WHO KILLED THE PROSPECTS FOR COMPETING CAR LINES?

Some Strange Facts in Connection with Proposal Given the City for the Building of Routes to Suburbs by a New Company Come to Light.

PIGEONHOLED AT CITY HALL FOR ONE DAY UNTIL R. J. WILTED

Sixty miles of additional street railway track to the remote suburbs—what the city might have had.

Twenty-five miles of additional track, in the already congested sections—what the city gets.

This is the view taken by the somewhat mysterious group of capitalists in whose behalf former City Solicitor W. C. Chisholm wrote the board of control last week.

When 1921 came, the city would take over the lines and equipment at a specified percentage above the cost of installation, and with the lines of the Toronto railway would be in a position to start with a complete system.

"On getting the franchise, we would have begun at once on the lines and been able to start a service in eighteen months or two years," said the engineer.

Why the Delay? In support of his statement that the city's attitude had been very peculiar, he stated that early in the year, in January or February, the mayor was approached with a verbal proposition.

Mayor Returned Plans. Along with this was the request that the city, in asking permission from the legislature to build street lines as feeders to the proposed subway system, insert also the provision that such lines in the new districts could be built by another company if the city chose to give the right.

R. J.'s Quick Turn. It was not until June last, four months after the negotiations, broken off because of apparent lack of interest on the city's part, that the outlines of the plan became known to the public.

It happened on the night of Sept. 13, at about the hour of 10 p.m., there arrived at the city hall a letter renewing the syndicate's offer.

WHAT THE CITY MIGHT HAVE HAD:

Sixty miles of additional single track, or more than half the present mileage of the Toronto Railway Co., giving a street railway service from the centre of the city to the remotest sections of the outlying districts to the north and east.

WHAT THE CITY GETS:

Twenty-five miles of single tracks in older Toronto, leaving the problem of service in the newer districts as far from solution as ever, unless lines are built, the street railway is expropriated, or the city is satisfied to build lines in the outlying districts on the double-fare principle.

BANKS HAVE MONEY FOR CANADIAN ENTERPRISES

Report for August Indicates That They Are Reducing Foreign Investments.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20.—(Special.)—The bank report for the month of August, just issued by the department of finance, indicates a healthy condition of trade and continued commercial expansion.

On Aug. 31 current deposits totaled \$285,813,172, an increase of \$4,974,650. The increase in savings deposits was even more striking, there being an increase from \$33,884,371 to \$44,837,432, or nearly seven million dollars.

A comparison of the banking business of Canada to-day with 20 years ago shows that the Bank of Montreal alone does ten per cent. more business than was transacted two decades ago by all the banks in the country.

MAJOR ORCHARD DYING

Well-known Business and Military Man Victim of Appendicitis.

Major W. H. Orchard, local manager for the Imperial Tobacco Co., is in a critical condition at the General Hospital, and was not expected to survive the night.

The announcement will come as a great shock to his host of friends, not only in Toronto, but throughout Ontario. He was apparently in good health on Friday, but on Saturday had to be operated on for appendicitis, and a second operation was required yesterday.

Major Orchard, who is on the reserve list of officers of the 48th Highlanders, having retired from the regiment in December, 1907, has been one of the most popular officers in western Ontario command.

AUTO FACTORIES BUSY FACTS DISPROVE TALES

Local Managers of Big Concerns Deny Detroit Despatch and Tell of Real Conditions.

A Detroit despatch was published locally yesterday concerning the business being done by the Packard and Buick Automobile Manufacturing Cos. The statements have brought prompt replies from the local representatives.

M. A. Kennedy, managing director of the Ontario Motor Car Co., Ltd., in making a denial, says: "In the first place, the Packard Company's new buildings are all completed and they are moving into them, so that it would be manifestly impossible to discontinue the building program, and in the second place, their dealers and receivers some days ago, shows that the shipments of cars season on June 1 has been 77 per cent. increase on shipments made in same period last year, the month of August shipments alone being 451 cars, and under date of no later than yesterday, we have a letter from the factory stating that they are driving the factory as hard as they know how and their normal maximum capacity.

