GIRL STUDENT DIES OF BURNS

Knocked Over Lamp While At Studies

Planned to be Missionary

Was Daughter of Rev. Dr. Smith, Former Missionary in China—Street of French City Scene of Tragedy, Girl Shoots Sister

Kingston, Ont., April 11.—Miss Lulu Smith, of Glenora, student at Queens University, died this morning from burns received at the Y. W. C. A. residence last night. She had been studying and when about to retire, knocked over her lamp.

Her room mate beat out the blaze, but the girl was fearfully burned. She was a daughter of Rev. Dr. Smith of Glenora, former missionary of the Presbyterian church in China, and had intended devoting her life to mission work in the Celestial empire, where she was born twenty-one years ago.

Nantes, France, April 11.—A sensation shooting affair in which a young society woman was probably mortally wounded by her sister caused tremendous excitement today.

After upbraiding her sister for causing a scandal in the family, she suddenly drew a revolver from her maid and began firing at her sister. An immense crowd gathered and threatened to lynch the shooter, but she was rescued by the police and arrested. Miss Genevieve was taken to the hospital dying.

At the police station Mart, who is thirty years old, made reference to the recent killing of Gaston Calmette by Mme. Caillaux in Paris and the authorities believe she was influenced by that tragedy.

Emo, Ont., April 11.—Late yesterday afternoon, at Berwick Station, west of Emo, on the Canadian Northern Railway, four men tried to cross the railway in a small canoe, in a heavy wind storm. Carl Haglund, Erik Erickson and Albert Ewert were drowned. George Smart was rescued.

DOCTOR NEVE LOSES CAR

Dr. F. H. Neve had the misfortune to lose his McLaughlin Buick automobile which blew up about two o'clock this morning. The doctor was taking Dr. Macaulay and Frank Munroe and other friends to their homes when the car stopped in front of Joshua Cowan's house in Douglas avenue. While trying to get the machine started again an explosion occurred and the car was destroyed. The chemical engine was called out to extinguish the fire. The car cost \$1,000 when new and was insured for \$1,000. Extensive repairs were made to the machine a few weeks ago.

SEAL STEAMER LOST IN NEWFOUNDLAND WATERS



THE SOUTHERN CROSS IN BATTLE HARBOR, LABRADOR

After days of anxious and exhaustive inquiries from all portions of the Newfoundland coast, where it was hoped the steam sealer Southern Cross might have found refuge, hope on her safety has been abandoned and she has been given up as lost, with all on board, consisting of 170 men.

There is still faith in many quarters that the Southern Cross, the stout vessel that Lieutenant Shackleton, the British explorer, used on one of his Antarctic expeditions, weathered the blizzard. No wreckage has been reported anywhere along the coast. These optimists call attention to the fact that the vessel contains a very slow vessel, able to steam only five knots under the best conditions, and that if driven far by the gale it would take her some time to work back into communication with the rest of the fleet.

C. P. R. IS MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN THE TRAIN SERVICE

Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Grant returned to the city today. The superintendent of the C. P. R. Atlantic division had been in Montreal attending a conference on the summer service, which will be come effective about May 31. It was decided not to establish a second train to Montreal this summer, but from here, but a change was made in the time of arrival and departure.

After that date the train will arrive at 11:40 instead of 12 noon, and will leave at 8:45 p.m. The Boston train will arrive in the morning and leave in the evening of Sundays as well as week days, and there will be better connection with Fredericton through the running of a morning suburban through to Fredericton Junction, leaving at 7:30 a.m. This train will connect with the train for the capital at the Junction and return to the city about 11:30 a.m.

WHAT N. B. MISSED

While potatoes are \$1 a barrel in Woodstock they are worth \$1.50 in Houlton and Presque Isle letter says: "From \$1.85 to \$1.90 is being paid for potatoes at present. The farmers are still holding on for higher prices. It is estimated that fully 3,000,000 bushels of potatoes are still in the country."

THREE BANK ROBBERS KILLED; TWO WOUNDED; 1,500 SHOTS WERE FIRED

Prince Rupert, B. C., April 11.—Three of the six bandits who robbed the Bank of Canada at New Hazelton were killed and two were seriously wounded by a posse, remaining robber escaping to the hills with the booty about \$1,000.

