GLAZES FOR DUTCH TILES.

Kraetzer recommends the following composition.

1. WHITE GLAZE.—Stir together 120 parts of concentrated solution of soda water-glass and milk of lime (7½ to 12 parts of lime) until the mixture is perfectly dry; then pulverize, grind and sift. The crude tiles are either brushed over with water-glass solution or the powder moistened with water glass solution is applied as glaze and burnt. Polish, 100 parts, chile saltpetre, 15½, and lime 25, fused together, pulverized and mixed with water-glass solution may be worked in the same manner.

2. DEEP RED GLAZE.—Finely pulverized white glass 15 parts, pulverized borax 7½, whiting 5, chile saltpetre ¼, purple of cassius 2½, fused together, pulverized and applied with water-glass solution.

3. DARK RED GLAZE.—Glass 24 parts, soda 12, borax 9, red lead 9, chile saltpetre 4½, antimony ½, purple of cassius 3, sal ammoniac 3, fused together, pulverized and applied with water glass solution.

4. AZURE BLUE GLAZE.—Glass 16 parts, soda 5½, borax 4, calcined bones 2½, chile saltpetre 1½, cobaltic oxide 1½, fused together, pulverized and applied with water-glass solution.

According to other statements, a good glazing mixture is obtained by carefully burning 60 parts of lead and 40 of tin. Fuse 106 parts of the ash thus obtained with 50 parts of sand free from iron, 50 parts of common salt, 20 of feldspar, 6 of saltpetre and 6 of litharge. The fused mass is ground. If for some masses this glaze should prove too liquid, so that it runs off, take for the above mixture 60 parts of sand and 25 to 30 parts of feldspar.

ST. HILAIRE, QUE.—St. Victor Convent at this place was destroyed by fire on the 8th inst. The building cost \$25,000 and will be rebuilt.

DUNDAS, ONT.—It is proposed to expend \$10,000 for the purpose of improving the water supply of the town. Considerable pipe will be required.

NEW GLASGOW, N. S.—The Town Clerk is issuing debentures as follows. For waterworks, \$5,000. street improvements, \$10,000. sewers, \$10,000.

QUEBEC, QUE.—Dr. DeGrosbois, M.L.A. for Shefford, is asking the Provincial Government for a grant of \$10,000 to build the Jackson bridge at Roxton.

TWEED, ONT.—It is understood that Mr. G. M. Miller, architect, of Toronto, will be entrusted with the preparation of plans for a new church to be erected here.

BROCKVILLE, ONT.—It is expected that the corner stone of the new Separate school and the new convent school will be laid by Archbishop Cleary on the 16th inst.

HULL, QUE.—Work has commenced on the excavation for the new Court House, and it is expected everything will be ready for building by the end of the present month.

WHITBY, ONT.—Mr. A. M. Ross will receive tenders until the 16th inst. for furnaces and other appliances required in heating the Music Hall and Council Chamber.

PEMBROKE, ONT.—A by-law has been introduced in the Town Council authorizing the issuing of \$50,000 of debentures for the construction of a system of waterworks for the town.

PETERBOROUGH, ONT.—The Town Council is gaining information on electric street railways, having sent a deputation to witness the operation of the new electric road just completed at Ottawa.

WOODSTOCK, ONT.—Messrs. Cuthbertson & Fowler, architects, have prepared plans and will superintend the erection of the proposed House of Refuge, for which a site has been selected near this town.

ST. LAMBERT, QUE.—A project is under consideration to construct waterworks and sewerage systems for the town, and a by-law will shortly be submitted to the ratepayers to raise the necessary funds.

OTTAWA, ONT.—The residents of March Corners are talking of erecting a new school house.—Mr. Wise, Superintendent of the Rideau Canal, has recommended the construction of a new dam, at what is known as "Hog's Back."

TILSONBURG, ONT.—Stone pavements are to be laid on a number of the streets.—A deputation from this vicinity recently asked the Dominion Government for a bonus of \$3,000 a mile for the

construction of 16 miles of the Tilsonburg, Lake Erie and Pacific Railroad.

OWEN SOUND, ONT.—Mr. A. C. Dutton, extensive wholesale lumber dealer, of Springfield, Mass., is in town looking for a suitable site on which to erect a large planing mill.—The C. P. R. are about to erect a flour shed, 240 by 40 ft.

WALKERVILLE, ONT.—It is stated that Mortimer Smith, architect, of Detroit, has prepared plans for the erection of a large summer hotel at Peche Island for the Messrs. Walker.—The Presbyterians intend erecting a Sunday School building.

STRATFORD, ONT.—Tenders are invited until 4 p. m. to-day (Saturday), for the erection of a Sunday School building in connection with St. James Church, the dimensions of which are 40 by 80 feet, with basement, main floor and gallery. Mr. Powell is the architect.
