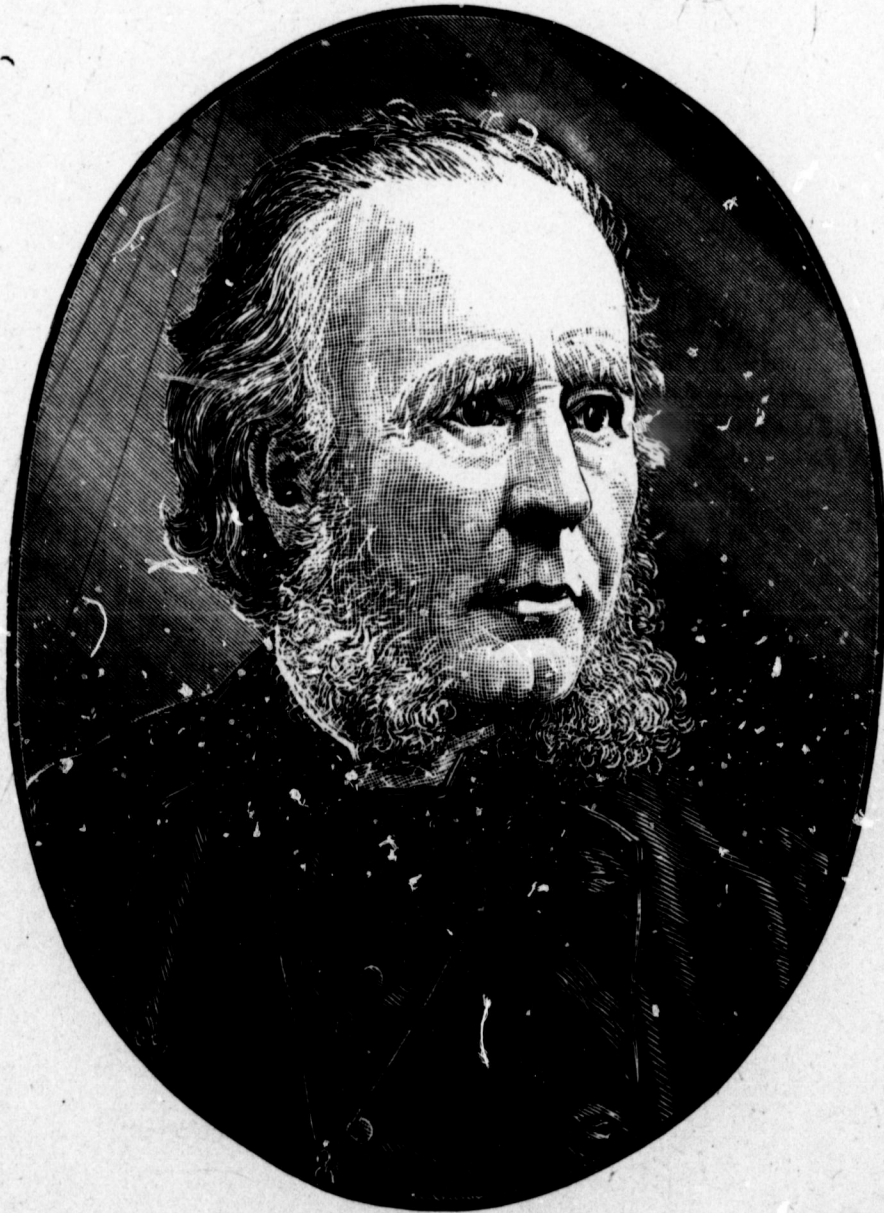

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Missionary and Benevolent Funds,

For which the General Assembly appoints collections to be made in all the congregations.

I. Home Missions:—The necessary expenditure increases every year. The continuous flow of immigration to the North-West Provinces has hitherto taxed the resources of the Western Committee to the utmost, and this year additional claims have arisen owing to the drought in certain places and floods in others by which the crops were destroyed in some districts and the people were unable to contribute for the support of ordinances as otherwise they would have done. \$79,000 are required in the West and \$13,000 in the East—\$92,000 in all, for the supply of upwards of 1000 preaching stations.