SIDELIGHTS ON BIG CANADIAN MERGERS

What Has Been Done in Past Two Years in the Way of Industrial Combinations — Professional Merger-Maker May Be a Menace.

Canadian Mergers

The number of industrial amalgamations consummated in Canada since January, 1909, is 20, absorbing 138 individual companies.

The aggregate authorized capitalization, including bonds, of 19 of these mergers, is \$190,600,000.

The securities issued to the public, as a result of the amalgamation movement, totaled at least \$28,850,000.

The smallest merger was the Simeon Co. Limited, capitalized at \$1,000,000. It absorbed three companies.

The aggregate capitalization of 106 of these companies was approximately \$66,240,508, which amount, in various ways, was increased upon amalgamation.

The largest consolidation was the Steel Co. of Canada, Limited, which took over five companies. Its authorized capitalization, including bonds, amounted to \$35,000,000.

"Industrial Amalgamation in Canada—Their Objects, Advantages and Dangers" is the subject of a very complete review of the big mergers effected in Canada within the past two years, by Fred W. Field, editor of The Monetary Times, and which will appear in this week's issue.

The facts and figures illustrate the growing extensiveness of the tendency to amalgamate. Operations have not been confined to one or a few classes of commodities.

Arrangements have also been made between navigation, light and power, brewery, canning, retail, box trade and other companies.

In addition to important and heavily capitalized companies, several perhaps equally as important, speak of steamship companies and reduced by half a third company's fleet.

The end of the move ment is by no means in sight. Several other manufacturing companies will probably amalgamate, or at least evolve a well-organized, agreeable understanding.

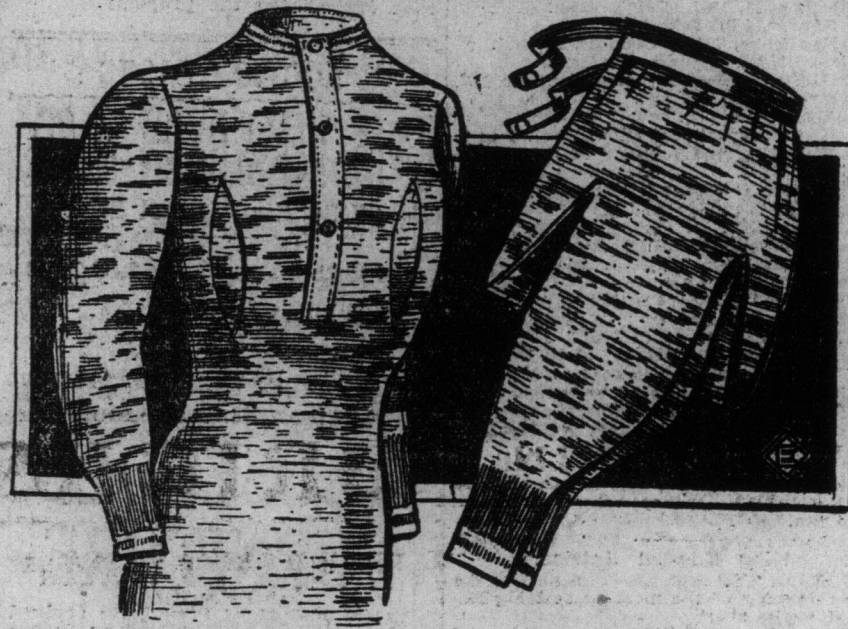

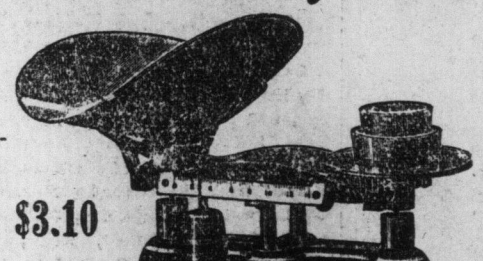

CITY TRANSMISSION LINE.

There has been a great deal of much shuffling over the city entrance of the hydro-electric power transmission lines. Just why some citizens are so opposed to the lines is fully understood, but others who are depending on the line for cheap power and light and lower taxes seem to have very little reason for their objections.