As the robbers started for the hills, 200 citizens followed, both sides firing as fast as they could work their guns. Just before gaining the shelter of wood two of the bandits were killed. The third was killed a little later.

The two wounded robbers struggled on for a time, but soon surrendered. None of the posse was injured. It is estimated that 1,500 shots were exchanged.

TWO STEAMERS IN

The Donaldson Line steamer Indram and the C. P. R. steamer Mount Temple arrived this morning. Officials on each boat report a rough passage with hard seas. The Indram, Captain John Teifer, docked at No. 4 berth at 2:15. She sailed from Glasgow on March 28. She brought a good cargo for St. John and will sail on Wednesday for Baltimore. Eugene McGowan a former steward of the Alban line steamer Pomeranian and who is well known in St. John is now chief steward of the Indram.

The Mount Temple, Captain R. H. McNeill, docked at No. 1 berth at 7:30 o'clock. She left London on March 20 and Antwerp on March 28. There were on board nine cabin passengers and 123 third class. She carried a large general cargo.

SAID TO BE CARLETON MAN James McCue, a woodsman, formerly of West St. John, N. B., died in a hospital in Bangor on Thursday. The hospital authorities are trying to locate relatives.

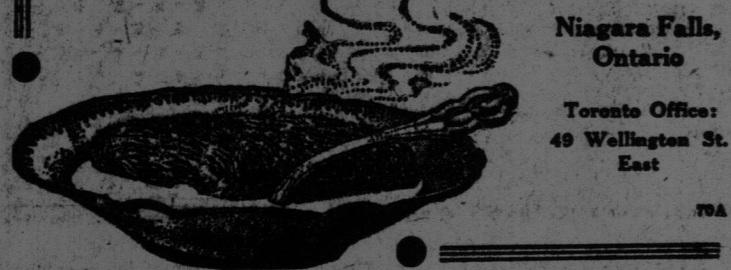

### MME. CLARA BUTT'S TRIUMPH

English Contralto Thrilled Vast Audience With Her Wonderful Voice

(Toronto Telegram)

At other times the vast audience that thronged the Massey Hall last night may have expressed an unguarded opinion that some other than Mme. Clara Butt is the world's premier contralto singer. If there were any such they will be inclined to withdraw that opinion now. The famous English singer completely enraptured her hearers with her wonderful voice, which for strength, clarity and richness, is absolutely unique. It is impossible to conceive anything so sweet and with so many varied qualities.

The programme was designed to display the beauty of her voice from every angle so to speak, the selections including themes dealing with widely different moods and varying temperaments. They ranged from the dramatic "O Don Patale" to the subdued, simple, yet inspiring old Breton air, "L'Angelus" and from the merry "Mien, Mien" to the majestic dignity of "Creation's Hymn." The rendering of Beethoven's composition was an outstanding feature of the evening's work. The extraordinary volume and grandeur of her tone was a revelation. Recalled for this brilliant effort she sang "Abide With Me," which never fails to arouse the last bit of latent enthusiasm. As an encore for her second group, which included "L'Air De Lis," "Johnnie," the fragment "B for Barney," and the martial "Women of Inver," Mme. Butt sang a new patriotic song, "March On, Canada," composed for her by Harold Craxton, the piano accompanist. It could scarcely be said that the music was inspiring, and sung by any other than Mme. Clara Butt the effect would have been disappointing when he appeared in the final duet with his wife. The comparison, however, only emphasized the wondrous power of Mme. Butt's voice.

What St. John people missed when the engagement of these singers was cancelled here may be judged from the foregoing.

### MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Miss Lillian Bayer, aged twenty-two, leaving a train at Rockingham, near Halifax on her return home from Dalhousie University, fell under the train and was beheaded.

John Krefchenko was on Thursday found guilty of the murder of H. M. Arnold of Sussex, Bank of Montreal manager at Plum Coulee, Man., and sentenced to die by hanging on July 9. He admitted being at the bank but denied the shooting. He said three men were implicated.

On the steamer Carquet, at Halifax from the West Indies via St. John, a mild case of smallpox was found. The patient, a negro freeman, was placed in hospital and the steamer fumigated.

