Vatican Protests British Mandate For Palestine.

\$3,000,000 Saved Railway Board by Wages Cut--Army of Returned Men Marching on Ottawa---Week End Destruction in Belfast.

BIG WAGES CUT. CHICAGO, May 28. Adjustment of wages of maintenance employees announced by United States Railway Labor Board to-night affects 400,000 employees and will reduce the wage bill of the railroads by \$48,000,000 yearly.

GERMANY WILL ACCEPT. BERLIN, May 28. Tageblatt says the note to be sent by the Reparations Commission to Germany will indicate acceptance of the Commission's decision on the express condition that Germany shall be followed by an international loan on tolerable conditions.

A PAPAL PROTEST. GENEVA, May 28. Cardinal Gasparri, Papal Secretary of State, has addressed a note on behalf of the Vatican to the League of Nations, says the Exchange Telegraph, setting in strong terms against the British mandate for Palestine. The note, says the news agency, is on the ground that the mandate threatens religious equality. The creation of a Jewish National Home in Palestine, it is argued, gives the adherents of Zionism a privileged position.

FREE STATE PARLIAMENT. DUBLIN, May 28. The Provisional Government announces that in accordance with Article 17 of the Treaty signed in London in 1921, it has been decided to summon Parliament to meet in Dublin on July first.

ROUND THE WORLD FLIGHT. LYONS, France, May 28. The British round the world flight flyers left for Turin at 10.45 a.m.

AGREEMENT RE CHURCH TREASURES. MOSCOW, May 28. An agreement has been reached between the Vatican and Foreign Minister Tchitcherin whereby the Soviet Government will accept the Catholic Churches of Russia in their campaign of requisitioning Church treasures for the famine relief fund, a correspondent is informed. CRISIS NOT OVER. PARIS, May 28. REPUBLICAN ARMY UNITED. DUBLIN, May 28. Two sections of the Irish Republican Army will be brought together in the near future, it is asserted to-day on what are considered good grounds. Negotiations, which have been proceeding for some time are reported to have reached definite conclusions.

Household Notes.

To give the stove a smooth, attractive surface, rub with a soft cloth dipped in melted paraffin.

A non-poisonous fly paper is made by painting oiled paper with equal parts of molasses and varnish.

When using the fireless cooker, use metal radiators for quick baking and soapstone for slower baking.

Chop left-over meat and use in a highly seasoned, jellyed meat loaf. Garnish with slices of hard-boiled egg.

French dressing made with lemon juice instead of vinegar is better in flavor and will stimulate the liver.

A stiff brush, a strong scrubbing powder and very hot water will remove old paint and varnish from floors. Coarse hominy should be boiled directly over fire for 15 minutes, then steamed in double boiler for about 3 hours.

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)
Codfish—The total shipments this week amount to 2,317 quintals, all from St. John's, viz.—By schr. Hazel...

Cod Oil—Enquiries still continue, and we notice small shipments by each outgoing steamer. It looks as if all markets will be very bare before the new crop can be available. It was pleasing news to hear that the Senate at Washington had cut out from the proposed Fisheries Tariff on cod oil...

Flour—May wheat in Chicago this week fluctuated once more back around 131 and July wheat to 122. The idea seems now to have taken permanent hold on the minds of wheat dealers that there will be sufficient wheat to fulfill all requirements until the new winter crop is ready.

Pork—The pork market in Chicago continues to show growing strength, and May pork reached \$23.25 this week as compared with the maximum of \$29.95 last week. The local prices have not yet been much influenced upward except Mess Pork and Ham Butt, which are \$29.50 and \$30.00 barrels per barrel, as against \$29.00 for both last week.

Beef—The beef market has so far not moved up in sympathy with the strong movement in Pork, but it is expected to do so shortly, should the latter keep its present tendency. The S. S. Digby brought in 200 barrels this week, the S. S. Belveron 64, and the S. S. Rosalind 20 barrels. This makes 10,587 for the St. John's market since New Year as compared with 6,300 for corresponding date last year—a surplus of 4,287. The quotations in the local market are lower in some of the grades than last week at the wholesale houses.

Molasses—The market for molasses is quiet but steady. The new product continues to be sold here for 75 cents "Fancy" in the puncheon, and 65 cents for "Choice." At Barbados prices are quoted at 35 cents to 38 cents per wine gallon. Since our last issue the schr. Humbird arrived here from Barbados to the Moore Export Coy. with 245 puncheons, 20 barrels and 32 half-barrels. The following vessels are also due with cargoes next month: Jean Dundonald, Duff, David Ritchie, Gordon E. Moulton, Ene A. Moulton, and Annie L. Warren. The imports to date are about 2,900 puncheons, as against 1,800 last year at this date.

