When slipping plants make the cuttings where the stems are woody, for if too green or full of sap they will wither before the roots have time to sprout. Fill a shallow box with clean sand, water it freely and insert the cuttings to the depth of an inch and a half. Press the sand down firmly and protect the box from the direct rays of the sun. Water

freely for the first week, after this sparingly. If the leaves drop off the slips do not be discouraged; new growth will soon start. After slips are well started transplant them to crocks or boxes that they are to remain in thru the winter; use any good garden soil, but that they are to remain in thru the winter; use any good garden soil, but remember that if the loam is too rich you will have more foliage than blossoms. This applies especially to geraniums. Verbenas, heliotropes, begonias and fuchsias may all be slipped now, as well as roses, and will make your living rooms bright and cheery when the snow flies over the

Delicate slips should have a sheet of glass placed over the rooting box until they are well started and so should seedlings planted this month. I think a better way to secure sturdy house plants than to grow them from

think a better way to secure sturdy house plants than to grow them from seeds, is to take up those that have started about the roots of the garden plants. These that germinate directly from the parent flower, in the open soil, are stronger and stand transplanting better than hand-raised seedlings. If you like trailing vince in the dining and living-room or in the library, you can get finely started ones by what is called "suckering." Choose a strong branch of the vine growing near the ground, and peg it down with a forked stick—a clothes pin will do. Cover the pegged part with several inches of soil, keep moist and in a few weeks you can cut the layered part free from the parent stalk, and you will find it has strong roots started. Roses are grown successfully, too, by this method. The passion plant, Madeira vine and all the ivies respond quickly to this "suck-ering."
