Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), by leave of the House, introduced a Bill No. 1, An Act respecting the Administration of Oaths of Office, which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported, That when the House did attend His Excellency the Governor General this day in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, and to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy which he read to the House as follows:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

It affords me much pleasure to meet you at the commencement of another session of Parliament and to be able to congratulate you upon the marked prosperity of the country. The volume of trade and of building construction, the growth in employment, the increased railway receipts, the expanding revenues, and business conditions generally, all bear testimony to a sound economic development which promises much in the way of substantial progress.

The celebrations of the Sixtieth Anniversary of Confederation, held during the past summer, were of a memorable character. They evoked in all parts of the Dominion a spirit of national pride and patriotism. Related to the commemoration, and outstanding among the events of the year, was the visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Prince of Wales and Prince George, and the Prime Minister of Great Britain. The welcome everywhere accorded the representatives of the Royal Family and the representative of the British Parliament evidenced the strength of the ties which unite in a common allegiance the members of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

Striking recognition has been accorded Canada's position in the League of Nations through the selection of Canada by the Assembly to a non-per-

manent seat on the Council of the League.

As contemplated by the conclusions of the Imperial Conference of 1926, provision was made on July 1 for direct communication between His Majesty's Government in Canada and His Majesty's other Governments of the British Empire. The further implementing of these conclusions which aim at more effective consultation through personal contact by the appointment to Canada of a representative of His Majesty's Government in Great Britain is being discussed between the Secretary of State for Dominion Affairs in Great Britain, who is at present in Canada, and members of my Government. By agreement between the Governments of France and Canada and the Governments of Japan and Canada it is proposed that each of these countries shall be represented in the other by a Minister Plenipotentiary.

Following the announcement made during the last Session of Parliament, a Conference was convened at Ottawa in November between the Dominion Government and the Governments of the Provinces of Canada. It is the opinion of my advisers that this Conference proved of the utmost value in facilitating a full and free exchange of views between the participating Governments on problems of mutual interest and concern. Your attention will be

invited during the present Session to some of the more important matters dis-

cussed at the Conference.

As a result of the Dominion-Provincial Conference, my advisers have decided, pending a complete revision of the financial arrangements as contemplated by the Duncan Report, to recommend the continuance to the Maritime Provinces of the money grants made at the last session. In the light of the discussions at the Conference, my Ministers are continuing negotiations with the Prairie Provinces for the return of their natural resources and are giving consideration to the restoration to the Province of British Columbia of the lands of the railway belt and the Peace River block. Consideration is also being given to the railway problems of the several provinces, as outlined at the Conference.

The work of reconditioning that portion of the Hudson Bay railway previously constructed has been finished. After most careful examination and consideration, and upon the best advice obtainable, Churchill has been selected as the ocean terminus of the Bay route. A contract has been let for the grading and bridging of the railway extension to Churchill and preparations looking to the establishment of the necessary harbour works there are well

advanced.

There has been a substantial increase in the number of British immigrants as well as in the number of immigrants of a suitable type from the continent of Europe. Steps have been taken towards closer co-operation with the Provincial Governments in land settlement, placement and supervisory work. Several provincial centres have already been established for the reception and distribution of British youths for agricultural work, and a constructive settlement scheme has been put into force for settlers of this class.

The opening of new territory by the construction of branch lines of railway

is proceeding rapidly, and is providing wider opportunities for settlement.

Harbour Commissions have been established at the ports of St. John and Halifax. This, it is expected, will facilitate and expand the movement of traffic through Atlantic seaports. The volume of trade at other Canadian ports during the past season has increased. In grain shipments, the Port of Montreal attained

a pre-eminent position among world ocean ports.

Much progress has been made in the development of aviation in the Dominion. An organization has been established for the administration of civil aviation, distinct from that of the Air Force. To assist in the development of transoceanic air routes, a site for an airship base has been purchased near Montreal. An airship mooring tower will be erected and a public air terminal for aeroplanes provided.

In the postal service the year has been marked by the inauguration of an

air mail service between Rimouski and Montreal.

Satisfactory progress has been made in the organization of the Department of National Revenue. The final report of the Royal Commission on Customs and Excise will be presented immediately for your consideration, and legislation based upon the report will be introduced.

It is proposed to amalgamate the Departments of Health and Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment in a single department of National Health and Veterans'

Welfare.

A proclamation has been issued bringing the revised Statutes of Canada into force on the first day of February, and copies of the new revision will be

available for the present session.

Among other important matters to which your attention will be invited will be measures providing for more favourable trade relations between Canada and certain foreign countries, and for substantial assistance to and improved facilities for industrial and scientific research.

On motion of Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), a Special Committee was appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed, Lists of Members to compose the Select Standing Committees of this House under Standing Order 63, said Committee to be composed of Messrs.: King (Kootenay East), Forke, Casgrain, Stewart (Leeds) and Hanson.

Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), delivered a message from His Excellency the Governor General, which was read by Mr. Speaker, as follows:-WILLINGDON.

The donations include, as was the case last year, a considerable number of valuable books concerned with international and economic affairs presented by

the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace.

Amongst the many books in the theological section which were destroyed in the fire of 1916 was a set of eight volumes of Walton's Polyglot Bible, printed in 1657. Mrs. Elizabeth Wright of Kingston was good enough to present to the Library during the past year a fine edition of this work.

During the latter part of the Recess that section of the Library which contains the literature of travels has been rearranged and the whole of the books

card-indexed in respect both to subject and author.

Since our last Report the collections of Canadian pamphlets have been

increased by some 94 volumes, or about 1,000 pamphlets.

This year being the sixtieth anniversary of Confederation, Vols. Nos. 1413 to 1418 inclusive, have been made up of essays relating to Confederation, published either before or since 1867. Volumes 1419 and 1420 contain pamphlets dealing with the Confederation celebration in Ottawa.

That it is expedient to amend and revise the Electricity Inspection Act to bring it into conformity with the existing conditions in electricity, in regard to the commercial unit of supply, the units of electrical measure, inspection standards, the verification of meters, and other related matters, and to provide for the appointment of a Director and such assistants as may be deemed necessary.

Whereupon, Mr. Malcolm, a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

And whereas scientific research in Britain and elsewhere has demonstrated that coal, when used in a highly pulverized form, can successfully compete in

price and results, with fuel oil;

And whereas it is very desirable that the output of our mines should be

increased and more labour employed;

Therefore be it Resolved—That, in the opinion of this House, in order to test and demonstrate the possibilities of pulverized coal, the Government should adapt one of their steamers on the Pacific Coast, and the furnace of one of the Government public buildings in British Columbia, to the use of pulverized coal from Vancouver Island mines.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

Mr. Irvine, seconded by Mr. Spencer, moved,—Whereas, it is the existent policy of this country, that reasonable preparation should be made for self-defence in case of any war involving Canada;

And whereas, such preparation if undertaken, should be both adequate and

of such a character as to make war less likely to occur;

Therefore be it resolved, that in the opinion of this House, it is advisable that legislation be enacted providing that on the declaration of war involving Canada, all natural resources and essential services, including transportation facilities, industrial plants and commercial and financing agencies, should automatically be conscripted for National Service for the duration of the war.

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

At six o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 6, until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.

Mr. Edwards (Frontenac-Addington), seconded by Mr. Jones, moved,—That, in the opinion of this House, in the best interests of Confederation, and the economic development of Western Canada, the Provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta should be granted their natural resources free from restrictions within the legislative competence of the Parliament of Canada with provisions for the maintenance and administration of school lands and school land endowment funds for educational purposes according to the laws of the respective provinces, but in compliance with the letter and spirit of the constitution, and that the claims of these provinces to compensation for loss for lands and resources alienated, and the claims of any other provinces in connection with this subject should be investigated with a view to satisfactory and equitable adjustment.

And the question being proposed;

Mr. Lapointe raised the point of Order: That the said Notice of Motion was out of Order for the reason that it had been materially amended after the Notice thereof had been given in the Votes and Proceedings, and a new Notice of Motion, as altered, should appear on the Order Paper after other Notices of Motions which would have precedence over it.

After Debate thereon;

Mr. Speaker: What is the Rule of the House? Standing Order 45 reads as follows:—"Forty-eight hours' notice "—in Great Britain only twenty-four hours' notice is required, but in Canada it is forty-eight hours—"shall be given of a motion for leave to present a bill, resolution or address, for the appointment of any committee, or for placing a question on the order paper, but this rule shall not apply to bills after their introduction, or to private bills, or to the times of meeting or adjournment of the House. Such notice shall be laid on the Table before six o'clock, p.m., and be printed in the Votes and Proceedings of that

day."

It is true that according to paragraph 363 of Beauchesne's Parliamentary Rules and Forms, a modification of a Notice of Motion may be permitted. That paragraph reads as follows: "A modification of a Notice of Motion standing upon the notice paper is permitted, if the amended notice does not exceed the scope of the original notice." The above reference is taken from May, 13th edition, page 234, where the following is found: "A modification of a Notice of Motion standing upon the notice paper is permitted, if the amended notice does not exceed the scope of the original notice." The next sentence however, reads as follows: "If a motion is proposed, which differs materially from the terms of the notice, it can only be made with the consent of the House, or upon a renewal of the notice." If the consent of the House was unanimous there would be no objection, I suppose, to the honourable member for Frontenac-Addington proceeding, because when the House gives unanimous consent in a matter involving the rules, that becomes the law of the House. In this case there is not unanimous

consent; objection is taken. Is that objection well founded? In other words is the motion on the Order Paper at the present time the same as the one of which notice was given in the Votes and Proceedings? There are two reasons, in my humble judgment, why this proposed resolution as now redrafted is beyond the scope of the notice given in the Votes and Proceedings.

First, by stating that provision should be made for the administration of "school lands" in addition to school lands endowment funds, the mover has materially changed the conditions on which the proposed grant of their natural

resources should, in his opinion, be made to the interested provinces.

Secondly, the words "but in compliance with the letter and spirit of the constitution," were placed in the first draft so as to apply to the granting of the natural resources to the prairie provinces; whilst in the second draft these words have been moved further down and made to apply to the administration of school land endowment funds for educational purposes. There is a material difference between the two propositions. Strictly speaking, and according to the rules of the House, this motion is out of order.

I will quote in support of my ruling, May, 13th edition, page 234; Blackmore, page 212; Redlich, second volume, pages 216 and 217, and a footnote; and Bourinot, 4th edition, page 299. Bourinot is very clear on the matter. He says: "A motion on the Order Paper must be in accordance with the notice in the Votes; and, should a Member desire to substitute another, or alter its terms, he must first obtain the leave of the House." Under the circumstances I cannot do otherwise than rule that the point of Order is well taken.

The said proposed motion was then withdrawn.

Miss Macphail, seconded by Mr. Coote, moved,—That, in the opinion of this House, the time has come for the establishment of a Government Department for the promotion of Peace and International Understanding.

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.

Your Examiner has duly examined the following Petitions for Private Bills, and finds that all the requirements of the 95th Standing Order have been complied with in each case, viz:—

Of Benjamin Charles Prowse of Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, and

others; to incorporate The Canadian Commerce Insurance Company.

Of the Great Lakes and Atlantic Canal and Power Company, Limited; to create a deep waterway and canal from Cornwall, Ontario, to Montreal, Province of Quebec.

The Clerk of the House laid on the Table the following Private Bill:—Bill No. 152, An Act respecting the Great Lakes and Atlantic Canal and Power Company, Limited.—Mr. Denis (Joliette).

The said Bill was read the first time and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House, pursuant to Standing Order 102.

Mr. McIntosh, from the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has had before it Bill No. 4, An Act to amend the Civil Service Act (Councils), referred to the Committee on February 10, 1928. Having considered the Bill and examined a number of witnesses on the subject-matter involved, your Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. That whereas the majority of the witnesses heard were of the opinion that further consideration should be given to the details of the constitution of National Civil Service Councils.

And whereas the Government is prepared to establish such Councils. And whereas the objects of the Bill may be attained by Order in Council.

2. That this Committee endorses the principle of the establishment by the Government of a National Civil Service Council, composed of representatives of the Government and the organized Civil Service in equal numbers, to consider and advise the Government upon matters of mutual concern to the Government and civil servants in their respective capacities as employer and employees, also as to the establishing of any other consultative and advisory machinery that may be required.

3. That, as the form of constitution for such a council, covering its scope and functions, can best be determined by joint agreement between the parties concerned, this committee recommends the setting up by the Government of a drafting committee representing both the Government and the Civil Service organizations, for the said purpose, provided that any such constitution so drafted shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council; and

4. That after the said constitution has been drafted and approved in the manner set forth the National Civil Service Council should be established

forthwith by the Government.

5. In view of the above recommendations your Committee recommend that Bill No. 4 be not further proceeded with.

Mr. Rinfret, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 20th February, 1928, for a copy of all correspondence, letters, telegrams, petitions and other documents in the custody of the Government in connection with a demand for a branch railway from a point near Field on the Canadian National railway to Sturgeon Falls, Ontario.

Mr. Robb, a Member of the King's Privy Council, delivered a Message from His Excellency the Governor General which was read by the Speaker, as follows:—

On motion of Mr. Marcil, the First Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

By leave of the House, Mr. Robb moved,—That the House do go into Committee of the Whole this day, to consider a proposed Resolution to ratify and confirm the Scheme of Arrangement with holders of the five per cent Income Charge Convertible Debenture Stock of the Canadian Northern Railway.

Whereupon, Mr. Robb, a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

And the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

The House resolved itself into Committee of the Whole on the said proposed Resolution.

(In the Committee)

The following Resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Scheme of Arrangement with holders of the five per cent Income Charge Convertible Debenture Stock of the Canadian Northern Railway be ratified and confirmed, and that the Governor in Council be authorized to guarantee the principal and interest of the new securities to be issued in pursuance therewith not exceeding in aggregate face value such an amount as may by the Governor in Council be considered sufficient to raise \$22,689,575.32; the proceeds to be deposited to the credit of the Minister of Finance in trust, to be released by the Minister in such amounts as are required to carry out the provisions of the scheme.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was reported, read the second time and concurred in.

Mr. Robb then, by leave of the House, presented a Bill, No. 153, An Act respecting the Canadian National Railways and respecting the Canadian Northern Railway Company five per cent Income Charge Convertible Debenture stock, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading at the next sitting of the House.

to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), for Mr. Stewart (Edmonton West), moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the following proposed Resolution:—

That the agreement between the Dominion of Canada, the Province of Ontario and the Province of Manitoba respecting the construction of a dam for the purposes of conservation, regulation and power, at Lower Ear Falls at the outlet of Lac Seul in the Province of Ontario, be ratified and confirmed, and that the Governor in Council be authorized to carry out the provisions thereof whereby the Dominion assumes three-fifths of the capital cost of the dam, estimated at \$700,000, and the payment of interest and cost of operation and maintenance for certain limited periods.

Whereupon, Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution,

recommends it to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), for Mr. Stewart (Edmonton West), moved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the following proposed Resolution:—

That the Yukon Quartz Mining Act be amended to provide for the payment of an annual royalty on the profits of mines in the Yukon Territory, exceeding the sum of \$10,000 annually, in place of the royalty at present imposed upon sales of the products of the mines, and to prescribe the rates of royalty to be paid upon the said annual profits.

Your Committee have duly considered Bill No. 61, An Act to amend the Live Stock and Live Stock Products Act, and beg leave to report the same, without amendment; also Bill No. 73, An Act respecting the Inspection of Hay and Straw, and beg leave to report the same, with amendments.

And also,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 13th February, 1928, for a copy of all correspondence, telegrams, orders in council, reports, resolutions, agreements or other documents in the custody of any department of the Government of Canada or of the Joint International Waterways Commission in any way relating to the diversion of water for power purposes at or near Massena in the State of New York.

The grants or the unexpended portions thereof made under the Statutes of 1909, c. 32, 1914, c. 50, 1919, c. 30, of \$200,000 each year for twenty consecutive years from the first day of April, 1909, may be expended to aid construction work for the protection, safety and convenience of the public in respect of crossings in existence on the first day of April, 1909, and in respect of existing crossings constructed after that date where agreements have been entered into as aforesaid.

Whereupon, Mr. Dunning, a Member of the King's Privy Council, informed the House, That His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said proposed Resolution, recommends it to the House.

Resolved, That the House do go into Committee of the Whole, at the next sitting of the House, to consider the said proposed Resolution.

The Bill No. 189, An Act to amend the Prisons and Reformatories Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 190, An Act to amend the Exchequer Court Act, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time and passed.

