



Address of the Birk Session.

Brethren,—As your servants in the work of the Lord, and your fellow-laborers, to whom has been committed the oversight of the congregation, we greet you, at the close of another year, with recognition of God's past goodness, rich, though undeserved, and with hopefulness as we look forward on the ever increasing work of our congregation.

That the spiritual life of the Church is far below that which we desire to see manifested in all our lives, we are compelled to confess, and yet we rejoice in evidences, not a few, of a growing devotion on the part of many to the cause of our King, and of a recognition of the privileges of Christian service and sacrifice.

The increasing prosperity of the organizations within the Church, deepening interest in the Sabbath Schools and prayer meetings, fidelity and earnestness on the part of those leading our service of praise, and the larger liberality of many of our members, are causes for gratitude to God; the response of the congregation to the appeal for help for famine-sufferers in India, a response in which we were all so nobly led by one or two of our members, is worthy of special note; the general character of that offering was one of its most pleasing features.

The development of the Pottersburg Mission into a flourishing congregation, under the earnest labors of Rev. George Gilmore, is a marked feature of Church extension, in which our congregation has had a special share; our branches are multiplying, and still the parent stem grows stronger.

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We record, with sorrow, the loss sustained by the Church on earth through the death of our well beloved senior elder, Mr. William Stevely, whose long and unselfish service for the congregation can never be forgotten; that service was to himself a delight and to us a blessing. The Session has further suffered during the year by the loss, for a time, of the services of our efficient Clerk, Mr. C. R. Somerville, whose long illness caused sorrow in the whole congregation; we rejoice with him in the prospect of recovery and of his early return to us.

To all the families of the congregation, into which sorrow and bereavement have come, we offer tenderest sympathy, commending them to the grace of the God of all comfort, whose mercies fail not.

The statistics of the membership of the congregation will appear in an appended statement. We take this opportunity of appealing to Church members for a still more evident and earnest appreciation of the sacraments of the Church; carelessness with regard to the Lord's supper and the sacrament of Baptism can only be a sign of spiritual declension.

At the beginning of a new year we summon you, with ourselves, to prayer. The Spirit of the Lord is not straitened; let us cry for the early and the latter rain, and let us purify ourselves from every uncleanness; God shall yet be enquired of by us Brethren, pray! "The Church converteth the whole world by blood and prayer."

Report of the Managers.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church:

The Managers beg to submit herewith their fortyseventh Annual Report, together with the Treasurer's Statement duly audited.

With the deepest regret your Managers would record the death of the Chairman of the Improvement Committee, Dr. J. H Gardiner, a man of kindly heart and sterling integrity. He had served on the Board for many years with marked ability, and was at all times willing to give time and money to help forward any good cause. His death is a decided loss to the community at large, and more especially to Saint Andrew's Congregation.

In February an appeal was made to the congregation on behalf of the sufferers by famine in India. The congregation responded nobly, and the very large sum of \$1,400 was contributed, and at once forwarded to Rev. Dr. Warden, and by him cabled to India to be distributed by the officers of our Church there.

The ordinary revenue for the year shows a very slight increase over that of 1896, as follows:

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The net expenditure for the year on the Oxford Street and Pottersburg Missions was \$936.38. When these missions were assumed by the congregation, it was shown that a small general increase in contributions would be necessary. Though some have responded, yet the increase has not been general or in proportion to the extra expense.

The ordinary expenses have been kept as low as possible, yet the Managers regret to have to report a small deficit for the year. If all the work in which our congregation is at present engaged is to be carried on successfully, it is absolutely necessary that the contributions should be increased, and if the congregation would but contribute \$10.00 per Sabbath more, the deficit would be changed into a surplus.

During the year many applications for pews have had to be refused owing to the crowded condition of the church. On very few of the pews are there only one name, and on a great many there are three, four, and even five names. This means that all the members of the family cannot come to church at once, and even then the younger members are sent to the gallery; the dividing of the family in this way is a very undesirable feature.

In May last your Managers, seeing that certain repairs were necessary, and believing it unwise to spend money on the church in its present condition, after much deliberation had estimates prepared for a new Sabbath School and some improvements, &c., to the church. Finally, the result of the Managers' efforts were submitted to a special meeting of the congregation; at that meeting a committee was appointed to deal with the whole question and report at the annual meeting.

The estimated expenses for 1898 are as follows: Salaries, \$4,025; interest, \$300; light, water and coal, \$500;

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printing, \$250; Sabbath Schools, \$400; taxes, \$225; sundries, \$400; Service of Praise, \$400; grant to Pottersburg, \$500; total, \$7,000

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Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

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The Annual Meeting of St. Andrew's Presbyterian congregation was held in the church Wednesday evening, January 19, 1898.

