





WHAT THEY WILL DO.

Mr. Ivey Explains the Intentions of the New Electric Street Railway, if They Got a Franchise-Advertising the City.

Mayor Spencer, Ald. Judd, Leonard, Dreaney, Yates and Secretary Pope attended the finance committee matines Saturday.

Mr. C. H. Ivey waited on the committee and presented them with the proposed agreement of the new Electric Street Railway Company. It was a very lengthy document and was identical with the former one, except that the line which the company proposed to lay on York street from the river to Rectory street was changed to along York street and out on the Hamilton road. Mr. Ivey said the usual fare of 5 cents would be charged. Workingmen's tickets at eight for 25 cents would be issued. The company would deposit with the city \$5,000 as guarantee that the agreement would be carried out. They would also pay the city \$100 for each mile of single track that was laid and \$200 for each mile of double track and further give a certain percentage of the gross receipts. The company would agree to have five miles in operation at the end of one year and the whole system at the end of two years. If they were allowed to proceed with the work at once a line would be in operation between the city and Queen's Park before the Western Fair of 1892 rolled around. They might, however, have to give the present company another month's notice, and in that case the time would be too short in which to have the work done.

The document will be handed to the city solicitor, who will meet the committee at a meeting at 6:30 this evening, and inforthem as to its legality.

It was decided to purchase 3,000 copies of the Buffalo Express containing an advertisement of this city. A copy will be sent to hotels, railroad stations and other such places throughout Canada and the United States. Ald. Dreaney opposed the Schene, and argued that the money should

The sum granted by the council for this object was \$150, and the Buffalo papers will cost only \$90. It was suggested that the balance be expended on local papers.
