



The accident took place about 3 o'clock in the morning, but he could see LeBlanc in the water. The crew lowered a boat, but the captain said it was no use looking for him as he had sunk.

The inquest was adjourned to Sept. 4 to get the testimony of Captain Powell. LeBlanc belonged to Richibucto.


