

THE TWO BOARDS WRANGLLED

Views on Financing Exchanged By the Board of Control and Public School Board.

SCHOOLS NEED \$20,000 AT ONCE.

Metropolitan Railway Agreement Up Again—The Day at the City Hall.

"You offered to give us certain particulars, you don't give them to us, and you put on your coats and go out in a huff."

Such was Mayor Howland's idea, expressed to Chairman Dr. Spence of the Public School Board, at the fall-end of a conference between the School Board and the Board of Control yesterday afternoon.

The Board of Control had invited the School Board to forget all existing differences for the present, and to give a statement of what monies were absolutely necessary at once for Public School expenses in order that the usefulness of the schools would not be impaired.

Not an Official Deputation. Chairman Dr. Spence and the heads of the various School Board committees responded, and said they wanted \$20,000 to finish out the year with, and \$100,000 for the present year.

On the advice of their solicitor, W. D. McMurich, who was with them, they did not care to go into detail of their urgent requirements, beyond that there were no requirements, beyond what they were paid for services already rendered.

The Mayor objected to a verbal statement being accepted by the Board of Control, whereas Dr. Spence retorted: "Some of us will go to the ratepayers, and our word will be considered just as sacred as yours."

The understanding, however, had been that anything done by the Board of Control to relieve the pressing necessities of the schools would be entirely without prejudice to pending litigation.

Close Friday—For Holidays. The School Board deputation was told that they were doubtless most estimable gentlemen, but they did not come with any resolution from their board containing a detailed statement of their urgent requirements.

"If we pass a resolution showing the amount due to the Public School Board, will you pay it?" asked Trustee Hales, who is chairman of the School Finance Committee.

"You can't ask us to do that—that is too much," replied the Mayor.

Mr. Hales intimated that the school trustees were personally liable for the debts incurred by the School Board recently, but he was not going to close up the schools, any way.

The Mayor said to Dr. Spence: "You state in court that we were refusing the funds necessary to keep the schools open."

Dr. Spence nodded.

The Mayor—"When do you close the schools this year?"

"Friday."

"Have you enough to go on with until Friday?"

"Yes," volunteered Trustee Jones.

After a lengthy criticism from the Mayor as to the manner in which the School Board had spent money in excess of the estimates, Trustee Hales said it would have been absolutely impossible for the schools for the year on the estimates given by the Board of Control.

A Matter of Law. The Mayor urged for a written statement of present positions, to be considered by the board until the School Board should send on one officially.

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Trustee Jones—"I understand you will not take our word."

Dr. Spence—"Well, we will bid them good-bye, that's all. We have given the information verbally."

The Mayor read the words in the opening paragraph in response, and this opened another lengthy wrangle, which culminated in a statement that Trustee Hales will prepare a statement showing what the School Board owes and what he thinks should reasonably be paid at once.

The School Board will meet tonight and the Board of Control will be waiting for them to carry out their duty.

Ontario Prohibition Alliance Issues a Slogan to Its Friends and Adherents.

REPORT OF A MILTON MEETING.

Premier Again Requested to Fulfill His Pledge in the Following Premises.

GET READY.

At an early date a deputation will wait upon the Premier to present in full the Ontario Alliance to the Ontario Alliance, and now being mailed: The following is the front page call issued in the monthly published by the Ontario Alliance, and now being mailed:

It is especially important that the names of officers of all committees and societies should be forwarded as soon as possible to the secretary of the Ontario Alliance, so that he may be able to communicate with them direct, with information, suggestions and advice, immediately after the government's declaration has been made.

Secretary F. S. Spence of the Ontario Alliance has received the following report of the organization of a Halton County Prohibition Electoral Association at Milton on Tuesday. A convention was held of delegates from various points of the county in the Royal Templars Hall at Milton on Tuesday.

Whereas, Sir Oliver Mowat, on February 6, 1898, declared in favor of provincial legislation as far as his government had the constitutional power to enact it; and whereas, Hon. G. W. Ross, on February 12th, of this present year, in reply to a deputation of Prohibitionists, stated that the government was always prepared to go as far as the constitutional powers of the province would allow, and had not receded from that position.

Therefore, resolved, that this Halton County Prohibition Association hereby request of the Ontario Government a fulfillment of the promise of its Premier by the introduction at the coming session of the Legislature of a bill to prohibit provincial transactions in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, to the extent of its ascertained powers.


LOCAL TOPICS.

WITH THE S.A.C.

Trooper Campbell tells of the Work of the South African Contingent in the city from Trooper H. M. Campbell of the South African Contingent, dated Nov. 14, from Beit Spruit, Transvaal, says: "Since my last letter, written some time in July, the progress of events here has been slow. The same old, steady, unimportant policy continues, and it is a long weary business. However, Lord Kitchener's last proclamation had the effect of stirring up all parties, and renewed activity is the rule. Large captures and surrenders have been made recently, and we must attribute it in part to the moral effect of the proclamation.

"Northern Cape Colony is being rapidly pacified. Schooneboom, a destroyer of Mar ruyburg, is captured, and both he and his party both hand-pressed and kept confined by on the move. The Intelligence Department is completed and efficient, and movements of the enemy are scrutinized and reported at once. However, in view of the past, speculating on the personal numbers and fighting strength of the Boers is a matter of conjecture. It is a fact in recent batches of prisoners many young fellows 14 or 16 years of age. This means that they were too young to be in command in the beginning of the campaign, and are now being utilized as auxiliaries as far as possible.

