C. P. R. TELEPHONE SERVICE FROM ATLANTIC TO PACIFIC

Montreal, Oct. 30.—The C. P. R. has completed its private telephone system from Cartier, Ont., on the main line east to Brandon, a distance of 1,046 miles. This is the nucleus of a system which will stretch from the Atlantic to the Pacific, with telephones all along the company's branches. This wire will hereafter be used on the Lake Superior division despatching trains, while from Fort William to Brandon the wire will be used for emergency purposes only. It is possible the company will use them for despatching purposes later on.

THE YOUNG DELINQUENTS

Coming to a consideration of the Juvenile Delinquents Act she said all had rejoiced in the passage of the bill known as the Juvenile Delinquents Act on July 30, 1908, by the federal parliament empowering any province or portion of a province to enforce the said act after the provincial legislature had made provision for the establishment of juvenile courts. It was to be regretted, however, that the matter had not been taken up by more provinces. Manitoba being the only one thus far to adopt it and it had proved a great success in the diminution of juvenile crime. She urged the representatives of all the provinces assembled to urge this matter on the attention of the provincial governments.

WOMEN HOLD FIRST POLITICAL MEETING

Thousand Delegates Adopt Platform in New York—150 Police There

New York, Oct. 30.—One thousand delegates regularly elected at conventions held in every one of the sixty-three assembly districts of Greater New York, met at Carnegie Hall last night at the first women's political convention ever held in New York City. Mrs. Clarence MacKay presented the platform, which was subsequently adopted. Peaceful as was the purpose of the convention, there were adjoining a detachment of 150 policemen. No call upon their services was made.

JUMPS OVERBOARD FROM BARK ARROW

New York, Oct. 30.—British bark Arrow Captain Melvor, which has arrived here from Hilo, was sixteen days off the Cape of Good Hope, with heavy weather. During this time on Aug. 27, Charles Cecil Sterling, aged 18 years, a native of London, jumped overboard and was lost. He was supposed to have been drugged at the time.

COUNTESS MARRIES A POOR CLERK

Paris, Oct. 29.—A despatch from Vienna to the Matin reports the marriage of the Countess Marguerite Lonyay, a relative of the Countess Lonyay, who was formerly Princess Stephanie of Belgium, to a poor bank clerk. The bridegroom, who is about 30 years old, was formerly employed at the residence of Count Lonyay, but has recently been out of employment. The Countess is about forty years of age.

SEND SCHOOL-BOYS OUT TO CANADA

London, Oct. 30.—The emigration subcommittee at the headmasters' conference has now undertaken to advise and assist public schoolboys to emigrate to Canada. It is proposed that boys be sent out for practical training on Canadian farms, followed by a course in an agricultural college.

HAYS EVASIVE WHEN ASKED ABOUT STEAMER LINES ON THE ATLANTIC

Toronto, Oct. 30.—(Special)—Chas. M. Hays, president of the Grand Trunk Railway Co., was here yesterday and, while declaring that no immediate change in the company's policy was under consideration, spoke hopefully as to the future. The grain movement from the west, he said, was almost double what it was a year ago, and this was due not merely to an increase in crop, but also to general improvement in business conditions.

CAN'T CUT UP BIBLE

(Toronto Telegram)

"God's book has gained more from criticism than it can ever lose," said Archdeacon Cady last night at the men's rally in connection with the Ontario Sunday School Association in High Park Avenue Methodist church.

"The Bible is more than a book. It cannot be studied as mere literature. Some men are dwelling far too much on names and numbers.

"Criticism of the Bible is not a religious work, but a mere literary occupation. It is like as if God had sent down an angel with a message till they had stretched the angel on the dissecting table to see how he was made.

"The Bible is a book of all ages. You can't cut it up or piece it up. When the higher critics have seemingly read it as under, the dismembered limbs came together and stand a living organism and stare you in the face.

"This little ark of Hebrew literature still floats on the surface of the world, defying the billows and tempests of time, while the archives of Egypt and the empires of the east are dashed into oblivion.

"Gentlemen, if ever your faith grows dim, read the digest of the British and Foreign Bible Society and see what work the Bible is doing in the world today. It fulfills every requirement that science demands. It has enriched the language itself. It has elevated the thoughts of men."

SUCCESS OF JAPS IN SHIPPING

The Japanese snatch away one portion of the shipping trade after the other. They have even succeeded in crowding out the most noted English steamship line, the Peninsular & Oriental Company, from east Asiatic traffic. For fifty years did this English line successfully carry on trade in the East, but now it frankly admits that it is being steadily driven out of Japanese shipping. Today officers and crew of the two greatest Japanese marine companies are almost exclusively Japanese or Chinese. The pay of the yellow sailors is notoriously very much lower than that of the whites, while their board, too, is far less expensive. In addition to this, shipbuilding is much cheaper in Japan than in America.