II. Augmentation of Stipends:—On the principles that the strong should help the weak, and that a settled ministry is better than casual supply, this Fund aims at the supplementing of ministers' stipends in the weaker charges so as to secure a minimum stipend of \$750 with a manse. During the past eleven years much good has been done: 155 congregations in the West and 11 in the East have by its help become self-supporting, and regular services have been maintained in many other places that can never become self-supporting. \$30,000 are wanted this year in the West, and \$9,000 in the East. The number of congregations receiving aid last year was 194.

III. French Evangelization:—The work is carried on as heretofore by the threefold means of preaching, colportage, and education. 25 ordained ministers and licentiates, 12 student missionaries, 11 colporteurs, and 22 mission day-school teachers were employed during the year. 36 mission fields with 90 stations were occupied. 160 persons were received into the Church, making a total membership of 958. There were 884 scholars in the Sabbath-schools and 830 in the day-schools: 184 attended the Pointe-aux-Trembles schools. The amount required for the current year is \$47,500.

IV. Foreign Missions:—The field is world-wide and the work of the Committees limited only by the means placed at their disposal. 37 ordained missionaries with a large staff of assistants are employed in foreign fields and among non-christian people in our own country. The estimated expenditure for the current year is \$143,000.

V. The Colleges:—None of our Theological Colleges are as yet fully endowed, but are all more or less dependant on the liberality of the congregations for their support. Altogether they require about \$25,000 per annum from the Church. The work they are doing is certainly of the highest importance.

VI. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund:—Upwards of 150 annuitants look chiefly to this fund for their support, and yet the average annuity is not more than \$150 a year.

VII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund:—93 ministers participated in the benefit of the fund last year—the average annuity being only \$180. The amount asked by the Committees this year from the congregations is \$20,000. The proposed endowment fund is hastening to completion very slowly. A few thousands given for this purpose will be a good investment and very acceptable.

VIII. The Assembly Fund:—The annual expenses of the General Assembly for printing and other purposes is about \$5,000.

The Missionary Outlook.

“The hard times,” have had the effect of lessening the contributions of the congregations during the past year, but our Home and Foreign missions. The Evangelistic work, however, of the committees has in no wise been curtailed; on the contrary, it has been enlarging. Hence the call for increased liberality during the current year.

As will be seen from the accompanying Chart, a few changes have taken place in the *personnel* of our Foreign mission staff. Miss Lucinda Graham, M.D. and Mrs. Malcolm of the Honan mission died at their posts in October last. Miss Sinclair has taken Miss Archibald's place in Trinidad. Miss McWilliams has retired from Central India and Miss Kate Campbell has gone out in her stead. Rev. S. A. Fraser has succeeded Mr. Coffin at San Fernando, and Rev. J. A. Slimmon formerly of the China Inland mission has joined the Honan Presbytery. Mr. J. J. Thompson, M. D., has entered on his work as a Missionary to the Chinese in Eastern Canada, with headquarters at Montreal.

An unprecedentedly large number of our Foreign Missionaries were home on furlough last year, mostly on account of sickness, and it is deemed best that those from China should not hasten their return during the present unsettled state of the country, which, among other misfortunes, has had the effect of intensifying in many districts the “anti-foreign sentiment,” that has not unfrequently threatened the lives of our own and other missionaries in that country. The annual reports from the various missionary fields are all of an encouraging nature. “In due season we shall reap if we faint not.”

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The Rev. Dr. Jenkins

We feel sure that many in the Congregation will be glad to see the portrait of the venerable Pastor *emeritus* of St. Paul's Church which we have inserted in this number of our year book. It is copied from a fine photograph by Notman, taken about the time of Dr. Jenkins' retirement.

Dr. Jenkins was born at Exeter, Devonshire, England, December 5th, 1813; was educated at Mount-Radford College, Exeter, and at the Wesleyan Theological Institution, Hoxton, London, (now Richmond College); a probationer in 1835; was ordained to the ministry August 6th, 1837, and appointed missionary to the Mysore, India, whence he returned, invalided, in 1842; ministered to an English congregation in Malta from 1842 to 1844, and in the western part of Cornwall, England, from 1844 to 1847; minister of St. James Street Methodist Church, Montreal, from 1847 to 1853, that year he joined the Presbyterian Church of the United States, and was minister of Calvary Presbyterian Church, Philadelphia, from 1853 to 1863; minister of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, from January, 1865, to October, 1881; Chairman of the Protestant Board of School Commissioners for the City of Montreal from 1866 to 1878, and in the year last named was elected Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; received the degree of D.D. from the University of New York in 1860, and that of LL.D. from McGill College, Montreal, in 1879, and same year became a Governor's Fellow of McGill.