The meeting was opened with devotional exercises by the Pastor, assisted by the Rev. Archibald Stewart

Rev Robert Johnston, B.D., the Pastor, occupied the chair, and Mr J. Gordon McIntosh acted as Secretary.

The Chairman read the letter from the Session, a copy of which will be found in the printed annual report.

The Minutes of the Annual Meeting of January 20th, 1897, as printed, were confirmed, and the Minutes of meetings of February 10th and September 1st were read and confirmed.

Moved by Mr. G W. Armstrong, seconded by Mr. H. H. Wallace, "That the report of the Managers be received and considered."

Mr. Jas Houston, the Chairman of the Board of Managers, then read the report and moved its adoption. Mr. M. H Rowland seconded it.

Moved by Mr. Alex. Tytler, "That the item of \$400 in the estimates for Service of Praise be struck out.

Moved by Mr. G. M. Anderson, seconded by Mr. James Mills, "That a sum not exceeding \$800 be granted for the expenses of the Organist and the Choir." Lost.

The report, as submitted by the Managers, was then put to the meeting and adopted.

Moved by Mr. M. H. Rowland, seconded by Mr. F. G. Rumball, and carried, "That this meeting now proceed to the election of Managers."

The Chairman of the Board of Managers then appointed Messrs. J. W. McIntosh and O. B. Leslie from

that Board, and the congregation, by motion of Messrs. H. H. Wallace and James Gillean, appointed Messrs James Cowan and Geo. W. Armstrong.

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The Nominating Committee then withdrew.

A vote of thanks was unanimously passed to the Choir and the Ushers for their services during the past year.

Moved by Mr. James Mills, seconded by Mr. T. H. Purdom, "That as Mr. Crawford, the janitor of the church, is in poor health, the Managers be recommended to pay for any necessary assistance." Carried.

Mr F. W. Merchant, M.A., and Mr. C. R. Somerville were re appointed auditors, with many thanks for past services.

Moved by Mr. A. Gillean, seconded by Mr. D. Fraser, "That Mr. J Gordon McIntosh be re-appointed Secretary-Treasurer at the same salary as last year." Carried.

The Nominating Committee submitted the following names: James Cowan, James McSween, Alex Gillean, Alex Purdom Samuel Wright, James Smith, M. H. Rowland, Samuel Stevely, A. G. Chisholm and Francis Love.

Mr. Love asked that his name be withdrawn.

Mr. J. Gillespie Jones was nominated by Mr. James Houston and Mr. John Lochead.

The Nominating Committee were appointed scrutineers, and on a ballot being taken the following gentlemen were declared elected: James Cowan, James McSween, Alex. Gillean, Samuel Stevely, Alex. Purdom, M. H. Rowland, James Smith.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH IMPROVEMENT.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church:

Your Committee having, in accordance with your instructions, considered carefully the whole matter of church improvement, find that:

1st The present Sabbath School accommodation is quite inadequate and unsuitable for the number of scholars in attendance and the work carried on, and that a residence for the church officer upon the premises is desirable; they therefore find that a new school building and a church officer's house are necessary, the probable cost of which will be about \$9,000.

and. The floor of the Church is inconvenient. A large part of the gallery, on account of its discomfort, yields very little revenue, and the exits of the church are insufficient; and that therefore a new inclined floor should replace the present one, the gallery should be improved, and more exits provided from the church, which, with the necessary changes, will cost about \$5,000.

3rd. They therefore recommend that the congregation authorize the raising of \$18,000, to be spent thus:

For new school building and church officer's house, \$9,000; for church renovation, \$5,000; to pay present congregational indebtedness, \$4,000.

They further recommend that subscriptions be at once secured, and that no work be commenced until an amount sufficient to cover the cost of the Sabbath School building be subscribed; that the Sabbath School building be the first work undertaken, and that the church improvement be then proceeded with.

The report was read, and its adoption was moved by Mr. John Ferguson, seconded by Mr. James Mills. Mr. F. W. Merchant, M.A., on behalf of the Committee, spoke supporting the report, he showed by the actual attendance that increased Sabbath School accommodation was absolutely necessary; some changes should be made in the interior of the church. These changes could not be made unless the congregation had a place to worship in. It was intended to finish the Sabbath School before making any alterations in the church; the money for the Sabbath School to be subscribed before the work was started, and the money for the alterations in the church was to be raised, if necessary, by a mortgage on the Sabbath School and manse, the church itself was not to be mortgaged.

After some questions had been asked and answered satisfactorily, the motion was put to the meeting and carried.

The chair was then taken by Mr. Houston.

Moved by Mr. Frank Love, seconded by Mr. G. A. McGillivray, "That the stipend of the Rev. Robert Johnston be increased by the sum of \$500 per annum."

Mr. Johnston thanked the congregation for the kind expression of appreciation, but declined to accept any increase to his stipend at present.