The council has taken another shuffling course, and adopted an alternate route, the responsibility for the final choice being left to the Hydro-Electric Commission. As the engineer of the commission has expressed himself decidedly in favor of the lake front route, both on account of utility and economy, there could be no doubt about the result.

The only objection to the water route is the difficulties of ice during the winter months. The weight and the lifting power of the immense locomotives which form around anything projecting above the water are considerations which will have to be dealt with by the engineers.

The engineers can be trusted to handle any difficulties that arise out of natural obstacles. It is for Mayor Geary and the council to see that no more artificial obstructions are placed in the way of the completion of the transmission line.

The reports sent out in August did not show the water to be as bad as the returns from the mortality department indicated it must have been.

Another point in this connection is with respect to the chloride of lime treatment which is being used to purify the water. Tests have been made of an exhaustive character by several experimenters, and they know the exact amount of the chemical that is necessary to kill the typhoid germ.

In professional circles this amount is stated to be just double what the engineering department has been using. If it is a fact that there is such a means of absolute protection from typhoid as exists in the chloride treatment, then it can only be said that it is a matter of very gross carelessness not to make use of it under the most skilled direction and in the proper quantities.

It is stated without any qualification that it is possible absolutely to sterilize water as far as the typhoid germ is concerned by the use of chloride of lime, and that the quantity is so small that no injurious effects can arise from its use.

Is the health department aware of these facts and if so, what is to be said about the increasing death-rate from typhoid?

PUBLIC OR PRIVATE ELECTRIC POWER? There is nothing bigger in sight than the approaching amalgamation of all the electric power interests of eastern Canada.

Eastern Ontario is practically consolidated, the control of the water powers having passed into allied hands, and the road franchises being practically under the same control.

The Toronto interests are a unit. The Hamilton interests are similarly united. The \$25,000,000 merger of last year indicates clearly what is in the wind.

HUGH DELINE NOW FACES CHARGE OF WIFE MURDER

Dummer Township Farmer Taken Into Custody Yesterday at Havelock.

Havelock, Sept. 20.—(Special).—The Dummer Township mystery took a startling turn this afternoon when Hugh Deline was arrested at 3.30, charged with the murder of his wife, Christie May Parks.

Deline came to Havelock at 2 o'clock to buy some coal oil and other household necessities, and from the time he placed foot in the municipality he was shadowed persistently by local Constable Bennett.

Provincial Detective Reburn, who has been detailed to the case by the attorney-general's department, was, at the time, on his way to the Deline home, accompanied by County Constable Williams, armed with a warrant for Deline's arrest. Learning that their quarry had driven in to Havelock, they turned back and took Deline into custody immediately upon reaching here. The warrant did not minimize in the slightest, but charged Deline with the murder of his wife.

Deline did not evince the slightest emotion, other than natural surprise in a mild degree. The childish sympathy of the man makes his predicament almost pitiful. After warning him that anything he might say would be used as evidence against him, the conservative banker, enter my protest for light costs money.

He was arraigned before Magistrate Joyce to-night, and was remanded to the county jail. He is to-morrow, and where he will remain until Friday afternoon, when he will appear at the inquest on his wife's body, which was put on the witness stand at this session of the inquest.

The reason the crown authorities decided to arrest Deline is that, in addition to the suspicious circumstances already cited, which would appear to identify him with the case, spots were found on his trousers corresponding to the spots on the dead woman's clothing. It will be difficult for Deline to explain their presence there, since he declares he was too frightened or horrified to think of leaving his wife lying in the woods, to which he says he did not touch her body at all.

This, then, gives the contumacious three points of a incrimination against Deline, viz., his statement to Bennett, persons that he expected to go home and find his wife dead; the fact that he took him two and a half hours to go, as he says, as a vacation, two miles, and the spots on his clothing.