It was during his ministry in the Methodist Church in Montreal, that Dr. Jenkins delivered his famous course of lectures which drew immense audiences at the time, and were afterwards published in book form under the title "A Protestant's Appeal to the Douay Bible." As stated above, Dr. Jenkins commenced his pastorate with us in January 1865; his formal induction took place in June following, as stated on page 4. It will be still fresh in the memory of many of his old friends that the last occasion on which he conducted the Sabbath services in St. Paul's Church was on the 7th of August 1887, the day which followed the completion of his fiftieth year in the ministry.

Pastoral Letter.

MY DEAR FRIENDS :—

It is my privilege to write as a preface to our annual report, a short pastoral letter. In one sentence I would like once more cordially to thank all who have helped and encouraged and cheered me in my work, and to express my great thankfulness for the unbroken harmony which continues to characterize our congregational life. In retrospect of another year, whilst it makes me grateful it also makes me humble, and I earnestly pray that I may be enabled to be more faithful to God and more helpful to you during this new year.

There are only two things to which I wish specially to allude—one regarding the temporal and the other the spiritual welfare of the congregation. For some time past there has been a debt, a debt I am sorry to say, not diminishing, but rather increasing, year by year—at the end of the year, it amounted, including the mortgage on the caretaker's house, to between ten and eleven thousand dollars. The Trustees thought that the present, with all its financial depression, was not a good time to try to raise the amount. So anxious was I, however, to see the debt removed, that I offered, with their approval, to make the effort. I did so reluctantly—it is the first time I have made an appeal for my own congregation—and I hope the necessity will never again arise : at the same time I do not regret doing it, because the kindness and cordiality manifested towards me by all whom I approached, have greatly encouraged me, and have taught me two things—one, that I have your full sympathy with me in all my work, and the other, that by diligent faithfulness I might accomplish more in Christ's service than I have hitherto done. The result of my effort is told elsewhere in the report. Owing to sickness, I was unable to see all to whom I hoped to appeal. I would ask all who are willing to aid me still to send their contributions, and if this is done, I am full of hope, that the end of 1895 will see our congregation entirely free of debt, and also the church lighted with electric light. And I would now very strongly urge upon the members of the congregation so to support the Trustees in their work that we will never need again to raise money to pay off debt.

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Last year was in one respect a sad year for us, for death took from us some of our best known and most active members. Death is always sad, but in some instances the sadness was deepened by terrible suddenness. During my holiday, one sorrow after another came—sorrows which I felt not only as a pastor, but as an intimate personal friend, for I had the privilege of knowing as close and true friends, some of those who died. We all bear upon our hearts in tender sympathy the bereaved homes. It was not all loss, we have added some beautiful memories to our heritage, and surely we have learned and laid to heart the striking lessons. Who may be called away this year, we cannot tell; it may be any of us. Oh that we could begin now to live so that come death how and when it may, it may be a going home. Under the shadow of death may we learn the deeper meaning of life, and may this year be to all of us a year of greater nearness to God, of greater loyalty to Christ, of greater good-will to one another, and of greater zeal and activity in Christian life and work.

Report of the Kirk-Session.

WE are daily reminded of the shortness and uncertainty of life, but when death comes suddenly and takes away, as with a stroke, personal friends and acquaintances who were accounted to be yet in the "prime of life" and in the height of their activity and usefulness, the familiar message seems to be addressed to us in louder tones and with added solemnity—"Be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of man cometh." Thrice during the past year beloved members of this congregation were thus removed from our earthly fellowship. Mr. James Burnett, Mr. John Murray Smith, and Mr. James Richardson died suddenly last summer. The Session recorded its sense of the loss sustained by the congregation in the death of two of those brethern in the following minute:—

"It was unanimously resolved to record in the minutes, the great

“loss sustained by the congregation through the deaths of Messrs. James Burnett and John Murray Smith, both of whom had held offices in the Church, and whose services were greatly appreciated, and whose characters were held in high esteem. Their upright lives and their general helpfulness will be long remembered. The Kirk-Session also records its deep sympathy with their sorrowing families.”

