

. C. R. Police Official Pinched Retaining Wall on East Side of Courtenay Bay Practically Ruined by Great Waves -Repaired Last Summer.

A gang of men were put on the job repairing and reconstructing. Rails were laid from the I.C.B. track and heavy rock and lumber hauled out to the end of the retaining wall. 

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


