Beath of Mat Taylor. Mat Taylor, the man who completely re-volutionized the art of boat building, died at Dublin during the holidays. It was he who invented the present form of keelless single-streaked racing craft. The new style was brought into prominent notice by the Royal Chester Rowing Club winning the Grand Challenge Cup at Henley regatta in 1856 in one of them, this being the first time that a boat of the description had appeared at Henley. Chester had won the Stewards' Challenge Cup in the previous year, and by winning not only the Grand Challenge Cup, but the Ladies' Plate also, in 1856, they, as well as establishing them-selves as a first-blass club, caused Mat Taylor's keelless boats to come into uni-versal use. He coily made his boats about 64 feet long, about 10 feet shorter than eight-oared, craft of the present day; other-ise his lines have remained without much ange.
