

Editor Tvening Telegram Dear Sir .- As an experienced Walonian, I have read with interest your report of the large catch (50 trout) in Fortune Bay, weighing 466 lbs., or over 9 lbs. per trout, in exactly four ours, as per Mr. Warren's letter published in the Evening Telegram of September 14th.

Like Mr. Tucker I must say I doubt ry much the veracity of this "Fish tory," but as neither Mr. Tucker nor have seen the size of the boat or the trout, I will attack the story on a different course, and that course is the time in landing the trout, which stands no argument.

I may say I have landed 25 trout veighing in all 125 lbs., and at another me 8 trout weighing 62 lbs., also a 71/2 lb. trout which took me thirtyfive minutes to land. The trout referred to in your letter average over nine ounds each, and I defy anyone to and a trout of this size in less than een minutes, and this is the minium time for this size of fish, caught airly on a rod as per letter, and not even allowing for the loss of time in taking the fish from the hook or waitng for another rise, the best that ould be done would be to land the lot 121/2 hours or fifteen minutes per ive minutes per trout, and this calculation does not even include the time catching the ten trout that were not weighed.

### Hypnotized by Height

Death-Leaps" Explained by a Doctor.

Every now and again we read of men and women who have fallen or leaped to death from heights—from piers, high bridges, the upper decks of liners, and so on. In many of these cases there is no reason for suspecting suicide, the victims having been perfectly happy, in comfortable circumstances, and without even the shadow of a motive for self-destruction.

Recent instances are those of Miss Cromwell, daughter of a wealthy New York financier, who, leaning over the deck rail of the S.S. Veendam, was seized with vertigo or dizziness and plunged to her death; and of Mrs. Charles Crouse, wife of a millionaire, who fell from the thirteenth foor of a hotel as the result of an attack of

What is this dizziness-this vertigo? Most of us have it at some time or other; but do we really know what it is, or what its causes are? There are many persons who suffer for the greater part of their lives from chronic vertigo-Meniere's disease, as it is celled after its discoverer But in Five Hours what concerns us is the vertigo that attacks a person who is apparently in

A momentary confusion of ideas, other part says at the same time, "It's not, and you know it."

This confusion and contradiction o may bring on a sudden attack of vertigo, which disappears the moment the individual realizes why that confusion

Such an experience befell Dr. Fridenberg, who, glancing across the street along which he was passing, saw a man swaying as if he were drunk. He would have seen nothing remarkable in this had he not noticed that the man was carefully reading a newspaper, which a swaying man does not do. The doctor was seized with an attack of vertigo; then subconsciously grasped the solution of the perplexing problem, and the vertigo vanished. The doctor was, in fact, looking not at the man himself. but at his reflection in the glass of a

sengers" keep us informed of our position in space. These are the semi-circular canals of our inner ears, our eves, and our general muscular sense. all of which help us to preserve our balance. They may be compared to the legs of a tripod on which we rest; the sudden loss of one brings us down.

### Fatal Confusion.

Miss Cromwell's death seems to ave been due to vertigo following eye-strain. If you look down at the water when a ship is moving, your eye instinctively tries to follow the movement of certain parts of the water, involving a terrific strain if the vessel is going fast. The eye cannot perform the task required of it; confusion follows, the balance of the "tripod" is upset, and vertigo results.

Mrs. Crouse's death arose from vertigo induced through looking down from a height. She forced her eyes to do what they were not accustomed to do-look straight down with a longdistance focus. Accustomed to see the ground or a floor about five and a half feet away, they are accustomed to focus at that point. Asked suddenly to focus a hundred times as far, something seems wrong, and there is momentary mental confusion and vertigo. A wrong mesage is flashed to the brain, or the brain flashes a message to the wrong set of muscles. Then, instead of a drawing back to safety, there is a forward leap-to death.

### Insist on Clean Meat

HOW HOUSEWIVES CAN HELP.

Housewives can help to end the clean-meat farce if they will patronise only those butchers who are making some attempt to observe the cleanmeat rules.

Women should make a point of purchasing from shops where the meat is protected from dust and mud by glass windows, and where files are kept of by a fan or muslin cloths.

They should also complain if they see people handling the meat. Carcases hung in shops should be covered with muslin cloths, especially if they are placed near the doorway.

Butchers will soon comply with the regulations if customers insist. A medical officer said yesterday that the doctors looked to the public to help them in their campaign for cleaner meat.

