Was Extolled in Warm Terms, But Some of His Statements Were a Bit Wild.

Montreal, April 12.—(Special)—The St. John's News says:

In a speech delivered before the Young Liberal Club of Hamilton on Monday, Senator Dandurand is reported in the Herald to have said, among other things, that "in St. John's, where about one-tenth of the people were English-speaking, the mayor was a good Scotchman, Mr. Duncan Macdonald, and before him had been Mr. James O. Cain. In Ilerbertville there were only two English-speaking men and one of them had been elected mayor."

Mr. Macdonald, the good Scotchman referred to, has filled an honored grave for 15 months, and it is 35 years since our lamented townsman was chief magistrate there on the 21st inst. The annual dinner of the people of the opposite town of Ilerbertville to honor that man is only two English-speaking citizens in that municipality, and that an Englishman is mayor of the town, as is also the case in the neighboring parish of Sabreville. 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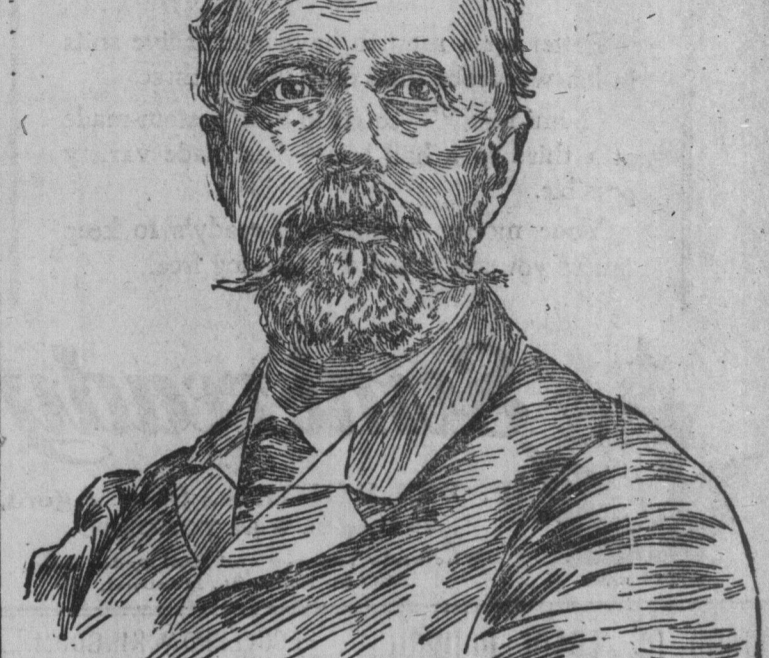

BOARD OF TRADE COUNCIL

Hance Logan's Motion in House of Commons Regarding Preferential Trade is Opposed.

AMENDMENT TO ALIEN LABOR LAW.

Legislation Should Not Restrict Immigrants Likely to Become Good Citizens.

Various matters that were under discussion in the public mind were dealt with by the Council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon.

In the case of the Kettle River Valley Railway, the report stated: "In this case, as the benefit will come to those in the older sections of the country in a great measure from the competition in rates, this should be secured."

The report was signed by the chairman, Mr. Peleg, and the members of the committee, including Messrs. Gurney, Williams, and others.

The amendments to the bill were approved by the Council, and the bill will be introduced in the House of Commons.

The bill is intended to prevent any person from acting as a private secretary to a foreigner temporarily residing in Canada, unless he is a Canadian citizen.

The bill also provides for the regulation of the practice of medicine by persons who are not registered in the province.

The bill is expected to pass the House of Commons in the near future.
