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PICKERING PIONEER DEAD. James Hubbard Just Saw the Opening Year and Then

Passed Away,
Brougham, Ont., Jan. 1.—By the death of
James Hubbard here to-day Brougham loses one of its oldest and most respected citizens, and the Township of Pickering one of its oldest inhabitants. Mr. Hubbard was born in the year 1812 in the Township of Pickering, and was the oldest born subject in the township, having been born only a couple of miles from here. He was a pioneer in many respects, having carried the first mail that came into Brougham; he also drove the first mail route from Whitby to Brougham, and in 1835 he used to take the mail by horseback from Pickering to Marlposa. Although he has lived in the very heart of a railroad country, he never was on a train. He leaves two children, a married daughter, living in Scarboro, and Mrs. James Williams of Brougham.

A wonderful old gentleman was James Hubbard in his time. He was the ristorian of Pickering Township. He could recall the Rebellion of 1837 as if it had happened but a week ago. He prided himself upon the fact that at that time, hough his father and four brothers shouldered myskets for Mackenzie, he had been true to his allegiance to the Crown.

He possessed a marvelous memory and could give the lineage of every resident in one of its oldest and most respected citi-

He possessed a marvelous memory and ould give the lineage of every resident in he township. He was a life-long Conservative and wor-

He was a life-long Conservative and worshipped the name of Str John A. Macdonald. In all his life, he was wont to say he nexer polled anything but a Conservative vote. In every election, he considered that "the Yonkess" were arrayed with the Reformers against "The Queen," and the Conservatives. This dea had been implanted in his mind in '37, and was unrooted at his death.

He was a kindly oldman, against whom no breath of taint was ever raised. He never tasted tobacco or liquor, and his strongest repletive was "darn." In this death the last of the ploneers of Pickering, sprung from good old U. E. Loyalist stock, is gone, and a kindly Christian gentleman passed away. Throughout the township he was known as Uncle Jim.

Car Drivers' Gloves.

Car Drivers' Gloves.

The car driver, when he wore any covering on his hands at all, has always worn gloves. He needed the use of his separate ingers in handling the reins; but his modern-successor, the gripman or the motorman, while wearing gloves in summer, in winter wears mittens. He does not need the use of his fingers separately in handling the mechanical appliances he manipulates, and mittens are the warmer and more comfortable. In summer all wear gloves. Aside from their greater convenience, they are at that season cooler. Gloves and mittens for motorman, gripmen and car drivers are made in many—a hundred or more—different varieties.

The materials used in their manufacture are horsehide, buckskin, sheepskin, cowhide, calfskin, and rubber, the glove or the mitten being made perhaps entirely of a single one of these materials, or of two in combination; and then many of these gloves or mittens are lined with some other material, or they are, it may be, worn with some other kind of glove or mitten.

Horsehide has in recent years come to be largely used for gripmien's and motormen's mittens. There is made of horsehide for this use a leather that is not only strong and has good wearing qualities, but that is at the same time soft and pliable. One kind of horsehide mitten is made with a woolen lining, and what is called an extension cuff, also of wool, to be turned backover the wrist of the wearer.


