

NEW YORK, Feb. 3—As the result of an investigation inaugurated by William H. Edwards, the Princeton University graduate, who was recently appointed street cleaning commissioner of New York City, eight employees of that department and the foreman of a private contractor were arraigned in court early today on charges of grand larceny by the use of fraudulent tickets. These tickets were issued to drivers of snow wagons and attest to their removal of a wagon load of snow from the streets. All the men arrested were held in bail for further hearing today. It is estimated that the frauds would have cost the city \$50,000 if the street removal bills resulting from the last storm have been paid, it is believed the city has suffered no loss in this in-

## WALLS OF JERICHO

FOUND NEAR DEAD SEA

Excavations Reveal Site of City That Succumbed to Hosts of Joshua.

BERLIN, Feb. 2—The Deutsche Orient Gesellschaft publishes interesting details of excavations which it has details of excavations which it has carried out on the supposed site of the ancient Jericho, a collection of mounds in the vicinity of the village of Ericha, near the Dead Sea. After a preliminary investigation an expedition was dispatched last year consisting of Professor Sellin, Herr Langenegger, a government architect, and Professor Watzinger, an archeologist, of Rostock.

The excavations, which were conducted from January 2 till April 8, gave most interesting results. The site investigated was a pleateau 400 yards long by 180 broad, containing seven mounds. After a week's digging the exterior wall of the vanished city was encountered at a depth of eight feet below the surface. The excavators were astonished at the technical excellence of the construction.

GENEVA, Feb. 2.—Mme. 

Accepting these sacrifices to be duty and suffering under caste compulsion themselves, the parents place and often even drive their helpless little daughters into the most cruel unions.

The census of 1891 gives these returns of early marriages in British India:

Females under 4 years of age, 258, 760; females from 5 to 9 years of age, 2,201,404; females from 10 to 14 years of age, 6,016,759, and these to men of all ages.


