





PANIC CAUSED BY FIRE IN NEW YORK SUBTERRANEAN RAILWAY

Gas Fills Ten Cars in New York Tubes 75 Feet Below Surface with 500 Persons Aboard - 160 in Hospital.

A despatch from New York says:—
Fire, smoke, carbon monoxide gas and panic imperilled the lives of more than 350 men and women trapped in a short-circuited Interborough subway express train, 50 feet below the surface of Lexington avenue, at east 59th street, shertly after 11 o'clock on Thursday, and 125 passengers were overcome by the choking gas and smoke, with several burned or injured by falls or trampling, and three firemen hurt in effecting rescues.

Eighty-seven persons were attended in Bellevue, Flower and other hos-

Eighty-seven persons were attended in Bellevue, Flower and other hospitals in the central section of the city for partial asphyxiation. Of that number 57 were able to go to their homes after being treated, but the condition of thirty was so serious that they had to reman at the hospitals.
