## A Merry Christmas—May it Be Yours in More Than Name Only

### APATHY THE ONLY FEATURE OF NOMINATION MEETINGS

Citizens Apparently Are not interesting themselves in the Civic Campaign—Four Candidates for the Mayoralty—Constants in the Various Wards

Civic nominations yesterday were a frost so far as public interest was concerned. At the city hall, in the morning, about 200 citizens heard from candidates for the mayoralty, 10 candidates for controllerships and 18 aspirants to the board of education present their claims for recognition at the hands of a neglected electorate. Mayor Coatsworth has as rivals Lindsley and Noble, of Socialist tendencies, and O'Hara, an independent, who says he would gladly serve the city in the chair without remuneration. Seems a pity that a philanthropy of that sort couldn't be combined with a personality that the citizens could take to more readily.

There will be several new faces in next year's council. Aid. Fleming, Harrison and Dunn want to lend their civic experience to the service of the board of control, and Aid. Oliver, Sheppard and Hey will retire with laurels already won. Ex-Aid. E. S. Cox, ex-Aid. Ned Hanlan and ex-Aid. R. H. Graham are anxious to once more serve the people. Several names which have been mentioned lately as "probable" were not even whispered at the nominations.

The ward nominations were very slimly attended and lacked the zest and enthusiasm of former years. Quite a difference of opinion manifested itself on all the by-laws but the power by-law, for which support was unanimous. The street railway and the loops were at target for rapid fire criticism from Riverdale to Brockton. Strange to say, the "salary grab" seems to have been forgotten.

### EAST OF THE MISSISSIPPI AND NORTH OF THE OHIO UNDER 2-CENT RATE LAW

One of the U.S. Interstate Commerce Commissioners Indulges in a Prophecy—Carriers Have Admitted That Rates Are Now Too High.

Kansas City, Dec. 24.—C. A. Prouty of Vermont, member of the U. S. interstate commerce commission, who arrived here this morning from St. Louis to continue the car shortage hearing, said to-day in an interview, in speaking of the so-called rate law:

"I have no doubt that eventually all states east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio will be on a two-cent basis, and by eventually I mean, of course, within a reasonable time for such legislation to be enacted—legislation shall be required, which I doubt. All these changes are and will be due to the agitation for the passage of the federal rate law. No man can tell what the final effect of the rate law may be until it has been worked out in the courts."

Mr. Prouty continued: "The most important effect of the law has been the reducing of passenger rates east of Pittsburgh and north of the Ohio River and in other communities. These reductions have been widespread—not in the west, I admit, but east of Pittsburgh and north of the Ohio people are riding for two cents a mile. The commission has made no orders, has expressed no opinion to account for this change. The carriers have tacitly admitted that their rates were too high."

Mr. Prouty said it was too early now to estimate the real value of the rate law. Up to this time the railroads, he said, had generally evaded it by legislation not only to obey the law, but to accept any construction the commission put upon it. The commission has had no occasion, he said, to issue any constraining orders, nor orders that would cost the railroads months to obey.

Mr. Prouty said, "that the first step would be to stop rebates. I believe they have been stopped."

Mr. Prouty, recurring to the reduction of passenger rates, said there had been some reductions in freight rates, too, as well as a cut in fares. While this amounts to a reduction in the published tariff, he said, "it amounts to largely increased revenues for the railroads. It must be clear that if they cut off all free transportation the carriers could afford to reduce passenger and freight rates."

