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PROSPECTUS FOR THE YEAR 1878-9.

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STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE

Has been founded to provide for the higher education of Protestant youths of both sexes. While owned by the Methodist Church of Canada, other denominations are represented upon its Boards of Management and Instruction. Its influence is designed to be positively *Christian, Evangelical, Non-Sectarian*. Religious preferences of parents are respected. The Principal and most of the teachers reside in the building, and over all entrusted to their care, patrons may rest assured the most conscientious guardianship will be exercised.

The College has been in operation since Jan. 1874. From the first it has taken a high rank among the educational institutions of the country. During the past year, its previous favorable reputation for thoroughness of instruction has been more than sustained.

Stanstead as a site for such an institution, is unquestionably unsurpassed in regard either to salubrity, or to charming and varied scenery, while its rare natural advantages are supplemented by art and culture. Owl's Head, Mons *Elephantis*, Mount Orford, etc., form a panorama of peerless beauty.

The building is an elegant and substantial structure 142x52 feet with a wing 37x42 feet. The spacious rooms are well lighted, heated and ventilated. The portion of the building occupied by the ladies and gentlemen, are completely separated by apartments of members of the Faculty, the internal arrangements being designed to secure the harmonious and effective supervision of all that relates to the educational and moral control of the students.

COURSES OF STUDY.

I. The Common English Course affords a thorough common English education, and forms the foundation of the higher courses.

II. The Academic, besides including the branches of the Common English Course in higher classes, embraces many more advanced subjects.

III. The College Preparatory, prepares young men to matriculate in the Universities.

IV. The Commercial imparts thorough instruction in all the branches usually taught in first-class Business Colleges, with the important additional advantage of affording the student access to classes in other Departments, which exclusively Commercial Colleges do not provide.

V. The Ladies' Collegiate.—(I) A three years course in English, embracing Rhetoric, Composition, English Literature, Elocution, Elements of Criticism, History, Natural Sciences, Mental and Moral Philosophy and Mathematics. (II) A four years course, including the same branches as the three years course, with any two of the following languages: Latin, Greek, German, French, Italian.

VI. FINE ARTS.—Thorough instruction by distinguished Masters is afforded in Vocal and Instrumental Music, Painting and Drawing. Provision is made for lessons in various ornamental branches.

PROF. FASOLT is retained as Director of the Department of Music. During the past year the enviable reputation of this Department for excellence and thoroughness of instruction, has been more than maintained.

Prof. Fasolt was engaged upon the recommendation of Dr. E. Tourjee, and has taught for many years with great success in the Musical Conservatories in Berlin, New York, and other institutions of high rank. It is believed that no other school in the country affords facilities for the study of Music superior to those provided by Stanstead Wesleyan College.

HONORS OF THE INSTITUTION.

The Degree of Mistress of English Literature is awarded to Ladies completing satisfactorily the above Three Years Course. The Degree of Mistress of Liberal Learning is awarded to Ladies completing satisfactorily the above Four Years Course. Diplomas are granted to graduates of the Commercial Department. Certificates are awarded to students passing satisfactory examinations in lower or partial courses of study.

EXPENSES.

Board with furnished room and fuel, \$2.50 per week. Light and washing 50 cents extra. Discount of 15 per cent. to children of ministers and young men preparing for the Christian Ministry. Special reduction made to others, if two or more pupils of the same family attend. Boarders must provide their own table napkins.