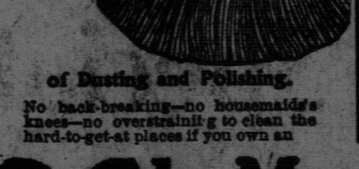

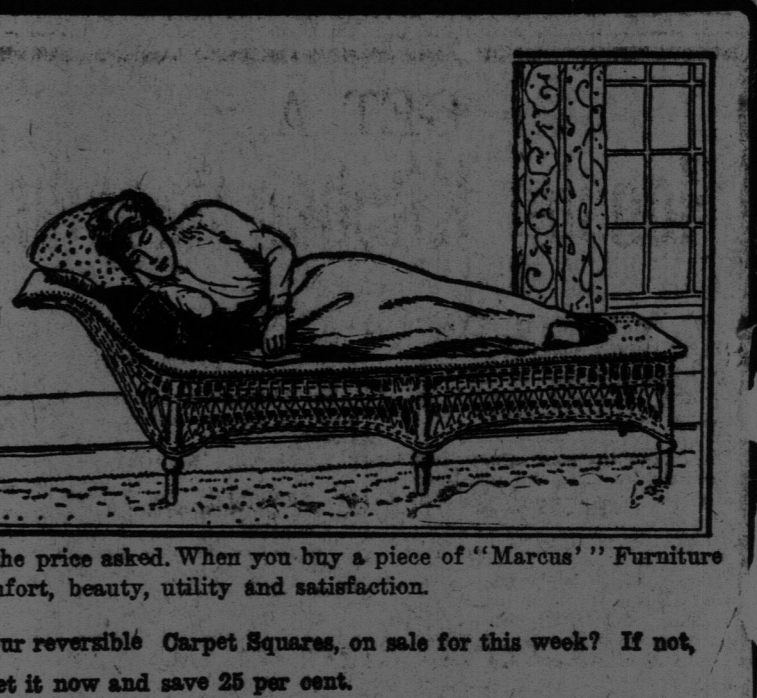

## CARLETON'S

The Bank of British North America had discouraged Real Estate speculation, which is largely blamed for the present depression. The bank, at the same time, encouraged legitimate business. The net profits for the year ending 29th November, 1913, amounted to \$689,746, which, together with balances brought forward from the previous year, made \$788,000 available for distribution. Two dividends absorbed \$388,000, and the Reserve Fund \$97,000. An appropriation of \$97,000 was made to the Bank Premises Account, and contributions were made to the various funds for the benefit of the staff, in addition to which a bonus of five per cent. was paid on their salaries.

The bank has total assets of \$62,644,000, and total deposits of \$88,200,000. Current Loans and Discounts in Canada amounted to \$28,096,000, while other current loans elsewhere than in Canada amounted to \$7,718,000. Altogether the showing is a particularly favorable one. Full particulars of the proceedings and balance sheet will be found elsewhere in this issue.

WHY THIS INDECENT HASTE?

Every member of the legislature who votes for the third reading of the Valley Railway bill next week will by that act proclaim himself unworthy of the confidence of his constituents.

To force through the house with indecent haste a government measure greatly increasing the financial obligations of the province while the government is resting under charges of the gravest character, not yet investigated, would arouse in the public mind an instant suspicion that there must be reasons for such a course which would not bear the light of day.

There is no urgency calling for the bond guarantee in advance of the investigation. That which, has waited so long can wait a little longer without in any way impeding the enterprise.

Speakers who discussed the measure in the house on Thursday night seemed to have been greatly impressed by the speech of Premier Fleming. But Premier Fleming is resting under the gravest charges ever made against a premier of this province.

It may be as well to remind the members of the house that neither Mr. F. B. Carvell, Hon. William Pugsley nor Mr. E. S. Carter is on trial, but Hon. J. K. Fleming and his colleagues, and the members of the legislature. What they have done and what they are doing are the subject of public discussion and enquiry, and upon them the judgment will be pronounced.

If these reckless partisans do jam the measure through, it will be the plain duty of the lieutenant-governor to administer such a rebuke as will be a warning to all future legislators that the representatives of the people should also be the guardians of the public honor.

THE ST. JOHN MEMBERS.

St. John people not only read with amazement yesterday that the Valley Railway bond guarantee had again been brought before the legislature on Thursday night, but that Messrs. Baxter, Tilley, Grannan and Lockhart were among those who boldly advocated rushing the measure through in advance of the enquiry into the charges made by Mr. Dugal.