The Bill No. 72, An Act to amend the Fertilizers Act, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time and passed, on division.

Mr. Speaker having arrived in the House, took the Chair.

The Bill No. 51, An Act to regulate the Sale and Inspection of Root Vegetables, was considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again at the next sitting of the House.

The Bill No. 191, An Act to amend the Criminal Code, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, and progress having been made and reported, the Committee obtained leave to consider it again at the next sitting of the House.

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until to-morrow, at three o'clock, p.m.

The Clerk informed the House of the unavoidable absence of Mr. Speaker. Whereupon Mr. Johnston (Long Lake), Chairman of Committees, took the Chair as Deputy Speaker, pursuant to the Statute in that case made and provided

PRAYERS.

Mr. Power, from the Special Committee on Pensions and Returned Soldiers Problems, presented the following as their Third Report:—

Your Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 39, An Act respecting the disposal of certain Canteen Funds, and have agreed to report the said Bill with amendments.

Mr. Power, from the Special Committee on Pensions and Returned Soldiers' Problems, presented the following as their Fourth and Final Report:—

Your Committee, which is composed of seventeen members, was appointed on the 15th of February, and on the 20th and 27th, it was empowered to send for persons, papers and records, to examine witnesses for evidence, to print their day-to-day proceedings, to report from time to time, and to sit while the House is in session.

Meetings, Matters Referred, Witnesses

On the 17th of February your Committee met for organization. The Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, the Honourable J. H. King, was present and addressed the Committee. In the course of his remarks he stated that the services of the officers of his department would, during its sittings, be at the disposal of the Committee. At all subsequent meetings the Chairman of the Board of Pension Commissioners, its Chief Medical Adviser, the Secretary of the Department and a representative of the Federal Appeal Board were in attendance. Your Committee desires to thank these gentlemen for the information, advice and assistance which they were at all times willing to render; and also to express its appreciation of the services rendered by the secretary of the Board of Pension Commissioners, Mr. Paton, and by the Committee's secretary, Mr. Cloutier.

Representatives of soldiers' organizations appeared before the Committee for the purpose of giving evidence and were also in attendance throughout the period of its public sittings. The case on behalf of the soldiers was laid before the Committee in the strongest possible light and the presentation was couched in energetic, yet moderate and dignified language.

Your Committee held forty-seven working sessions and examined twentyseven witnesses, seventeen of whom represented soldiers' and other organizations,

and ten departmental officers.

There were submitted in the form of written resolutions and evidence, suggestions in respect to the following matters:-

Amendments to the Pension Act, Artificial Limbs, Canteen Funds, Civil Service Preference, Employment, Exchange, Federal Appeal Board,

Grave Markers, Publication of Handbook,

Hospitalization, Imperial Forces, Indigent and Aged Veterans,

Insurance, Last Post Fund.

Medical Examinations, Old Age Pensions, Orders in Council, Poppies, Rehabilitation, Service Pensions, Scheme for Housing, Soldiers' Land Settlement, Soldiers' Advisers, Treatment. Victoria Cross, Veteraft Workshops, and Vocational Training.

On the 10th of April, Bill No. 39, An Act respecting the disposal of certain Canteen Funds, was referred to the Committee. In this connection the said Bill was reported with the Committee's Third Report.

All suggestions submitted to your Committee were considered. In respect to some of these, no action was taken because existing legislation and regulations were considered sufficiently broad to permit the departments concerned putting these suggestions into practice. In others, it was deemed inadvisable to take action at present. In all other respects the suggestions were given effect as the recommendations herein contained will show.

Whilst these important matters and recommendations were considered and reconsidered in full Committee, it was nevertheless deemed advisable to appoint Sub-Committees to draft recommendations in accordance with the Committee's conclusions. A sub-committee on Agenda and Procedure, composed of Messrs. Black, McPherson and Speakman was appointed in the early beginning of the Committee's sittings, and six sub-committees on drafting were appointed as follows:-

1. Pensions,—Messrs. Clark, Speakman and Thorson.

2. Insurance,—Messrs. Ilsley and McGibbon.

3. Canteen Funds,—Mr. Black and Sir Eugene Fiset.
4. Soldiers' Land Settlement,—Messrs. McLean and Speakman.
5. Employment and Care of Problem Cases,—Messrs. Adshead, Black, McPherson, Ross, Sanderson and Speakman.

6. Miscellaneous,—Messrs. Arthurs, Sir Eugene Fiset, Gershaw, McPherson and Hepburn.

Recommendations

The recommendations of your Committee are as follows:-

PART I

PENSIONS

Your Committee received suggestions with respect to the Pension Act submitted on behalf of several organizations composed of ex-service men, including the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, represented by J. R. Bowler of Winnipeg and F. L. Barrow of Ottawa, the Tuberculous Section of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, represented by R. Hale of London and C. P. Gilman of Ottawa, the Amputations Association of the Great War, the Sir Arthur Pearson Club for Blinded Soldiers and Sailors, and the Canadian Pensioners Association represented by R. Myers and C. J. Brown of Toronto, and the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada represented by H. Colebourne of Ottawa. In addition the Committee heard from the Department represented by E. H. Scammell, Secretary, the Board of Pension Commissioners, represented by Colonel J. T. C. Thompson, Chairman, Dr. R. J. Kee, Chief Medical Adviser and Mr. J. A. W. Paton, Secretary, and the Federal Appeal Board represented by Colonel C. W. Belton, Chairman, and Colonel C. B. Topp, The Committee also had the assistance of Lieut.-Colonel L. N. Lafleche, Dominion 1st Vice-President of the Canadian Legion, and several other members of the Adjustment Bureau of the Canadian Legion at Ottawa, including Mr. J. C. Herwig of that Bureau.

In addition to the proposals placed before the Committee by representatives of organizations of returned soldiers, several suggestions as to desirable changes in the Pension Act were made by the Department. Some of the recommendations of the Committee deal only with matters of administration and are intended to settle doubts which have arisen and to give legislative sanction to existing practice.

An effort has been made to remove sources of grievances against which the returned soldiers have complained and, with this in view, important changes are recommended by your Committee with regard to the machinery for dealing with the meritorious clause and with regard to the jurisdiction of the Federal Appeal Board to hear appeals from refusal by the Board of Pension Commissioners to grant pensions, and a scheme is suggested for settlement of disputes between the Board of Pension Commissioners and the Federal Appeal Board as to diagnosis.

Your Committee has also made important recommendations with regard to such matters as pensions to dependents of deceased members of the forces who were in receipt of pensions for aggravation of a pre-enlistment disability, pension for disabilities which arose subsequent to discharge, limitations of time within which applications for pension must be made, marriage after the appearance of injury or disease, pensions for dependent parents or persons in the place of a parent, pensions for dependent children and special allowances for clothing, last sickness and burial expenses.

Your Committee has not dealt with such amendments to the Pension Act as might be advisable in view of the proposed amalgamation of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment with the Department of Health.

The Committee recommends that there be passed at this session of parliament

an Act to amend the Pension Act as follows:

AN ACT TO AMEND THE PENSION ACT

His Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons, enacts as follows:—

- 1. Paragraphs (a), (m) and (o) of section two of the Pension Act, chapter 157 of the Revised Statutes of 1927, are repealed and the following are substituted therefor:
 - (a) "appearance of the injury or disease" includes the recurrence of an injury or disease which has been so improved as to have removed the resultant disability or reduced sufficiently to permit the member of the forces subsequently to serve in a theatre of actual war.
 - (m) "pension" means pension on account of the death or disability of a member of the forces and includes addition to pension, temporary pension, additional payment, final payment or any other payment awarded by the Commission to or in respect of any member of the forces.
 - (o) "theatre of actual war" means-
 - (i) in the case of the military or air forces, the zone of the allied armies on the continents of Europe, of Asia or of Africa or any other place at which the member of the forces has sustained injury or contracted disease directly by a hostile act of the enemy;
 - (ii) in the case of the naval forces, the high seas or wherever contact has been made with hostile forces of the enemy, or any other place at which the member of the forces has sustained injury or contracted disease directly by a hostile act of the enemy.
- 2. Subsection eight, paragraph (b) of Section three of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:
 - (b) The medical classification of the injury or disease causing the disability or death in respect of which the application has been made;
 - (ii) The medical classification of such injuries or diseases as have been dealt with by the Commission in connection with the application;
 - (iii) Whether the injury or disease resulting in disability or death was or was not attributable to or incurred during military service or whether it pre-existed enlistment and was or was not aggravated during military service.
- 3. Paragraph (a) of Section eleven is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - (a) Pensions shall be awarded to or in respect of members of the forces who have suffered disability in accordance with the rates set out in Schedule A of this Act, and in respect of members of the forces who have died in accordance with the rates set out in Schedule B of this Act, when the injury or disease resulting in disability or death or the aggravation of such injury or disease resulting in disability or substantially contributing to death in respect of which the application for pension is made was attributable to or was incurred during such military service.

- 4. Section thirteen of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 13. A pension shall not be awarded in respect of the death of a member of the forces, unless an application therefor has been made (a) within three years after the date of the death in respect of which pension is claimed; or (b) within three years after the date upon which the applicant has fallen into a dependent condition.
- 5. Section sixteen of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 16. When a pensioner appears to be incapable of expending or is not expending the pension in a proper manner or is not maintaining the members of his family to whom he owes the duty of maintenance, the Commission may direct that the pension be administered for the benefit of the pensioner and or the members of his family by the Department or by some person selected by the Commission.
- 6. Subsections four, five and six of Section twenty of the said Act are repealed and the following are substituted therefor:—
 - 4. Any pension or balance of pension due to a deceased pensioner at the time of his death, whether unpaid or held in trust by the Department, shall not form part of the estate of such deceased pensioner.
 - 5. The Commission may, in its discretion direct the payment of such pension or balance of pension either to the pensioner's widow and/or his child or children or to any person who has maintained him or been maintained by him or may direct that it be paid in whole or in part towards the expenses of the pensioner's last sickness and burial.
 - 6. If no order for the payment of such pension or balance of pension is made by the Commission such balance shall be paid into the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada.
- 7. Section twenty-one of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 21. Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Act, any case respecting a member of the forces or any of his dependents which is claimed to be specially meritorious may be made the subject of an investigation and adjudication by way of compassionate pension or allowance as hereinafter provided.
 - 2. Every claim made under this section shall be referred for consideration to the Commission which shall have power, if it is of the opinion that the claim is specially meritorious, to recommend that a compassionate pension or allowance be paid to the claimant, and upon the refusal of the Commission to recommend such payment an appeal therefrom shall lie to the Federal Appeal Board, which shall have a similar power of recommendation.
 - 3. The payment of such compassionate pension or allowance as may be recommended under this section by the Commission or the Federal Appeal Board shall be subject to the approval of the Governor-in-Council.
 - 4. The pension awarded under the authority of this section shall not exceed in amount that which could have been granted in the like case under other provisions of this Act if the death, injury, or disease on account of which the pension is claimed, was attributable to military service.

- 8. Subsection one of Section twenty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 22. No pension shall be paid to or in respect of a child who, if a boy, is over the age of sixteen years or, if a girl, is over the age of seventeen years, except when such child and those responsible for its maintenance are without adequate resources, and
 - (a) such child is unable owing to physical or mental infirmity to provide for its own maintenance, in which case the pension may be paid while such child is incapacitated by physical or mental infirmity from earning a livelihood: Provided that no pension shall be awarded unless such infirmity occurred before the child attained the age of twenty-one years; and that if such child is an orphan the Commission shall have discretion to increase such child's pension up to an amount not exceeding orphan's rates; or
 - (b) such child is following and is making satisfactory progress in a course of instruction approved by the Commission, in which case the pension may be paid until such child has attained the age of twenty-one years.
- 9. Subsection five of Section twenty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 5. The Commission may direct that the pension for a child may be paid to its mother or father or to its guardian or to any person approved by the Commission or may direct that such pension be administered by the Department.
- 10. Subsection seven of Section twenty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 7. The children of a pensioner who has died and who at the time of his death was in receipt of a pension in any of classes one to five mentioned in Schedule A of this Act, or who, except for the provisions of subsection one of section twenty-nine of this Act, would have been in receipt of a pension in one of the said classes, shall be entitled to a pension as if he had died on service whether his death was attributable to his service or not.
- 11. Subsection nine of Section twenty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 9. On the death of the wife of a pensioner pensioned on account of disability, the additional pension for a married member of the forces may, in the discretion of the Commission, be continued to him for so long as there is a minor child or are minor children of pensionable age, provided there exists a daughter or other person competent to assume and who does assume the household duties and care of the child or children.
- 12. Section twenty-two of the said Act is amended by adding thereto the following subsection:—
 - 10. On the death of a widow of a member of the forces who has been in receipt of a pension, the pension for the widow may, in the discretion of the Commission, be continued for so long as there is a minor child or there are minor children of pensionable age, to a daughter competent to assume and who does assume the household duties and care of the other child or children, provided that in such case the pension payable for children shall continue but the rate payable for orphan children shall not apply.

- 13. Subsection four of Section twenty-six of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—.
 - 4. A member of the forces in receipt of pension for any other disability for the relief of which any appliance must be worn or treatment applied which causes wear and tear of clothing may, in the discretion of the Commission, be granted an allowance in respect of such wear and tear not exceeding fifty-four dollars per annum.
- 14. Paragraph (b) of Section twenty-seven of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
- (b) in the case in which a pension is awarded to an applicant the appearance of whose disability was subsequent to his retirement or discharge from the forces, in which case a pension may be paid from a date six months prior to the day upon which application for pension has been received or from the date of the appearance of the disability whichever is the later date, or from the day upon which application was made to the Department for treatment in respect of the disability for which pension is awarded provided that if treatment was commenced under the jurisdiction of the Department in respect of such disability a pension may be paid from the day following that upon which the treatment of the applicant by the Department was completed.
- 15. Subsection one of Section twenty-eight of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 28. If an applicant or pensioner should in the opinion of the Commission undergo medical or surgical treatment, and the applicant or pensioner in the opinion of the Commission unreasonably refuses to undergo such treatment, the pension to which the extent of his disability would otherwise have entitled him may be reduced, in the discretion of the Commission, by not more than one-half, provided that this section shall not apply to a refusal to undergo a major surgical operation.
- 16. Section twenty-nine of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 29. During such time as, under the departmental regulations in that behalf, a pensioner is in receipt of pay and allowances from the Department while under treatment, payment of his pension shall be suspended and the pay and allowances shall stand in lieu thereof; pending a fresh award, payment of the pension shall recommence forthwith after the termination of such suspension.
 - 2. During such time as, under the departmental regulations in that behalf, a pensioner is an in-patient under treatment in respect of a disability other than his pensionable disability, his pension, if in excess of the amount he would have been entitled to receive by way of pay and allowances, if the disability for which he is under treatment had been pensionable, shall be reduced to such amount; pending a fresh award, the payment of pension in full shall recommence forthwith upon the pensioner's ceasing to be an in-patient as aforesaid.
- 17. Subsection three of section thirty of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 3. When a pensioner previous to his enlistment or during his service was maintaining or was substantially assisting in maintaining one or both of his parents or a person in the place of a parent an amount not exceeding the amount set forth in Schedule A of this Act as the additional pension

for one child may, in the discretion of the Commission, be paid direct to each of such parents or person in the place of a parent or to him so long as he continues such maintenance; provided that the benefits of this subsection shall be limited to a parent or parents or a person in the place of a parent who is, are or would be, if the pensioner did not contribute, in a dependent condition, and that if the Commission is of opinion that the pensioner is unable by reason of circumstances beyond his control to continue his contribution towards the maintenance of his parent or parents or a person in the place of a parent the Commission may continue the said benefits.