LOOK ALIKE TO JUDGE Thinks Mr. Stewart Has Forgotten Signing

"Judgment was reserved by Justice Clute in the case brought by the College-street ratepayers against the city and John Maguire, contractor, to prevent the laying of an asphalt block pavement on College-street between Manning-avenue and Dovercourt-road. The points to be decided are, whether the genuineness of the signature of Mrs. A. T. Stewart, on the petition for asphalt block paving, is disallowed, and whether the petition, being that of a monopoly alleged to be enjoyed by the Ontario Asphalt Block Co., and under the powers of the board of control as to awarding and having general control of contracts.

"Does it not look as if there had been some influence to accelerate the action of the council?" remarked Justice Clute, who also commented: "If an expert had said that Mr. and Mrs. Stewart's names were signed by a different hand, I would not be so certain. Mr. Stewart avers that he did not sign his wife's name, but I think that he must have forgotten."

STEAMERS COLLIDE. Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Sept. 20.—The passenger steamer Lakeland of Port Huron and barge John Smethton, belonging to the Pittsburgh Steamship Company, were badly damaged in a collision in a fog early to-day in Little Rapids cut, below this city. The Lakeland was beached and the Smethton was anchored alongside.

RESERVOIR NOT DRY YET And the Drained Portion Resembles a Hay Field.

To-day should see the whole floor of the Rosedale Reservoir uncovered by the outlet into the Rosedale Creek. Yesterday all but about a third of the surface to the south was laid bare, but in that section the water was still some six or seven feet deep at 6 o'clock last night. The men are busily engaged in sweeping the sediment down into the water and stoking the great masses of weeds which have grown upon the unemptied surface.

The uncovered portion looks like a great hay field with the regular piles of weeds. The stench is sickening. It will be ten days before the reservoir is again ready for service.

Would Remove Police Commissioner. NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Acting Mayor Mitchell has recommended that Police Commissioner Egan be removed on the ground of unfitness in permitting gambling to flourish in the city unchecked.

Mr. Mitchell said that Commissioner Baker, in a letter to him, showed insubordination.

SMOTHERED BY SHAVINGS
But No One Knows How He Fell in Chute.

"That deceased came to his death on Sept. 9, 1910, in Toronto, by suffocation thru falling down a shaving chute at J. B. Smith & Son's planing mill, and we, the jury, do not consider the place dangerous or the proprietors or employees to blame."

Such was the verdict returned last night by Coroner Elliott's jury at the morgue, which enquired into the death of Adolph Kopinsky.

The evidence given by the employees was in effect that the spot where the foreigner worked was not a dangerous place, but no one was able to tell how the accident happened.

John Donnelly declared there was nothing dangerous about the place. It was two feet square and extended for several feet down. He could not tell how the man fell in. There were ropes and poles thru the chute. The mouth of the chute was cut right in the floor with no guard rail and no trap door. When the machine was in operation, the shavings could not accumulate.

According to Dr. D. Archibald, death was due to suffocation. There was a scalp wound back of the ear due to falling against something, and to inhaling of shavings when unconscious caused the smothering.

Wm. Brown, foreman, had seen the man asleep once, and Kendall Mulholland, a shipper, had seen deceased sleeping on two or three occasions. John Dunbar had constructed the

These subjects include not only that of company law but also conditional sales, notes, bills, assignments and preferences, etc.

PROMOTION PULL HURTS FIRE AND POLICE DEPTS.

Ald. Maguire Will Have Chief Thompson Make Enlightening Report.

"There are men who have been in the fire department many years, who have never had a mark against them and who in ability are equal to anyone else, but who don't get promoted, simply because they haven't the pull. It is a serious condition. Men who have not been in the department nearly so long, are advanced over the men who simply do their duty. The practice of promotion by seniority should be observed as far as possible, but men are being passed over. That what is hurting the fire department and the police force, also in the latter case, it's not so conspicuous."

Objects to Street Signs.
Ald. McCausland protested against the granting of any more permits for street signs, as they were spoiling the appearance of the streets.