The St. John Valley Railway must be constructed. It must be built from St. John to Grand Falls as originally intended. It must be connected with the Transcontinental to give that line easy access to terminals at Courtenay Bay.

The St. John members of the legislature should be able to explain to their constituents during the Easter holidays all about the foreshores bill.

There is as yet no guarantee that the dominion government will assume the cost of the bridges across the St. John and Kennebecasis rivers. We have only the announcement that members of the Borden government gave certain assurances to two members of the New Brunswick legislature.

NO BACKWARD STEPS.

Every gain for tax reform in western Canada has been a permanent gain. Some of these gains may have seemed trifling to those who work for the full measure of single tax. Be that as it may, the recognition of the principle even in a small measure is important. But one feature that is specially encouraging is the fact that wherever any advance has been made, there has never been any disposition to turn back.

The one overwhelming answer to the critics of tax reform is the outstanding fact that no encouragement has been given in any quarter to any reactionary proposals. The entire tendency is forward. Many municipalities that started some years ago with a small measure of the single tax principle, such as a small reduction in the tax on improvements, are now raising their entire revenue by a single tax on land values.

Everywhere throughout the west the tendency has been forward. Never backward. The latest evidence of popular approval for tax reform is seen in the action of the Saskatchewan provincial municipal convention, which met at Regina during the first week of March. A resolution in favor of a return to the old system of taxation for rural municipalities, was overwhelmingly voted down. Will the critics of tax reform please make a note of this.

Farm lands in Saskatchewan were formerly taxed on a flat rate of so much per acre. This was changed by act of the provincial legislature to a straight single tax on the unimproved value of land, and from this one tax all rural municipal revenue is now raised. The critics may keep on with their criticism, but nothing succeeds like success. The single tax in western Canada has come to stay. It is giving satisfaction. In a few years there will be no other form of taxation for municipal revenue purposes in these four western provinces save one tax on the unimproved value of

**Near Tragedy In Falls Today**

Tugboat Edward P. Sinks; Crew Have Thrilling Escape

**MAKE SHORE IN SMALL BOAT**

Tug Was Coming Down For Day's Work When Something Went Amis and She Quickly Went Under

The tugboat Edward P., owned and operated by the Edward Partington Pulp & Paper Co., lies at the bottom of the reversing falls, and the three members who constituted her crew had a narrow and thrilling escape from death in the waters this morning about eight o'clock when she struck the piling coming through the falls, and sank in a very few moments.

The tug had left her moorings at In-diantown and was coming through the falls for the work of the day, in charge of Captain Blanchard Ferris. She met the pitch of the tide a little distance above the bridges and it may be that her propeller struck a rock and became immovable or dropped. A large hole must have been ripped in her bottom for in a very few minutes it was seen by those on board that the water was pouring in at an alarming rate.

The crew realized the danger and quickly hoisted the small boat from the cabin-top. The three of them—Captain Ferris, Engineer John Cowie, and Wm. Legatt—managed to get away from the sinking tug-boat just a few minutes before she went down and made their way through the whirling eddies of the falls in the small boat to safety.

The Edward P. is completely out of sight beneath the falls. There is a fairly definite idea as to her location and an immediate effort will be made to have her raised. She has been used for towing purposes by the pulp company and has rendered valuable service since they purchased her about ten years ago. The tug was known as the Serena E., but after a thorough overhauling and refitting, she was so renovated as to be practically a new boat. The name was changed to Edward P. It is probable that a crew will be put to work today to raise her from her position.

The three men had a thrilling time of it. They had not a moment to spare, as they say it was only three minutes from the time the tug met with the mishap until she sank with only her mast-head showing above the surface. They could find only one ear to pull or paddle their way to shore with the grip the whirlpool it was soon smashed to pieces. With the fragments they had to steer their course to the land.

**Vote For Only Three of Them**

Here is Law Governing Election of Commissioners

**MUST STRIKE OFF 10 NAMES**

Any Ballot With More Than Three Names Left on It Will be Rejected by the Returning Officers

"Both at the primary and final elections each duly qualified voter, who is entitled to vote, may vote for one person for the office of commissioner as there are commissioners to be finally chosen." This paragraph of section six of the amended city charter, adopted 1912, definitely lays down the law regarding the number of candidates for whom each elector may vote. Under its provisions, at the coming primary election, each voter may vote for only three candidates for commissioner as there are only three vacancies to be filled.