Japanese shipping in the Pacific is steadily undermining not only American but European shipping also. The tonnage of their merchant marine rose from 477,430 tons in 1898 to 1,115,880 tons in 1907.

No subsidy granted by the United States would enable our shipping to compete with that of Japan in the Pacific trade. It is true that Japan gives government aid to its shipping in this trade, but it was in the way of a start, where the companies were weak financially—New Orleans Picayune.



HALLEY'S COMET

By Frederic Campbell, Sc. D. President of the Department of Astronomy, Brooklyn Institute.



The Solar System, showing paths of planets, and of comets of long and short periods.



COMING from a distance 800,000,000 miles greater than that of the most remote planet, and returning from an absence of 75 years, it now revolves upon us to trace the movements of that great comet, already discovered in our sky, and soon to be seen for months by everyone who has eyes. It is true that the comet's motion is followed only in our own immediate vicinity. But the curve which it makes while within our view proves the curve that it must make when beyond, so that we are able to track the monster as if we saw it every day.

The planets travel not perfect circles, but ellipses, a little longer one way than the other; and, not in the centre, but at one of the two foci of each ellipse, nearer one end than the other, the sun is found. A periodical comet also travels an ellipse, but much more flattened or eccentric, so that its path may run nearer the sun in one direction, and farther back into space in the other, than that of any planet.

As Halley's comet is usually about 75 years in making its complete orbit, it is 37 1/2 years traveling back to the sun from its most distant point, known as "aphelion." Though it comes from a much greater distance than Neptune, it makes no approach to that planet, its path bearing off quite an angle. Hence, as it draws near, we do not need to think of it as passing any planet before Jupiter. But, as it approaches the sun, it also rises to that general plane on which all the planets travel, so that, when calculations show that it crossed Jupiter's path about March 15, 1909, we are interested to know it. The two bodies were then distant from the sun about 480,000,000 miles. There was then a wide space to cover, and an immense number of asteroids to pass; but, as an ocean liner avoids the fishing fleet off the coast of Newfoundland, so the comet steers to one side and runs no risk of collision.

And now the comet is in sight, far beyond the orbit of Mars, having been detected on September 17 by Professor Wolf of Heidelberg, Germany. It will not cross Mars' path till about February 27, 1910, more than two months after we have begun to see it with the naked eye. Steadily increasing in speed, by March 31 it due to cross the path of the earth. It dashes across the orbit of Venus about April 20, and on May 10 is at "perihelion" its nearest to the sun, swinging about that body at a distance of 66,000,000 miles therefrom, and moving at top speed.

As it begins its retreat back into space, about May 30 it is again crossing Venus' path, and the 16th of June the earth's. The comet will then be regarded as past history, for it will have gone from view, both telescope and camera failing to report anything further. But so exact are the operations of mathematics that, on any day and at any hour a skilled astronomer can tell just where the comet is, how fast it is going, and how near it is to the sun, the nearest planet, or the earth.



The comet's path from February 12 to June 3, as indicated by the unbroken line, is above the plane of the earth's orbit; the rest, indicated by broken line, is below the same.

CAPT. NEWMAN

The Montreal Gazette says:--"Many expressions of regret were heard yesterday in shipping circles concerning the untimely death by drowning of Captain Newman of the ill-fated Donaldson liner rescue of Grand Manan. All hope of the rescue of Captain Newman and the members of the crew who got away from the ship in one of the boats, was abandoned.

Captain Newman was one of the best known commanders of the Donaldson line fleet and had for some years been coming to the St. Lawrence, where he earned the reputation of being a careful and experienced navigator. At one time Newman was in command of the Tritonia, and made regular visits to the St. Lawrence. His last visit to Montreal was at the end of last season, and during the winter he sailed regularly on the Salacia between Glasgow and St. John, N. B.

A few months ago, Captain Newman was transferred to the Hestia and Captain McKelvie, then on that boat, was transferred to the Salacia. Captain McKelvie spoke feelingly yesterday of his colleague, stating that just before he left the Clyde, on his recent voyage, he saw the Hestia and her commander. The Hestia left a few days later on the voyage which ended in shipwreck and disaster. The Salacia sailed on her homeward voyage to Glasgow early this morning."

