lives were lost in the region shaken.

GERMANY BANS CARNIVALS.
BERLIN, Feb. 5. Herr Severing, Prussian Minister of the Interior, who recently put the ban on Monocles, worn by security police, has notified President Ebert that in view of the "great gravity of Germany's situation" the comic carnival season in which Germans were accustomed to make merry for a month will not be observed. Those who celebrate will be severely punished. Baden and Bavaria have made similar decisions.

WOULD ISOLATE BELFAST.
BELFAST, Feb. 5. Attempts to isolate Belfast from communication with the rest of Ireland were made last night, telegraph and telephone wires being cut in every direction. It was suggested that the endeavor was to prevent the circulation of Sir Edward Carson's speech at the Session of the Ulster Unionist Council yesterday but the address had been telegraphed before the wires were severed.

POLES WILL EVACUATE VILNA.
PARIS, Feb. 5. Vilna will be evacuated by Polish irregulars as soon as the date for the Lithuanian plebiscite is fixed, and an international occupation contingent has arrived under formal promise made by President Pilsudski to Leon Bougeois President of the Council of the League of Nations.

Dear Sir,—In a note relating to Mr. Geo. W. B. Ayre's last letter published in your paper, you state that you were obliged to delete certain references contained in the original. I think you would have done well to have run your pencil also through his reference to the Church of England Institute. The Institute has a good reputation in the community, which it is anxious to maintain, and the fact of Mr. Geo. W. B. Ayre having included a reference to it in one of his lengthy epistles has not added in any way to that reputation.

It is a matter of astonishment to many of the members of the C.E.I. to learn that Mr. Ayre is still connected with the Institute, as he has not been in its districts for some time without any assistance from Geo. W. B. Ayre, Esq., have, during the above period brought the Institute to its present excellent social and financial condition.

As a member of the C. E. Institute I resent its name being dragged into a discussion of matters with which it has nothing to do, and would suggest to Mr. Ayre that in future he keep to his own particular controversy; otherwise he may find that he has "bitten off more than he can chew."

 Dear Sir,—The approaching spring is looked forward to with feelings of anxiety by fishermen here, as it is apparent to the most casual observer that supplies will be difficult to obtain and the tremendous losses, sustained by men supplying for the fishery here last season, has discouraged them from again risking their savings in such a perilous enterprise as the fishery. Unless Cooker's mad career is stopped the young men will flee from this country in thousands to enrich the revenues of other lands, and desolation and despair will settle like a funeral pall over the land. How long, Oh Lord, how long will the present corrupt administration be tolerated in power? No band of politicians, outside the famous Tammany Ring, has been known to display such shameless raids on a country's wealth. At this time last season men were busy preparing their codtraps, and building boats to prosecute the fishery, but at the present time very few are engaged at this work, as it is generally conceded that to go fishing under the conditions that existed last season would be madness. The Fishery Regulations are blamed for much of the misery and want that prevails here to-day and the cry goes up from an outraged people for a change of Government.

Too late, the people realize how they were fooled and deluded into voting against their true friends and returning instead the greatest crowd of political scoundrels that ever disgraced a country. The Sugar scandal is enough to make one's blood boil with indignation when they realize that if it were not for the F.C.B. sugar would now be selling at 11 cents per pound.

"What fools these mortals be!" is certainly applicable to the electors of this district for turning down a man who has purchased their fish and given out supplies and substituting a man who can do nothing to help them out. Oh for a leader of the calibre of Cashin or the noble-hearted Crosbie, whose generosity towards fishermen of this place who could not dispose of their fish, will be indelibly enshrined in the minds of those men. Yes, Mr. Editor, the name of Sir J. C. Crosbie is respected and honored in this district. Not only did he extend the hand of kindness to his friends but also to those who were his strongest opponents, and their opposition has now turned into admiration for him, and in the next election those who opposed him will take off their coats and

fight for Crosbie and Cashin. Man of the North Shore, it is up to you to rectify the terrible mistake you made in the fall elections of 1919 and again last spring. Petition the Government against the iniquitous fishery regulations. We appeal to Cave and LeGrow to resign their seats and give us a chance to elect men who can do something to help out the fishermen. We believe the hour has struck for the people to arise in their might and hurl the present aggregation miscalled a Government, from power. A great wave of public feeling is sweeping over the country increasing in volume as it advances, and we hope before long it will sweep far out in the sea of political oblivion the most shameless, extravagant Government this country has ever had.

Swiss Annoyed at Canada's Flag.

The announcement just made that the Canadian Government has introduced a merchant marine flag showing a white cross encircled by a ring on a red ground has caused consternation in Switzerland. The Swiss flag is, of course, a white cross on a red ground, but without any ring around the cross, and the Swiss press and public are asking their Government whether Canada cannot be prevented from having a merchant marine flag so closely resembling the Swiss flag, especially as Switzerland hopes one day to have her own merchant marine, in view of her long cherished project of having a canal connecting the Rhone, or one connecting Marseilles with Lyons and Geneva, and also utilizing the Rhone. It is suggested that this new grievance is one which might be carried to the League of Nations, but it is possible that the Swiss Government will merely make friendly representations to Canada.

The total production of Italy's industries in 1919 has fallen far below the 1918 level.

Britain's Miracles.