- 18. Section thirty of the said Act is amended by adding thereto the following subsection:—
 - 4. When a parent or person in the place of a parent who was not wholly or to a substantial extent maintained by the pensioner previous to his enlistment or during his service by reason of the fact that such parent or person was not then in a dependent condition, subsequently falls into a dependent condition, is incapacitated by mental or physical infirmity from earning a livelihood and is wholly or to a substantial extent maintained by the pensioner, an amount not exceeding the amount set forth in Schedule A of this Act as the additional pension for one child may, in the discretion of the Commission, be paid direct to each of such parents or person in the place of a parent or to the pensioner for so long as he continues such maintenance.
- 19. Section thirty-one of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 31. When a pensioner pensioned on account of a disability has died and his estate is not sufficient to pay the expenses of his last sickness and burial, the Commission may pay such expenses, or a portion thereof, but the payment in any such case shall not exceed one hundred and fifty dollars.
- 20. Subsection one of section thirty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 32. (a) No pension shall be paid to the widow of a pensioner unless she was living with him or was maintained by him or was in the opinion of the Commission entitled to be maintained by him at the time of his death and for a reasonable time previously thereto.
 - (b) No pension shall be paid to the widow of a member of the forces unless she was married to him before the appearance of the injury or disease which resulted in his death. *Provided*
 - (i) that a pension shall be paid when a member of the forces on and after the coming into force of this Act secures from the Commission a certificate showing that any pensionable injury or disease from which he was suffering at the time of the marriage would not in the opinion of the Commission result in death.
 - (ii) that a pension shall be paid in the case of a member of the forces who has married before the coming into force of this Act, and who has obtained from the Commission a certificate showing that any pensionable injury or disease from which he was suffering at the time of the marriage, would not in the opinion of the Commission result in death.
 - (iii) that a pension shall be paid in the case of a member of the forces who has married and who has died of a pensionable disability prior to the coming into force of this Act, if, at the time

- of the marriage, the condition of such member of the forces was such that the prospective wife after making reasonable enquiries would not anticipate that the injury or disease would be a substantial factor in causing death, provided, however, that it shall be conclusively presumed that such injury or disease was not a substantial factor in causing death, if at the time of the marriage there existed no resultant pensionable disability from such injury or disease.
 - (iv) that a pension shall be paid in the case of a member of the forces who has married prior to the coming into force of this Act and who fails to apply to the Commission for a certificate showing that any pensionable injury or disease from which he was suffering at the time of the marriage would not in the opinion of the Commission result in death and who subsequently dies of a pensionable disability if at the time of the marriage the condition of such member of the forces was such that the prospective wife after making reasonable enquiries would not anticipate that the injury or disease would be a substantial factor in causing death; provided, however, that it shall be conclusively presumed that such injury or disease was not a substantial factor in causing death if, at the time of the marriage, there existed no resultant pensionable disability from such injury or disease.
- 21. Subsection three of Section thirty-two of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 3. A woman who, although not married to the member of the forces, was living with him in Canada at the time he became a member of the forces and for a reasonable time previously thereto, and who, at such time, was publicly represented by him as his wife may, in the case of his death and in the discretion of the Commission, be awarded a pension equivalent to the pension she would have received had she been his legal widow, and the Commission may also award a pension if, in its opinion, an injustice would be done by not recognizing a woman as the wife of a member of the forces although there is no evidence that she had been publicly represented by him as his wife. Provided that such woman shall not be refused a pension for which she would have been eligible under the provisions hereof if she had remained unmarried, by reason only of her having married the member of the forces with whom she had been living as aforesaid.
- 22. Subsection (a) of section thirty-seven of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - (a) in the case in which a pension is awarded to a parent or person in place of a parent who was not wholly or to a substantial extent maintained by the member of the forces at the time of his death, in which case the pension shall be paid from a day to be fixed in each case by the Commission.
- 23. Subsection four of section fifty of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 4. Of the members first appointed to the Board, other than the Chairman, one-half shall be appointed for a term of two years and the other for a term of three years, and they shall be eligible for reappointment for such further terms of two or three years as the Governor in Council may deem advisable.

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- 24. Subsection one of section fifty-one of the said Act is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—
 - 51. Upon the evidence and record upon which the Commission gave its decision an appeal shall lie to the Federal Appeal Board in respect of any refusal of pension by the Commission; Provided—
 - (a) that the Board shall have no jurisdiction to assess the extent of any disability in respect of which an appeal is made or to determine the amount of pension which should be awarded;
 - (b) that there shall be no appeal in cases where the Commission is called upon to exercise its discretion in respect of an application made to it and the refusal of pension is made in the exercise of such discretion.
 - (c) that if the medical classification of the injury or disease resulting in disability or death in respect of which an application has been refused by the Commission is considered by the Board to be in error, the Board shall, before issuing judgment, communicate in writing to the Commission its reasons for considering such medical classification to be in error, whereupon the dispute as to the medical classification shall be referred by the Commission to a board consisting of three medical experts, one to be named by the Commission, another to be named by the Board, and the third to be agreed upon by the two so named, and in the event of their failure to agree, to be named by the Minister, which board of experts shall be requested to determine the medical classification to be acted upon by the Commission in rendering its decision. If, upon the medical classification so determined, pension is refused by the Commission, the Board shall give the appeal such further consideration as it may deem necessary, and issue its judgment on the medical classification determined as hereinbefore provided.
- 25. Subsections four to eight of section fifty-one of the said Act are repealed and the following are substituted therefor:—
 - 4. Any person desiring to appeal from a decision of the Commission may do so by notice thereof in writing delivered to the Department or to the Board on or before the thirty-first day of December, A.D. 1928, or within two years from the date of the decision complained of.
 - 5. The decision of the Board on such appeal shall be final and shall be binding upon the applicant and upon the Commission, provided that if before the 31st day of December, A.D. 1928, or within one year from the date of the decision of the Board upholding a refusal of pension by the Commission the applicant submits newly discovered evidence which, in the opinion of the Commission, raises a reasonable doubt of the correctness of the decision, the Commission shall reconsider the case and if pension is again refused the applicant shall have the right of a second appeal to the Board whose decision on such second appeal shall be final and shall be binding upon the applicant and upon the Commission.
 - 6. In accordance with such regulations as may be made by the Governor in Council in that behalf an applicant may be allowed the expenses incurred by him in attending at the hearing of his appeal and both the applicant and the Commission shall be entitled to appear at such hearing by counsel or other representative, but no allowance shall be made for the payment of any fee or remuneration to any counsel or representative so appearing other than the Official Soldiers' Adviser appointed by the Department.

- 7. Every judgment rendered by the Board shall be signed by the Chairman or presiding member of the Board and the Secretary and shall contain the following information:—
- (i) the name or names of the member or members of the Board who heard the appeal;
- (ii) the medical classification of the injury or disease causing the disability or death in respect of which the appeal was made;
- (iii) the medical classification of the injury or disease causing the disability or death in respect of which the appeal is allowed or disallowed as the case may be;
- (iv) If the appeal is allowed, whether the injury or disease resulting in disability or death was attributable to or incurred during military service or whether it pre-existed enlistment and was or was not aggravated during military service.
- 8. Any dispute as to the jurisdiction of the Board to entertain and determine appeals from refusal of pension by the Commission shall be referred by the Department to the Exchequer Court for determination.
- 26. The following addition is made to Schedule A to the said Act:—
 Class 21. Disabilities below 5 per cent—all ranks—a final payment not exceeding \$100.

PART II INSURANCE

It was strongly represented to your Committee by returned soldiers' organizations that their members, and returned soldiers generally, should again be afforded the opportunity of applying for and receiving insurance under the provisions of The Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act under which no applications have been receivable since September 1st, 1923.

The evidence adduced before the Committee clearly shows that this insurance has proved of great benefit to returned soldiers and their dependents, especially those provisions covering what are known as sub-standard risks. The evidence also shows that the issue of policies under this Act has not imposed nor will it impose anything but a negligible burden on the country.

Your Committee therefore recommends that the following provision be enacted, namely:—

Section twenty of The Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, chapter fifty-four of the Statutes of 1920, as amended by section three of chapter forty-two of the Statutes of 1922, is repealed and the following is substituted therefor:—

20. Applications for insurance may be received under this Act on and after the first day of July, nineteen hundred and twenty-eight, up to and including the thirtieth day of June, nineteen hundred and thirty-three, but shall not be received thereafter.

PART III

CANTEEN FUNDS

The Committee recommends as follows:-

1. That Bill 39, An Act respecting the disposal of certain Canteen Funds, be amended so that participation in the funds may not be limited to any particular class of ex-members of the forces, but that any ex-member of the Canadian Expeditionary Force or member of the Royal Canadian Navy who served in the Great War may be eligible to participate.



2. That after the reservation of \$5,000 as provided by section 3 of the Bill, the residue be divided into ten allotments on the basis of the division of canteen funds as provided by the Canteen Funds Act of 1925.

The Committee, in accordance with the above recommendations, has submitted with its third report the said Bill with amendments.

PART IV

LAND SETTLEMENT

In the consideration of questions under this heading it was recognized that sufficient time had not yet elapsed to permit a judgment to be arrived at as to the extent to which the amendments of last session had been successful in solving the vexed question of deflation as it affected lands held by soldier settlers under the Act, the majority of applications for relief being still in the process of readjustment. Your Committee found, however, that an oversight had occurred in the omission to place within the provisions of the amendment of last year those settlers who had purchased land under the provision of the Act of 1917. Very little is involved, as very few cases fall into this class, but it is felt that the slight change should be made in order to avoid discrimination and to carry into effect the intention of Parliament.

It is also the opinion of your Committee that the present policy of withholding title to homesteads and soldier grants in respect of lands other than those upon which loans are granted should be discontinued.

It is also the Committee's opinion that no deficiency which may remain on the resale of the lands or other property of a former settler whose agreement with the Board has been terminated should be charged to or collectible from the said former settler, except in such cases where fraud or intent to defraud is shown.

Your Committee therefore recommends that an act be passed this session as follows:—

AN ACT TO AMEND THE SOLDIER SETTLEMENT ACT

His Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons enacts as follows:—

- 1. Subsection four of Section twenty-two of the Soldier Settlement Act, being Chapter 188 of the Revised Statutes of 1927, is amended by striking out all words following the word "settler" in the sixth line thereof.
 - 2. Section twenty-six of the said Act is repealed.
- 3. Section twenty-seven of the said Act is amended by adding the following thereto:—
- "provided that the term 'charged land' referred to in this Act shall not include nor be deemed to include any land other than that in respect of which an advance pursuant to this Act was secured from the Board."
- 4. Section sixty-eight of the said Act is amended by inserting immediately after the word "who" where it first appears in the second line thereof, the following:—

"is indebted to the Board in respect of an amount loaned to him by the Board under the former Act for and expended in the purchase of agricultural land or"



PART V

EMPLOYMENT AND CARE OF PROBLEM CASES

Your Committee finds that one of the most serious situations confronting the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and the country generally is that relating to the employment and care of ex-members of the forces suffering from disability "broken down or burned out" which, under the present regulations, are wholly or in part non-pensionable. These cases may be subdivided into three different classes:—

- 1. Employable only in certain restricted occupations in the general labour market;
- 2. Not employable in the general labour market, yet capable of doing a certain amount of work under sheltered conditions;
- 3. Unemployable.
- 1. With regard to the first class, certain agencies, namely The Employment Service of Canada, Returned Soldier Associations, Soldiers' Aid Commissions, and, in certain large centres, Citizens' Rehabilitation Boards, working together have succeeded in finding suitable employment for large numbers of men.
- It is recommended that the Minister endeavour to find some means of more closely co-ordinating the efforts of these bodies with those of the department.
- 2. Persons falling under the second class, if pensioners, are eligible for employment in the Vetcraft Shops; non-pensioners under present regulations are not.

The Committee recommends that the Vetcraft shops be enlarged so as to employ a greater number of men and that a vigorous advertising campaign be instituted looking towards the increased sale of Vetcraft products, and that articles more easily marketable be produced.

Vocational training in industrial establishments at the expense of the Department has been found to be of benefit in a large number of cases.

It is recommended that the present policy be continued and enlarged.

3. The unemployable, if pensioners, may, under the present regulations, be provided with care and maintenance in a departmental institution. Certain provisions have been made by the Department to care for a limited number of non-pensioners by admission to hospitals either under the control of or under contract with the Department. It was made clear to your Committee that the accommodation at present available in departmental institutions is not sufficient to receive all the persons of this class who will require attention. A number of suggestions have been made to your Committee for dealing with such cases, amongst others that soldiers' homes be established in different sections of the country.

Your Committee, realizing to the full that the recommendations herein contained can only be regarded as temporary expedients, is of opinion that they should be given effect at once in order that some immediate relief may be afforded to the more pressing cases and information gathered which will be of importance in framing the policy which it is convinced must eventually be adopted by the Department. The time at the disposal of the Committee and the opportunity afforded for study were not sufficient to permit it to define any policy along the lines of which the Government should deal with this, the most serious problem which has arisen in connection with our ex-soldiers.

Your Committee strongly recommends that some such policy should be formulated without delay, and to that end an investigation and enquiry, whether by means of a commission or otherwise, should be instituted and a report made upon the methods in use in this or other countries for dealing with the problem by way of institutional care or otherwise.

PART VI

MISCELLANEOUS

1. Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League

Your Committee was greatly impressed by the efficiency of the Service Bureau, an organization instituted by the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League at Ottawa for the purpose of preparing for submission to the Board of Pension Commissioners, the Federal Appeal Board and the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment the claims arising out of legislation on behalf of ex-soldiers. This Bureau has, since its inception, handled thousands of cases and has been of inestimable value not only to members of the Legion, but to all ex-soldiers and their dependents. We feel that it should be given some direct governmental assistance.

The Committee recommends that the estimates to be submitted to Parliament should provide for a yearly grant to the Dominion Executive Council of the Canadian Legion, British Empire Service League. The expenditure of this grant to be subject to such supervision and audit as the Governor in Council may deem necessary, the amount not to exceed \$10,000 per annum and to be contributed on the basis of one dollar for every dollar expended by the Legion directly for the purposes of the Bureau.

2. Treatment

It is recommended, (a) That provision be made for free hospitalization without pay and allowances in respect of non-service disabilities for all pensioners who are unable to provide the same at their own expense.

(b) That Clause 3 of paragraph (13) of Order in Council P.C. 129/1232 be amended to provide that full pay and allowances be paid if the former member of the forces referred to in the said paragraph is in receipt of a pension under section 12 of the Pension Act.

3. Civil Service

A group of ex-soldiers employed in the Department of the Interior, Dominion Land Surveyors' Branch, submitted evidence to show that owing to the nature of their occupation they are precluded, under existing legislation, from enjoying the benefits of the operation of the Superannuation Act afforded other civil servants.

Your Committee considers that a good case was made out and recommends that the Department of the Interior take steps to remedy the situation with respect to these employees.

Recommendation for Printing

Your Committee also begs to recommend that the Orders of Reference, Reports, Proceedings and the Evidence, together with a suitable index to be prepared by the Clerk of the Committee, be printed as an appendix to the Journals of the House of the present session, and also for distribution in bluebook form, not exceeding five hundred copies in English and two hundred copies in French, and that Standing Order No. 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

A printed copy of the Committee's Minutes of Proceedings and Evidence, with indexes, is herewith submitted for the information of the House.

4. What a fair or exhibition has to do in order to qualify for the Government grant in each class.

5. Amount of money paid out by way of Government grants to fairs or exhibitions in each year from 1924 to 1927, inclusive, in each province.

6. During the years mentioned what fairs or exhibitions in each province received Government grants, and amount in each case.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 11th April, 1928, for a copy of the recommendations made by the Canadian Horticultural Council as submitted to the Minister of Agriculture, fixing the value for duty of fruits and vegetables to be applied during the coming season under the provisions of section 43 of the Customs Act.

Mr. Forke, a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 16th April, 1928, for a copy of the agreements entered into by the Government with the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Canadian National Railways for the bringing in of immigrants from the British Isles of from South Eastern Europe.

Mr. Kennedy, seconded by Mr. Spencer, moved, That Bill No. 57, An Act respecting The Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway Company, placed on the Order Paper for consideration from 8 to 9 p.m. on Tuesday, the 1st May, 1928, be then given precedence over other Bills.

After Debate thereon, the said motion was, by leave of the House with-

drawn.

Bill No. 264 (Letter H7 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act for the relief of

Marion Jarvis Lewis."

Mr. Hay, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Seventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—
Consideration has been given to a Resolution of the House of Commons,

dated February 13, 1928, and referred to this Committee, viz:-

"That, in the opinion of this House, the time has come for the consideration of the improvement of our banking system and that the Banking and Commerce Committee be instructed to study possible improvements and report thereon." Five sessions of the Committee were held during which this reference was

under consideration.

Witnesses were examined, including O. S. Tompkins, Inspector-General of Banks; G. W. Hyndman, Assistant Deputy Minister of Finance; A. E. Darby, Director of Economic Research of the Canadian Council of Agriculture; A. E. Phipps, President of the Canadian Bankers' Association; The Hon. W. P. C. Harding, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, Mass.; and H. T.

Ross. K.C., Secretary of the Canadian Bankers' Association.