Moved by Mr. A S. Macgregor, seconded by Mr. G. A. McGillivray, "That the present Committee on Church Improvement appoint collectors for the Building Fund." Carried.

The meeting was closed by singing the Doxology and by a prayer.

REPORT.

In submitting the eleventh Annual Report of The King's Messengers Foreign Mission Band, we would state that the work has been carried on steadily and quietly along the lines of former years.

We held 11 meetings, with an average attendance of 22. Greatest number present any one meeting, 33; least number present at any one meeting, 12.

We are pleased to be able to report an increase in attendance over last year, 52 names having been entered upon our roll; although some of this number will not be with us in 1898, yet we know that they will still be engaged in the work in other parts of the vineyard.

It also affords us much pleasure to state that our financial standing is better than previous years, as will be seen as we proceed.

Our programme committees arranged the different meetings, and very edifying and interesting have been our talks and readings on the different subjects assigned for special consideration.

Lives of noted men who spent their lives in the cause of missions have also been studied.

In order to secure the more regular attendance of members, we divided the Band into five sections, each section presided over by different members, who undertook to look after absentees

We also divided it into two sections with the Vice-Presidents as leaders, with the object in view of creating a wholesome rivalry in our midst as to which side would secure the greater number of new members.

This plan, we are sorry to say, did not meet our ex-

pectations.

Rev. Wm. Patterson, of Toronto, lectured on our behalf, March 22nd, on "Our Work and How To Do It," and the proceeds of this lecture amounted to \$16.60.

Mrs. Johnston kindly was present at our April meeting and gave a very edifying talk, taking as her theme the words, "Pass It On," from which many rich lessons were derived.

Our Honorary President, Mrs. Murray, was with us at our May meeting, and gave a Bible reading on "The Winning of Souls." Mrs. Murray also read a letter from Miss Jean Gordon, a former member of our Band, now in the foreign field of India. We were very glad to hear that Miss Gordon was well and that in the near future we may be privileged to welcome her among us again for a much-needed rest.

Our part in providing for the North-west Box this year was to furnish clothing for a boy of six years of age. Materials for this purpose were bought, and a deserving person was given the work of making them over. But do not go away with the idea that we had everything made for us; this labor of love was shared by our own members also, as some well made garments and other comforts testified. Others supplied money for the purchase of necessary articles, and our box was valued at \$27.00.

At our Thank-offering meeting in October we realized \$22.51.

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On November 5th Mr. R. A. Little kindly lectured for us on "Socrates in Athens," but a very disagreeable night told sadly on our audience, and consequently on the collection, which amounted to \$6.41.

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Total amount collected during the year from all sources, \$112 13.

And now another year with its mysteries awaits us; let us press onward, hoping for still greater things, and may each of us try to weave in with the days of 1898, messages of love and encouragement to those we meet in our daily walks of life; thus showing that not only in name but in deed we are Messengers of the King.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT FOR 1897.

The work of the Sabbath School transcends in importance all other departments of Church work. It is in the Sabbath School that the Truth as it is in Christ is implanted in the young heart. Scholars and teachers are anxiously waiting to prove by their increased efforts and devotion to this all-important work that the confidence placed in them will not be misplaced, and that whatever sacrifice the congregation makes in behalf of the Sabbath School will be amply justified by results. A call comes up from fifty unselfish devoted workers to the congregation, to provide them only with a place in which to do their work satisfactorily to themselves and to those under their charge, to the honor and glory of Him who hath done so much for us.

Through the kindness of numerous friends, who have generously given special contributions amounting to \$79.25, the library has been increased by the handsome addi-

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heir on s in tion of 147 new books. Friends of the school will recognize the necessity for a good library on learning that an average of about 150 books are taken out each week to be read. The management of our library, under the superintendency of Mr. S. J. Radcliffe and his able assistants, can scarcely be too highly commended.

The secretary of our School, Mr. G. A. Mathewson, and his assistants, though working under great disadvantages owing to lack of proper quarters and facilities for doing their work, have performed their duties in a most praiseworthy manner.

I cannot in words express my deep sense of gratitude to the teachers and all other workers for their generous support and unfailing sympathy amid all my efforts to serve the school. Our united prayer has ever been that the whole school might be united together by the cords of Christ's love, and our prayer has been abundantly answered.

The number of teachers and officers on roll is 16; scholars, 150; total, 166; average attendance, 124; collections, \$82.09; grant to Home and Foreign Missions, \$40.

of Mrs. (Rev. J. A.) Murray.

We acknowledge with thanks the donation of \$100.00 from Mr Thos. Kent, a bequest from the estate of the late Mrs Kent, which was handed to Mrs. Murray for the use of the school.

Our schoolhouse is in need of considerable repairs, , and steps should be taken at once to put it in proper shape.
