



### FIFTY-FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT.

### 1890-91.

### REPORT OF BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry, in accordance with the Act incorporating the Institution, beg to submit the fifty-fourth Annual Report of the affairs of the Charity to the subscribers and the public.

The demands upon the resources of the Charity for Outdoor relief during the past season have been, for various reasons hereunder detailed, unusually great, necessitating an appeal to the City Corporation for a supplementary grant of \$5,000, which was generously and promply responded to.

Owing to the increasing population there is a pressing demand for more and improved accommodation for Innates.

Your Trustees and Managers have been carefully considering this subject, and hope to be able shortly to submit a feasible plan for its accomplishment.

It has been the painful duty of the Board to record the death of three Trustees during the past year, viz.:

Mr. Henry Rowsell, who had been connected with the management of the Charity for a period of half a century.

Very Rev. J. M. Laurent, who had been a most punctual and active member for twenty-two years.

And the Venerable Dr. Rose, who manifested an intense interest in the Charity to the end of his long and useful life.

The Treasurer's Statement shows a large increase in receipts for the year, chiefly on account of the supplementary grant of \$5,000 from the Corporation, and increased grant from the Ontario Government, for Immates, and in voluntary subscriptions, notwithstanding there is an overdraft upon the bank amounting to \$960,46.

We desire thankfully to acknowledge the usual grant of 1,000 bushels of Coke from the Consumers' Gas Co.

Through the voluntary assistance of various elergymen of the city, the religious services for the Inmates have been regularly maintained.

The kind offices of the ladies connected with the Flower Mission, are much appreciated and enjoyed by the Inmates.

The Board desires to record its entire satisfaction with the able manner in which the Superintendent, Mr. Arthur Laughlen, and Mrs. North, the Matron, have discharged their respective duties during the past year.

The duties of Mr. Williamson, the Receiving Clerk, and his assistant, were also faithfully discharged.

The annexed reports of the Superintendent, the Standing Committees, and the statement of the Treasurer, supply the details of all the departments of work connected with the Institution.

### REPORT OF CASUAL POOR COMMITTEE.

To the Board of the House of Industry:

For the year ending 31st March, 1891, the total number of men "Casuals" was 1,247, last year the number was 1,481; of the former number 454 were in the Lodge only one night, last year the number was 530; and 832 from one to three nights. Thus one-third of the total number was in the Lodge more than three nights, which is a little less in proportion than last year.

The number of nights that the remainder 415 were in the Lodge ranged from three nights to 166 nights, which is also better than last year, as we had last year one man who was in the Lodge 198 nights; twenty-four Casuals were in the Lodge at least 100 nights, the corresponding number last year was fourteen.

The average number sheltered in the Lodge at night during the four months, December, January, February and March, for the year 1889-90 was 75, for 1890-91 it was 82, an increase of seven per night.

In addition to the 1,247 men, there were 117 women sheltered at the Lodge, the number last year was 128.

The total number of individuals who were admitted to the Lodge for the past year was 1,364, last year the number was 1,609, a decrease for the past year of 245; of the 1,364, 362 reported themselves as from outside the city, i.e., twenty-six per cent. of the whole number.

There were cut this season 729 cords of wood, last year the number of cords cut was 404. Your Committee feels under special obligation to the Elias Rogers Coal Company for the great assistance it has given the Committee in carrying on the labour tests so satisfactorily. Your Committee does not think but improvements are needed and can be made in this important branch of the House's work, still a good beginning has been made and improvements ought to follow.

Your Committee would recommend that application be made to the Provincial Government for aid to the Wayfarer's Lodge on account of the large number, twenty-nine per cent. of the whole number of men, from other municipalities which apply for shelter therein during the winter months; and also that the city be asked to continue its annual grant of \$2,000 for the Casual poor.

### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON VISITATION AND OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The Chairman of this Committee, Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, with his well-known interest in the work of this House, rendered effective service up to the 1st of March, when failing health from over-work compelled him to seek rest and change of climate.

The number of families relieved this year, since April last, has been 2,033, as compared with 1,459 for the corresponding period of 1889-90, and 1,280 in 1888-89. The actual number of persons receiving assistance from this Institution during the year, including the 1,364 Casuals reaches the total of 9,453, about one-twentieth of the entire population of this city. This great increase of distress may be attributed largely to the general depression of trade, the labour agitations during the year, lack of corporation employment during the winter, the unusual severity of the season, and the epidemic of last year, which left some in broken health, and consumed the previous savings of many industrious households.

The work of visitation throughout the forty-four districts has been more thoroughly and conscientiously performed than perhaps during any previous year. This institution, indeed the cause of the poor and friendless, is under lasting obligation to those fifty gentlemen who have freely given their time and attention to this most essential and often most distressing work, many of them visiting during the season more than 100 families, in some cases two and three times.

During the month of February a conference of visitors was held for the purpose of discussing the visitation work, comparing notes, and receiving suggestions in reference to it. The judgment was unanimous that visitation of the poor could be more efficiently done by the voluntary service now rendered, than through any paid agency.

An additional depot for the distribution of bread has been established in the western division, and the work, of distribution has been attended to by Mr. James Simpson in the east, Mr. G. Wiley in the west, and Mr. E. O. Smith, 467 Dundas street, for the extreme west. 50,316 loaves costing \$4,486.49 have been

distributed to the outdoor poor this season, as against 23,929 loaves last year, which cost the house \$2,134.07. The groceries distributed, consisting of oatmeal, rice, tea and sugar have reached the unprecedentedly large amount of 15,205 lbs., costing \$818.50, as against 5,119 lbs. the previous year, of the value of \$277.32.

The members of this Committee have taken part in the meetings of the Conference of Associated Charities, and have had the opportunity of correcting misunderstandings that frequently arise concerning the work of this queen of our charitable organizations. In conferring with the representatives of other noble societies, the nature and far-reaching extent of the operations of the House of Industry and Refuge have been clearly brought out, compelling the admiration of all those whose hearts beat in sympathy with the afflicted and the distressed.

Your Committee would more and more emphasize the importance of applying the labour test, whenever practicable to all the departments of our work. To furnish the necessaries of existence to the able-bodied, leaving them in idleness, sloth, improvidence and intemperance, is demoralizing and degrading in its effects. Our object is not to nourish a brood of paupers, but rather to provide the poor with the means of earning support, and thus save them from pauperism.
