BENNETT AND MANION SURPRISES IN CABINET ANNOUNCEMENT AT OTTAWA

Doherty and Wigmore Among Six Who go Out of Office-Former to Another Post, Yet Unnamed; Outside Position for St. John Man--Calder, Reid and Foster for Senate—Hon. J. B. M. Baxter is Minister of Customs-No Solicitor-General Yet—Dissolution Expected Tomorrow.

Ottawa, Sept 21-Right Hon Arthur Meighen, the premier, announced his new cabinet a little after nine o'clock this morning as the members of the cabinet filed out of the governor general's office where the swearing in had taken place. The cabinet as announced by Mr. Meighen is as follows:-

The prime minister had a couple of surprises—R. B. Bennett, K.C., of Calgary, succeeds Right Hon. C. J. Doherty as minister of justice, and R. J. Manion, of Fort William, becomes minister of soldiers civil re-establishment. Both of these men had been prominently mentioned but more recently it had been intimated that neither was likely to be included in the new cabinet.

AS MINIS

Six ministers—Hon, C. J. Doherty, justice; Hon, J. D. Reid, railways; Sir George Foster, minister of trade and commerce; Hon, R. W. Wigmore, minister of customs and excise; Hon, J. A. Calder, minister of immigration, and Hon, P. E. Blondin, postmaster general, have retired.

There are nine new ministers with portfolio and two without portfolio.

GREAT MEDICAL COLLEGE OPENED

Erected in Peking by Chinese Medical Board of Rockefeller Foundation.

Peking, Sept. 21—The great Peking Union Medical College, which has been erected here by the China Medical Board of the Rockefeller Foundation, was dedi-cated this week and noted scientists and medical men from many countries at-

medical men from many countries attended.

The Peking Union Medical college has been in process of erection and construction since 1915. It is the chief agency through which the Rockefeller Foundation aims to promote the progress of western medicine in China. It is an outgrowth of the Union Medical College, which was founded by the joint effort of six British and American missionary societies in 1906, after the Boxer outbreak. The China Medical Board of the coundation has assumed the full support of the college, which is chartered under he laws of the State of New York.

The purpose of the China Medical loard is to make the college a rallying oint for scientific medical training and search not only in China but through at the Far East. It will maintain conant relations with Europe and North merica through a system of visiting rofessors. Graduate students from her medical colleges are expected to sort to it. Practicing physicians and edical missionaries in China may reive from it stimulation and support. The campus of the college, which is cated near the heart of Peking and the orbidden City, was formerly the site the palace and garden of a Chinese ince.







He asked me once if it would be possible to show him the motion pictures I was making of him before I shipped them to New York. I made arrangements to do this. We rigged up a projecting room on the Prince's private car and while the pictures were being shown the Prince asked me to sit by him. He asked me lots of questions about the technical phases of moving picture work and seemed very much interested. However, I had no reason to believe that I had caught his imagination or fixed myself in his memory.

How Automobile Racing" Poisons" a Man

HEN Gaston Chevrolet climbed from his little green racing car after winning the 500-mile international sweepstakes automobile race at Indianapolis recently, after having driven steadiliy for nearly six hours at the average speed of 88.16 miles per hour, his eyes were almost lifeless. In medical phraseology they were "dead." His face was haggard and drawn. The muscles of his legs and forearms were cramped and knotted. His head dropped and his steps fal-

In fact he looked like a man who had just taken a dose of poison. And that is exactly what happened, as a writer of the Scientific American explains.

explains.

The strain of clutching the wheel of his car for more than 5 hours and 40 minutes, never once relaxing his hold or taking his eyes off the dizzy white stretch of brick pavement always ahead of his speeding machine, had caused physical fatigue equivalent to poison, for fatigue is defined as poison by prominent medical authorities. And fatigue poison is just as effective in its action as arsenic or carbolic acid. An overdose of either would be fatal.

Two photographs of Chevrolet, one taken be-fore and the other immediately after the race, tell the story of the racer's complete exhaustion. One


