## IS THE CHINESE EMPEROR DEAD?

The Shanghai Mercury Has a Report on Scheming to Remove the Empress Dowager. A Trustee Turned Traitor-Alleged Agreement Between British and Russia-Cable News.

London, Oct. 4.-According to a despatch from Shanghai to the Chinese Mercury of the 1st inst., the Emperor of China intended to remove the Empress Dowager from his path, and entrusted his plans to an adherent. The latter proved a traitor. The Empress Dowager, on learning of the plot, sternly upbraided the Emperor and invited him to drink the contents of a cup to which she pointed. He swallowed the fluid in a gulp. It is impossible, however, according to this correspondent, to ascertain whether the Emperor is actually alive or dead.

**Cossacks and Marines.**  
London, Oct. 5.-The Pekin correspondent of The Daily Chronicle, telegraphing Monday, says: "Thirty Cossacks and thirty English marines arrived here today."

**Alleged Anglo-Russian Saw-Off.**  
Paris, Oct. 5.-The London correspondent of The Journal des Debats announces that Great Britain and Russia are about to sign an agreement giving the former preponderance in the Yang Tze Valley, and the latter preponderance in Manchuria.

## NEW HISTORY OF EUROPE

Will Be Begun When Spanish-American Peace Preliminaries Are Signed, Says Gen. Cerros.

Paris, Oct. 4.-La Patrie this evening prints an interview, said to have been had with General Rafael Cerros y Sienra of the Spanish Peace Commission, in which he is represented as saying: "Peace between Spain and the United States will complicate all the Eastern questions. The day upon which the preliminaries are signed the first chapter in the new history of Europe will be commenced, as the United States will henceforth play a preponderant role in events of which different parts of the world will be the theatre."

**It has been pretended that Spain wanted war, or, at least, allowed herself to be dragged into it. This is a mistake, since the United States have long coveted our colonies. They introduced Separatist and autonomist ideas into Cuba, ideas which were not shared by a majority of the inhabitants of the island. Influences of all kinds have been brought into play to excite risings, and hence ensued a war, the consequences of which might be prejudicial to ourselves and may affect all European interests.**

## ANOTHER FEARFUL STORM.

Island Off the Coast of Georgia Swept Out of Existence - Only Three Persons Escaped.

Savannah, Ga., Oct. 4.-Complete details from Brunswick and the surrounding country are impossible because of the destruction of the telegraph and telephone system. Campbell Island, 12 miles from Darien, on the Altamaha River, is said to be completely swept away, and only three persons escaped in getting off the island. There is no definite information as to the population of the island, and estimates of the number supposed to have perished range from 20 to 50. The population was made up wholly of colored truck growers. Four deaths are now reported from Brunswick. The damage to property there is estimated at half a million dollars. News from outlying islands is not obtainable.

## WHO CUT THAT WIRE?

The G. N. W. Telegraph Company Is After Someone's Scalp.

Montreal, Oct. 4.-There is likely to be serious trouble for somebody in connection with the seizure made this afternoon on the stock broking premises of H. W. Tarr & Co. on St. Jacques-street. The office is in the G. N. W. building, and during the seizure somebody cut the telegraph wire and caused considerable inconvenience. The manager of the G. N. W. company laid a complaint at the Police Court, and it is likely that an action for damages will result.

## CRUGER SEEKING ALLIES.

Hopes for the Assistance of the Congo Free State.

London, Oct. 4.-The Cape Town correspondent of The Daily Mail says: "Great Britain, it is reported from Johannesburg, will take over the Delagoa customs, railways and telegraph about the middle of this month."

## BOGEST BONANZA OF ALL

Fullman Company, Capitalized in 1897 at \$100,000, Now Earns Over 12 Per Cent. On \$36,000,000.

San Francisco, Oct. 4.-The examination of Col. Polk into the finances of the Fullman Company shows that the capital stock of the company is estimated at \$36,000,000. The statement for the fiscal year ending July 31, 1898, is as follows: Gross earnings, \$8,074,881.21; operating expenses, \$3,511,888.32; net receipts from operating, \$4,562,992.89. Other expenses figure up \$212,160.15, making the net earnings \$4,350,832.74, or nearly 18 per cent on its present capital stock.

Montreal, Que., Oct. 4.-[Special]-Mr. Sidney G. P. Coryn, European travelling passenger agent for the Canadian Pacific Railway, is now in the city and his remarks on immigration matters are of interest. He states that there is a movement on foot to bring to Canada the Dobrosoulski of Southern Russia, who, to the number of 10,000 families, reside in the Caucasus Mountains and who, like the Mennonites, have made themselves famous because of their refusal to serve in the army.

## THE PASTOR SEC.

## NATIONAL ISSUES ARE PARAMOUNT

Roosevelt Says State Elections Cannot Be Run Independent of the Central Government's Policy-Must Have Honest Money, Protection to Native Industry, a Merchant Marine and a Strong Army and Navy.

New York, Oct. 4.-Col. Roosevelt was officially notified today of his selection as the candidate of the Republican party for Governor of New York State.

In accepting the nomination, Col. Roosevelt said, in part: "National issues are paramount this year. It is no more possible to conduct a State election now without regard to national issues, than it was possible so to conduct one in 1861 or 1863. As it then was, so it now is, the interests of the nation as a whole are vital and absorbing interest to each citizen."