Referring to South Africa. Hon. Mr. Rowell asked: "Under what other flag will you find such miracles as I have related." His query followed a statement of the loyalty of the Dutch population who twenty years ago were at war with Great Britain. Truly the present state of South Africa is one of the many miracles worked under the Union Jack. In almost every quarter of the globe similar instances of the benignity of British rule are to be found. The most complete proof of that is seen in the sacrifices made by every part of the Empire in the great war. In normal times of peace the dominions are jealous of their prerogatives as self-governing states. But in the time of danger or crisis they respond to the needs of the Empire in a whole-hearted way that excites admiration throughout the world. Any person looking for evidence of Britain's love of freedom, and its willingness to grant it, could not discover anything more convincing than the love and loyalty of her distant daughter nations. It reveals a series of miracles, of which South Africa is but one.—The Sentinel.

Student Goes Five Days Without Food.

In a successful effort to test his will-power, A. J. Graham, a second year student at the Ontario Agricultural College, has concluded a five-day fast. A close study of the famine conditions in China had spurred him on, as he wanted to find out how it felt to be really hungry, and in addition to this he has a strong conviction that the people of the world are eating too much, and that fasting will do much to cure many of the ills that are so prevalent to-day. The student had nick-named him "MacSwiney."

Toy Pistols Much Too Deadly.

A novelty firm in New York has been shipping pistols into Toronto through the mails. The detectives, who secured possession of one of the small revolvers, tested it and found that the gun would fire small-calibre bullets. The company claims they are "toy pistols" and can only be used for blank cartridges. They have been instructed to discontinue sending the guns into Canada.

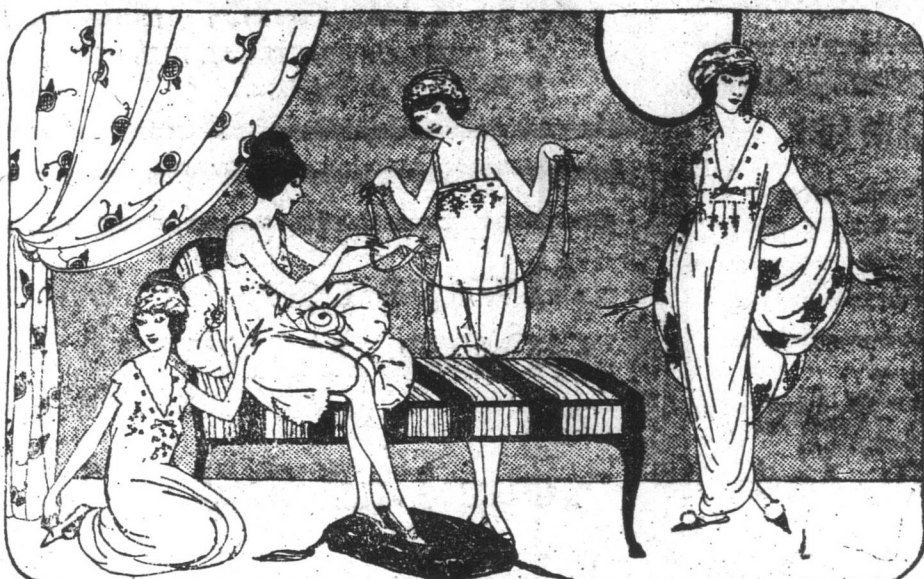

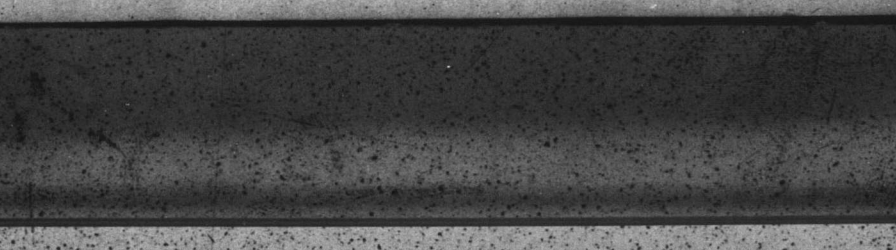

Gentleman Jackson, the Pugilist.

Perhaps the man who did most to popularize the "noble art" was John Jackson, champion of England, and better known to history as "Gentleman Jackson." Unlike most other pugilists who have distinguished themselves for only one trait of excellence, he possessed three—superior strength, science, and pluck. His agility in the ring was extraordinary. At an exhibition of sparring in the "Five Courts" got up in honor of the then Czar of Russia after the signing of "Peace of Europe," on February 7, 1812, Gentleman Jackson demonstrated the marvellous science he possessed, and aroused the admiration and enthusiasm of the spectators. He did much to lift the sport to a higher level, for in his luxurious rooms at Bond Street, he gave lessons in scientific boxing to the nobility and gentry of the age; creating an enthusiasm for the game among a class which had previously been content to watch others perform. To be a pupil of Gentleman Jackson became a vogue, and the "young bloods" of the day did not consider they were thorough in the fashion till they had had their "claret tapped" by the champion of England. It was not, however, only as a scientific boxer that Gentleman Jackson outshone his contemporaries, for he was, in addition, one of the toughest fighters. In his second public fight, when he was only nineteen years of age, he gave such an outstanding exhibition of fortitude that he at once became famous. He was matched on that occasion against Inglesstone—a man who only just missed championship honours. Jackson was then far from the accomplished professional which he afterwards became, and he underwent a thorough grueling at the hands of Inglesstone. Although he got the worst of the encounter in every round, he fought steadily on. But he was fighting a losing fight all the time, and at last sustained a terrific fall, in which he broke his leg. He wanted to fight for a finish, but Inglesstone, with his natural sense of fair play, absolutely refused to entertain such a one-sided proposition, and Jackson's seconds agreed.