As there are only two candidates for mayor there will be no vote for the mayorality at the primary election but only at the final election. At the final election the ballots will carry also the names of the six candidates for commissioner who stand highest in the first election and from these the electors may again vote for three.

G. Frederick Fisher, one of the candidates, has circulated copies of the official ballot with a note enclosed drawing attention to this provision of the law, for the guidance of electors who may not be familiar with the method of voting. The Standard refers to this circular, and with evident ignorance of the law, disputes its correctness and advances the theory that each elector may vote for six candidates at the primary election.

The circular is in exact conformity with the law and voters should be careful to follow these instructions. The first ballot will bear the names of the three candidates for commissioner and the voter must strike out at least ten of those for whom he does not wish to vote, leaving the names of the three for which he wishes to vote. Any ballots with more than three names left unstricken will be rejected by the returning officers.

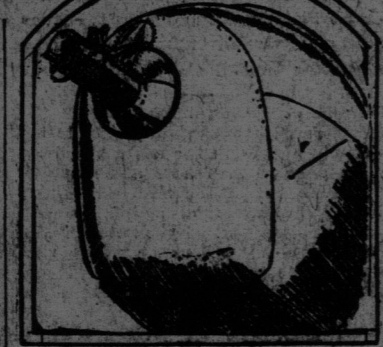

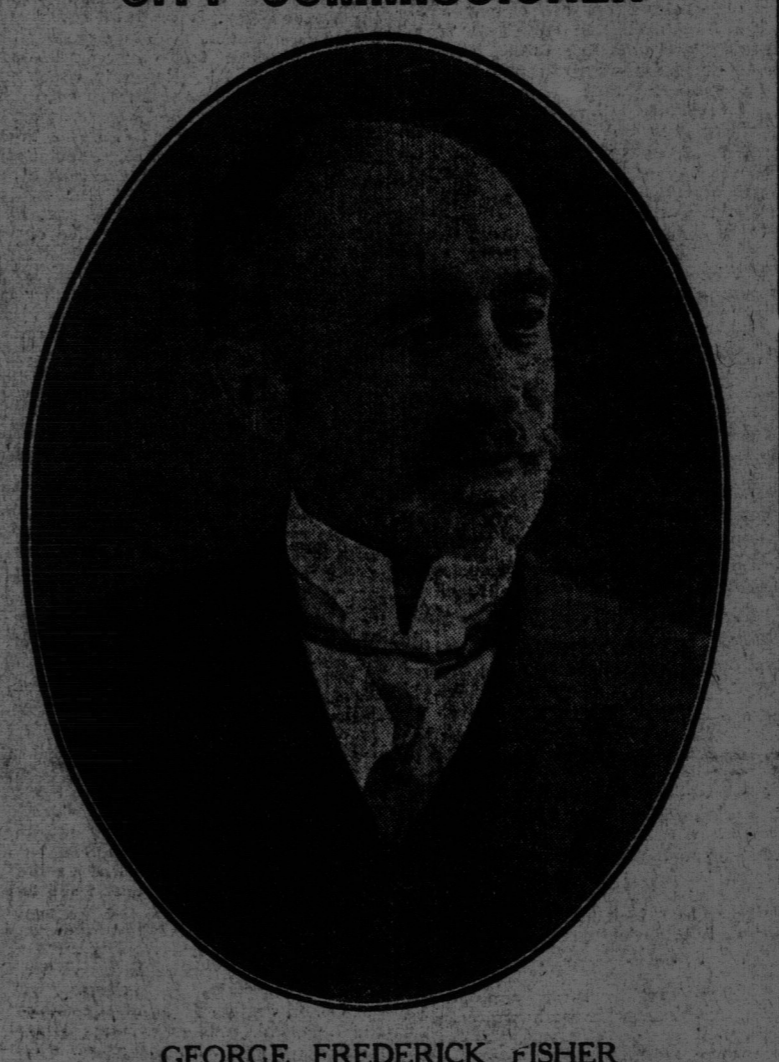

PREMIER'S DENIAL OF THE DUGAL GRAFT CHARGES

Investigation Promised—Despite This Action Valley Railway Bill Pressed to Committee Stage

Fredericton, April 10.—On Thursday afternoon before the house adjourned for the Easter recess, a denial of the Dugal charges was made by Premier Fleming through Attorney-General Clarke, and the Valley Railway bill passed through the committee stage. The house will meet again next Wednesday. It is thought likely that it will be announced then that a royal commission, preferably of judges, may be appointed to deal with the Dugal charges.