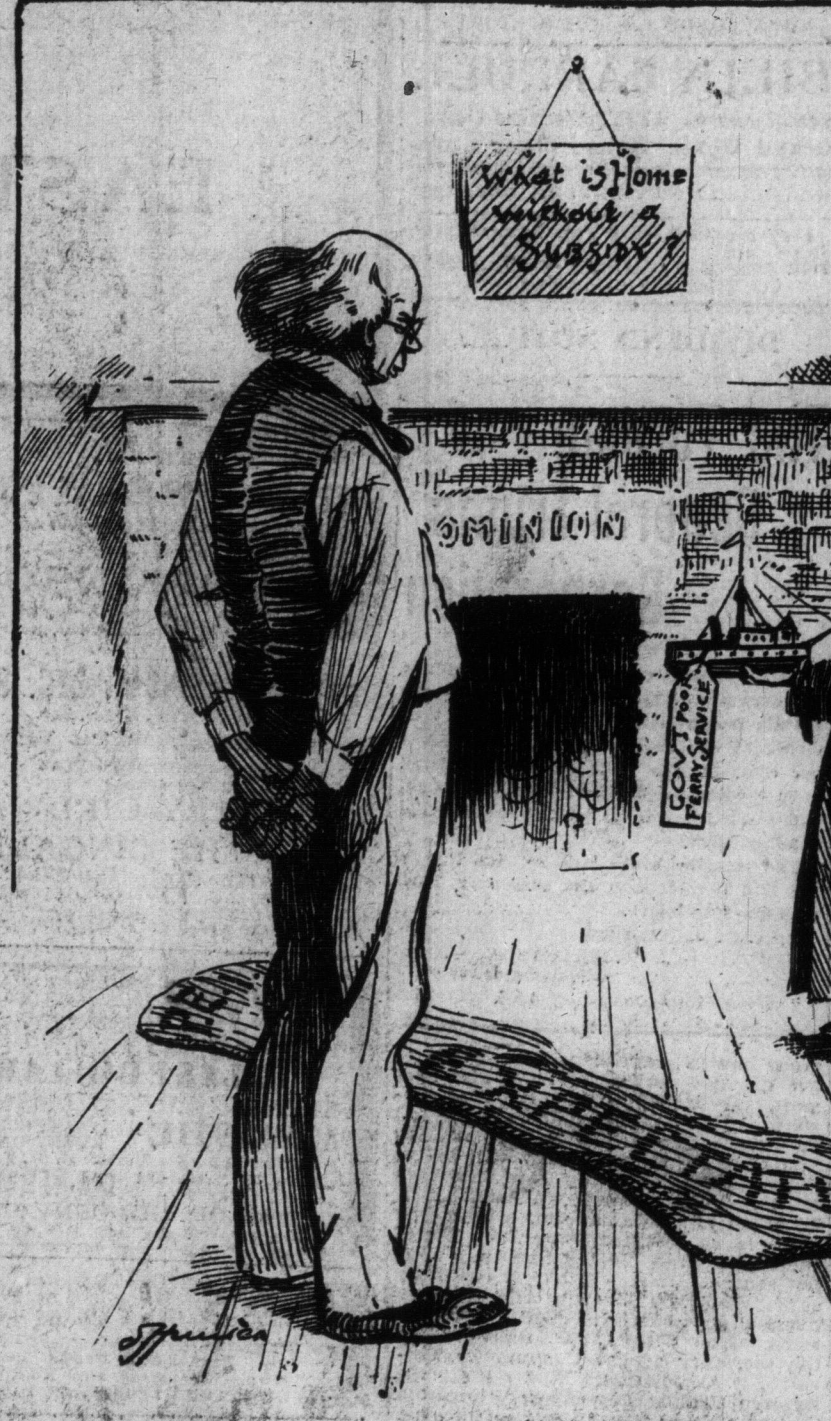

King's Dinner Will Include Choice Dishes, From Crowned Relatives—London Has Most Prosperous Christmas Season in Many Years.

London, Dec. 24.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra and the Prince and Princess of Wales will pass Christmas at Sandringham.

From an enormous Christmas tree, occupying the centre of the ballroom, the Queen and the other members of the royal family will personally distribute gifts to each member of the household to-morrow afternoon. The tenants and employees of the royal farms will also receive remembrances, beef and coal being distributed to the widows and poor laborers.

The King's Christmas dinner, as usual, will include a boar's head, the gift of Emperor William, oxen and sturgeon, from Emperor Nicholas, and roasted peacock and young swan, from Hampton Court, besides the traditional baron-of-beef and turkey. The King has also sent a number of specially fattened young swans to many members of European royal families.

The general signs of prosperity are more plentiful here this Christmas than for many years. The stores have been unpacked for weeks, and enjoyed an unprecedented food of business, all ranks appearing to share in the general abundance of wealth. The crowd of poverty-stricken unemployed so pitifully obvious in London's streets a year ago has almost disappeared, indicating that all branches of trades are participating in the improved condition.

#### KBAR AT BELLS ISLAND.

New York, Dec. 24.—Perhaps a happier crowd of strangers was never brought together than the 200 immigrants who enjoyed a Christmas dinner on Bells Island to-day. Commissioner Watchorn did the honors while a dozen clergymen told the story of Christmas in as many tongues.

Tables on which there was everything from turkey to pumpkin pie, were spread in the great registration hall and in adjoining rooms were candle-lit Christmas trees bearing a gift for every guest. There were toys for the 500 children, boxes of candy for the women and cigars for the men. After a speech by the commissioner, the dinner made a brave attempt at singing "America."

#### GIFT DISTRIBUTION.

**"RESOLUTE" WRECK REPORT**

**"Cap." Sullivan Complimented for His Work—Good Boat, Well Navigated.**

The report of Commander Spain, citing the finding of the court of enquiry into the "Resolute" wreck, was made public yesterday. It declares: That the S.S. "Resolute" was, as far as can be ascertained, in a sound and seaworthy condition, and well fitted for the service in which she was employed.