Mr. Richardson, though not an office-bearer, had been a member of this Church for many years, and was highly esteemed by all who knew him. While the record of mortality is upon the whole lighter than the average of former years, sickness and suffering have been the portion of many, to whom we tender our sincere sympathy, and especially to those who are at the present time in affliction, praying that they may be restored to health and that, meanwhile, they may be sustained by those comforts and consolations which the world cannot give and which it cannot take away.

In regard to the general work of the congregation it is not necessary to dwell at any length, as full details will be found in the reports of the respective Boards and Committees. Speaking generally, we have reason to thank God for continued goodness and mercy during the past year, and to confess with regret that we have not done so much for the advancement of His cause and kingdom as our high privileges and opportunities would warrant.

The Church services have been largely attended, but continued lack of interest on the part of many in the missionary work of the Presbyterian Church in Canada is a matter of deep regret to the

Kirk-Session, and it is their earnest desire that every member and adherent of the congregation might see their way to contribute,—“not grudgingly or of necessity”—but cheerfully and systematically—each according to his ability—for the spread of the Gospel at home and abroad. “There is that scattereth and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty.”

In accordance with a petition from the congregation of Victoria Church, a legal transfer was made to them in September last of the Church property at Point St. Charles, with certain specified conditions. The new congregation, as will be seen from Mr. Larmonth's excellent report, is in a flourishing condition, and St. Paul's continues to manifest its interest in it by a liberal annual contribution towards the minister's stipend.

During the pastor's absence in the month of July, the Sabbath services were conducted most acceptably by Rev. T. W. Winfield, chaplain to his Excellency the Governor-General. While residing in Montreal, this winter, the Vice-regal family worshipped regularly with us and joined with us in the sacrament of the Lord's supper; two of the young members of the family—Lord Haddo and Lady Majorie Gordon being communicants for the first time.

It may be mentioned that the late Mr. James Burnett in his last Will and Testament left as a legacy the yearly interest of one thousand dollars to be paid to the minister for the benefit of the poor of the congregation. We trust that his example may lead others to do likewise. The revenue from the Christie legacy was this year, in conformity with the expressed wishes of the testator, given towards the support of a theological student attending the Presbyterian College, Montreal. The Ladies Aid Society kindly presented very handsome copies of the Bible for the pulpit and Lecture Hall of the Church respectively.

No less than four members of the Kirk-Session visited Dr. Jenkins last summer in his retirement at West Dulwich, near London. Dr. Jenkins was then in the enjoyment of good health and impressed each of his visitors with the conviction that he continues to take a very deep interest in every thing pertaining to the welfare of St. Paul's congregation—whose faithful minister he was for more than sixteen years.

The Annual Meeting.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church held within the school-room of the church on Monday, the 21st day of January, 1895, at 8 o'clock, p.m.

The Rev. Dr. Barclay was called to the chair, and Mr. W. W. Watson was requested to act as Secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the last annual meeting of the 22nd January, 1894, having been printed and circulated among the congregation, were taken as read and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees and the Treasurer's statement of the financial affairs of the church for the year ending 31st ult., having been distributed amongst those present were taken as read.

On the motion of the Chairman, seconded by Mr. A. F. Riddell, it was unanimously resolved :

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting be printed for circulation among the members of the congregation.

It was moved by Mr. Tasker, and seconded by Mr. Alex. Macpherson :

That the thanks of the Congregation be and are hereby tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year. Carried.

It was then moved by Mr. A. Ewan, seconded by Mr. John McDonald :

That the Congregation in taking cognizance of the reference made in the report of the Trustees to the successful issue of the Rev. Dr. Barclay's efforts to remove the debt on the church, desire to express to him their heart-felt thanks for this further proof of his zeal and devotion to the welfare of the Congregation. Carried.

Dr. Barclay, in acknowledging this motion, expressed himself as having met with the greatest kindness and consideration from the several members of the Congregation in the course of his visits in connection with this matter, and commended to the serious consideration of the Congregation the question of putting the revenues of the

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Church on such a basis as would obviate the necessity of again making a special appeal for aid.

