The people must make their voice heard, and must wipe out the venal politicians and speculators who are grinding the poor."

clover itself, and have not given

even an ordinary amount of nourish-

ment to start with. Clover will not

succeed on entirely worn-out land

and any attempt to bring such into

a renewed state of fertility by the use

of clover is likely to prove a failure.

Where the land is in fair condition

clover will usually improve it, and

in a very marked degree; but where

the soil is exhausted by over crop-

ping, fertilizers of some sort must

be applied, after which the clover

will do its share of carrying on the

improvement. Direct applications of

nitrogen to clover seem to be wasted,

and so also in a certain degree are

manures and fertilizers rich in

nitrogen. Phosphoric acid and

potash seem to be the two principal

applied ingredients of fertility in

which clover delights, and these

are so well proportioned to its use

in many cases as to be beneficial

and lasting to clover than the best

barnyard manure. Ashes often

show better results the year after

they are applied than they do the

first. I have seldom seen any

benefit to the grain crop when

ashes were used, even in large quantities,

Monrovia, Jan. 6.—The Star cable
says: London, Jan. 6.—Canada's wheat
production is enjoying a good deal of
attention in the British markets at
present. Competitions made with the
western American product, as against
Manitoba's wheat are in favor of the
latter. To this end, Dunlop Bros. of
Glasgow have issued a report which
states that while English and other
spring wheats are rather disappointing
Manitoba again comes to the front this
season. This report, continuing, says
Manitoba has exported freely to the
British market, and though the quantity
has been large, the quality is not inferior,
for Manitoba wheat is handsome, heavier
and in every way much more attractive
than Minnesota wheat. Manitoba's
No. 2 hard wheat has become popular in
the English and Scottish markets.
Manitoba wheat, No. 1 and 2 hard,
finds a ready sale. The prices are as
follows, quoted from yesterday's London
transactions: Manitoba No. 1 hard sold
at thirty shillings c. i. f.; No. 2 winter
at twenty-eight shillings.

Some interesting figures regarding fruit
culture in California are given by the
Horticultural Bureau of that State. It is
rather surprising to read that of the 184
square miles of land area in the State
100,000 acres are planted in fruit
trees, 200,000 acres are in bearing trees,
118,918 are in trees not yet in bear-
ing. Of 118,918 acres are in bearing
trees, and 104,000 are in bearing trees.
The crop this year will be 50,000
pounds; or 10 per cent. more than
last year. For the purpose of choosing
the best fruit, the following is a list of
the best fruit in California. This crop is very
sensitive to the weather, and ultimately
ruin or profits will turn a profit into a
loss. There are 60,000 acres devoted to
orange, of which two-thirds are in bear-
ing trees. About 100,000 acres are about
equally divided between pear and apple
trees. Last year the pear crop was
17,000,000 pounds, but this year it will
reach 20,000,000 pounds, owing
to favorable weather.