PROSPECT OF \$4,000 FINE ALARMING

Judge Ritchie Deals With Case of Handbill Distribution in Streets; Also Ringing of Door Bells

Samuel Goldfeather looked rather frightened when told by Judge Ritchie in the police court this morning that he could be fined \$4,000 for the distribution of 2,000 hand bills. As the result of a complaint by Assistant Superintendent of Streets John Alexander, Acting Sergeant W. H. Finlay had reported Goldfeather for littering the streets with hand bills. In court this morning the street department official said that he had picked up one of a large number of bills advertising a sale, and had taken it into the store and asked the clerk to speak to the proprietor about littering the streets with them.

Goldfeather said that he was hired to distribute 2,000 and had two boys to help him.

His honor read the section of the law with reference to throwing waste paper about the streets, and said that it provided for a fine of \$2 for each and every piece which would in this case amount to \$4,000.

Goldfeather hastened to a telephone and communicated with his employer, Mr. Ashkins, and the latter hurried to court. He told the court that, as he had seen others distributing handbills, he thought it all right.

His honor said that it was a fact that the law was being violated, as every section on amusement enterprise was advertised now in this way, and he intended to put a stop to it. The porches of private houses were being filled with all kinds of advertising matter.

Judge Ritchie also said that there was a fine for ringing door bells, except to see some one in the household for legitimate business. There was too much ringing of the bell and bringing the maid to the door for various schemes. If it were allowed to go on it would keep maids busy.

The case was dismissed with a warning.

MOTHER IS DEAD, CHILDREN ARE ILL

Mrs. O. B. Akery Dies in Hospital--Four of Family Were There With Typhoid

Yesterday afternoon in the general public hospital Mrs. Alonzo B. Akery, of 29 Military Road passed away. About two weeks ago Mrs. Akery's three children were taken to the hospital suffering from typhoid fever. One of the children, a girl, recovered, and left a few days ago; yesterday she mother died and a son and daughter are still in the institution under treatment.

Mrs. Akery, who was about fifty years of age, was not very strong and her system could not withstand the ravages of the fever. She leaves a husband and two married daughters--Mrs. Fairweather, of Military Road and Mrs. Pier, of West St. John, in addition to the two girls and one boy, who were also ill.

She was a member of Cullum Lodge, L. O. B. A. No. 38 and the members of this and sister lodges are asked to attend the funeral at 2.30 o'clock in Sunday afternoon from miter late residence, Military Road.

SCHR. W. S. FIELDING IS ABANDONED

Capt. Geldert and Six Men Picked Up and Taken to New York

New York, Oct. 29--The British schooner "Carib II," Wallace, from Truxillo, etc., brought here the captain and six men of the schooner W. S. Fielding, from Havana October 9 for Rustan and Brunswick. She was dismantled in a severe gale and abandoned October 12 in lat 22 lon 83.

The William S. Fielding left Havana on October 9, with her captain and crew of six men, for Rustan, Honduras, to get a cargo of coconuts. She was caught in a hurricane and the masts, lifeboats and all that was loose on deck were swept overboard.

When night came on the vessel jammed herself hard on the Colorado Reef, north-west of Cuba. She was out of the course of vessels and twenty-five miles from land. Rain fell all night. The men had a raft nearly finished when the "Carib II" hove in sight. At four o'clock the next afternoon the rescue work began.

The W. S. Fielding was built in Liverpool, Eng., in 1901, and she registered 109 tons. Her managing owner is Abraham W. Hendry, of Liverpool, N. S. Captain Geldert was in command of the vessel. On her last voyage she took a cargo of lumber from Bridgewater, N. S., to Havana. The schooner has been here recently. She was a fine vessel.

PRICE OF RUBBERS TAKES A JUMP

Wholesale boot and shoe dealers here have received advices from the manufacturers that owing to the cost of crude rubber there is no prospect of lower quotations for rubbers in some time and that an advance will be in effect November 1. The advance will mean first quality men's fine rubbers will retail at \$1.25 and ladies' at 85 cents.

MR. TEED WILL NOT DISCUSS HIS REPORT

A despatch from Fredericton states that the report of Commissioner M. G. Teed in the inquiry into the charges made against Police Magistrate Kay, of Moncton, has been filed with the provincial government. It is also stated that it is understood that he completely exonerates Magistrate Kay of any wrongdoing.

Mr. Teed, when asked about the matter this morning, said he had handled his report to the government about four weeks ago but he declined to discuss it in any way and would neither confirm nor deny the statement that the report exonerated Magistrate Kay.

NOT YET RE-INSTATED

A statement appears in a morning paper that "Johnny Dever and Fred Mahoney have been reinstated and will appear in Carri uniforms this afternoon. Outside of these two men, the Carri team will line-up the same as on last Saturday."

This statement is incorrect. Dever and Mahoney have only within a day or two applied for reinstatement, and on reply has yet been received.
