ANOTHER ONTARIO REGION

Which is Said to Be Rich in Yellow Metal.

IT IS IN SIMCOE COUNTY.

An Independent Enterprise Wants to Tap the Rainy River Country.

A Narrow Gauge Railroad Proposed—Wabegon, the Distributing Point of the Manitowish, is Growing—The British Association and its Relation to Mining—Hawk Bay and Saw Bill—Hawthorn—Hastings Like the Transvaal.

It would seem that to the several already discovered gold-bearing areas of Ontario another district more or less rich in the yellow metal is to be added. The region in which the precious stuff has most lately been found lies between Lake Couchiching and Georgian Bay in the northern part of Simcoe County. The old water plant says: Gold has been discovered in the township of Matchedash in good paying quantities. Several samples have been sent to the Ontario assay office and the results are awaited. Mr. C. W. Vanzant sent samples of ore to be tested, and received word that the ore produced from \$10 to \$30 in gold per ton. Should the find turn out as well as expected, \$300,000 will be immediately put in to work it. A number of prospectors from Toronto were sent to the township to see what they could find. They returned with the news that they had not seen anything definite from them.

TAP THE GOLD FIELDS.

Private American Enterprises May Build a Road Into Hawk Bay.

While the American railways which centre in Duluth are considering the best means of tapping the Rainy River gold fields from the state of Minnesota and sharing with the C.P.R. the trade of the region, an independent enterprise may step in and beat them out. The Rainy Lake Journal has this idea in mind when it observes: What is the matter with the mining men of Ontario taking hold and organizing a company to build a railroad from Towanog to Hibbing in this city? The Journal has positive guarantee that a narrow-gauge railroad with freight cars and a capacity of from 15 to 20 tons built on the Manitowish system, can be constructed and put in operation for half a million dollars. What is the use of waiting for the iron range, the Mississippi and what not, to give us a new business? A little united effort of our part will give us just what we want? What say you, England, Wabegon, Poley, Fredrick, Blackwood, Vary, Lums, Hollands, Whiteley, Berg and others? Let us hold a meeting immediately upon opening of the season, and build that railroad.

WABEGON GROWING.

News from the Town Which is the Manitowish County Centre.

Wabegon, the distributing point of the Manitowish county, seems to be growing. The building industry is active, and work is going on day and night, and has a great amount of work ahead. Contracts have been let for over a hundred houses, and to be started within the next ten days, among which is a large two-story building for the Wabegon Hotel, and a number of other buildings. The town is now on the newly surveyed street lines, and which has been the haven for the prospectors, and all matters relating to the town for the past two years.

Mr. W. H. Leitch, of Toronto, and Mr. S. Downing of Port Arthur, have purchased lots, and will start the erection of a block on King-street on a stone foundation, which they purpose starting a wholesale business. Other local arrivals are Alex. Harvie of Toronto, architect, and F. J. Johnson of Sarabia, who are taking up homes.

Mr. James McLaughlin of Winnipeg is building two steam trigs for W. P. Johnston of Neepawa. They are for use on Wabegon and Manitowish lakes, and cost about \$20,000 each. Mr. McLaughlin has the one he is constructing at Wabegon ready for the machinery, and will leave for the Manitowish as soon as navigation opens, where he will construct the other boat.

There is a fear that the Port Frances mail carriers, who left Wabegon Saturday before last by the ice route, are probably drowned. Their dig was found on Monday, and a camp at which they were to call on Sunday was not reached by them. The bodies of the men were since arrived at Wabegon, and report that they had not reached the camp when they left Monday morning. The names of the men are John Crowe and Paul Girard. A search party has been sent.

British Association and Mining.

The following was yesterday handed by Mr. G. T. Veale to Dr. McCullin: To the chairman of the Toronto Local Executive Committee of the British Association for the Advancement of Science.

We the undersigned respectfully sub-

mit to your committee the following request, namely: That some mine-owners, prospectors, practical mine prospectors, and assayers be placed on your committee in order that the proper interests of the important and rapidly increasing mining industry of Canada should be fully laid before the association at the forthcoming meeting; and that a certain special section of the association should be formed for the purpose of studying and illustrating the facts of the mining resources of the Dominion of Canada, and that this section should meet every day during its session.

There are upwards of sixty three mine-owners, prospectors, practical mine prospectors and assayers in reply that he will place himself at the disposal of the committee; and he, as well as the Mayor, is in accord with the suggestions, although nothing has been done.

One way to an accomplishment of the above would be for all the mine-owners to subscribe by becoming members of the association when no doubt the matter will be considered by the local committee at a meeting.

THREE DISSIDENTING VOICES

From Principal Cavenre Sunday Cars.

REV. MR. JORDAN'S POSITION

He Would Not Bind the Consciences of the Members.

Save the People Understanding the Matter Thoroughly and Should be Able to Give an Intelligent Vote Without Prejudice—Committee on Church Life and Work Objects to Sunday Closing Question of the Site for the New St. Paul's Church.

The proceedings of the Toronto Presbytery in Knox Church yesterday were held in two respects. The first had relation to Sunday cars and the second to Sunday closing.

Principal Cavenre moved a resolution on the issue of the platform of the Anti-Sunday Car Association. This was adopted and supported by Drs. McTavish and Parsons.

Rev. Louis Jordan of St. James' square church, objected to the resolution, as the Presbytery had no authority to bind those who were not present, and he would prefer that the people cast their vote without any prejudice in the matter.

The resolution carried with three dissentients.

On the matter of Sunday closing, the Presbytery voted to support the Anti-Sunday Car Association, and to urge that the peace and quietude of the Sabbath be disturbed by the visit of Sunday locomotion is certainly not popular with Toronto Presbyterians.

Rev. Principal Cavenre introduced the following resolution re Sunday cars: "Resolved, That the Presbytery at its present time to review its testimony to the great importance of properly observing the Lord's day, in the goodness of God this day has been appointed and set apart for purposes of rest and worship, and nothing which unnecessarily interferes with these ends should be permitted to be introduced into the service of the church."

With reference to the proposed to establish a street car service in Toronto on the Sabbath, the Presbytery voted to advise that such service would be proved to the satisfaction of the Presbytery, and that the real interests of the people must not receive the sanction or countenance of Christian people.

The Presbytery also considered, having fully considered the issues involved, and having heard the members and adherents of its congregations, in respect of their duty in relation to the Lord's day, and in relation to the proposed street car service on the Sabbath, to express their faithful to bear their part in endeavoring to defeat a proposal which would be a violation of the Sabbath, and to urge that the Sabbath be observed in its sanctity and quietude of the Christian Sabbath."