The attorney general regretted keenly, he said, that such charges had been made and he promised a complete investigation. He made a formal statement that he was authorized by James Kidd Fleming to state boldly and publicly that he denied absolutely every charge contained in the notice of motion, that he did not through the agency of W. H. Berry, chief superintendent of crown timber lands of the province the sum of \$15 per square mile over and above the amount of the bonus paid by them as set forth in the annual report of the crown land debt. There was not one word of truth in that, or in any other charge contained in the resolution, and he would be prepared to show the people the absolute falsity of such charges when the proper tribunal should have been appointed.

After the announcement regarding the investigation into the graft accusations surprise was expressed when it was seen that consideration of the Valley Railway bill to give an additional guarantee of \$10,000 per mile was to be passed through. Many members had left for their homes and there were only about seventeen present. Messrs. Stewart and Swin, of Northumberland, criticized the bill strongly, but Messrs. Tilley, Baxter, Gammann, Jones, Lockhart, White and T. J. Carter endorsed the bill. With a few slight amendments it was agreed to.

Report of the Directors of the Bank of British North America,  
Presented to the Proprietors at Their Seventy-Eighth Yearly  
General Meeting, on Tuesday, March 3rd, 1914.

In submitting the Report and Balance Sheet to the 29th November, 1913 the Court of Directors desire to point out to the Proprietors that the changes now introduced into the form of the Balance Sheet have been rendered necessary by the provisions of the Canadian Bank Act, 1913.

Mr. H. B. It gives me much pleasure to meet the shareholders, and the visit affords an opportunity which I greatly value for personal consultation with the Court of Directors regarding our various business operations.

Mr. Hoare has dealt with the affairs of the bank, and I have been requested by the Court of Directors regarding our various business operations. The year 1913 was not free from anxiety, but at the same time it was a profitable year for operations, and practically all of them show increased earnings.

The large borrowings of recent years are a matter of reflection of the continued excess of imports over exports. For the ten years ending March 31, 1913, the excess amounted to \$1,146,000,000, and of that \$448,000,000 or 41 per cent. occurred during the last two years of the period. Until a year or two ago it was easy for issues of Canadian securities to be placed in London, and it was perhaps natural that an enterprising and sanguine people should take advantage of the opportunity thus afforded to extend their investments in the Dominion.

The banks are entitled to issue increased circulation equivalent to their deposits for the time being. This is the explanation of the fact that the circulation of the bank has increased since the 30th November, 1912, and is now \$1,148,584.45. This increase is due to the fact that the bank has been able to obtain a larger amount of deposits than it has been able to issue in the form of circulation.

good value and earning power from those which do not, and will bring into the light the speculators who have embarrased themselves through real estate operations. I will now refer very briefly to general business conditions, of which I am glad to say a quite satisfactory account can be given.

In the Maritime Provinces the crops were good except the apple crop in Nova Scotia, which was disappointing. The lumber industry has, on the whole, had a fair year. The fisheries have been good, and the mining operations continuing a record year.

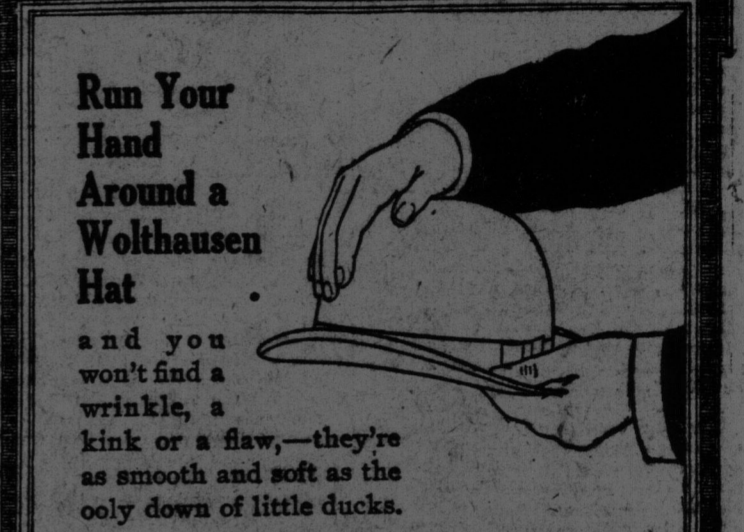
In the province of Quebec the crops were satisfactory and prices good. An exception has also to be made here in the case of fruit, especially apples, which were far below the average. In the lumber industry, logging conditions during the previous winter were not favorable, owing to the want of snow, and some logs did not reach the mills, but demand and prices were good, and the industry, upon the whole, had a satisfactory year.

