DOMESTIC RECIPES.
Ginger Cookies—One cup each, sugar, molasses and butter or lard (a little salt if lard is used); one-half cup of boiling water, one teaspoonful of ginger, and four enough for a soft dough.
Olives Sandwiches—Scald and cool one dozen large olives; take out the stones and chop the meat very fine. Add a teaspoonful of mayonnaise dressing and the same quantity of cracker dust. Mix and spread on thin slices of buttered bread. Nice for luncheon, tea and for the children's lunch baskets.
Charlotte Russe—A well-made Charlotte Russe is delicious. It is not as often served as it deserves to be. To be at its best it should be made of pure cream and a dash of dish with lady fingers or sliced sponge cake. Fill the centre with whipped cream slightly sweetened and flavored to taste; spread lady fingers or the thinly sliced sponge cake. To make a cake use two and for the children's cake use one and a half.
Quick Graham Bread—One egg, one-quarter cup of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of molasses, one cup of milk, one tablespoonful of baking powder, two cups of graham flour, sifted; one cup of wheat flour and three full teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix in the order given, and bake in moderate oven for three-quarters of an hour.
Macaroni Oustard—Crush a dozen macaroni. Make a custard of six yolks of eggs and a pint and one-half of light cream, with a tablespoonful of powdered sugar. Cook for half an hour, and stir in the macaroni crumbs, and serve, when cool, heated on a dish buttered, seasoned first with salt and garnished with sprigs of angelica.
Frothed Eggs—Beat five eggs until the whites are stiff, and put in two eggs, pour the butter over the eggs, put over very moderate heat until they are warmed through. Then pour them rapidly back and forth from the pan into the bowl that held the butter, until eggs and butter are well blended. Place over the steam, and stir rapidly until a smooth, creamy mass appears. Pour over a hot buttered toast.
English Bread Pudding—One pint of soft breadcrumbs, one-half cup of milk, one egg, and one-half cup of raisins, and one-half cup of bread-crumbs. The better way to make the crumbs is to take a whole loaf and cut it into thin slices. The fruit may be mixed with the crumbs, or it may be spread on top of the bread on the pan. If it is used to cover the top, it will form a bottom layer when the pudding is baked. Beat the eggs, add sugar and milk. When the sugar is dissolved, pour the mixture over the breadcrumbs, and stand ten minutes and place in a shallow baking-pan, partly filled with water. Bake in a quick oven for about twenty minutes. The mixture must be "set in the centre." Serve with a liquid pudding sauce.

THE PROPER CARE OF LAMPS.
It is not an uncommon thing for lamps to be carelessly treated. The matters to be attended to are: first, the wicks, which should be kept perfectly clean and trimmed. They should be carefully examined and filled each morning, and when necessary cleaned out. The burner of a lamp should be especially looked after, but this is the part most often neglected. The holes in it, or the "spurs" through which air is admitted to the flames, should be kept entirely free from dirt. The method of adjusting the chimney which moves the wick up and down must also be cleaned out when necessary. If the lamp is a large brass lamp with a tube for ventilation running clear through the burner, so that the air ascends to the wick from beneath, be careful to examine this space, for it is likely to become choked with dust and burned-off particles of the wick.
If the wick needs trimming, take a match or smooth bit of wood and gently rub it over the edge of the wick, after turning the metal tube holding it in on a line with the lower edge of the burner out, crusty trimmings will be blown out, and the wick will be as good as a guide for the hand, thus making the trimming easy.
If the lamp has a glass chimney, the wick needs cleaning and trimming. They should be filled with oil every day. They burn better when the font is full of oil. When the inside of the font is found to have a sediment, the residue of oil should be poured out and thrown away, or strained and used for other household purposes, such as cleaning woodwork or damp woodwork in the cellar or in combination with boiling water to scour for cleaning the iron.

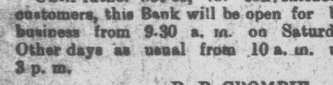

The War.

London, May 21, 11.50 p. m.—A despatch to the St. James' Gazette from Kobe, Japan, dated today, after confirming the report of the stranding of the Russian protected cruiser Bogatyr on the rocks near the entrance to Vladivostok, adds that the Bogatyr subsequently was blown up by the Russians to prevent her falling into the hands of the Japanese.

The Bogatyr was a fine modern cruiser of 6,750 tons: was built in 1902, and was 416 3/4 feet long. The armament of the Bogatyr consisted of twelve six inch guns, twelve 3 inch guns, six 1.8 inch guns, two 1.4 inch guns and two smaller rapid fire guns. She had six torpedo tubes and five inches of nickel steel armor over her gun positions. The speed of the Bogatyr was estimated to be over twenty-three knots and her crew numbered 680 men.

Tokio, May 21, noon.—Although it has not been officially reported, it is said on good authority that the Japanese forces have captured Kai Chou, driving the Russians back to Tai-Chia in the direction of New Chwang, and preventing the advance of the Russian troops at New Chwang in the direction of Kai Chou. The bombardment by the Japanese of the vicinity of Kai Chou recently was probably in preparation for the landing of forces in the northwest corner of the Liao Tung peninsula for the purpose of capturing New Chwang and cooperating with the other armies in the march on Liao Yang.

Probably a small Japanese force has been landed at Kin Chou Bay. This Japanese force was landed on May 14, at the mouth of the Dayan river, west of the Yalu.

Tokio, May 21, 5 p. m.—The Japanese forces which landed at Taku Shan Thursday, surrounded and routed a force of Russian cavalry at 7 o'clock Friday evening in the neighborhood of Wang Chi Tung, seven miles north of Taku Shan. The Russian force, which consisted of about one squadron, lost many men killed or wounded, as well as a captain who was captured. The Japanese sustained no losses.

Liao Yang, May 20.—Eleven military trains have come in here during the past twenty-four hours. The Russian rouble is rising. The rains have stopped suddenly and fine weather has set in.

Tokio, May 21, noon.—It is absolutely certain that the battleship Hataze was sunk by a Russian mine ten miles off the coast. The position of these mines makes navigation dangerous for neutral vessels and a protest from foreign governments is expected. The loss of the Japanese warship is felt keenly here. No flags are flying in this city, and the nightly lantern parades have been abandoned.

Mukden, May 20.—The main body of the Japanese forces estimated at 80,000 men, remains south of the Russian troops, who are covering Liao Yang. The Japanese have apparently suspended their advance. It is reported that they sent the launches and junks to drop mines in the paths of the Japanese warships and transports. The Russian force is reported to be holding the Miao Tai straits against torpedo attacks from Port Arthur for the purpose of transports with the third army that the Hataze met with disaster.

Realizing that they were effectively isolated the Port Arthur Russians made their desperation an excuse for sowing the whole gulf of Pe Chi Li with floating blockade mines.