As directed in the Order of Reference, the Committee conducted a study of possible improvements to our Canadian banking system, and many interesting and useful suggestions were made; but early in the proceedings one major proposal to a large extent monopolized the attention of the Committee, viz., that a Central Bank of Issue and Rediscount, somewhat analogous in its relations to the Canadian banking system to that of the Federal Reserve Banks to the United States system should be established in Canada. It was urged that through the "open market" operations of such a bank and variation in rates of interest in accordance with changing monetary conditions, control of credit could in some degree be exercised, and that the institution might become a

medium through which commodity price levels could be regulated.

The evidence adduced did not, however, convince the Committee that such could be fully achieved. The preponderance of evidence indicated that the operations of a Central Bank of Issue, or Federal Reserve Bank as in the United States, exercised only an indirect or limited influence over price levels and that many of the functions attributed to such Central Bank of Issue and Rediscount were already being performed through the Finance Act. The Committee, however, is of opinion that owing to the rapid expansion of Canadian commercial, industrial and agricultural operations and the possibility in the near future for the need of a much larger measure of credit than at any time in the past, it is desirable that a careful study be made by competent experts of the facilities available under the Finance Act, and to determine if such are capable of ready expansion to meet possible requirements of credit; and further to determine if under the present scope of the Finance Act it is possible for the Treasury Board to deal effectively with unusual variations in the rates of interest; and, lastly, to consider (in case it should be decided that present legislation is too restrictive) what measure should be taken to adapt our present system to the growing needs of the country.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend that the Government, through the Minister of Finance and the Treasury Board, invite into conference the Bankers of Canada, together with other competent persons with experience in such matters, to give further study to the subject-matter of this Report, with instructions to take such steps as in their opinion in the premises are warranted. Your Committee feel that while it has accomplished much useful preliminary work, this would be conducive to a more intensive study of the question than to have the Committee itself conduct further investigations and this recommendation would, of course, in no way affect the usual procedure of having all important changes in banking legislation ordinarily made at the regular decennial revisions of the Bank Act submitted for the careful consideration of the Committee.

Your Committee desire to express appreciation of the manner in which evidence was given, and particularly of the courtesy of the Hon. W. P. G. Harding, Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Boston, for having come to Canada to give evidence which has proven to be of inestimable value to the

Committee.

Canadian National Railways

Your Committee have had under consideration Item 408 of the Estimates. which provides for loans or guarantees of \$39,000,000 to the Canadian National Railway Company for the year ended December 31st, 1928, which is the first full calendar year for which the Estimates of the railway company have been placed upon the basis of the calendar year, instead of the Government fiscal year, which was previously the case. The Estimates considered by the Committee and presented to the House a year ago covered the nine months' period ended December 31st, 1927.

Your Committee have in the course of their deliberations examined in considerable detail the operating statements and the capital expenditures of the company for the year ended December 31st, 1927, and desire to point out that the statements presented this year are in a modified form in that the accounts of the Central Vermont Railway, now in receivership, have been excluded for the entire year, and the accounts of the Eastern Lines, under the provisions of the Maritime Freight Rates Act passed last session, have been shown separately from those of the balance of the Canadian National System, for the six months ended December 31st, 1927.

Your Committee note that the operating results for the year 1927 were not quite as favourable as those for the previous year. The evidence adduced from the officers of the railway disclosed the fact that the chief reasons for the less favourable showing were an increase in expenses due to a general increase in wages, and because of somewhat larger expenditures on maintenance of way and structures to improve the physical condition of the property; and a decrease in earnings due to a reduction in freight rates and to a later harvesting of the grain crop, which delayed the grain movement in 1927 as compared with the movement in 1926. When these factors are taken into account, your Committee is of the opinion that the results of the operations have been very satisfactory indeed.

Your Committee have examined in detail the capital expenditures made during the year, which totalled a very considerable sum, and are satisfied from evidence given that the railway properties have received a benefit in keeping with the capital outlay made.

Your Committee are also satisfied from the evidence given that the accounts for the year 1927 as presented are in accordance with prescribed practices in railroad accounting, and when taken together with the separate statement respecting the Eastern Lines, reflect accurately the revenues received and the expenditures made, as well as the additions to the capital account during the year 1927.

Your Committee are gratified to observe the continued improvement in the earnings of the company's hotels, and to learn from the officers of the company of the indirect benefit resulting from the operation of the hotel system.

Your Committee have already in their Third Report referred to their consideration of Bill 204, "An Act respecting the Toronto Terminals Railway Company."

Your Committee note that the requirements for the present year, exclusive of the Eastern Lines, amount to \$39,000,000, as compared with the requirements asked for last year of \$22,500,000 for the nine months ended December 31st, 1927, including the Eastern Lines. The chief reasons for the increase are the twelve months' period as compared with the nine months' period of last year, increased interest and a larger program of additions and betterments which was examined by your Committee and found to be reasonable.

From the evidence given your Committee are of the opinion that the amount of \$39,000,000 is necessary for the purposes of the company during the year 1928 and should be passed by the House.

Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Limited

Your Committee have had under consideration Item 409 of the Estimates, which provides for a loan of \$758,000 to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, Limited, and have, in the course of their deliberations, examined the

operations for the year ended December 31st, 1927. Your Committee note that the results of the operations have not been quite as favourable as those for the previous year, due to a highly competitive situation, which resulted in a reduction of freight rates in certain directions, with a resultant reduction in the gross revenue of the company.

Your Committee note that the amount asked for, viz.: \$758,000, is to be used to the extent of \$750,000 for contemplated deficits and \$8,000 for betterments, and are of the opinion that this amount is necessary and should be

granted by the House.

Mr. Sanderson, for Mr. Hay, moved,—That, in accordance with notice given on the 3rd instant, the Eighth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce be concurred in.

PRAYERS.

Mr. McIntosh, from the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations, presented the Third and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee has had under consideration a resolution, which was adopted by the House of Commons on March 21st, in the following terms;

That, in the opinion of this House, the Committee on Industrial and International Relations be authorized to investigate and report on insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity.

Your Committee proceeded, as directed, to investigate the subject of insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity. The Assistant Deputy Minister of Labour, who was the first witness, presented memoranda of information dealing with the systems of insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity which exist in various countries, also a memorandum of information relative to systems of voluntary sickness insurance and benefits which have been developed in this country. The Director of the Employment Service of Canada furnished the Committee with an outline of the operations of the free employment offices which have been established by the Provincial Governments in sixty-four centres throughout the Dominion, and which are assisted by a Federal grant. Witnesses appeared before the Committee on behalf of organized labour, Public Welfare Associations, and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and expressed the views of their respective organizations on the subject-matter of reference.

The Deputy Minister of Justice gave evidence on the question of the respective jurisdiction of the Dominion and Provincial Governments regarding

unemployment, sickness and invalidity.

While the time at the disposal of your Committee has been too short to make as comprehensive a report as the importance of this matter demands, your Committee submits the following recommendations:—

1. That the necessity of a policy providing some method of unemployment insurance is one that will inevitably have to be dealt with before long, as a solution, in part, of the industrial problems of the present day.

2. That we accept and endorse the principle of unemployment insurance, based on compulsory contributions derived from the State, the Employer and the Employee. In this connection we would point out that a somewhat similar decision was arrived at by a Royal Commission on Industrial Relations, which dealt with this subject in 1919.

3. That the evidence of the Justice Department makes it clear that the responsibility for such legislation rests on the Provincial authorities, it being within their jurisdiction under the provisions of the B.N.A. Act, but that it would be within the power of Parliament to contribute, by grant, to such Provinces as adopted such legislation, following the precedent set in the matter of Technical Education, Highway Construction and, more recently, the Old Age Pension Act.

4. That, whereas the conditions of unemployment vary so much more from Province to Province, than those relating to old age, it would be very desirable, for the success of any plan of unemployment insurance that several of the Provinces should be willing to act simultaneously. In view of these circumstances, we are of the opinion that this matter should be referred to the various provinces, to ascertain which of them would be prepared to consider adopting

legislation of this character, and to what extent.

5. On the very important subject of the cost of unemployment insurance your Committee has experienced great difficulty in arriving at any definite conclusion owing to the lack of data as to the amount of unemployment, either constant or occasional in character. There appears to be no definite method of ascertaining the unemployment at any given point for any length of time. We, therefore, recommend that the Government immediately devise some means whereby the amount of the unemployment, over a period of a year, could reasonably be calculated.

6. That as unemployment insurance has been in operation for a number of years in Great Britain, and has recently been thoroughly investigated by a strong committee, and the system reorganized on the basis of their support, your Committee would suggest to the Government the advisability of obtaining from Great Britain expert advice on the subject which would be of service in the formulation of a plan or plans suitable to conditions in Canada, and in

arriving at the approximate cost.

7. In order that this matter might be further dealt with, your Committee recommends to Parliament that at the next session this question be again referred

to the Committee on Industrial and International Relations.

8. Your Committee further recommends that 8,000 copies in English, and 2,000 copies in French, of this report, and the evidence upon which it is based, be printed in Blue Book form, these to be distributed by the Department of Labour. and that Standing Order 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

Mr. Thorson, from the Special Committee appointed to consider the question of the adequacy of the remuneration paid to the Judges of the various Courts in Canada, presented the Second and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

Your Committee, composed of fifteen members, were appointed on April 13th, 1928, in accordance with a resolution passed in the House on March 20th, 1928, and were empowered to send for persons, papers and records, to examine witnesses under oath, and to report from time to time, and were further empowered on April 19th, 1928, to print their minutes of proceedings and any evidence taken by them, and to sit while the House is in session.

Your Committee met for organization on April 19th, 1928, and since then have held seven sessions and heard twenty witnesses. Representations were also made to your Committee by letters and telegrams from numerous persons who did not appear before them. Your Committee also had before them reports of committees of the County Court Judges and of the Canadian Bar Association, resolutions from various organizations and information from the Department of Justice and the Bureau of Statistics.

Your Committee gave careful consideration to the question referred to them and find that the remuneration paid to the judges in the various courts in Canada as hereinafter mentioned is inadequate and ought to be increased.

Your Committee, therefore, recommend:-

1. That the salaries of the judges of the District and County Courts of the various provinces of Canada be increased by \$2,000 per annum each.

2. That the salaries of the judges of the Superior Courts of the various provinces of Canada, and of the Exchequer Court of Canada be increased by \$2,000 per annum each.
3. That the salaries of the judges of the Supreme Court of Canada be

increased by \$3,000 per annum each.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Speaker laid on the Table of the House,—Report of the 24th Conference of the Interparliamentary Union held at Paris, France, from the 25th to the 31st of August, both inclusively, 1927, by the Hon. N. A. Belcourt, President of the Canadian Group.

And also the Report of the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Branch of the Interparliamentary Union, held on the 19th April, 1928, at Ottawa, Canada,

which are as follows:-

This Report is submitted in conformity with the rules of the Interparliamentary Union requiring the President of every National Group to report the proceedings of the Conferences at the Parliamentary Session which follows each Conference.

The Honourable Senator Dandurand, Privy Councillor, and the undersigned, who were then and are still members of the Council of the Union, attended the different meetings of the Council, of the several Committees and of the General

Conference in August, 1927, at Paris.

The following nations: Germany, United States of America, Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Canada, Denmark, Dominican Republic, Egypt, Esthonia, Finland, France, Great Britain, Greece, Hungary, Indes Netherlands, British Indies, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Lethonia, Mexico, Nicaragua, Norway, Lower Countries, Peru, Philippines, Poland, Roumania, Salvador, Sweden, Switzerland and Czecho-Slovakia were represented by their delegates numbering in all 440.

Previous to the Conference preliminary Documents relating to the matters appearing on the Agenda for discussion at this Conference were distributed to the delegates a month in advance of the Conference; these documents also contained the reports and conclusions of the various Committees and the Resolutions to be

submitted for adoption. The subjects of the Agenda were:-

1. Abuse of Noxious Drugs.

2. Methods for the Codification of International Law.

3. Technical plans for the reduction of Armaments. 4. Resolutions prepared by the Committee for European Customs'

Entente.

The meetings were held at the "Palais du Luxembourg," in the Senate Chamber. Mr. Paul Doumer, President of the Senate of France, was elected

President of the Conference, which he opened with a speech of welcome which was received with much applause. Mr. Raymond Poincaré, Minister of Finance and President of the Council, M. Aristide Briand, Minister for Foreign Affairs, M. Painlévé, Minister of War, M. Bouisson, President of La Chambre des Députés, and many of the members of the Government attended one or more

The President of the Reichstag and some of the leading members of that Chamber and many of the Parliamentarian leaders of the 33 nations were present with other delegates and all took a deeply interested part in the proceedings. There were several receptions and other brilliant functions given by the Municipal Council of Paris, the President of the Republic, M. Briand, M. Painlevé, M. Poincaré, M. Bouisson, Senator Fernand Merlin and others.

The Delegates from Great Britain, Lord Treowen and others, and from the United States, Senators Burton and Tyson, took a prominent part in the activities of the Conference.

On the first day the Hon. Senator Dandurand opened the General Debate and was followed by several other delegates, including myself. After the close of the General Debate, the subjects mentioned in the Agenda were discussed as follows:-

Friday, 26th August.—Abuse of Noxious Drugs.

Saturday, 27th August.—Establishment of Customs Union in Europe (in which only European delegates participated).

Monday, 29th August.—Technical plans for reduction of Armaments. Tuesday, 30th August.—Methods for Codification of International Law.

The Resolutions annexed to this Report were unanimously adopted.

The Delegates were reminded of their obligations to include these Resolutions in the Report to their respective Parliaments. They are as follows:—

1. Resolution with regard to Noxious Drugs.

- 2. Resolution with regard to Customs Agreement between the countries of Europe.
 - 3. Resolution with regard to the abolition of Passport Visas.

4. Resolution with regard to reduction of Armaments.

5. Resolution with regard to Codification of International Law.

During the General Debate I brought before the Assembly the question of Parliamentary Government as it functions nowadays and insisted upon the necessity of a thorough examination of its present condition, its shortcomings and failures, as well as the necessity for its improvement, and that this grave subject should be especially dealt with by a Commission appointed for the purpose of being reported on fully at the next Conference. It was unanimously decided that it would be one of the principal questions for discussion and action at the now approaching Conference, at Berlin, in August next, and the subject accordingly has been placed on the Agenda.

In the meantime the Bureau of the Union has printed and circulated the opinions of some of the great Parliamentarians of Europe on the subject. They are M. Harold J. Laski, professor of Economic Sciences of the Faculty of London University; M. Charles Borgeaud, professor at the University of Geneva; M. F. Larnaude, honorary dean of the Faculty of Law at Paris; Gaetano Mosca, Senator, of the Kingdom of Italy, professor at the University of Rome, and M. M. J. Bonn, professor at the Commercial Institute of Berlin.

I shared with the President of "La Chambre des Députés" and a few other delegates the honour of presiding at two Sittings of the General Assembly. During the Conference it was a repeated source of gratification to me, as President of the Canadian Group, to hear from most of the delegates who had attended the Conference of 1925, held, as you no doubt remember, partly in

Washington and partly in Ottawa, that they were still under the vivid impressions which they had carried away from their visit to Canada, of what they then saw and of the very enjoyable and profitable trip it had afforded them.

The Annual Meeting of the Canadian Group was held on the 19th April, in Room 116, House of Commons, when the General Elections took place, with the following results:—

The membership of the Group has recently been largely increased and we now have 125 members.

I wish to draw special attention to the publications of the Union. A volume containing the reports, recommendations, discussions and resolutions submitted to and adopted by every Annual General Conference is published shortly after each Conference and a certain number of these volumes are available for each national group. The members of the Canadian Group, at their last Annual Meeting, were unanimously of opinion that an effort should be made to have these volumes and the other publications printed in the form of pamphlets, which are issued between Conferences, made available for each member of the Group. With this and other purposes in view it was decided to make the annual membership contribution to the Canadian Group \$5 yearly.

The advantages of membership in the Union are of exceptional value as the Union deals with all international questions. It is an ally and coadjutor and co-operator of the Society of the League of Nations and in constant relation with it. It affords many other advantages for travelling and for meeting the leaders of public thought and action in the various countries which have formed national groups.

At the Conference in Ottawa, the first one ever held in Canada, in 1925, there were 425 delegates representing 41 nations. Opportunities for making life-long and most interesting acquaintances between all these Groups are frequently offered.

