

ITALIANS ARE FORCING WAR

Italy Gives Turkey Just Twenty-four Hours to Back Down or Fight. Turkey Rejects Demands and Explains to Powers -- War Probable. Tripoli Already Covered by Italian Warships and Turkey Prevented from Landing Arms or Men.

Constantinople, Sept. 28.—Italy has presented her ultimatum demanding an answer within 24 hours, she will accept only the immediate evacuation of Tripoli.

Chiaso, Switzerland, Sept. 28.—At Taranto the sailing board of the Italian cruiser Vettor Pisani and the Duke of Abruzzi created great enthusiasm and the crowd shouted, "Long live the House of Savoy."

Turkey observes that the Italian note of Sept. 24 was received when it was impossible to prevent the Demas from landing as she was already independent of her right to send reinforcements to a province of her own.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 28.—Turkey has made an appeal to Russia in which she sets forth the action taken by Italy, and asks what Russia will do in the present and future situation.

Vienna, Sept. 28.—Nouvelles Presse learns from an authoritative source that the moment Italy lands troops in Tripoli Turkey will declare war, expel all Italians from Turkey within twenty-four hours, abrogate the capitulations and commercial treaty.

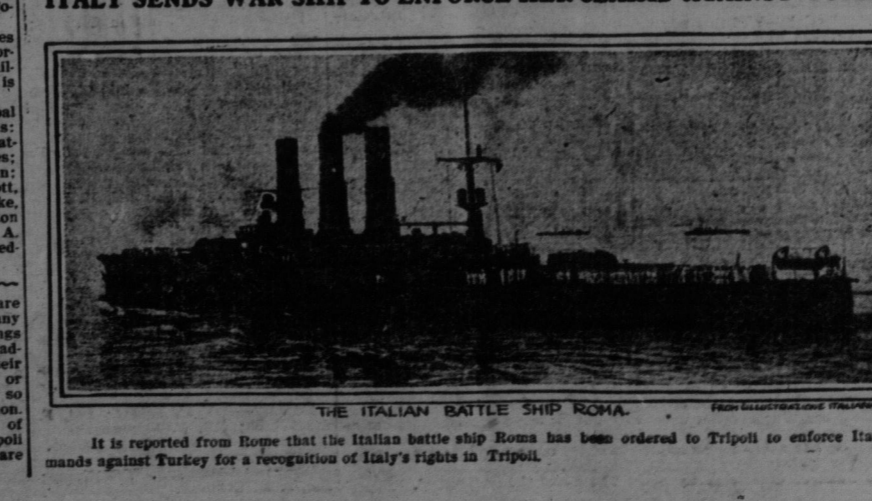

my reports from the Pinkertons were false, and started to completely investigate the whole thing. I returned once to Montreal, and the next morning telephoned for McNamara and discharged him, telling him to get his money from the people who were working for me.

"McNamara telephoned me and I saw him at the Windsor Hotel, and showed him the Dunn report, and Patterson's denials, and told him my report as to Patterson's concern being a \$7,000,000 affair was absolutely correct."

"I said that was not true as I had never seen the woman in my life before," said Mr. Russell. "I asked Patterson if he knew the girl he took to meet me. He replied, 'Yes, I told her she could take you out to dinner, and I replied, 'I would not see at a dog fight with her.'"

"At that time," said Mr. Russell, "I knew nothing of the asylum plot, but was simply working on the badger game. A few days later I received a report from the Kellogg & Ross firm on the 18th, McNamara came to my room at the Windsor. He said, 'Thank God for the chance of getting that badger game over and done with. The Pinkerton thing called off, because he said that he owed that to the Pinkertons. That made me believe that he had been acting for somebody else.'"

"I was going back on the advice of R. C. Smith, K. C.," said Mr. Russell, "to investigate this badger position which had been attempted by J. J. Patterson and his wife."

"McNamara was to go to New York by the Rutland, and I was to go by the D. & H. I got on and was met by the goods. I was kept under cover."

His English Bull Dog was Voted Best Animal in Dog Show which Closed Last Night -- Robert Smith's Setter a Very Close Second -- The Prize Winners.

What is counted on as being the best dog show ever held in the city came to a close last night, when there was a very large crowd of spectators at the Queen's rink to admire the excellent lot of dogs and watch the judging. It was after ten o'clock when the judges got through with their work which was most satisfactory to all.

The English bull exhibited by H. H. Smith was presented by the handsome silver cup donated by the president for being the best dog or bitch in any class in the show. An English setter, owned by Robert Smith was a very close second and it took the judges considerable time in deciding the winner. On the announcement being made that the bull had won the prize, there were rounds of applause from the large crowd about the ring and there was also much applause for the English setter which showed up so well.

L. W. Lehurie's brace of cocker spaniels won the cup for the best brace in any breed in the show and a good second was LeB. Wilson's wire-haired fox terriers.

During the evening there was a pleasant surprise for Mrs. Caleb West wife of the judge at the show when she was waited on by a committee of the Association members and presented with a handsome umbrella. Mrs. West, like her husband is an excellent judge of dogs and during her stay in the city, has made numerous friends.

RESULT IN THE TRURO GOLF PLAY

Truro, Sept. 28.—In the semi-final of the men's championship golf competition held here today, the feature of the day was between Wylie of Halifax and Ritchie of Moncton. Rain bothered the contestants but the New Brunswicker pulled out a winner by 2 up. The results today were:

Some fine golf is looked forward to and it is likely that a large number will follow the players.

It is, nevertheless, below this season's lofty figures. Boston won the flag in 1903, and capped this achievement by defeating Pittsburgh in the world's series, yet Boston had only two regulars batting 300. They were Dougherty, with a credit of 322 and Parent, who hit 304.

In addition, Catcher Farrell in 1911 hit 404 and Cy Young in 40 batted 320. In 1904 Boston captured another championship, and this time did not have a single 300 swatter in its lineup. The leader was Chick Stahl, and he hit 298.

Philadelphia, Sept. 28.—The American or National league in the last 10 years or more can compare with the Athletics of 1911 in hitting. Not only do the monarchs of baseball rank alone as the master batsmen of modern baseball, but even taking the handicap of the foul strike rule and spitball pitching, they outstrip a large majority of the old-time clubs.

THE ONLY REGULAR MACK NOT IN THE 300 CLASS

The only regular Mack not in the 300 class is Jack Barry, and Barry, next to Baker, is the most dangerous batsman in a pinch on the team. A comparison with the former pennant winner shows plainly that Mack has the greatest batting team in the history of the American league. No team in the National league compares with it since Frank Rebeck's great Boston team of 1897, but in that season there was no foul strike rule to help the pitcher, as in recent years.
