Canadian farmers have benefited in the last three or four years to the ctent of three millions of dollars as result of the work of the Canadian eed Growers' Association, according the statement made by President W. Robertson at the convention of last organization in the railway compitee room of the House of Com-

mittee room of the House of Commons.

"That extra amount gained," he said, "means better homes, better achools, and better conditions generally in the rural districts without robbing a man, woman or child. It means a richer and happier life on the farms of Canada and that's what makes nation great."

Denmark's Example.

Dr. Robertson instanced the little country of Denmark as an example worthy of emulation in agricultural achievement, poirtins out that a generation ago it was regarded as one of the poorest countries on the earth but by means of organization the foremost in agricultural development.

Since Joseph collected the corn in Egypt, he opined there had been little improvement in the quality of the crop until 25 years ago in Canada special attention was paid to the oroduction. He showed how the yield of grain per acre had been greatly increased by the application of scientific methods.

OF LONGER TERMS

Ottawa, June 26.—It is not the intention of the government to pay off the \$30,000,000 loaned which in a way matures next week. It was negotiated many years and becomes due on July first, 1919, but the government was given the option of liquidating it this year on July 1st, if it so chose.

Owing to the conditions of the money market the longer terms will be availed of. The loan bears interest, at 3½ per cent. as compared with the 4 per cent, rate now prevailing.
