#### British Plantation Rubber Is Saving Canada Millions Low Prices of Rubbers and Overshoes

Due to Britain's Control of Situation

Here in Canada many of us have fallen into the truly Anglo-Saxon habit of considering the "Mother of Parliaments" slow and a bit behind the times. The present price of rubber, when its cause is revealed, affords one of the many proofs that such an opinion

Neutrals have been allowed all the rubber they want, at prices actually lower than before the war, so long as they prevent any of it from reaching the enemy, while Canada and other parts of the Empire have an abundant supply at equally favorable Government-regulated prices.

In this foresight and generosity of the British Government lies the reason why rubber alone, of all the great staples, has not gone up in price—why rubbers and overshoes, in spite of increased cost of fabric, chemicals and labor, are as inexpensive as ever, while shoes are costing several dollars a pair more. Wearing rubbers or overshoes through this winter to protect these expensive shoes is more than practical thrift—it is grateful patriotism, for in thus saving leather we make it easier for the Government to secure the absolutely necessary supplies of this alarmingly scarce material for our soldiers.

METAL OF MEN IS TEST

Sahara, the dust-swept deserts of Gobi, seem fair in comparison with this region of the Somme.

My throat is parched, my eyes seem to be bleeding though I have been walking but half an hour, picking my way through shell craters and upturned soil, jumping across abandoned German trenches, through a terrain littered with unexploded shells of all calibres and kinds. Here lies an innocent-looking little "Mihs" bomb, not much larger than a duck's egg. The man who threw it forgot to pull out the cotter-pin, so that it did not go off. Here it lies, apparently harmless, yet it has the potential strength to blow half a platoon into "Kingdom Come." Next to it lies what looks like a giant's dumb-bell. The great iron balls at each end are larger than a man's head. I spurt forward instinctively as I trip against the connecting bar of the bomb. Nothing happens. Yet this mighty engine of war can wipe out a company.

Shooting Down Balloons.

The days when British batteries when call intered in starvation rations, when ten rounds were allotted to a gun and the German howitzers could pound British trenches with impunity. Now, for every shell case empty, a new one is waiting to take its place.

New German Guns.

And yet, as a gunner said to me, for every shell in hand we still need two new ones, and we know we will get them. For the Germans have in no way slackened their fire. On the contrary, they have brought new big guns and are still answering almost shell for shell to the British fire. Yet there is something aggressive in the British cannon roar which proclaims to all who would hear that the day of smashing, superiority is at hand.

We pass through long lines of German trenches, recently captured. They are nine feet deep, with walls held up by wattles and meshed wire. The floors are of latticed wood, braced two feet above the surface soil of the trench bottom.







# Don't be put off THE BI-LINGUAL DECISION (Toronto Star.) The first point to be noted in the judgment of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in the bilingual case is that it is a vindication of provincial rights, or of provincial authority. Generally, the provinces have exclusive powers over education. The Dominion has power to intervene in certain cases, but this part of the law has never worked satisfactorily. Its only effect in the Manitoba school case was to keep the question open for several years, and to introduce a troublesome controversy into Dominion polities. The attempt of the Conservative government to restore separate schools in Manitoba was one of the causes of its disruption and downfall. Finally, the province was allowed to settle the matter in its own way. The vindication of the authority of Ontario is not a matter merely of provincial pride. It promotes educational efficiency and it promotes peace. Efficiency would be impaired by outside interference, and that kind of interference is likely also to produce ill-will and friction. Ontario would not take kindly to any interference, to any suggestion even, by the province of Quebec, and Quebec would be equaly jealous of any interference on the part of Ontario. So long as the bilingual question here is purely an Ontario question, it can be considered mainly on educational

It is personal magnetism of a high quality, and all the more remarkable because the man himself lacks (if I can trust my informants ) any of that refinement of feature or character which usment of feature or character which usually accompanies a really magnetic individual. He has will power, no doubt, but that is oftener a quality consciously exercised. His influence on his staff and his men on all those who are in his neighborhood, is, as I gather, not consciously exercised. It is an effortless influence, and therefore in a captain all the more valuable. And yet, because it is a personal magnetism, unconsciously exercised. a personal magnetism, unconsciously exercised, it appears not to be communicable. He can inspire his officers and his men, but he cannot send his officers to inspire the men in the west. Independent of Interests,

Hindenburg is not without his critics. For if, as I admit, his name works miracles among the troops and among the ordinary population (I can speak at any rate for Saxony and the south), I found that in Berlin and to some extent also in Frankfort men of high standing shook their heads.

You must remember that one reason why Hindenburg is so popular with the "veering crowds" is that they believe him, as he believes himself, entirely independent of any but military considerations. People have suspected that England has been spared for this reason or that, reasons political, commercial, or financial. They have believed that the Zeppelins and submarines could "bring England to her knees," but that the Kaiser has been too much under the influence of Bailin and other financiers and business men and has been swayed by them to admit of some hesitancy in the use of "Germany's deadliest weapons." I need not tell you that the old aristocracy, who before the war hated as they feared the Kaiser's new "aristocracy of commerce" (you remember how he said "Germany's diplomacy must become commercialized") were the first to hint that the "Bailin crowd" were too much in the counsel of the Sovereign.
