

Bacteria as a Cause of Combustien.

Experiments made by Prof. F. Cohn regarding the cause of the so-called "spontaneous combustion" of masses of cotton, grass, tobacco, etc., have led him to the conclusion that it is invariably due to a fermentation caused by bacteria. 




