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

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

Introduction.

A brief outline of the Art movement in photography may be of interest in connection with the present Exhibition. Invented by Joseph Niéphore de Nièpce, who died in 1833, photography is, by means new, but curiously enough it had not been used by artists as a means of expression until about fifteen years ago, consequently almost all photographic work of any distinction is decidedly modern. There is, however, one notable exception, *David Octavius Hill, R.S.A., 1802-1870, who may be said to be the father of pictorial photography. Over sixty years ago he produced a remarkable series of portraits in this medium, which have never since been excelled, and which have elicited the warmest praise from such painter-artists as Leighton, Sargent, and the great Whistler himself. "It may be asked," says Bernard Shaw, speaking of the artists, "why, if photography be so exquisite an artistic process, it did not attract them. Well, there were many reasons. The first and principal one, never mentioned. It was, that artists were terrified by the difficulty and mystery of the process."

Since the days of Hill science has done little for the pictorial worker, excepting mechanically to perfect his apparatus. It is interesting to note that the two printing processes best adapted for individual expression were invented by Poitevin over half a century ago, and have been only recently revived for the very qualities for which they were abandoned by their inventor.

Two organizations have done much to further the advance of the movement : the "Linked Ring" in England and the "Photo-Secession" in America. The Linked Ring was formed by a number of pictorial workers who left the Royal Photographic Society some fourteen years ago. Their prime object is their exhibition, the Photographic Salon, which is held annually. It has always been conducted in a dignified manner, and no awards are offered, but to have one's work accepted by the "Salon" has always been a coveted distinction. The Photo-Secession, "a protest against the conventional idea of what constitutes pictorial photography," is broader in its aims and international in its scope. They have permanent galleries in New York, where is held during the winter month a continuous series of exhibitions, not necessarily photographic, but generally so, and invariably of interest to the art-lover. Their programme for the present season, for example, includes an exhibition of drawings by Rodin. The Photo-Secession, by the high standard of their exhibitions, both in America and Europe, have compelled recognition of the photographic medium, and have fully substantiated its claims. Mention must also be made of the labours of Mr. Alfred Stieglitz, not only as the Director of the Photo-Secession, but also as editor and publisher of *Camera Work*, a quarterly publication which has opened the eyes of all who have seen it to the possibilities of the photographic medium. Visitors to this Exhibition will have an opportunity of judging for themselves of the excellence of the prints therein published.

To those who still discredit the claims of photography to rank as a medium of artistic expression, we can only say

quote Bernard Shaw: "The truth is that neither a photograph nor a painting is necessarily 'artistic'; nor does anybody who knows the A B C of criticism suppose that Fine Art refers to the processes by which works of fine art are produced, instead of certain qualities in the product."

Following are some of the various printing processes employed in the production of the photographs shown in this Exhibition:

Nos. 12 and 110 are oil-prints; Nos. 15, 28, 32, 33, 34, 40, 84, 102, 112, 150, 151, 175, 176, 177, 198 and 199 are gum-prints; Nos. 104, 107 and 224½ are in gum-platinum; Nos. 5, 7, 13, 14, 29, 59, 96, 97, 107 to 119, 121 to 130 and 136 are in the carbon process; Nos. 1, 2, 3, 16, 17, 19 to 24, 27, 30, 31, 35, 36, 37, 38, 42 to 46, 47, 49 to 59, 61, 68 to 74, 81, 85 to 89, 103, 105, 106, 108, 109, 120, 131, 144 to 159, 162 to 175, 182 to 197, 200, 201, 202, 227, 229, 230, 260, 261, 262 and 277 are in platinum; Nos. 48 and 60 are in glycine-platinum; Nos. 3, 82, 180 and 226 are bromide silver. Most of the others are from gravures made from the original plates, in many instances by their authors, and published by Mr. Alfred Stieglitz in *Camera Work*. We are also indebted to Mr. Stieglitz for permission to print the essay by Maeterlinck, which first appeared in the second number of *Camera Work*.

We take this opportunity to thank our friends, who, by their kindness and hearty co-operation in either contributing their own work or lending pictures in their possession, have made this Exhibition a possibility. We are specially indebted to Mr. Horsley Hinton for collecting and forwarding the prints which largely represent the British workers.
