

the market price of silver. Under this law the government bought that amount of silver monthly, stored it away in the treasury vaults and issued silver bills in its stead to the extent of its value. There are now stored away in these vanlts many tons of this silver bullion which is doing nobody any good and is all the time lessening in value as the price of silver declines in the markets of the world. In the meantime when any of these silver bills are presented to the treasury they have to be rede med in

gold in order to keep them at their face value. All will remember the silver scare

which occurred a few months ago when the secretary of the treasury intimated in an interview that it might soon become necessary to redeem these silver certificates in silver

This silver purchase law seems to the disinterested observer to have been the quintescence of folly. It was passed during Harrison's time to catch the votes of the silver states. In this respect, however, it failed, as those states wanted free coinage of silver aud nearly all of them were carried by the Populist party, which adopted free coinage

as one of its leading planks. Now the silver men oppose its repeal simply because i makes a market for that amount of silver monthly. But why should a governmen

buy silver and store it away, merely to help the silver mines? Can not the farmer with equal force demand that it should also buy his wheat, store it away, and issue certificates on the strength of it? Indeed, the

It was simply impossible for the United States, great as its resources are, to go on buying silver always and paying for it in gold. Such a law had to be repealed sooner or later, and although it has taken a desparate effort to accomplish it,. yet it has been done. It remains now to beseen what new legislation shall be enacted

to regulate the use of silver. In the mean time the repeal of this act helps to remove doubt as to the stability and value of the silver bills. They should be all right now