In Ontario the crops were a good average and prices high. The lumber industry, while not so prosperous as in some former years, did fairly well, and in mining there was a good year with increased outputs.

In the Prairie Provinces there was an excellent crop, larger in quantity than the previous year, and of exceptionally high quality. Though prices were not quite so good as in 1912, the total value of the crop was a little ahead of that year.

Ray Bronson in the Ring No More

(FROM T. S. ANDREWS)

Milwaukee, April 7—There are few fighters who really know when to retire from the ring. Not so with Ray Bronson, an Indianapolis lightweight, who developed into a welterweight in the last year and was given credit by many writers as having a good claim to the welterweight championship. Bronson left for Australia last fall with the intention of fighting Johnny Summers, the British welterweight champion, for the world's title. I hope that you will not think I am a quitter because I am quitting the ring, but you are aware that the average boxer doesn't know when to quit and I don't intend to put myself in that class. This idea of punching a man about the head will not brighten him any and I do not intend to go in and be made a punching bag of by men whom I could have beaten in a round or two a few years ago. 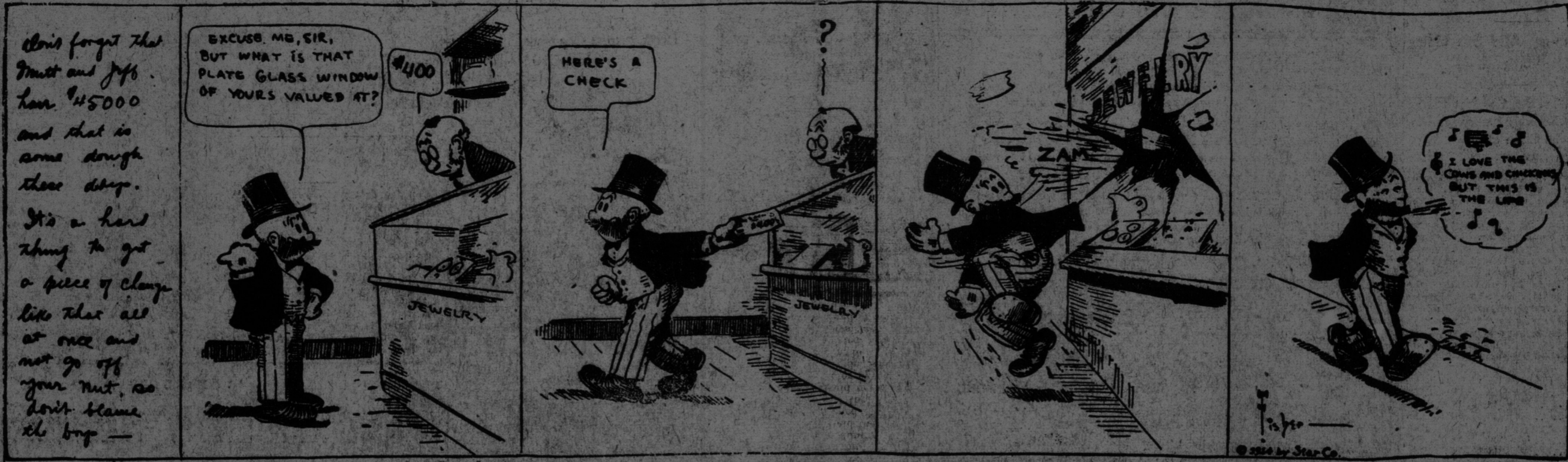

It is estimated that nearly 40,000 persons have listened to Doctor Burrows during the campaign.