The Union welcomes the discussion of the matters investigated and reported upon at its several conferences by the Parliamentarians of the different units and is prepared to give its most serious consideration to recommendations and suggestions emanating from the Parliamentarians of the different Groups.

In the name of the Canadian Group I invite the close attention of the Members of Parliament to the great work accomplished by the Union in the past and to its efforts in the future. The Honourable Gentlemen are also invited to discuss the subject matters dealt with in the Resolutions in this Report contained.

The next Conference will be held in Berlin, Germany, between the 23rd

and 28th, both inclusively, of August next.

A meeting of the Canadian Group will be called in a few days to select the nine delegates from the Canadian Group who will attend this Conference.

The Annual Meeting of the Canadian Branch of the Inter-Parliamentary Union was held on Thursday, the 19th April, 1928, in Room 116, House of Commons.

Hon. N. A. Belcourt (Senator), President, was in the Chair.

The following members were present:-

Hon. Senators Beaubien, Bénard, Hughes, Rankin, McMeans and Spence; Messrs. S. C. Robinson, Fraser, Chevrier, Pettit and McQuarrie, Members of the House of Commons.

Hon. Mr. Belcourt reported that a general conference attended by delegates of 33 countries, including Canada, was held at Paris from the 25th to the 30th of August, 1927.

Mr. Paul Doumer, President of the Senate, acted as Honorary President of the General Conference.

The President of the French Republic, Mr. Poincare, President of the Council; Mr. Painlevé, Minister of War; Mr. Briand, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Mr. Bouisson, President of the Chamber of Deputies; Senator Fernand Merlin, President of the French Group; honoured the Convention either by giving receptions or by paying a visit to the Convention.

The main questions debated were:-

1. The fight against noxious drugs of addiction.

2. A system of customs agreement between the countries of Europe.

3. Abolition of passport visas.4. The reduction of Armaments.

5. The codification of International Law.

The following resolutions were adopted:-

(a) The fight against noxious drugs of addiction.

"The XXIVth Inter-Parliamentary Conference calls the very special attention of the Groups of the Union to the serious dangers attendant upon the abuse of opium and other drugs of addiction for the health and morality of the peoples, especially with regard to the younger generation.

The Conference declares unanimously that the attainment of the ends aimed at in the fight against this abuse will only be reached by the following measures:—

- (a) Limitation of the culture of the poppy and coca leaves and of the production of all narcotics to the recognized amount needed for medical and scientific purposes, this measure to include the total suppression of the use of opium for smoking.
- (b) The establishment of a system of control by national or international means for the observance of the rules fixed to the above effect.
- (c) The elimination of all profits by private dealers in the drug trade, with the exception of the drugs required for legitimate purposes as mentioned above.

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The XXIVth Inter-Parliamentary Conference, taking note of the fact that under Article 6, chapter 2, of the Hague Convention of 1912, the contracting powers undertook to adopt measures for the suppression of the manufacture, trade in, and use of prepared opium within the territories subject to their jurisdiction, recommends for the consideration of the Groups of the Union to urge the Governments concerned to set a definite term not to exceed fifteen years, within which the manufacture, trade in and use of prepared opium within their respective territories and possessions be finally and completely suppressed.

III

Considering that the two Conferences held at Geneva from November, 1924, to February, 1925, resulted in the conclusion of a series of international agreements concerning the gradual limitation of the abusive use of opium and of other dangerous drugs, and making for the establishment of effective centrol and supervision of the use of such drugs,

and seeing that opinions differ as to the value of those agreements, the Conference recommends that the Groups who regard the agreements as an important step towards the achievement of the ends in view urge their respective parliaments and governments to see that the Geneva agreements are ratified by their country without delay,

and asks the Groups who are unable to share this opinion to make every effort to induce their states to endeavour to revise those agreements at the first possible opportunity in accordance with the principles enumerated in Resolution 1.

"In the meantime those Groups are asked to make every effort to induce their states to exercise a strict control on the manufacture and export of narcotics, in view of the fact that it is practically impossible to supervise the traffic.

IV

"The Conference recommends that the Groups shall examine the possibility of obtaining the adoption by legislative and administrative measures of the prohibition of the production and distribution of heroine.

V

"Whereas the great dangers above mentioned created by the abuse of drugs of addiction may compromise the reconstruction in the social and economic field which is recognized as necessary, after the world war, in next to all countries,

the Inter-Parliamentary Bureau is requested to transmit these resolutions to all the Groups of the Union and to all the Governments and Parliaments of the world."

- (b) A system of customs agreement between the countries of Europe. (A system of customs agreement between the European countries was then put in the form of a resoultion, but as the tariff is part of the political program in Canada, it does not seem advisable that this group should consider this resolution.)
 - (c) The abolition of passport visas.

(Discussion pp. 305-371)

"The Conference reiterates the recommendation of the Stockholm Conference in 1921 and the Berne-Geneva Conference in 1924 in favour of the abolition of passport visas, without prejudice to any measure which may be considered necessary for the security of the State."

(d) Reduction of Armaments.

(Reports, pp. 152-167; Discussion pp. 372-459; 524-529)

"Resolution:

The XXIVth Inter-Parliamentary Conference recalling the fact that the States Signatories of the Peace Treaties of 1919-20 and of the Covenant of the League of Nations, unanimously recognized that the maintenance of peace requires "the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with national safety and the enforcement by common action of international obligations";

Seeing that by virtue of the aforementioned peace treaties, the armaments of certain States have been reduced and limited "in order to render possible the initiation of a general limitation of the armaments

of all nations":

Seeing that this preparation for a Convention of general limitation has, thanks to the sustained efforts of the Preparatory Disarmament Committee of the League of Nations, resulted, in spite of numerous reservations, in unanimously accepted drafts in favour of the limitation of armaments for land and air, but has not succeeded in reconciling the various points of view expressed in the matter of naval armaments;

Seeing that these failures have caused great disappointment to those who, suffering from the effects of the present economic disorder, count on seeing their hopes realized by means of the reduction of the

burden of military organization;

Expresses the wish that the governments, basing themselves on the lofty principles of the Covenant of the League of Nations, employ with energy every means in their power to favour an appeal to arbitration in case of contest between States, to ensure security for each State, facilitate the general reduction of armaments and hasten the common work necessary for the achievement of this threefold result;

The Conference asks the Groups of the Union to work for this end within their respective Parliaments and with their Governments, with all the energy which the situation demands, and invites them to organize active popular propaganda in order that public opinion may express itself imperiously in favour of the reduction of armaments and the reign of

justice between the nations."

(e) Codification of International Law.

(Reports, pp. 168-181; Discussion, pp. 460-521)

A. "In view of the importance and urgency of a progressive codification of International Law,

considering that by such codification the flagrant injustices and numerous uncertainties which characterize International Law in its present state would be eliminated and that a stable and generally accepted basis would then be created for the solution of international disputes in the supreme interest of peace,

in view of the recommendation made to the Council of the League of Nations by the Committee of Experts for the Progressive Codification of International Law, to the effect that the codification of a first series of subject-matters which, in the opinion of the experts and according to the declarations of a considerable number of Governments, are to be regarded as ready for such a codification, should be taken in hand.

the XXIVth Inter-Parliamentary Conference warmly supports the recommendation, and records the wish that a first Conference on Public International Law be summoned as soon as possible and that all States, whether members or not of the League, be invited to participate in it, with a view to giving practical and tangible effect to the highly important work of the Committee of Experts.

B. In view of the very satisfactory progress made in the work pursued up till now by the Committee of Experts of the League of Nations,

the Conference recommends that the Committee of Experts, functioning as a Permanent Committee, as is the case with other bodies within the League, shall be invited to pursue and push forward its studies with a view to preparing fresh preliminary draft conventions on other chapters of Public International Law the codification of which appears desirable and feasible.

It insists on the importance of a thorough and conscientious preparation of the work of the Conferences on Public International Law, and recommends in particular that the present and future work of the Committee also embrace the question of the unification of certain principles of International Penal Law, and be carefully studied in every quarter concerning itself with the development of International Law, and that it be, if necessary, co-ordinated with the work of other competent institutions, and especially with that of the Pan-American Union.

C. The Conference recalls the Resolution voted by the XXIIIrd Conference held at Washington and Ottawa in 1925 recommending the drafting of a general synthetic plan of Codification of Public International Law,

and requests the Committee for Juridical Questions of the Union to submit the draft of such a plan to the next Inter-Parliamentary Conference

The draft shall regard war solely as a crime against International Law (with the exception, however, of the right of legitimate defence which justifies a resort to arms), and must consequently include, in addition to positive Law, rules intended to secure the Law of Peace (Friendly arrangements, mediation, conciliation, arbitration, resort to international jurisdiction), as well as rules relating to the ultimate execution of decisions reached.

Hon. Mr. Belcourt laid stress upon the importance of the Canadian Group joining the others in giving serious consideration to the above mentioned matters. He pointed out that these resolutions were printed in a volume which could be available and distributed. Necessary steps will be taken by the secretary, in order to secure copies for the members of the Canadian Group.

The Union is closely allied to the League of Nations with which it works in co-operation. All the independent countries in the world which have joined the League of Nations belong to the Union.

The United States has also formed a very imposing group, which has been very active and has exercised great influence in the Union. It received the delegates at Washington in 1925. Mr. Belcourt recalled that the Convention of 1925 had, as previously arranged, sat partly in Washington and Ottawa. A very enjoyable and profitable trip was then made through parts of Quebec and Ontario. The delegates were delighted with the way in which they had been received in Canada.

Mr. Belcourt read part of the circular for 1928, which invited the different Groups to consider resolutions respecting the control of foreign politics, the manufacture of arms and war munitions by private parties, the establishment of commissions for the prevention of conflicts between the nationals of the same country and the prohibition of the noxious drug traffic.

He also explained that our statutes contain provisions against this traffic, and that, although this Group was in full sympathy with the three first mentioned resolutions and could record its approval, he did not see the necessity of making a thorough study thereof and drafting reports. He however dilated on the question of the reduction of armaments and the codification of international law, reading copious excerpts from the annual report of the 24th Conference.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. McMeans, seconded by Mr. McQuarrie, it was resolved that this Group is in full sympathy with the resolutions respecting the reduction of armaments and will on all occasions give them its most hearty support.

The codification of international laws gave rise to some debate, most of the members present realizing the importance of publishing a code containing the principles and rules of practice of the international law.

On motion of Senator Beaubien, seconded by Senator Hughes, it was resolved that the Canadian Group desires to place itself on record as giving its full approval to the project of entrusting a committee of scholarly gentlemen with the task of codifying the principles of international law which now govern the relations between the different countries of the world.

The Chairman reminded the meeting that the next Conference of the Union will be held at Berlin, Germany, and expressed the hope that Canada would then be adequately represented. The members present were of the opinion that this country should not neglect this opportunity of taking rank with the other Groups which are playing an important part in the different activities of the League of Nations.

The elections of the Board for the year 1928 then took place and gave the following result:—

On motion of Mr. McQuarrie, seconded by Hon. Mr. McMeans, it was resolved that Arthur Beauchesne, Esq., Clerk of the House of Commons, be appointed Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Group.

Hon. Mr. McMeans said that the Group was indebted to Hon. Mr. Belcourt for the splendid work he had done in the past few years. His organization of the delegates' visit to Canada in 1925 deserved great credit. The visitors were very enthusiastic over the reception given to them, and very favourably impressed with the conditions as they saw them in Canada. No better advertisement could have been made for the Dominion.

He proposed, seconded by Hon. Mr. Beaubien, and it was resolved that the Canadian Group of the Inter-Parliamentary Union desires to express its warmest thanks to Hon. N. A. Belcourt, its President, for the splendid work he has performed both as Chairman and a delegate to the Conferences which have taken place in Europe and America.

The Chairman suggested that a yearly contribution be paid by the members in order to subscribe to the publications issued by the Headquarters in Geneva. He pointed out that under the Constitution, the Groups were empowered to adopt regulations and fix an annual fee, in order to meet its expenses. On motion of Mr. Pettit, seconded by the Hon. Mr. Beaubien, it was resolved that an annual fee of \$5 be paid by the members of the Canadian Group.

The Chairman stated that the different matters embodied in the resolutions passed at Geneva and transmitted to the Canadian Group, should be brought to the attention of Parliament during the present session. He added that he would submit these matters to the Senate, and, after some slight discussion, it was unanimously resolved that Mr. McQuarrie be entrusted with this duty for the House of Commons.

The Clerk informed the House of the unavoidable absence of Mr. Speaker. Whereupon Mr. Johnston (Long Lake), Chairman of Committees, took the Chair as Deputy Speaker, pursuant to the Statute in that case made and provided.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Duff, from the Select Standing Committee on Marine and Fisheries, to whom were referred the Annual Report of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries for the fiscal year 1926-27; and the Annual Report of the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries for the same period, presented the following as their First and Final Report :-

Your Committee have held several meetings at which different matters came under review. No witnesses were summoned, but certain gentlemen

appeared before your Committee at their own request.

A representative of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League, Britannia Branch, Victoria, B.C., made strong representations to your Committee respecting the present system of Pilotage, and also the present system of enquiry into wrecks, in Canadian waters on the Pacific coast. That conditions

there were unsatisfactory.

Two gentlemen, representing canneries, now operating at certain points on the British Columbia coast, appeared before your Committee. They complained that owing to some recent regulations instituted by the department, serious losses had resulted to their business. It was explained to your Committee that the regulations in question were imposed for the purpose of limiting the catch of salmon while hovering near certain spawning areas, having regard for the future of that industry.

The question of Fishing Licenses was again taken under consideration, with regard to issue of such licenses and the control of that industry in British

Columbia fishing waters, so far as possible along the most desirable channels.

The Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and the Director of Fisheries of that department, were requested to come before your Committee and explain the regulations and conditions, respectively, against which complaints had been made. Letters and telegrams were produced, both for and against changes being made, and after careful consideration of the evidence adduced, certain resolutions were adopted by your Committee on which is based the recommendations herewith submitted to the consideration and judgment of the House, as follows:—

Your Committee respectfully recommend that an investigation be held by a Commissioner appointed by the Government, and enquiry made into the whole question of Pilotage in Canadian waters on the Pacific coast; and also, respecting the system of enquiring into wrecks; with power to summon witnesses and examine them under oath; and to compel the production of documents, and,

Your Committee respectfully recommend to the House that in future no Fishing Licenses in British Columbia waters be issued except to British subjects.

- (c) And, in case the foregoing provisions of this section are not complied with, the holders of the shares so issued shall be liable to the company and to its creditors to the amount of the par value of the shares held by them respectively."

Mr. Jacobs, for Mr. Hay, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have considered Bill No. 341 (Letter B10 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to incorporate Eastern Bank of Canada," and beg leave to report the same without amendment.

Mr. Denis (Joliette), from the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, presented the Second and Final Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

(1) On the 29th of March, 1928, the House adopted the following resolution:—

That the Interim and Final Reports respectively of the Hon. Mr. Justice Clarke, Commissioner appointed to inquire into the alleged existence of corrupt or illegal practices in the election held in the electoral district of Athabaska, in the Province of Alberta, on the 29th of October, 1925, which reports were laid on the table of the House on December 15, 1926, be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections.

(2) Your Committee have held ten meetings and examined several witnesses including the following: Jules Castonguay, Chief Electoral Officer; George Gonthier, Auditor General; E. J. Lemaire, Clerk of the Privy Council; W. Stuart Edwards, Deputy Minister of Justice.

(3) In the course of their deliberations your Committee have examined in detail the said reports of Commissioner Clarke and the evidence taken before him.

(4) Your Committee is of the opinion that the cause of corrupt and illegal practices in the election held in the Federal Constituency of Athabaska in 1925 was the partizanship, ignorance and incompetence of certain election officials and your Committee recommend that the Auditor General should submit to the Justice Department a full statement of the payments made to the aforesaid officials with a view to instituting proceedings for the recovery of the amounts so paid to such officials if the law provides for such action.

- (5) Your Committee is further of the opinion that the Chief Electoral Officer should recommend to the proper authorities that prosecutions should be taken against all violators of the Dominion Elections Act.
- (6) The Committee recommend that a Special Committee of the House should be appointed at the next session of Parliament to examine into the evidence and deliberations of this Committee this year and to study the Dominion Elections Act, 1920, and the amendments thereto, and the Corrupt Practices Inquiries Act, and to suggest to the House such other amendments to the said Acts as they may deem advisable, such Committee to give special attention to the method of selecting returning officers and the preparation of voters' lists.
- (7) The Committee is also of the opinion that under the circumstances the deposit of Charles Henry Gauvreau, one of the candidates at the election of the 29th of October, 1925, in the Electoral District of Athabaska, should be refunded.
- (8) Your Committee submit herewith for the information of the House their Minutes of Proceedings and the evidence taken by them.