"Johannesburg is rapidly taking on its usual appearance, and each train brings large numbers of returning refugees. In a few months the city and its mines will be on the road to a new era and a renewed prosperity, unhampered with local surveillance and officious extortion.

"This division of the South African Contingent has been on column for some time operating in the Lesburg Mountains, and the section of country between Ventersburg and Paotseboom. Col. Hicks of the Dublin Fusiliers with part of his regiment, was in command. The movement was commenced in the captured Boer camp at Zwartfontein last July. The Boers at Zwartfontein were also reported. This section of the country is very difficult, covered with small, rugged, red granite hills, and running parallel with the Vaal River. Although the vicinity has been gone over after time, it is still impossible to keep it clear until recently, when the S.A.C. extended their chain of forts as to the north. The only section of the country is not the pleasant existence in the world. The men, however, are in splendid health, and in fact the Boers have been singularly free from disease. Not a death has occurred since our arrival in the country."

DANCES AND WEDDINGS

Responsible for Smallpox Outbreak in the Vicinity of Winnipeg.
Winnipeg, Dec. 18.—Dr. A. H. Simpson is engaged in stamping out smallpox, which now exists in St. Boniface, and the neighborhood. The St. Anne site, St. Anne's boarding school, where the disease was first reported to have the disease have all been removed to the pest house at St. Boniface. Dr. Lambert, who has been investigating the outbreak, has been able to trace the disease to the St. Anne's boarding school, where people met and where those who were free from the disease contracted it from those who were not. St. Boniface General Hospital and also the Isolation Hospital have been notified, and until the smallpox has been wiped out, Churches, convents, schools, and all other public buildings have been closed, and will not be used until the medical authorities are satisfied that the disease has been eradicated. The disease is a pest, and the smallpox physician at St. Boniface Hospital has established a house and use such other means as he deems necessary to eradicate the disease in that section.

REFORM MOVEMENT IN LONDON.

Condition of Streets at Night Worth London, Dec. 18.—The Duke of Norfolk, at the head of a deputation representing the Westminster Council, yesterday called on the Right Hon. C. T. Ritchie, the Secretary of State for Home Affairs, in order to urge him to do something to check the evil condition of some of the principal London streets at night. The evil complained of is much worse here than in New York.

The deputation said that Liverpool and other cities had been improved by police action in this respect, but Mr. Ritchie replied that the statements about the improvement at Liverpool had been greatly exaggerated and dwelt on the difficulties which the London police had to contend with, urged, also, that they (the police) had done much and were doing much to suppress vice.

SEVENTY TURKS BANISHED.

Spies Accused of the Hostility to the Constantinople correspondent of The Times, seventy Turks have been banished by spies as hostile to the present regime.
The Sultan has banished all seventy spies to Haidar, Anab.

The British Ambassador presented the report that General Louis Bolla, the fighting leader of the Boers, was wounded in the recent fight with the British. The Russian Ambassador has told the Grand Vizer that the state of Macedonia and Armenia is disgraced to the Turkish government.

DR. RIDDLE IN LISGAR.

Is Expected to Be Government Candidate in By-Election.
Winnipeg, Dec. 18.—An evening paper says it was learned on good authority that Dr. Riddle of Crystal City will be the government candidate in Lisgar. Dr. Riddle has, it is stated, privately expressed his willingness to accept the candidature.

FROM BOER SOURCES.

Kreger Has Not Heard That Botha Was Wounded in the Leg.
Philadelphia, Dec. 18.—The North American London correspondent says: The report that General Louis Bolla, the fighting leader of the Boers, was wounded in the recent fight with the British, has not been confirmed, although the report has been widely circulated. Reports to continental papers are that Bolla has reported to Kruger that he has been wounded in the leg, and that of these reports are recanted from a Boer theory.

That Boers say he was temporarily out of action is not mentioned in these reports, and the story that he was wounded is not believed by friends of the Boers.

Montreal, Dec. 18.—Cable advices from London today announce that the Board of Directors of the Grand Trunk Railway System have appointed Mr. Charles Percy G.T.R. Auditor.

LABOR LEADERS INDICTED.
Charged as Accessories for Murder of Striking Mine Operator.
Madisonville, Ky., Dec. 18.—The Webster County grand jury, in session at Dorson, returned indictments to-day against James D. Wood, president of the United Mine Workers of America, on the 23rd district; Kittridge Barnabe, vice-president, and W. B. Minton, secretary of the district, charging them as accessories before the fact for willful murder. The indictments are a result of an investigation of the facts connected with the attack made at the Providence Mines by union men five weeks ago. One of the union men who was killed in the battle, had papers on his person, which were introduced as evidence against the mine leaders. A list of the guns, their numbers and the names of the men to whom the guns had been given was found together with other evidence.

Hide Were Unsatisfactory.
Six parcels of timber units on the north shore of Lake Huron were offered for sale in the rotunda of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon, but the bids were unsatisfactory, and the parcels were withdrawn. A large number of prominent lumbermen were present, some coming from a distance. The first bid was of \$100,000 for 11 and 1/2 in. in the Township of George and Dunlop, 30 square miles area. On the first block the only bid was \$2000 per square mile. The second block consisted of 100 acres, and was put up for sale by E. W. Sparrow of Lansing, Mich. Peter Ryan appeared as auctioneer.