**LET MILITANTS DIE**  
Life Overvalued, Says Dr. Mercier in Letter to London Times  
Dr. Charles A. Mercier, a well-known London physician, in a letter to the London Times, makes some remarkable statements in regard to the militant suffragette problem. Hunger strikers, he says, should be allowed to die if they refuse to do so.  
"Life is now over-valued. The value of society as a whole preponderates vastly over the value of any of its component parts," says Doctor Mercier, and he adds:  
"If the responsible authorities shrink from allowing criminals to inflict upon themselves the death sentence other measures can be adopted. These criminals, with the want of logic and want of humor that characterize all their proceedings, are prompt to invoke the protection and the benefits of that very law they seek to destroy. If the law had a proper regard for its own dignity, it would withdraw its protection from those who seek to degrade it."  
"They should be proclaimed outlaws, their contracts should be enforceable, they should be made incapable of taking legal proceedings of any kind, civil or criminal."

No evidence could be shown that Mr. or Mrs. Love, foster-parents of the child, had anything to do with placing the needles in the brain, but they are to be deported to the United States. It is a mystery to the physicians how the needles could be forced through the skull.

**SON OF SEVENTY SAVES CENTENARIAN MOTHER**  
Carries Her Out of Burning Home and Wheels Her in Barrow to Safety.  
London, April 11.—A calamity, the intensity of which is not to be measured by the mere record of damage done and dwellings destroyed, befell the village of Little Chesterford, in the county of Essex. Eleven homes, accommodating nearly fifty out of a total population of 100, were burnt to the ground and the laborers whose homes have thus vanished will feel the blow all the more because they earn only three dollars a week, and cottages in the country are everywhere scarce.  
Among those saved was a centenarian woman. Her son, who is seventy-three, was working in a back garden when he saw the cottages at the lower end of the street on fire. He had only time to help his mother out of bed and into the garden when the thatched roof of the house collapsed. He put his mother in a wheelbarrow and wheeled her away to safety.  
The old woman's greatest apparent regret was that she had not brought away her spectacles.

**STRIKING EXERPT FROM SERMON PREACHED BY REV. J. J. McCASKILL**  
Preparatory service was held in St. Matthews Presbyterian church on Friday evening, Rev. J. J. McCaskill preached on "The Kingdom of God Cometh Not With Observation." Luke 17:30. He said in part—  
"Formerly the church used to canonize its heroes. The modern method is to vulgarize them. Modern evangelism tends to regard contemplation as the gravest sin of which any man can be guilty. It is following the way of easy delusion and self-deception. When Arthur's knights of the Round Table were seized with a frenzy to follow the quest of the Holy Grail, the king heard their vows with a sorrowful heart for he foreboded that most of them would be lost in the quagmire and return no more. His foreboding was only too true. They followed wandering fires to their hurt.  
The decay of dogma has brought a reaction towards emotionalism, and the duty of constructing rational religion upon a sound basis is shirked for the easier way of gratifying religious feeling by antics at scholarship and blinding vulgarity. Billy Sunday states his method in this simple way: "I loaded my old muzzle-loading gospel gun with ipseca, buttermilk, rough on nails, rock salt, and whatever else came handy, and the gang has been ducking and the feathers flying ever since." He hopes it out for the Lord and pictures "the ones" for that "smooth guy" the devil Billy Sunday may be taken as a type of those who would express religion in the language of the race track and the gutter.  
The method is as taking as is the method of yellow journalism, and putting a snarl in of the barroom, over the holy things will hardly prove an effective method of building a community in righteousness. Those heavenly twins—hygiene and rationalism—have been considerably overworked in modern evangelism and they are giving the people a sorry caricature of true religion. Fearing religion up by the roots may be interesting as a form of intoxication and self-indulgence, but the reverent will always look upon it with shame. It is a triumph of cheap emotionalism over mind and morals. It is hitting below the intellect."

**EXPUL BOYS THAT SMOKE**  
Westboro, Mass., April 11.—The selectmen and school committee have joined with Superintendent Ezekiel E. Wilson of the public schools to try to stop smoking among the boys.  
The selectmen ordered Chief of Police J. Mooney to warn all the merchants against selling cigarettes to boys under eighteen years old.  
Superintendent Wilson has made a rule that all boys caught smoking during school hours will be expelled from school and cannot return until they appear before the school committee.

**Wilson for Local Option.**  
Washington, April 11.—President Wilson is in favor of local option on the liquor question and does not believe prohibition should be made a part of a party programme.