Mr. McIntosh, from the Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

In obedience to an Order of your Honourable House dated May 31st, your Committee have reconsidered Paragraph 8 of their Third and Final Report, and have amended the same in accordance with the instructions received, and beg to submit herewith the said Report, as so amended, as follows:-

The Select Standing Committee on Industrial and International Relations begs leave to present the following as their

THIRD AND FINAL REPORT

Your Committee has had under consideration a resolution, which was adopted by the House of Commons on March 21st, in the following terms:—

"That in the opinion of this House, the Committee on Industrial and International Relations be authorized to investigate and report on insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity."

Your Committee proceeded, as directed, to investigate the subject of insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity. The Assistant Deputy Minister of Labour, who was the first witness, presented memoranda of information dealing with the systems of insurance against unemployment, sickness and invalidity which exist in various countries, also a memorandum of information relative to systems of voluntary sickness insurance and benefits which have been developed in this country. The Director of the Employment Service of Canada furnished the Committee with an outline of the operations of the free employment offices which have been established by the Provincial Governments in sixty-four centres throughout the Dominion, and which are assisted by a Federal grant. Witnesses appeared before the Committee on behalf of organized labour, Public Welfare Associations, and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and expressed the views of their respective organizations on the subject matter of reference.

The Deputy Minister of Justice gave evidence on the question of the respective jurisdiction of the Dominion and Provincial Governments regarding unemployment, sickness and invalidity,

While the time at the disposal of your Committee has been too short to make as comprehensive a report as the importance of this matter demands, your Committee submits the following recommendations:—

1. That the necessity of providing some method of unemployment insurance is one that will inevitably have to be dealt with before long, as a solution,

in part, of the industrial problems of the present day.

2. That we accept and endorse the principle of unemployment insurance, based on compulsory contributions derived from the State, the Employer and the Employee. In this connection, we would point out that a somewhat similar decision was arrived at by a Royal Commission on Industrial Relations, which

dealt with this subject in 1919.

3. That the evidence of the Justice Department makes it clear that the responsibility for such legislation rests on the Provincial authorities, it being within their jurisdiction under the provisions of the B.N.A. Act, but that it would be within the power of Parliament to contribute, by grant, to such Provinces as adopted such legislation, following the precedent set in the matter of Technical Education, Highway Construction and, more recently, the Old Age Pension Act.

4. That, whereas the conditions of unemployment vary so much more from Province to Province, than those relating to old age, it would be very desirable, for the success of any plan of unemployment insurance that several of the Provinces should be willing to act simultaneously. In view of these circumstances, we are of the opinion that this matter should be referred to the various provinces, to ascertain which of them would be prepared to con-

sider adopting legislation of this character, and to what extent.

5. On the very important subject of the cost of unemployment insurance your Committee has experienced great difficulty in arriving at any definite conclusion owing to the lack of data as to the amount of unemployment, either constant or occasional in character. There appears to be no definite method of ascertaining the unemployment at any given point for any length of time. We, therefore, recommend that the Government immediately devise some means whereby the amount of the unemployment, over a period of a year, could reasonably be calculated.

6. That as unemployment insurance has been in operation for a number of years in Great Britain, and has recently been thoroughly investigated by a strong committee, and the system reorganized on the basis of their report, your Committee would suggest to the Government the advisability of obtaining from Great Britain expert advice on the subject which would be of service in the formulation of a plan or plans suitable to conditions in Canada, and in

arriving at the approximate cost.

7. In order that this matter might be further dealt with, your Committee recommends to Parliament that at the next Session this question be again

referred to the Committee on Industrial and International Relations.

8. Your Committee further recommend that 750 copies in English, and 250 copies in French, of this report, and the evidence upon which it is based, be printed in blue book form, and that Standing Order No. 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

- "(10) Such officers, clerks and other employees as may be required for the proper discharge of the work of the Board shall be furnished by the Department on request of the Board and the salaries of all such officers, clerks and other employees, together with all other expenses incidental to the carrying out of the work with which the Board is charged shall be paid by the Department on approval of the accounts by the Board and shall be charged against the salary or other appropriations of the Department.
- (11) The Board shall furnish the Minister with an annual report and such Report shall be embodied in the Annual Report of the Department."
- 12. Page 13, lines 10 to 42 inclusive, and page 14, lines 1 to 3 inclusive.—
 For clause 31 substitute the following:—
- "31. Subsection one of section fifty-one of the said Act is hereby amended by adding after the word "service" in the sixth line thereof the following:—
- "If the medical classification of the injury or disease resulting in disability or death in respect of which an application has been refused by the Commission is considered by the Board to be in error, the Board shall, before issuing judgment, communicate in writing to the Commission its reasons for considering such medical classification to be in error, whereupon the dispute as to the medical classification shall be referred by the Commission to a board consisting of three medical experts, one to be named by the Commission, another to be named by the Board, and the third to be agreed upon by the two as named, and in the event of their failure to agree, to be named by the Minister, which board of experts shall be requested to determine the medical classification to be acted upon by the Commission in rendering its decision. If, upon the medical classification so determined, pension is refused by the Commission, the Board shall give the appeal such further consideration as it may deem necessary, and issue its judgment on the medical classification determined as hereinbefore provided."
- 13. Page 14, lines 25 to 33 inclusive.—For subsection (6) substitute the following:—
- "(6) Every applicant and the Board of Pension Commissioners for Canada or its representatives shall have the right to attend in person, at any and all sittings for the purpose of hearing an appeal held by the Board or by a member thereof, under such conditions as to the payment of an applicant's expenses thereby incurred as may be fixed by regulation of the Governor in Council, and the applicant may if he so desires, but at his own expense, be assisted thereat, by counsel or representative other than the official Soldier Adviser appointed by the Department."
 - 14. Page 15, line 21.—Add the following as new clause "A":—

New Clause "A"

"This Act shall come into force on the first day of September, 1928."

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the Bill No. 290, An Act to amend the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act with an amendment, which is as follows:—

On motion of Mr. Denis (Joliette), the Second and Final Report of the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections was concurred in.

The Order being read for the consideration of the amendments made by

the Senate to the Bill No. 289, An Act to amend the Pension Act;

Mr. King (Kootenay East), moved,—That a Message be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours that this House agrees to their amendments to clauses 4, 5 subsection 4 (1), 5 subsection 4 (3) inserted, 24, 29, 32 subsection 6 and New Clause A and disagrees to their amendments to clauses 2 (a), 7, 12, 25, 30 (10), and 31 to Bill No. 289, An Act to amend the Pension Act, for the following reasons:—

Because in respect of clause 30, subsection 10, the amendments made by the Senate differ in form and substance from those made by them to clause 5, subsection 4 (1) and are likely to cause confusion and misunderstanding in their interpretation. There is no objection to requiring the approval of the Commission or of the Board before the payment of accounts, but the right to question expenditure must lie with the Minister who is responsible to Parlia-

ment for the proper use of the moneys with which he is entrusted.

This safeguard is implied in subsection 4 (1) of clause 5 as amended by the Senate in the provision that the Commission shall be attached to the Department. There is no such safeguard provided in the amendment by the Senate to subsection 10 of clause 30. The Board should not possess a greater control of expenditure than that given to the Commission. It is considered that the situation would be clarified and the two bodies placed upon an equal footing in this respect if an amendment similar to that made to subsection 4 (1) of clause 5, were made to subsection (10) of clause 30. The subsection would then read as follows:—

"The Board shall be attached to the Department and the expenses required to be incurred for the discharge of its duties, including the salaries of its officers, clerks, and other employees shall, on approval by the Board, be paid,

out of the moneys provided by Parliament."

Because in respect of clause 12, while this House concurs in the amendments made by the Senate as to the special tribunal that is to consider cases claimed to be specially meritorious it is not clear what course must be followed by the applicant before he presents his application to such special tribunal. The term "entitlement" as used in the amendments made by the Senate is not defined by the Pension Act. There are several cases which might quite properly be made the subject of an award of a compassionate pension or allowance which are obviously not pensionable as a matter of right under the Pension Act. If it is intended that before applications are made to the special tribunal, the applicant must first apply to the Commission in all cases, even if obviously not provided for in the Pension Act, and must make a further application to the Board only in those cases, where, under the Pension Act, an appeal lies to the Board, it is considered that such intention would be made clear by deleting the words "and in which entitlement has been refused by the Commission, and by the Board where the right of appeal exists" as contained in the amendments made by the Senate and substituting therefor "and in which pension has been refused by the Commission, or if an appeal lies to the Board, both by the Commission and by the Board."

Because in respect of clauses 2 (a), 7, 25 and 31 this House adopted these clauses unanimously. They were based upon the report of the Special Committee of this House on Pensions and Returned Soldiers' Problems, who were unanimous in their findings and recommendations. The said committee held 47 sessions and heard representatives of various soldier organizations throughout Canada, departmental officers, the chairman and officials both of the Commission and of the Board. The report of the Special Committee was concurred in unanimously by this House. The clauses are designed to remove grievances which the Special Committee considered well founded and to extend the payment of pensions to persons who ought to be entitled thereto. The amendments to these clauses made by the Senate are considered to be not in the

public interest.

Because in respect of clause 7, under the provisions of Section 11a of the Pension Act, although pension is paid to a member of the forces in respect of the aggravation of an injury or disease existing prior to enlistment resulting in disability where such aggravation was attributable to or was incurred during military service, yet no pension is payable to the dependents of such member of the forces on his death unless it is proved to the Commission that such aggravation was itself the cause of his death, the object of this House in passing clause 7 was to provide for the payment of pensions to the dependents of such member of the forces on his death where the aggravation although not itself the cause of his death was a substantial factor in causing it. The clause is easier of application than the present law and would give a greater latitude to the Commission to award pensions in accordance with the fundamental principle of the Pension Act that a pension shall be paid to the dependents of a deceased member of the forces if the death of such member took place during or was attributable to his military service.

Because in respect of clause 25 it is considered that the provisions of section 32 of the Pension Act that no pension shall be paid to the widow of a member of the forces unless she was married to him before the appearance of the injury or disease which resulted in his death are too wide in their extent while it is in the public interest not to pay a pension to a woman who married a member of the forces in the expectation that she would receive a pension upon his death it is not in the public interest or just that pensions should be denied to all widows who come within the class described in Section 32. Nor is it in the public interest that members of the forces who have suffered disability by reason of military service should be in a different position as regards marriage

from other members of the forces. The object of this House in passing clause 25 was to provide pensions in deserving cases, at the same time providing necessary safeguards. It is considered that difficulties of interpretation and application might be overcome by providing that a pension shall be paid to the widow of a member of the forces notwithstanding her marriage to him, after the appearance of the injury or disease which resulted in his death provided that such marriage took place prior to the coming into force of the Pension Act of 1919 or that at the time of such marriage the member of the forces was not over forty years of age, was not in receipt of a pension in respect of the injury or disease which resulted in his death and was not seriously ill.

Because in respect of clause 2a which defines the term "appearance of the injury or disease" as the same is used in section 32 of the Pension Act, it is considered that the provisions of the said section ought not to extend to the widow of a member of the forces who was married to him after the appearance of an injury or disease and after such injury or disease had been reduced sufficiently to permit him to serve in a theatre of actual war provided the

marriage was prior to the recurrence of such injury or disease.

Because in respect of clause 31 under the provisions of Section 51 of the Pension Act the only question on which an appeal lies from the decision of the Commission is as to whether the injury or disease or aggravation thereof resulting in disability or death was attributable to or incurred during military service. The object of this House in passing clause 31 was to widen the scope of appeal. It is in the public interest that the returned soldiers and their dependents should have confidence in the administration of the Pension Act and this object would have been accomplished by providing for a review by the Board of decisions of the Commission where applicants felt themselves aggrieved. It is considered that an appeal should lie to the Board on decisions made, for example, under the provisions of Sections 12, 30, 32, 33, 34 and 39 of the Pension Act. Clause 30 would have provided an appeal and an opportunity of correcting error, subject to the proviso therein contained, on such questions. By reason of the amendments by the Senate no such appeal is allowed.

And that the clerk do carry the said message to the Senate.

After Debate thereon, the question being put on the said motion; it was agreed to.

PRAYERS.

Mr. Robb, a Member of the King's Privy Council, delivered Messages from His Excellency the Governor General which were read by the Speaker, as follows:—

WILLINGDON

The Governor General transmits to the House of Commons further Supplementary Estimates of sums required for the service of the Dominion for the year ending on the 31st March, 1929, and, in accordance with the provisions of "The British North America Act, 1867," the Governor General recommends these Estimates to the House of Commons.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

OTTAWA, June 6, 1928.

On motion of Mr. Robb, the said Messages and Estimates were referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Sinclair (Queens), for Mr. Kay, from the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization, presented the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

Your Committee have had under consideration a Resolution and Order of Reference dated February 16th, 1928, whereby it was resolved: "That whereas

the protein content is an important factor in the value of wheat;

Therefore be it resolved that, in the opinion of this House, the National Council of Industrial and Scientific Research in conjunction with the Board of Grain Commissioners be asked to investigate and report on the feasibility of utilizing the protein content of wheat as a basic factor in the grading of that product;

And further be it resolved that this resolution be referred to the Committee on Agriculture and Colonization for consideration and for such suggestions in connection with the grading and inspection of wheat as it deems advisable to pass on to the said National Council and Board of Grain Commissioners."

Pursuant to the said Resolution and Order of Reference, your Committee has agreed to the following conclusions, which it has passed on to the said National Council and the Board of Grain Commissioners, viz:—

- 1. From a price standpoint baking strength is an important element in wheat, and in the Canada Grain Act definitions of our higher grades, baking strength is determined by two factors—variety and percentage of hard red vitreous kernels.
- 2. In the resolution submitted to your Committee it is proposed to amend the Grain Act so as to determine baking strength by the two factors—variety and quantity of protein—the latter to be determined by a chemical test and to be expressed in percentages.
- 3. In Canada, Great Britain, the United States and probably most other countries that consume Canadian wheat, baking strength is an important factor in determining its value; by strength is meant the quantity and quality of protein.
- 4. Except in the case of Durum wheat, which at present is graded in a class by itself, and probably one or two other varieties that are grown in relatively small quantities, the protein in the contract grades can be assumed to be of good quality.
- 5. All things considered, the amount of gluten, that is, of protein, seems, in the light of present day knowledge, to be the nearest approach to an ideal index of baking strength available.
- 6. The cost of making the protein tests would range from 50 cents to 75 cents, and is not considered a serious difficulty notwithstanding the fact that laboratories would necessarily have to be installed at all inspection points. We would suggest that data be obtained as to cost of installing and maintaining laboratories.
- 7. The time required to make an individual test would be from one and a half hours to two hours. However, as daylight is not required for laboratory testing, and as a large number of tests may be conducted simultaneously, under sufficient organization operating 24 hours a day, no difficulty would be encountered in testing of cars and no delay in despatching cars to terminal points may be anticipated.
- 8. The definite proposal contained in the Resolution could be put into effect in so far as car-lot shipments are concerned, but your Committee is not yet satisfied that wheat sold locally in wagon-loads could take advantage of this scheme. A practice in vogue among members of the Kansas Wheat Pool whereby the farmer and elevator man forwarded samples jointly to the laboratories would seem to point the way to a solution of the difficulty concerning street wheat and this system should be investigated.
- 9. The introduction of protein as a factor in wheat grading would be an incentive to grow the best milling varieties of wheat. This we consider of great importance.
- 10. According to Mr. L. H. Newman, Dominion Cerealist, Ottawa, and in the opinion of this Committee, the following varieties are classed as desirable:—Early Red Fife, Marquis, Ruby, Red Bobs, Selections, Renfrew, Kitchener, Garnet and Reward.
- 11. It is highly desirable that the Cereal Division of the Federal Department of Agriculture, and the several Provincial Governments working jointly, continue in their efforts to zone Canada's wheat area with a view to advising as to the variety, or varieties, most likely to prove satisfactory in each case.