After a full discussion of the matter, it was finally and unanimously resolved :

That in view of the falling off in collections, due in great measure to the practical failure of the envelope system, it is absolutely necessary that prompt steps be taken to put this important source of revenue on a more satisfactory and permanent basis, and that the following members of the Congregation be appointed a Committee to deal with this question, viz :—
Mr. Colin McArthur (convener), Mr. A. Ewan, Mr. A. S. Ewing, Mr. J. A. Cantlie, Mr. A. McFee, Mr. John Larmonth, Mr. F. E. Jodery, Mr. John McDonald, Mr. T. H. Newman, Mr. J. T. Wilson, Mr. E. B. Busted, Mr. Geo. Walker, Mr. Alex. Hamilton, Mr. R. S. Kinghorn, Mr. A. F. Riddell and Mr. W. W. Watson, with power to add to their number.

It was moved by Mr. Colin McArthur, seconded by Mr. A. McFee :

That the report of the Schedule Committee be printed with the other reports for distribution and that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the Congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds during the year, also that the thanks of the Congregation be accorded Mr. John W. Ross for his efficient services as Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee, and further that

be elected members of the Committee for the current year. Carried.

That Mr. Andrew Allan, Mr. E. B. Greenshields, and Mr. Hugh A. Allan be re-elected Trustees for the usual term. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. J. Larmonth, and seconded by Mr. J. T. Wilson :

That the thanks of the Congregation be tendered to Mr. P. S. Ross and Mr. John McDonald for their services as auditors, and that they be requested to accept the appointment for the current year. Carried.

It was moved by Mr. Cameron, seconded by Mr. McLagan :

That the thanks of the Congregation be tendered Mr. Robinson for his attentive and efficient services as organist, and to the members of the Choir for their valuable and acceptable aid in the musical services of the Church during the year. Carried.

On the motion of the Chairman, it was unanimously resolved :

That the hearty thanks of the Congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. John L. Morris and Mrs. Morris, and also to Mr. James Tasker and Mrs. Tasker, for their assiduous and successful work in the Sabbath-School and other schemes connected with the Church.

On the motion of Mr. Ewan a hearty vote of thanks was accorded Dr. Barclay for his conduct in the chair.

There being no further business before the meeting it was closed with prayer.

Report of the Trustees

for the year ending 31st December, 1894.

The Trustees beg to submit herewith the Treasurer's statement of the financial affairs of the Church for the year ending 31st ultimo. and they regret to have to state that the hope expressed in last year's report, that the increase in revenue then shown would continue, has not been realized. On the contrary, the year just closed has been a most disappointing one as regards the ordinary collections—especially those received by envelope—the deficiency as compared with last year, being \$718.94. There has also been less subscribed towards the choir fund by \$325.00. Together, these voluntary contributions show a decrease of \$1,043.94.

On the other hand, there has been an increase of \$604.75 in the amount received for pew rents, although the arrears in these, the Trustees are sorry to note, still represent a considerable sum. Altogether the statement shows a diminution in revenue of \$439.19.

The disbursements for the year are \$15,596.21, as against \$15,599.71 for 1893.

As will be seen, the balance due the Treasurer on the 31st ult. stands at \$5,512.43, or an increase of \$819.12 since the corresponding date of 1893, and the question of dealing with this large and increasing deficit demands the thoughtful and prompt consideration of every member of the Congregation.

The falling off in collections is a most discouraging feature, and as the maintenance of the Church is practically dependent on this

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source of revenue, the Trustees would again appeal to the Congregation for greater liberality in these contributions. They would also suggest that this meeting appoint a committee specially to deal with this item of revenue, with a view to obtaining more satisfactory results.

As regards the floating debt on the church, the Trustees have the pleasure to report that Dr. Barclay, with that devotion to the welfare of the Church—temporal as well as spiritual—which has characterized his ministry amongst us, has voluntarily undertaken to make an effort to collect the necessary funds to remove this heavy burden, and they, for themselves, and on behalf of the Congregation desire to express their gratitude to Dr. Barclay for the task he has thus imposed upon himself.

The thanks of the Congregation are also due to those who have already responded so generously to his appeal, and it is greatly to be hoped that Dr. Barclay's further efforts, which, but for his recent indisposition, he had hoped to have completed by the date of the annual meeting, will be met with that sympathetic alacrity which the object deserves. The liquidation of this debt, eliminating as it would a large amount now paid for interest, will result in a considerable reduction of expenditure.

The Trustees have to regret the death during the year of their much respected colleague, Mr. James Burnett, who took an active interest in the affairs of the Church. Mr. A. S. Ewing has been appointed to fill the vacancy thus created.