When, as now, the Republican party was forced to find new issues, to confront new problems. Then, as now, it was forced not to follow, but to make precedents. In 1861, we had to preserve the republic for its great destiny; in 1868, we have taken a long stride towards the accomplishment of that destiny. The Republican party, therefore, in its State platform, does well to reiterate the promises under which it was possible to elect a Republican president, pledges which made it possible to restore prosperity to our country, and to put the nation where it is possible to work out the glorious future, which is now before a reunited nation."

"The issues for honest money, for protection to American industry, for the upbuilding of a merchant marine, adequate to carry the commerce of the world, and to form a naval militia in times of war, are as vital this year as they were in the great contest which was so successfully fought in 1860.

"We must further strengthen our navy and build up our army, so that they may be equal to any demand made upon them, as we work out our destiny. Hawaii and Porto Rico are ours, and in the East and West Indies the interests of the nation shall be safeguarded."

Van Wyck Stuck to State Issues.

New York, Oct. 4.-Judge Augustus Van Wyck tonight received the official notification of his nomination for Governor by the recent Democratic State convention. He made a brief address to the committee that waited upon him at his home in Brooklyn, and accepted the nomination. The ceremony was very formal and did not consume more than a half hour. Judge Van Wyck confined his remarks entirely to State issues.

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**Member's Views.**  
One of the oldest and most influential members of the church, who has thus far entertained nothing but the warmest feelings towards the pastor, calls the stand taken nothing less than an act of base ingratitude. The remarks were entirely uncalculated, and established a most unworthy and unnecessary precedent. It may be that the known fact that Mr. McCaughan has received a call from Chicago has put the matter on a personal basis that would otherwise not be introduced and a prejudicial feeling thus generated.

**Finances in Good Shape.**  
Col. John I. Davidson states that the finances of the church were never in a better condition. St. Mark's was off their hands and in less than ten years the whole debt would be wiped out. The only trouble with the people of St. Andrew's was that they were too generous, and he believed that if the necessity arose \$25,000 could be raised in one week. The funds were always low at this time of the year, because most of the pew-holders and members had been holidaying and were behind in their dues, but within a month there would be a running surplus in the bank.

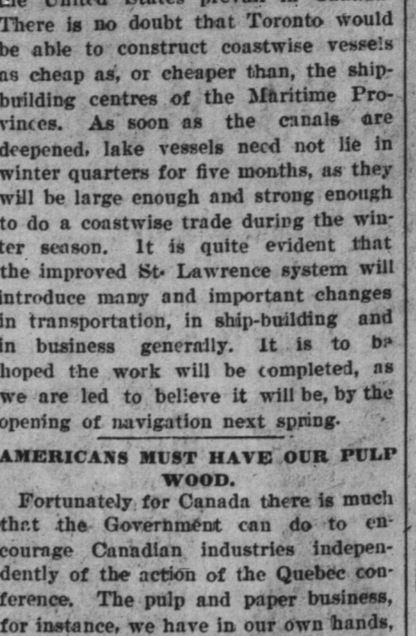

On the strength of Rev. John McEwen's hospital report, it was decided to press outdoor congregations to contribute to the maintenance of this department.

Hold Their Own. Rev. Norman Russell, who is about to return to his work in India, addressed the Presbytery on the desirability of organizations supporting their own representatives.

At the afternoon sitting of the Presbytery it was decided to adopt a model constitution for missionary associations, the object being to furnish an organization to aid in securing contributions for the schemes of the church.

The congregation of St. Albans and Ballantrae have fallen behind during the last two years in their contributions to alms, but are now endeavoring to pay up all arrears, and the Presbytery on that condition are trying to secure for them a grant of \$200 from the Augmentation Fund.

Repairs to Roads. Mr. L. H. Baldwin spoke to the Council on the matter of the grading and macadamizing of Avenue Road. This improvement, he said, had been promised for two years; the section paid pretty heavy taxes and it was perfect nonsense to keep putting the question off.

Ex-Deputy-Reeve Macdonald of Mount Dennis made a successful plea for sufficient gravel to be put on Eglington avenue in the locality where he resides, but Mr. G. Douglas, who asked for a sidewalk on Baitland-avenue, will have to show that the gravel is needed by the town.

The evening room at the high school has undergone many improvements during the holidays, and now sixteen students can work at the same table. The class is larger this year than it ever was before.

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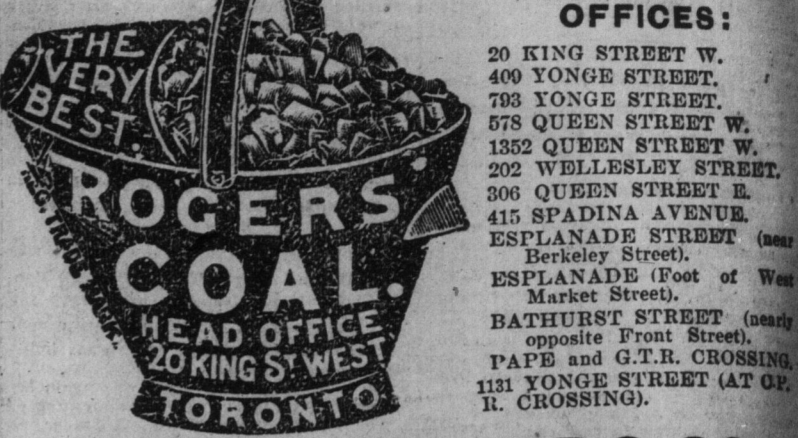