- 12. So far, however, as our export trade is concerned, there was not sufficient evidence submitted to the Committee relative to the effect of the proposed change in the basis of grading to warrant your Committee recommending its adoption at present. However, your Committee recommends that a full enquiry into this phase of the question be instituted.
- 13. Re: Garnet Wheat—In so far as evidence would show we are of the opinion this wheat which has hitherto been excluded from No. 1 Northern should be eligible for that grade.
 - 14. Re: Complaints of Liverpool Corn Trade Association.—

Your Committee believe that the complaint in the matter of No. 3 can be in some measure sustained, due principally to the inclusion in this grade of a large volume of improperly dried wheat.

Respecting the complaints regarding the general lowering of the standard of respective grades other than No. 3 we find that the evidence does not bear out this complaint.

Regarding the situation with respect to No. 3 we find that the Board of Grain Commissioners and the department are now fully alive to this situation. We recommend that steps be taken to prevent a continuation of this condition.

We recommend that the Department of Trade and Commerce and the Board of Grain Commissioners keep a careful check upon the quality of export wheat, and that samples of export shipments should regularly be secured and sent to the chief inspector and retained in his office for purpose of comparison; and also that the laboratory be required to make baking tests and report on samples of shipments regarding which complaint has been made.

- 15. The Committee recommends (a) temporary interchange of inspectors between the several inspection points in the Western Division.
- (b) Uniformity of standards of grades from year to year is most necessary and for the purpose of comparison standard samples should be preserved for at least five years.
- 16. In order that the high quality of our export wheat be maintained, and in order to discourage, as far as possible, the growth of undesirable varieties of wheat, we would urge that one or more seed warehouses be established for the purpose of collecting and distributing seed of approved varieties, and that an experimental flour mill of sufficient size be established in order that experimental work in milling and baking may be conducted on a scale that will give results in line with those obtained in commercial mills.

The Committee would suggest that the cost of construction and equipping these facilities may well be taken from surpluses of revenue over expenditures in the administration of the Grain Act and the revenue from terminal elevator overages in the western inspection division.

- 17. The Committee recommends that the protein map prepared by Dr. Birchard, exhibited to the Committee, be printed for distribution and that a similar map be prepared by the research laboratory for distribution as early as possible in each year.
- 18. This Committee recommends that inspectors be appointed at all transfer points between the head of the lakes and the seaboard, whose duty it will be to prevent any mixing of wheat so that the quality and condition of grades as fixed by final inspection will be maintained.
- 19. Your Committee recommends that the said National Research Council and the Board of Grain Commissioners report, as by the said Resolution instructed, to the Minister of Trade and Commerce, and that the said report be made before the next session of Parliament.

A copy of the printed evidence taken by the Committee in respect to the foregoing subject, is appended hereto for the information of the House.

In addition to hearing the foregoing witnesses your Committee took under consideration Resolutions and Petitions submitted by various organizations throughout the country.

Your Committee beg leave to report its conclusions and recommendations as follows, namely:—

Conditions Under Which Citizens of Various Countries Are Admitted to Canada

The Committee is convinced that there is considerable misapprehension and lack of information regarding conditions on which persons from different parts of the world are admitted to Canada. In order to remove this misapprehension and to have a clear background on which to base any recommendation, the Committee gives the following brief summary.

British.

1. All British subjects from the United Kingdom or from any of the British Dominions are eligible to enter Canada, provided they are sound mentally and physically and in a position to maintain themselves until employment can be secured.

No passport is required.

The passage rate for immigrants from the British Isles generally is \$91.25.

- 2. British agricultural workers are specially encouraged by the establishment of a low rate of \$9.73 at the instance of the Canadian Government.
- 3. British domestic workers are also provided for at the same rate as agricultural workers and in special cases even this small amount is advanced as a loan.
- 4. Families of British agricultural workers who have already emigrated to Canada are given the benefit of the special rate of \$9.73 for adults and free passage to all children under seventeen. In this case, also, loans are made in special cases to provide for the transportation of such families.
- 5. British children over fourteen and under seventeen who are brought into Canada under the auspices of certain Juvenile societies, have their passages paid; and an additional amount is paid to such societies to cover the railroad fares and incidental expenses of such children.
- 6. British boys over fourteen and under seventeen years of age, emigrating to Canada to approved farm homes, receive free passage to their destination.

Northern European Countries.—(Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Germany, Switzerland, Holland, Belgium and France).

Any subjects or citizens of these countries are eligible for entry to Canada provided they are sound mentally and physically and are in a position to maintain themselves until employment can be secured.

These people are required to have passports.

The average minimum ocean rate is approximately \$120.

No special rate or assistance of any kind is given by the Canadian Government to subjects or citizens of these countries.

Central and Southern European Countries.—(Austria, Hungary, Poland, Roumania, Lithuania, Esthonia, Latvia, Bulgaria, Jugo-Slavia, Czecho-Slovakia).

Only agricultural workers, domestic servants or those within a prescribed degree of relationship to residents already legally admitted to Canada are permitted to come in from these countries. Special exceptions may be made in cases in which the Minister of Immigration is satisfied that their labour or service is required in Canada.

These people are required to have passports.

The average minimum ocean rate is approximately \$135.

No special rate or assistance of any kind is given by the Canadian Government to subjects or citizens of these countries.

United States.

All citizens of the United States are eligible to emigrate to Canada provided they are sound mentally and physically and in a position to maintain themselves until employment can be secured.

No passport is required.

From the above it will be seen that emigrants from the United Kingdom stand in a specially favourable position as compared with emigrants from Continental countries, not only with regard to general passage rates but particularly with respect to the very greatly reduced rates given to agricultural and domestic workers from the United Kingdom.

For the further encouragement of British Immigration the following Schemes for land settlement should be noted:—

3,000 Family Scheme.

British families have been brought out to Canada at a special steamship rate, and they are located by the Canadian Government on vacant soldier settlement lands. The British Government supplies to each such family a maximum of \$1,500 cash for stock and equipment. All repayments are made by the settler for the price of the farm and for the stock and equipment loan, in equal yearly instalments, during a period of twenty-five years at the low interest rate of 5 per cent. The Canadian Government provides additional assistance by way of selection, settlement and supervision, free of charge.

British-Dominion-Provincial Land Settlement Scheme.

Under this Scheme the Provincial Government provides the farm. The British Government supplies \$1,500 for stock and equipment. The Canadian Government recruits the settler and provides settlement and supervision, free of charge, and, in addition, shares on a 50-50 basis any loss on account of stock and equipment. In the event of the default of a settler within the first two years the loss of interest on account of the purchase price of the land is shared on the following basis:—

This Scheme has already been adopted by two of the provinces and negotiations are now being carried on with another province.

Training and Placement of British Boys in Farm Homes.

Selected boys are given free passage from the United Kingdom to Canada, and institutions known as "training farms" are established by several provinces for receiving these British boys and distributing them among approved farm homes. The Dominion and Provincial Governments each contribute \$10 per boy towards the operation of the farm, and the British Government makes a grant of \$20 for the same purpose.

Land Settlement for British Boys.

The object is to establish on farms of their own, British boys who have come to Canada, and who have acquired the necessary experience in farm work, and who have each saved \$500. Under this Scheme the British Government loans \$1,250, the Dominion Government \$1,000, the Provincial Government \$250, and these loans, with the boy's savings, aggregate \$3,000 which is available for his settlement on the farm.

To indicate the importance of this work the British and Canadian Governments have entered into an Agreement to spend \$5,000,000 during the next ten years in making such loans.

As illustrating the special efforts put forward to encourage British immigration, the evidence shows that the Canadian Department of Immigration spends in this work \$16.67 for each British immigrant as compared with an average cost of 11 cents per head for immigrants from the Continental countries.

The Committee heard evidence in detail respecting the organization of the Department of Immigration and concerning all phases of its activities as carried on both separately and in conjunction with many governmental and voluntary organizations, and in relation thereto the Committee makes the following recommendations and suggestions.

Federal Responsibility.

In the opinion of the Committee the responsibility and control of the selection of immigrants, no matter by whom recruited, must rest solely and exclusively with the Government of Canada.

Provincial Co-operation.

The Committee recommends that special efforts be now made to extend the field of activity of the Provincial authorities particularly in the matter of placement, settlement and supervision of immigrants, and that, with this in view, the Federal Government consider contributing to defray the cost of Provincial co-operation for that purpose.

Medical Examination

There have been complaints about the new system of medical inspection under which Canadian doctors conduct the medical examination of prospective immigrants in the United Kingdom. It appears that this new system was inaugurated as a result of representations made to the Department of Immigration by steamship companies, by Provincial Governments, by the Dominion Council of Health, and by other Social Service Organizations.

Several reasons were urged in favour of the change:-

1. Great hardship was imposed on the immigrant who had been passed by the medical inspectors in the United Kingdom and then upon coming to Canada was subsequently rejected on arrival or after admission. 2. A large number of deportations have taken place on account of the mental or physical unfitness of those who had been passed as mentally and physically fit before leaving the United Kingdom.

3. The proportion of immigrants committed to mental institutions in Canada

has been excessive.

The new system affords free medical examination of prospective immigrants by Canadian doctors before they take passage for Canada. Twenty-one Canadian doctors and forty-five Roster doctors are conducting medical inspection in the British Isles, and there are 332 centres where medical examinations are conducted, and, in addition, special provisions are made for medical examination in isolated communities.

On the Continent there are seven Canadian doctors whose work is confined to examining all immigrants at the continental ports of embarkation. Previous to this examination by Canadian doctors the continental immigrant is subjected to a medical examination near his home under the auspices of the steamship company. Quarantine, fumigation and other precautions are exacted at the continental ports of embarkation in addition to the medical examination by the Canadian doctors.

The suggestion was made that the volume of emigration from the British Isles to Canada was being reduced by the new medical arrangement, but the evidence showed that there has been a greater decrease in emigration from the British Isles to the other overseas Dominions and to the United States.

The Committee was impressed with the fact that the medical officers to whom is entrusted the medical examination of intending emigrants have a serious responsibility to Canada, not only to the Federal Government, but also to the provinces. It is their duty to ascertain that intending emigrants are physically and mentally fit to take their places and do their share as Canadian citizens. In this connection, and more particularly with regard to immigration from the continent of Europe the Committee quote the resolution passed by the Social Service Council of Canada at its meeting recently held in Montreal as follows:—

"The Social Service Council of Canada having in mind the burden now laid on the various provinces of Canada in providing for the idiots and the insane, and the unfortunate results of admission into this country of the moron and feeble minded, desires to urge upon the Federal Government a continued and strict adherence to the provisions of the Immigration Act, in order that the door may not be open for the entrance of these types of prohibited undesirables."

Owing to the present arrangements a considerable amount of misunderstanding and dissatisfaction has arisen during the transition period. Certain objections were mentioned by witnesses, some of which have already been remedied. The present system of medical examination in the British Isles was inaugurated primarily for the benefit and protection of the British emigrant. The Department of Immigration and Department of Health should, it is considered, make the most exhaustive efforts to see that the new system is perfected so as to eliminate, as far as possible, inconvenience, delay and expense to the prospective emigrant, and to dispel the idea that there is any intention, on the part of the Canadian Government, to restrict or hinder the coming to Canada of British subjects. For this purpose the Committee recommend that the present system would be improved and that it would obviate delay and inconvenience to the prospective emigrant, especially those who reside in the rural districts of the British Isles, if the medical examinations were made by British local doctors paid by, and under the supervision and control of, the Canadian medical authorities, who should be located at convenient centres of population.

Special Passage Rates for British Settlers

1. 'Teen Age.

The Committee approves of all previous efforts to promote and encourage 'teen age immigration from Great Britain and recommends that the age limit for boy immigrants be extended to boys 14 to 19 years of age, both inclusive.

2. Domestics.

That the arrangements now in effect for the movement of domestics from the United Kingdom to Canada be continued.

3. Family Re-Union.

That measures be taken to extend the assisted passage privileges to the families of immigrants from Great Britain who are now in Canada and who have so far established themselves, as to have a reasonable prospect of being able to support their families in this country.

4. Reduction in Ocean Rates for all British Immigrants.

That measures be taken at an early date to arrange a conference between the Federal and British Governments and the Atlantic Steamship Companies with the object of obtaining a reduction in ocean rates to British immigrants to approximately £10.

Railway Rates for Canadian Landseekers

The Committee also recommend that measures be taken to ascertain whether the railways will restore the Home Seekers rates in effect prior to the War, making such rates effective eastbound as well as westbound.

Land Settlement

- 1. The Committee having heard the evidence in connection with the experiment of the 3,000 settlement scheme, now almost completed, recommend that time be given to test this form of land settlement before embarking upon extended schemes of this character.
- 2. The Committee approve of the extension to other provinces of the tripartite agreement with the British, Federal and Provincial Governments for the encouragement of land settlement by the British emigrant.
- 3. The Committee recommend, subject to the completion of satisfactory arrangements with governments of the provinces, that assistance equal to that given by the British Government to British emigrant boys be extended by the Government of Canada to the Canadian youth who are trained in agriculture.

Letters of Assurance of Employment. ("Permits"—socalled.)

Your Committee recommends that letters of assurance of employment shall state the names, addresses, occupations and nationality of the persons to be admitted and that an annual return be made by the Minister of Immigration to Parliament within thirty days of its meeting, giving particulars of all such letters, showing the names of persons so admitted, their addresses, occupation and nationality, the names and addresses of the persons who made the application for each such admission and of any other person who endorsed or made favourable representation in support of such application.

Railways' Continental Agreement

There was in the evidence, considerable criticism of certain features of the railways agreement. The Committee has some doubts as to the desirability of giving to the railways special authority to recruit immigrants, but as certain restrictions were imposed in connection with the renewal of the agreement in October, 1927, the Committee is of the opinion that in order to ascertain the results of its operation under the new conditions, the present agreement might be continued according to its terms, but with this exception—that the system of nominations of immigrants from non-preferred countries under the railways agreement should be confined forthwith to the following degrees of relationship: father or mother, husband or wife, son or daughter, brother or sister of any individual who is now engaged in farming in Canada, and further that the existing railways agreement should not be renewed in its present form.

Increasing Employment

Your Committee would also recommend that the Government make an intensive and comprehensive study of the possibilities of increasing industrial and agricultural development in Canada with a view to attracting capital and providing wider and increased opportunities for employment not only for our own people, but for prospective immigrants.

Your Committee recommends that 1,500 copies in English and 500 copies in French of the minutes of evidence and of this report, be printed in Blue Book form and that Standing Order 64 be suspended in relation thereto.

A copy of the Minutes of Procedure and Evidence is appended hereto for the information of the House.

For a copy of the King's Regulations prescribed by or in the name of His Majesty, dealing with or referring to the acceptance by His Majesty's Subjects of titles of honour, titular distinctions, decorations or orders, which may be conferred or proposed to be conferred by any foreign government, governmental

authority, state, power or potentate;

4. For a list of persons domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada, who, since May 1st, 1919, have been the recipients of any foreign title, titular distinction, decoration or order from any foreign government, governmental authority, state, power or potentate; stating the nature of the title, distinction, decoration or order so conferred in each case; also stating whether approval of the acceptance of such title, distinction, decoration or order by such recipient was signified by or in the name of His Majesty; and also stating whether and in what cases such approval as aforesaid was refused by or in the name of His Majesty to any such recipient; and also stating specifically the names of those domiciled or ordinarily resident in Canada who, since May, 1919, have accepted any such foreign title, distinction, decoration or order, without approval thereof being signified by or in the name of His Majesty.

Mr. Stewart (Edmonton West), a Member of the King's Privy Council, presented,—Return to an Order of the House of the 21st May, 1928, for a copy of the School Lands file re sale No. 495 and 496 in respect to one Stephen McKeown.

And also,—Return to an Order of the House of the 21st May, 1928, for a copy of School Lands file in respect to section 29-43-22 West of the 4th Meridian, bought by one Peter Albers, Waterglen, Alberta.

Mr. Kay, seconded by Mr. Glen, moved,—That the Tenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization be now concurred in.

Mr. Cahan, seconded by Mr. Arthurs, moved in amendment thereto:—
That the said report be not now concurred in, but that it be recommitted to the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization with instruc-

tions that they have power to amend the same and to recommend that the following suggestions and recommendations receive the favourable considera-

tion of the government, viz:-

1. The evidence taken by the committee and the reasonable implications of such evidence disclose that in the matter of immigration into Canada, particularly from Great Britain and northern Ireland, no effective measures are now being taken to secure the active and efficient co-operation with the Department of Immigration and Colonization, of the Colonization departments of the Canadian National Railways and of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and of the various other organizations, associations and agencies which are engaged in the work of immigration, colonization and settlement in Canada.

