Essex Election-McGregor **Re-Elected**.

Jeremiah O'Connor's protest against the legality of Mr. McGregor's can-didature does not seem to have had much effect in influencing the election for Essex, which came off on Thursday. Although Mr. O'Connor was thrust upon the Conservatives against the will of the substantial and influential members of the party, and at the outset of the contest they displayed a disposition to stand aloof from the struggle, ultimately they were pretty generally whipped into line and worked hard for him. Still there was comparatively little excitement over the event, the Conservatives evidently feeling ashamed of HEI their man and the Reformers deeming Mr. McGregor's return perfectly safe without the customary effort. The vote has been very light from this cause, and also because the ballot is an entirely new idea to a large portion of the electors, who displayed onsiderable timidity about its use Notwithstanding, the vote is larger than many anticipated. and the Re. form majority of January last is un doubtedly increased. Although the returns are not all in, there is httle doubt that the majority for McGregor will be over a thousand.







A Remarkable Masonic Incident.

A Remarkable Masonic Incident. The first Masonic funeral that ever co-mured in California took place in 1849, and was performed over a brother found drowned in the Bay of San Francisco. An account of the caremonies states, that on the body of deceased was found a sil-ver mark of a Mason, up.-n which were engraved the initials of his name. A hittle further investigation revealed to the beholder the most singular exhibi-tion of Masonic emblems that ever was human skit. There is nothing in the bistory of the traditions of Freemasonry equal to it. Beautifully dotted on the left arm, in red and blue ink, which time of the entire apprenticeship. On removing his garments from his body the trowel presented itself, with all the other tools of operative Masonry. Over his heart was the pot of incense. On the other parts of his body were the bee-hive, the book of constitutions guard-ed by the Tyler's sword, pointing to a maked heart; the All-Sceing Eye, the anchor and ark, the hour-glass, the soythe, the forty-seventh problem of Euclid, the sum, moon, stars and comets; the three steps which are emblematical of youth, manhood and age. Admirably exceuted was the weeping vrgin, reclin-ing on a broken column, upon which lay the book of constitutions. In her right hand she heid tho pot of incense, the Masonic emblem of a pure heart, and in her left hand a sprig of acaca, the em-blem of the immortality of the soul. Im-mediately beneath her stood a winged Time, with his scythe by his side, which cuts the britte thread of life, and the hour-glass at his feet, which is ever ro-min ling us that our lives are withering away. The withered and attenuated figure of the Destroyer was placed amid the long and flowing ringlets of the dis-consolate mourner. Thus were striking emblems of mortality and inmortality blended in one pictorial represedtation. 

Longevity in Canada. Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick had a population in 1871 of 8,486,000. There were 141 upwards of 100 years of age; 1389 under 100 and above 90; 13,000 above 80; 51,422 uhder 80 and above 70; 112,783 under 70 and above 60; 181,613 under 60 and above 50. In the same year there had only been 47,814 deaths, while the births amounted to 117,561. These facts testify to the healthinessof the climate, aithough for three or four months there are consi-derable extremes; yet this is only a small matter compared with the foggy atmosphere and rainy seasons of the British Islands.