That the officers and crew were in accordance with the government rules and customs of the trade in which the ship was employed, with the exception of Heavey, the first mate, who did not hold a Canadian certificate of any description, and the court considers the owners of the vessel are responsible for this man being on board the ship without proper qualifications.

That the "Resolute" was navigated in a seaman-like manner, but owing to the heavy sea, and the shallowness of the straits, the vessel struck the harbor, she was unable to enter the port.

That all measures were taken for the safety of the vessel, and that no disaster was anticipated, until a few minutes previous to the foundering of the ship, which was caused by water entering the hull of the steamer, from some source which the court was unable to determine, and to the impossibility of procuring any evidence in regard to it.

That the sudden change from comparative safety to the foundering of the steamer prevented more efficient measures being taken for the preservation of the crew, and the use of life preservers and the better handling of the lifeboats.

That Capt. Sullivan, marine superintendent of the company, made every effort towards the safety of the vessel, and his subsequent efforts towards the preservation of the crew deserve credit. The court considers that, if Capt. Sullivan had not been notified of the crew to take to the boats, more lives might have been saved.

**ORDINATION AT ST. ALBAN'S.**

The candidates were presented by Rev. Dr. Bowhall to the bishop for ordination. Those ordained are: Priests—Rev. H. J. Doonan, Rev. E. W. Murphy, H.A.A., Rev. E. C. Sharp, Rev. A. C. Cunningham, Deacons—Rev. E. C. Birch and Rev. J. B. Petherington.

The Rev. C. E. Sharp, vicar of St. Thomas Church, presided at the ordination service.

The appointments to which the candidates were assigned are: Rev. Mr. Raymond, assistant to Canon Baldwin, rector of All Saints; Mr. Murphy, assistant to Rev. C. J. James, Church of the Redeemer; Mr. Doonan, in charge of the mission at Highway; Mr. Pihler, rector of St. James; Mr. Cunningham, assistant to Rev. Bernard Bryan, rector of St. Andrew's; Mr. Murphy, assistant to Rev. E. C. Birch, rector of St. Paul's.

The Rev. Dr. Bowhall, vicar of St. Alban's, in charge of the choir, rendered splendid services.

**HEART ACTION RESTORED.**

**Message Used to Induce Circulation After 25 Minutes.**

London, Dec. 24.—Dr. Green, surgeon of the Bristol Hospital for children, describes a remarkable case of restoration of the heart action by means of a message after apparent death.

The patient, a boy of 9, suffered from a complaint which necessitated an operation. Chloroform was administered and the operation commenced. There was difficulty breathing and the heart sounds were audible. Hot towels were applied and injections of strychnine used, but without success.

Finally, 25 minutes after the heart had stopped, Dr. Green decided to apply direct compression of the chest. An opening was made sufficient to admit the right hand. The heart was found to be quite immobile and flaccid. The right hand began rhythmic compression. The patient's hand pressed the lower surface and the left hand pressed the upper surface of the chest. The rate of compression was about 70 a minute. For two minutes this was done without appreciable result. Then the doctor grasped the apex of the heart in his right hand and continued intermittent compression. Soon a slight fluttering of the heart was noticed, the pupils of the eyes contracted and within a few seconds the heart began to beat forcibly with more than normal vigor.

**MAKES BLIN. MAN SEE.**

**Dr. Zirm Successfully Transplants Cornea of Eye.**

Vienna, Dec. 24.—At a meeting of the medical society, Dr. Zirm showed a man on whom he had successfully performed transplantation of the cornea, which had destroyed the sight of both eyes. By chance the surgeon had to take out the eye of an 11-year-old boy, which was ruined by a splinter in the interior of the cornea.

The operator therefore cut slits in the opaque cornea of the man's eyes and inserted pieces of the boy's cornea. The experiment failed as to the right eye, as the transplanted window also thickened, but the left eye retained its transparency and almost normal vision was restored.

A very close examination revealed a slight veil over the left eye, which, however, does not prevent the patient from reading small print. From being stone blind, he is now able to go about his work.

The surgeon attributed numerous previous failures to the fact that the cornea of animals has heretofore been employed, whereas in this case human material was provided.

**CONFIDO GIRL WHO POSED AS MAN**

**LOVE STORY WITH TRAGEDY**

Romance in the Career of Russian Employee Whose Sex Was Revealed by Death.