"Too many people," he said, "are ready to accept conditions as they are. That is why we have not got things changed before. It is important that boys who deliver, meat on bicycles should have it well covered with muslin. In any case, housewives should soak their meat for several hours in water before it is cooked."-

# By Airship to the

ANGELES" CRAFT EXPRESS-ES VIEW.

BERLIN, August (U.P.)-"The exloration of the north pole will be made with an airship or it will not e made at all."

This is the considered opinion of Dr. Hugo Eckener, the famous commander of the "Los Angeles," then the "ZR 3," on her Transatlantic

If the Council of Ambassadors grants Germany the permission to build another airship for scientific research, then by the spring of 1927. the world will know what is to be known about the north pole. The geographic problems regarding the distribution of land and water in the arctic regions, problems of magnetsm, of the atmosphere, of high sea currents and of electricity, all will e solved by the expedition to be aunched with the new airship under Dr. Eckener's command and with Fritjof Nansen leading the staff of scientists on board.

In an interview with the United Press Dr. Eckener explained the preparations he has already made for he aeronautic part of the expedition. The Zeppelin company contemplated such an expedition before the war, and Count Zeppelin went to Spitzbergen to study the possibilities of anchoring and the air cur-

The plans for the new airship are ready, and foresee a ship of 110,000 cubic metres, that is about one-and-ahalf times the capacity of the Los Angeles. Otherwise the ship will be of the same type as the Los Angeles. like her carry five motors of 2.000 h.p. Owing to its larger dimensions. it is reckoned that the new ship will make between 75 and 85 miles an

A certain difficulty confronts us in securing the necessary outfit to navigate the ship near the pole. The cold is not, as the layman might thing, the chief obstacle. In spring and summer the temperature in the polar region is not as cold as the public think, and especially above the freezing point. Besides, as Dr. Eckener pointed out, during the war the Zeppelins, flying very high, sometimes encountered a temperature of degrees below zero, and nevertheless the motors work very well. The cold merely necessitates adding alcohol to the water for the motors.

### The Magnetic Pole.

The difficulty in navigating the ship arises from the special condiis of the polar region, that is from of no use, and it needs a complicated system of gauging to determine the position of the ship. Even the wireless set is influenced by these conditions Dr. Eckener nevertheless is confident that he will be able to guide the ship wherever he wishes.

Another point to be considered is the possibility of landing. Measures will be taken to enable the ship to descend on the surface of the water and to anchor there. Should no open water of sufficient dimensions be found, the touring of the pole will be made without landing. A landing other than on water, would be very difficult, because no crew is available to tow the ship down and fasten it to an anchor mast.

The ship must be larger than the os Angeles to carry the large scientific staff. It will be remembered that on the trans-Atlantic flight the ZR could not take another passenger because she needed all her carrying ower for the 30 tons of fuel. A simlar airship would be able to carry another 4 tons, if it started its flight from a place of sea-level and not, as did the ZR 3, from a place 400 metres above the sea. If the Los Angeles yould attempt a north pole expediion, she would have to use hydrogen ecause, filled with hellum, she carries 9 tons less. But for safety a bigger airship would always be required. Dr. Eckener has sufficient trained men in Friedrichshafen to make up

his crew, which will amount to some thirty men. The scientific members will be limited to twenty and include several German and some international experts. Dr. Eckener has already wired to Amundsen reminding him of previous discussions about eaching the pole in an airship, and e hopes that Amundsen and Ellsworth will join Nansen for the two rips which are now considered.

Contrary to Amundsen's last exedition, this new one will not mean he physical strain he just underwent. The scientists will have to work assiduously, but to use Dr. Eckener's words, they will live near the pole, as if they stayed in a dining-car or a sleeping-compartment.

"You tell me," said the judge, "that this is the person who knocked you down with his motor car. Could you swear to the man?"





Bigger Than a Liner

ALL METAL AIRSHIP TO LIFT

All airships yet devised will be dwarfed by a new type now under the consideration of experts in the United States. Our two new giant British airships are to weigh 150 tons. and to contain 5,000,000 cubic feet of gas. These American super-airships, however, will be larger than ocean liners, and will be borns aloft by 15,000,000 and even 20,000,000 cubic feet of gas. A vast ship of the air faprojected, unlike any so far built, and lispensing with a fabric covered outer aheathing, and also with internal gas bigs. The steel girders of this mouster's hull are to be covered, exweight metal plates, made from an aluminium alloy. This plating is to be riveted in such a way that the metal hall is not only weather-proof, but gas-proof, enabling hydrogen or helium to be pumped directly into it.