No general statement of the value of the Church property has heretofore been compiled, but the Trustees think that the time has now arrived for placing such a statement before the Congregation, and they recommend the incoming Trustees to have such a statement prepared for submission at the next annual meeting.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Mr. Andrew Allan, Mr. E. B. Greenshields, and Mr. Hugh A. Allan—all of whom are eligible for re-election.

NOTE.—Since the above report was printed Dr. Barclay has intimated that the result of his effort enables the Trustees to meet at once the deficiency of this year, and to pay off during 1895, the whole debt remaining on the congregation. The Trustees earnestly hope that the necessity for such an effort will never again be allowed to arise.

The number of scholars on the roll at present is 206—117 male and 89 female.

It is our sad duty to record the loss by death of Miss McFarlane, one of our brightest and most earnest teachers. She had been in the school from childhood, and was beloved by all.

We have also to mourn the loss of Mr. J. Murray Smith, a most devoted friend, to whom we were indebted for many acts of kindness.

The following teachers have resigned their classes, some of them only temporarily, we hope:—Miss Barron, Miss A. McFarlane, Miss K. Logie, Miss Ira Monk, Miss Mills, Mr. Newman, Mr. Mitchell, and Mr. Archibald. Our thanks are tendered to them for their faithful work whilst with us.

The following teachers have been admitted:—Miss Mackie, Miss Boyd, Miss Williamson, Miss Cameron, Miss Marion Cameron, Miss Norris, Miss Ewing.

The teachers desire to thank the Rev. Dr. Barclay for his kindness in taking the Sunday-school lessons as the subject of his Wednesday evening meetings. They have been much benefited by his instructions.

The elders have been attentive in visiting the school from time to time, and some of them assist in teaching.

\$228.19 has been contributed by the scholars for Missionary purposes.

The year 1894 being the first full year since the organization of our congregation, it is only at its close that we can judge of the permanency of the work already accomplished.

Along with almost every other congregation in this part of the city, we have felt the severe financial depression that has prevailed of late, yet, in the face of all this, the liberality of our members and adherents has enabled us to close the year free of debt.

Judging from the reports that are given below, we are quite safe in saying that there has been progress in every department of the Church's work, and that spiritually and financially, the Lord has blessed our labours.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.—In presenting their annual report they do so with feelings of the greatest satisfaction, which can be attested to by the handsome balance on hand at the close of the year, amounting to \$443.47.

Including the balance on hand from last year and the annual grant from St. Paul's, the total receipts amounted to \$1,982.09, and the expenditure to \$1,538.62, divided as follows: Pastor's and Caretaker's salaries, and interest on mortgage, \$1,155.96; fuel, water and light, \$131.81; repairs and new work on church, \$127.85; insurance, \$40.38; sundry expenses, \$82.62.

It was with pleasure that the Board was enabled to augment the pastor's salary by \$50, making it \$950. for the year, and with the expectation that during the coming year they may be able to carry out the recommendation of the Presbytery, by making it \$1000.

The Congregation and Board held one annual, eleven regular, and six special meetings during the year, apart from several joint meetings in reference to the proposed new church, and the transfer of the property from St. Paul's Church.

The Board of Management, on their own and the Congregation's behalf, desire to take this opportunity of placing on record their sincere thanks to St. Paul's Church members, not only for the annual grant that has been placed at their disposal for so many years, but also for the transfer to us of the whole property known as Victoria Chapel, land and buildings, for the nominal sum of ONE DOLLAR, to be used by Victoria Church as their future place of worship, under certain stipulations, agreeable to all parties concerned.

To Dr. Barclay and his Kirk-session we feel more than grateful for their deep interest in all that concerns us, and for their many kind and encouraging words from time to time, when we have met them, for counsel and advice.

SUNDAY-SCHOOL.—It is a true saying that the Sunday school is the nursery of the Church. It has been so in our experience, for we are now enjoying the fruit of years of patient labour among the young, in carefully training them for the higher duties of the Christian life and in helping to make them useful members of the Church.

The Mission School which opened on the 12th of August, 1866, with 12 scholars and 2 teachers, now numbers 286 scholars and 32 teachers, with an average attendance for the past year of 231 scholars and 26 teachers.

Our Missionary contributions were less than in the preceding year, amounting to \$123.38. Of this amount \$14.86 was handed to the Schedule Committee, for distribution among the Schemes of the Church.

