





(Charlottetown Guardian.) In midwinter, when the toy icebreakers are fast among the bergs and the 'ten thousand billion tons of ice "o' which Captain Read has told us, there is still a way of occasional escape from Prince Edward Island by the way of the Capes as "strap passengers." It is by the grace of the government of Canada that we enjoy this exalted privilege. It is a Government service. The Government owns the amphibious boats, shol with rumners and equipped with sails, cars and-straps. And these straps are a, badge and yoke of servitude as we shall see. For in these straps men do the work of beats of burden and literally bow their necks to the yoke—the Government yoke. It ought to be meutioned also that this is an interprovincial service. It is, in fact for weeks, and sometimes for months at a time, the sole means of conveyance for both mails and passengers between this Province and other Provinces of Canada. It has been so during all the thirty-three years that the Island has been a member of the happy and properous Dominion family.