Sugar—There has been no change in prices since our last report. Buyers evidently are of the opinion that prices are about at the bottom in "American Refined." The New York quotation this week is \$5.25 to \$5.40, and Montreal \$5.80 to \$5.90 per 100 lbs. St. John's price is \$10.50 to \$10.80 per 100 lbs. The imports to St. John's since New Year are 26,000 hundred-weight against 25,000 the same date last year, the shortage indicating a belief in a steady, if not declining market. Refiners in both Canada and the United States are buying "raw" in small quantities only, according as they require supplies, which is a sure indication of a belief in the continuance of a low, steady market.

Potatoes—Sales are quite heavy in the local market this week to meet the requirements of the farmers, who are now planting. Prices are the same as quoted last week, except for special quantities of early potatoes, which are as high as \$5.00 per barrel. The regular prices, however, are \$3.20 to \$3.40 for imported and \$2.50 to \$2.70 for home grown—fifty cents less in Conception Bay. United States potatoes of the New Southern States crop have declined \$1.00 to \$1.50 per barrel since May 1st. The market holds the tone of firmness indicated last week and local sales are running at \$4.00 per sack for white and \$3.80 for mixed. The demand for seedling is just now particularly good and what were imported since the first week of May are being fast absorbed. The S. S. Maple down now en-route from Montreal, is bringing more consignments. The price is likely to hold around present levels till the new crop is available. Hay—The market is quiet and unchanged and purchasing is limited to more immediate requirements of car lots in Montreal have been made again this week at \$35.00 to \$40.00 per ton. In the local market the demand has fallen off owing to there being now good grazing for cattle in the pasture fields. The suburban farmers sold quite a large quantity the past week or two at 2 1/2 cents a pound, or \$45.00 the short ton. 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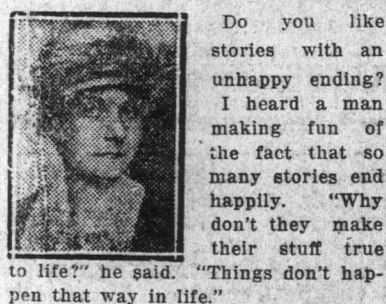

Do you like stories with an unhappy ending? I heard a man making fun of the fact that so many stories end happily. "Why don't they make them stuff true to life?" he said. "Things don't happen that way in life."

Someone told him that the editors would seldom accept stories with unhappy endings.

"They're crazy," he said, "I'll bet people would like them better for a change."

I wonder if he was right. No, that isn't true. I don't wonder. I went to the movies the other night in a little country town and there sat beside me a work-worn man of about 60 in shabby clothes, twisting an old cap in his hands.

"Next Week!"

The first picture was a serial. We saw the tenth episode of the adventures of half a dozen characters in the pursuit of a highly important

secret. As we all unconsciously enter into the identities of the hero or heroine of the picture or story we enjoy.

We Needn't Worry.

Pictures and the movies are vacarious living. We live through them a more vivid, more dramatic, more satisfying life than the fates have vouchsafed to most of us. And one of the great charms to the ordinary human being who has enough drabness, enough anxiety about how things are coming out, enough disappointment in his own life, is the blessed certainty that he does not need to worry about the story or picture; that the author will see that his hero and heroine get their heart's desire in the end.

And this is why I do not wonder if the high brow critic was right when he said the editors were foolish to insist that the majority of the stories they accept should end happily.

Historic Diamond Sold For \$5,500.

The big Dara-Gal-Noor diamond, brought to New York by Princess Fatima, "Sultana of Afghanistan," last summer, and which the Princess said was the second largest diamond in the world, and worth a king's ransom, was knocked down for \$5,500 on May 9 at a Sheriff's auction. Of the \$5,500 only \$135 was left for the Princess from the sale of the "River of Glory" gem. The rest went to satisfy liens for loans, duty on the diamond, attorney's fees and hotel bills. John R. Kahn, a diamond expert and jewelry buyer, bought the stone after a few minutes' furious bidding, which slowed up considerably after the bids had gone over \$5,500. Princess Fatima had said that she expected to realize \$200,000 on the diamond because of its historical value, but experts had appraised the intrinsic value at less than \$7,000. The stone is said to have once been the property of Alexander the Great, and to have adorned the famous peacock throne of Persia.