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Our present superintendent, Mr. John Lairmonth, became connected with the School in February, 1867, and assumed the superintendency in December, 1869, making twenty-eight years of continuous work in this department of the Church, and twenty-five years in the superintendency. During this time hundreds of scholars and teachers have passed through the School, and the influence on them for good, must in a great measure have affected their whole course in life and helped many of them to become followers of the Master.

One of our staff, Mr. Thos. Allan, is at present taking a course of study at Dr. A. B. Simpson's Institute, New York, with a view to preparing himself for missionary work in the near future. He expects to leave here in the fall of '95, and the field that he has chosen, is the Congo district, in Africa.

Our pastor the Rev. W. D. Reid, B.A., B.D., still conducts the Men's Bible class with great success. Young men from sixteen years and upwards are admitted to this class, and it is here that Mr. Reid considers it his greatest privilege to labour, outside the pulpit.

Mr. Geo. Wilson, assistant-superintendent, has charge of the Ladies' Bible-class. Mr. Wilson was one of the first scholars who attended on the opening Sunday, in August, 1866; and has laboured earnestly and faithfully all these years, without interruption, for the best interests of the School.

We have to report during the year the sad death of Miss Rebecca Gagnon, one of our most estimable Bible-class scholars, who died on the 19th of February last, after a few days illness.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOUR SOCIETY.—The Senior membership is 65 and the Junior, 75, making a total of 140 in the two societies.

The work of the Senior Society is not confined to our own Church, but is carried on in other parts of the city. Mr. Thos. H. Allan and his "Gospel Waggon" during the summer months carried on active work along the wharves, and although meeting with much opposition, yet he and his co-workers succeeded in enticing some to better ways of living.

Work has also been carried on in the Life-line Mission, on Wellington Street, where services are held every Saturday evening with lasting results.

For some time past a number of the members conduct services at the Protestant House of Industry and Refuge, on Tuesday and Sunday evenings.

The Temperance Committee have been very aggressive during the year, and the temperance sentiment of the district is very pronounced at the present time.

All the other committees of the Society have been active and useful, and no opportunity is allowed to pass unnoticed, where work for Christ and His cause can be done.

SCHEDULE COMMITTEE.—This Committee report having collected \$100. during the year, this amount to be apportioned to the different Schemes of the Church, at the annual meeting to be held in January.

BUILDING COMMITTEE.—A strong committee has been organized during the year with Mr. C. A. Smart as chairman, Henry N. Chauvin as secretary, and Ewan Ramsay as treasurer, and who have taken into consideration the whole subject of our new building. Plans and estimates have been laid before them, and the matter is now under consideration. To test the feelings of the congregation, subscription lists were opened, and in a short time between \$4000. and \$5000. were pledged by the members and adherents in the district.

The Chapel is now too small for the work carried on, and it has become almost a necessity to make a change in order to increase our sphere of usefulness.

KIRK-SESSION—The work of the Kirk-session for the year has been most encouraging. In the month of December, the Rev. Walter Russell and Mrs. Russell conducted a series of special services that were very successful, and helped to add many to the Communion roll at our last Communion service, held on the 23rd of December.

At the commencement of the year our roll numbered 144. There have been added by profession of faith, 48 ; by certificate 30 ; making a total of 222. Of these, 2 have been removed by death, and 7 by certificate, leaving a net addition of 69 for the year, making our present membership 213.

There were 21 baptisms, 5 marriages, and 15 deaths during the year.

The Session receipts were \$109.70, and the disbursements \$103.74, leaving \$5.96 in the Treasurer's hands.

To Mr. A. C. Hutchison the thanks of the Association are also due for a highly interesting lecture, illustrated with views and sketches, of English and Scotch ecclesiastical architecture. The lecture was highly appreciated.

Physical Culture was ably treated by Dr. J. C. Cameron, who is perhaps the most valuable authority on that subject as well as its most enthusiastic promoter among the college students. Valuable assistance was rendered by Dr. McKenzie of McGill College, and Miss Barnjum, who, with illustrations, gave additional interest to the lecture.

The season closed with a Ballad Concert under the direction of Mr. J. Henry Robinson, and was a success in every respect.

The proceeds of the concert and the balance on hand will be devoted to the object of the North-West Mission as usual.