As Ald. Phelan has a motion on the subject to come before the legislation committee, no action was taken. The proposed amendment to the building bylaws for the protection of workmen by requiring that, as each floor of a new building is completed, joists must be covered in such a way as to minimize risk to workmen, was approved by a deputation from the Amalgamated Carpenters' Union, but opposed by a representative of the Dominion Bridge Company on behalf of the Builders' Exchange. He said that as there was only one-sixteenth of an inch "play" in the rivet holes, to put each floor as the structure rose, would mean that the building would be out of plumb. The bylaw was allowed to stand over for another week.

Houses on the Island.
That there is plenty of space available for parks on the island without putting a stop to the leasing of land for the erection of more houses, was taken by the island committee yesterday, in declining to adopt the policy of prohibition proposed by the board of control.

Trade in South America.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres or on a farm of less than 80 acres if his wife or child, or his brother or sister of intended homesteader, is residing on the land.

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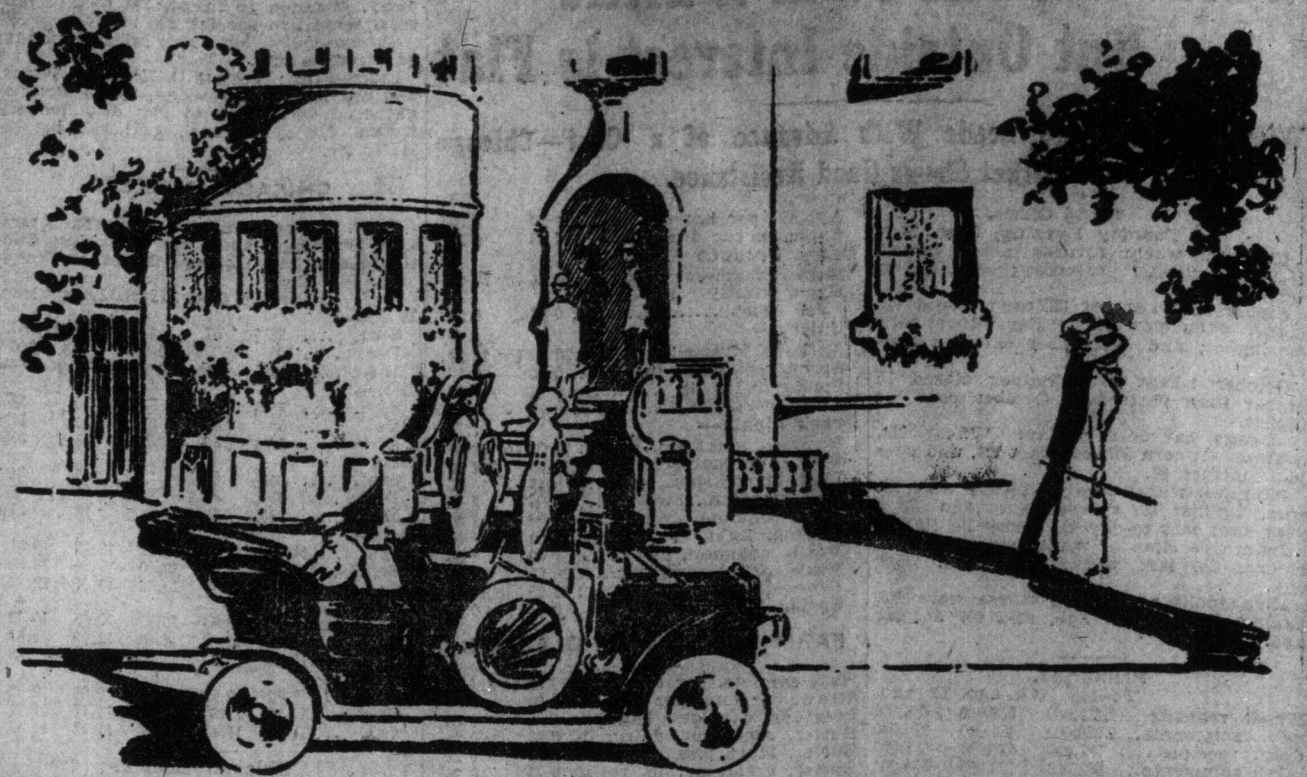