2. It is evident that the Department of Immigration and Colonization as at present constituted and administered is incompetent to procure the effective co-ordination and co-operation of all these various organizations in the work

of immigration, colonization and land settlement.

3. The matter of immigration into Canada is of mutual concern to Great Britain, with its congestion of population and prevalent unemployment, and to Canada with its widely extended territory and its sparse population; but neither country may be well served by the mere transport to Canada annually of large numbers of people who are left to make their way in Canada as pioneers in a new country under conditions of life which to them are novel and difficult.

4. On the other hand, the capacity of Canada for the absorption in large numbers of new settlers is obviously limited by the existing economic conditions of this country and the possibilities for their speedy improvement. The cost and difficulty involved in the resettlement in Canada of our returned soldiers after the conclusion of the Great War, and their absorption into the economic life of this country, are indicative of the ramifications of the problem of procuring the migration of masses of people from Great Britain to Canada and their resettlement in this country under conditions which will ensure their

future happiness and contentment.

5. Immigration should be carried on contemporaneously not only with land settlement throughout Canada, but also with such development and extension of employment in Canadian agriculture, mining, forestry and manufacturing as will rapidly absorb incoming settlers. Such immigration and land settlement on an extensive scale will eventually require not only large appropriations from the federal treasury for the direction, control and maintenance of such a comprehensive national undertaking, but it will also involve the establishment throughout Canada by private enterprise and by the investment of private capital of such profitable and diversified industries of all kinds as are suitable to our climatic and economic conditions.

6. The key to the solution of the whole problem of immigration to Canada is the provision of adequate employment, in all branches of domestic industry in Canada, not only for our Canadian people, but also for the large numbers of immigrants from other countries who may be induced to settle in Canada.

7. If existing economic conditions are more or less completely ignored and opportunities for employment are not widely extended, large migrations of people to this country will inevitably result in increasing the problems of domestic unemployment in Canada, especially in the winter season, and in lowering the standards of life which are at present enjoyed by those resident in Canada who are now engaged in industrial pursuits; both of which tendencies will, in turn, seriously react adversely upon the flow of immigration into Canada.

8. The committee, therefore, recommend that a department of Immigration, Colonization and Industrial Development be organized forthwith, which

shall be under the administration of a responsible Minister of the Crown and which shall consist of two branches, each under the direction of a superintendent of intellectual strength and considerable business experience.

9. The duty of the immigration and colonization branch of said proposed

department should be;

(a) To procure the co-operation of the several provincial governments

with the work of said proposed department;

(b) To co-ordinate the work of all organizations, associations and agencies, which are now engaged in promoting immigration into Canada, under one supreme direction and control for the more efficient carrying out of the undertakings which all have in common;

(c) To ensure, in so far as practicable, that a majority of the settlers emigrating from other countries to Canada shall be such as may be physically and mentally adapted to the conditions of life in this northern country and

likely to be readily assimilated by our existing population;

(d) To make adequate financial provision for the settlement upon the vacant lands throughout Canada, which are suitable for agriculture, of families who appear, with reasonable certainty, to be adapted for agricultural pursuits:

(e) To provide facilities for the settlement in the more recently organized provinces of Canada of settlers from the older provinces, who, as were thousands of the earlier settlers in the west, are intent upon leaving their homes in the east in search of wider opportunities for self-improvement in the new agricultural and mining districts which are now, from time to time, being opened up for settlement and development in the west, and

(f) To direct, supervise and control all schemes of settlement in the more

sparsely settled districts of Canada.

10. The duty of the industrial development branch of said proposed department should be:-

(a) To act in close co-operation with the immigration and colonization branch;

(b) To make a complete economic survey and study of the industrial resources of Canada;

(c) To advise in regard to the future economic development of the several provinces of Canada and of the North West Territories, with a view to the more

rapid extension of industrial employment, and

(d) To direct its attention particularly to the establishment of suitable industries in our smaller towns and villages not only in eastern Canada and British Columbia, but particularly in the three prairie provinces, whence a constantly increasing number of young men and young women who have no special aptitude or liking for agricultural pursuits, will inevitably emigrate from Canada to seek other industrial employment in the neighbouring republic, if similarly attractive opportunities are not afforded to them in Canada.

11. The investigations of the industrial development branch should be comprehensive in character and be undertaken in a spirit of scientific detachment, in order that it may receive adequate and non-partisan political support

throughout the whole country.

12. And the committee are also of opinion that the industrial development branch by a detailed survey of industrial conditions in Canada, would be able to recommend what new industries for the production in Canada of commodities, which are now imported in considerable quantities into Canada, could advantageously be created in Canada or be transplanted from other countries to Canada, without unduly increasing the prices for such commodities in our more limited markets, and so afford constantly increasing and remunerative employment within Canada for all classes of our population, and thus provide the strongest incentive to suitable settlers to make their permanent homes in Canada.

And a Debate arising thereon, and continuing;

And it being eleven o'clock, p.m.;

By unanimous consent, on motion of Mr. Mackenzie King (Prince Albert), it was resolved, -That the House may sit later than 11 o'clock, p.m., this day.

The Debate was then resumed.

And after further Debate thereon, the question being put on the said proposed amendment; it was negatived, on division.

And the question being put on the main motion: That the Tenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Agriculture and Colonization be now concurred in; it was agreed to, on division.

A Message was received from the Senate in respect to Bill No. 289, An Act

to amend the Pension Act, and acquainting this House:-

1. That the Senate doth insist on its first and second amendments, striking out the letter (a) in line 1 of clause 2, and paragraph (a) of clause 2, because by reason of a subsequent amendment to clause 25 herein set out, clause 2 (a)

serves no useful purpose.

2. That the Senate doth insist on its sixth amendment, striking out clause 7. because under section 11 of the Pension Act all who served in a theatre of war have been pensioned or are pensionable to the full extent of their disabilities without any deduction in respect of their pre-enlistment condition. The existing law clearly provides that even those who were found by medical examination to be unfit for front line service shall also be pensioned to the full extent of their disabilities notwithstanding the fact that their service in a theatre of war was of a non-combatant character, far removed from the scene of active hostilities. The existing law which has been in operation some ten years is definite and is well understood. Clause 7 proposes an amendment thereto providing that pensions shall be awarded to dependents where the aggravations of a preenlistment injury or disease substantially contributed to death. Consequently this is obviously intended to cover only those who served in Canada and England. The difficulty of interpreting the words "substantially contributed," coupled with the fact that the present law seems to be sufficiently generous to cover all classes that would come under this clause, warrant the conclusion that it cannot be reasonably justified.

3. That the Senate doth amend its seventh amendment by substituting for

new section 21 (1) of clause 12 the following:-

"21. (1) Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Act, any case respecting a member of the forces or any of his dependents which is claimed to be specially meritorious and in which pension has been refused by the Commission, or if an appeal lies to the Board, both by the Commission and by the Board, may be made the subject of an investigation and adjudication by way of compassionate pension or allowance as hereinafter provided."

4. That the Senate doth not insist on its ninth amendment, striking out

clause 25, but substitutes the following new clause 25 in lieu thereof:-

"25. Subsection one of section thirty-two of the said Act is repealed and

the following is substituted therefor:—
'32. (1) No pension shall be paid to the widow of a pensioner unless she was living with him or was maintained by him or was, in the opinion of the Commission, entitled to be maintained by him at the time of his death and for a reasonable time previously thereto.

(i) No pension shall be paid to the widow of a member of the forces unless she was married to him before the appearance of the injury or disease

which resulted in his death,

(a) Unless the injury in respect of which he was pensioned or entitled to pension would not shorten his expectancy of life; or

(b) Unless he was not chronically ill of a pensionable disease and not in

receipt of pension in respect thereof.

(ii) This subsection shall not be held to authorize any payment of a pension for any period anterior to the date of the coming into force of this Act.'"

5. That the Senate doth amend its eleventh amendment by substituting

for new subsection (10) of clause 30 the following:-

"(10) The Board shall be attached to the Department and the expenses required to be incurred for the discharge of its duties, including the salaries of its officers, clerks, and other employees shall, on approval by the Board, be

paid out of the moneys provided by Parliament."

6. That the Senate doth insist on its twelfth amendment, amending clause 31, because under the existing law the soldier himself, or in the event of his death his widow, his children or his parents have the right of appeal on the ground that the injury or disease or aggravation thereof resulting in disability or death was attributable to or was incurred during military service. Paragraphs (a) and (b) of this clause, while not clear, are intended to change the existing principle of the right of appeal, particularly for dependents other than widows and children who claim their financial resources are inadequate. The Senate is of the view this is not advisable.

Also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate doth agree to the amendments made by the House of Commons to the Bill No. 140 (Letter I8 of the Senate), intituled: "An Act to incorporate The People's Thrift Corporation," without any amendment.

And also,—A Message informing this House that the Senate had passed the following Bills without any amendment:—

Bill No. 288, An Act to amend the Soldier Settlement Act.

Bill No. 57, An Act respecting The Edmonton, Dunvegan and British Columbia Railway Company,

Your Committee have therefore passed the following resolution, and herewith submit the same for the approval of your Honourable House.

Resolved, That the Joint Select Standing Committee on the Printing of Parliament do recommend to both Houses that the salary of Mr. R. B. Davidson, superintendent of the distribution office, be increased to \$3,600 per annum, from March 31st, 1928.

408 Amount not exceeding \$39,000,000.00 to meet expenditures made or indebtedness incurred (where amounts available from net operating income or investments may be insufficient) by or on behalf of the Canadian National Railway Company, herein called "THE COMPANY," or any Company specified or referred to in Chapter 172 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, and Chapter 13 of the Statutes of 1920 or now or hereafter comprised in the Canadian National Railways or by the Company in respect of any railways, properties and works entrusted to it from time to time under the provisions of Section 19 of Chapter 172 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1927, or any one or more of such Companies, on any or all of the following accounts, such expenditures or indebtedness being herein called authorized expenditures:—

(a) Interest on securities, notes and other obligations;

rentals for lease of lines;

(b) Equipment Principal Payments; Sinking Funds; Miscellaneous Maturing or Matured Notes and other obligations secured or unsecured;

(c) Operating Income Deficit, whenever incurred or

ascertained;

(d) Construction and Betterments, including co-ordinations; acquisition of real or personal property.

The amount herein authorized may be applied from time to time to meet authorized expenditures, in the discretion of the Governor in Council:—

(a) In respect of railways, properties and works entrusted to the Company as aforesaid;

- (b) In respect of railways, properties and works not so entrusted by way of loans in cash, or by way of guarantee, or partly one way and partly the other, subject, however, as follows:—
- If by way of loans from His Majesty, the amount or amounts advanced to any one or more of the said Companies shall be repayable on demand, with interest payable half-yearly at the rate fixed from time to time by the Governor in Council, secured if and when directed by the Governor in Council by mortgage or mortgages upon such properties, in such form and containing such terms and conditions, not inconsistent herewith, as the Governor in Council may approve.
- If by way of loans from persons other than His Majesty (without the guarantee of His Majesty) the amounts, terms and conditions of such loans shall be such as the Governor in Council may from time to time approve.
- If by way of guarantee, any such guarantee may be either a general guarantee covering the total amount of the issue. or by a separate guarantee endorsed on each obligation, and may be of the principal, interest and sinking funds (if any) of the notes, obligations or securities of one or more of the said Companies specified by the Governor in Council, which notes, obligations or securities the Companies so specified are hereby authorized to make and issue, and such guarantee may be signed by the Minister of Finance, or such other person as the Governor in Council may authorize, on behalf of His Majesty, in such form and on such terms and conditions as the Governor in Council may determine to be appropriate and applicable thereto. Any guarantee so signed shall be conclusive evidence for all purposes that the provisions of this enactment have been complied with.
- Should temporary loans be made or negotiated before the lapse of this appropriation either from His Majesty or other persons, guaranteed notes, obligations or securities may subsequently be issued under the provisions of the preceding paragraph of this enactment to renew, refund or adjust such loans, or any part thereof.
- Each company herein mentioned or referred to is hereby authorized to aid and assist, in any manner any other or others of the said companies, and, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, may for its own requirements and also for the requirements of any or all of such other Companies from time to time:—
 - (a) Issue notes, obligations or other securities, joint or several, at discretion, for the purpose of any guarantee made or to be made under the provisions of this enactment;
 - (b) Apply the proceeds of any such guaranteed issue, or the amount of loans received by virtue of this enactment, in meeting authorized expenditures on its own account or on account of any or all of such other Companies;

(c) Make advances for the purpose of meeting authorized expenditures to any or all of such other Companies, upon or without any security, at discretion.

No purchaser of such guaranteed notes, securities or obligations shall be under any obligation to inquire into the application of the proceeds of any guaranteed issue...\$39,000,000 00

An Act to amend the Prisons and Reformatories Act.

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An Act to incorporate The People's Thrift Corporation.

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To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced by the Clerk of the Senate in the following words:--

"In His Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to these Bills."

Then the Honourable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

"The Commons of Canada have voted Supplies required to enable the Government to defray certain expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following

Bill:—

"An Act for granting to His Majesty certain sums of money for the public service of the financial year ending the 31st March, 1929.

"To which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's Assent."

To this Bill the Clerk of the Senate, by command of His Excellency the Governor General, did thereupon say:—

"In His Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General thanks His Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Second Session of the Sixteenth Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, with the following Speech:—

Honourable Members of the Senate:

Members of the House of Commons:

I desire to express my appreciation of the careful attention you have given to the various measures submitted for your consideration during the present session of Parliament.

It is a source of special satisfaction to note that the public accounts of the fiscal year recently ended disclose a substantial surplus and that you have been able to effect a further reduction in the public debt as well as a further material reduction in taxation.

The trade of our country continues to expand. Exports of manufactured goods are being well maintained and our total exports to foreign countries show, a considerable increase. It is anticipated that the volume of foreign trade will reveal a further increase as a result of the trade agreements just concluded.

I am gratified to observe that the interest and benefit of ex-service men and of their dependents has had particularly close and sympathetic attention during the session. As a result of the consideration you have given to this most important subject, an Act has been passed which considerably extends and improves the provisions made for pensions in respect of disabilities and deaths connected with the War, also an Act reviving the beneficial provisions of the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, and an Act affording further material relief to Soldier Settlers.

The amalgamation of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and the Department of Health into one department to be known as the Department of Pensions and National Health accords with a natural evolution and is a step which should serve to promote efficiency and economy in administration.

The general subject of immigration, including the work of the Department of Immigration and Colonization, has received careful study throughout the session by the Committee on Agriculture and Colonization. After months of inquiry into the many phases, both national and international, of this important and intricate problem, the Committee has reported its conclusions and recommendations, and the report has been adopted.

The extensive and important recommendations of the Commission recently appointed to investigate all phases of the fishing industry of the Maritime Provinces, the Magdalen Islands, and the costal portion of the Province of Quebec, have been met in part, and will continue to receive the attention of my advisers.

The report of the National Advisory Committee on the St. Lawrence Waterway project together with the views expressed thereon by the Government of the United States in an exchange of correspondence, which was submitted to Parliament at the present session, will continue to receive careful consideration. In this connection, provision has been made for referring to the courts certain questions as to federal and provincial jurisdiction with respect to navigation and water-powers.

The offer of assistance in the formation of Civil Flying Clubs has met with a wide-spread response. Flying training has already been started by Clubs both in eastern and western Canada. The construction of the airship mooring tower at St. Hubert Aerodrome, near Montreal, is being pressed with energy.

The special provision made for the establishment of National Research Laboratories should greatly facilitate industrial research and prove an aid to the more thorough utilization of our natural resources.

The provision made by the amendments to the Federal District Commission Act, with a view to commemorating the Diamond Jubilee of Confederation, will serve materially to enhance the position of Ottawa as the capital of the Dominion.

The appointment by His Majesty's Government in Great Britain of a High Commissioner to represent its interests in Canada has been received with much satisfaction.

The appropriations of this session will enable steps to be taken shortly to establish Canadian Legations in France and Japan. It is gratifying to know that the arrangements recently made for the further restriction of immigration from Japan, combined with the exchange of Ministers between Japan and Canada, give promise of affording a satisfactory solution of this long standing question.

The Canadian Government has learned with deep interest of the proposals which the Government of the United States, following extended discussions with the Government of France, has advanced for the renunciation of war, and, in accord with His Majesty's other Governments, has accepted the invitation of the United States to participate in the signature of a multilateral pact directed to this end and which it is earnestly hoped will materially strengthen the cause of peace throughout the world.