Chicago, Dec. 24.—The three days' wonder growing out of the discovery that Nicolai De Raylan, for years a clerk to Baron Schlippenbach, Russian consul in Chicago, was a woman—a woman who posed as a man—was solved yesterday. Mrs. Eugene Bruchulis, De Raylan's first wife, and Mrs. Anne De Raylan, both unboomed themselves. De Raylan was of the common classes of the southern part. The 11-year-old boy who has been reported as being the real child of the De Raylan woman, Mrs. Anne De Raylan's own child, the son of Joseph Armstrong, her former husband.

The idea of posing as a man gradually grew with the De Raylan girl. Trouble with her parents over a revolutionary matter drove her from her home in Elizabethville when De Raylan was a woman. She went to Kamenyets and America as a man. The romance clung to her. There was a diary, which Mrs. Bruchulis revealed, telling of how the De Raylan girl lived as "my angel girl," referred to as "my angel girl," in the quarter in St. Petersburg.

During the years of her double life in America letters constantly went back to Russia to the "angel girl." The girl wrote pitiful letters begging to be brought to this country, saying that she would be good and true, and at one period De Raylan tried to induce her friend, Francis Bruchulis, to marry her and be good and true, and to go to Russia to escape the opportunities of "Jenny."

In the City of Mexico De Raylan was an aide to Adolf Deverschitz, for years acting Russian charge d'affaires. After the death of Deverschitz it was discovered that "he" was a woman. For a short time in that city De Raylan lived as a woman, but upon leaving New York assumed the dress and role of a man.

In New York, feeling secure of her deception, she married her first "wife," and from there the story proceeds to Chicago. De Raylan's connection with the revolutionary party is seen in her presence at meetings of the west side "bund" and the secret connection with fellow-countrymen and the numerous despatches sent to Russia.

**CANADA THRUST FORWARD AS THE VITAL QUESTION**

Bryce Will Have to Settle Matter of Imperial Concern.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London, Dec. 24.—The Sunday Observer, referring to the questions now before us to solve, says there is for us all important, the imperial vital question of the moment, which is the thrust of itself forward as a matter of transcendent importance, and not less to America herself.

It would seem that they do not fear loss of trade to a town as a consequence of its being "dry," as was once the case. At the same time, it is stated that license holders have themselves to blame in a great many cases, for violations of the license law by many of them in the way of selling to intoxicated persons, to women and to minors are still to be found.

with the Detroit interests, eventually formed the syndicate. The company will be capitalized at \$5,000,000. If any stock at all is sold to the public it will not amount to more than half a million dollars. Expert opinion places the silver deposits under the lake at \$60,000,000.

He had been up to Lucknow to spend Sunday with his parents, and is in Toronto as the man "ahead" of next week's attraction at the Majestic Theatre--the Roderick-Bain McKenzie.

Major McKenzie is a scholar in the Gaelic, written and spoken language and has appeared before King Edward VII. by royal command, at Balmoral and Sandringham within two years.

#### Indicted in Detroit for Working Get-Rich-Quick Schemes.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 24.--George F. Kinnear, who was found dead in a Toronto hotel, was indicted here on several counts of fraudulent use of the mail in connection with the "get-rich-quick" schemes. One case was settled by the payment of \$1,000 fine. He was released on \$1000 bail in another case and jumped his bail. All trace of him was lost till it was learned to-day that he was dead in Toronto.

In Washington, Kinnear was formerly connected with The Washington Post. While in trouble here he was furnished with money by his family in England.

### REBELLION IN DUTCH COLONY

#### Considerable Opposition to Troops on Part of Chiefs.

The Hague, Dec. 24.--The Dutch troops are still meeting with considerable opposition on the part of the rebellious chiefs in the Dutch East Indies. The former have just captured the stronghold of the Rajah of Goa, at Sidrang.

The rajah's son and 18 of their followers were killed, many were wounded and the rajah's brother was made prisoner.

His much-mooted buoyancy has vanished, and he is a nervous wreck and a wrecked nervous system. His hair is streaked with gray, and his countenance is far from being that of a strong man.

Asked if he would return west next month to hang the men condemned in Winnipeg and Port Arthur, he replied that he did not know.

### STRUCK BY STREET CAR

Rochester, Dec. 24.--A light engine collided with passenger train No. 2 on the Buffalo, Rochester and Pittsburgh this morning. Michael Lynn of Rochester, engineer, and Henry Gath of Warsaw, fireman of the passenger engine, were killed. George McNally, engineer of the light engine, was badly injured, and E. Palmer, fireman of the light engine, is reported to have been killed.

Detroit to Buffalo, thru Western Ontario, is Route Planned.

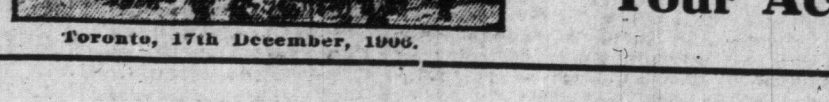
