The London Free Press is opposed to the

plebiscite. This may not astonish many of the readers of that journal, though its reasons for objection to the popular vote at the forthcoming municipal election are decidedly peculiar. Our contemporary opposes the plebiscite because of its fear that the question may get mixed up with municipal issues. That is just what a popular vote-a simple "Yes" or "No" marked on a ballot-will not result in. The popular vote, as every elector in London well knows by his or her experience in connection with the plebiscite taken at the instance of the City Council on the question of liquor license reduction, prevents the issue from being mixed up with ordiindividual elector to vote as he or she believes to be right without regard to the contestants or the other questions before the electorate. When last a plebiscite was before the electors in this city. before the electors in this city, so thoroughly was everybody reconciled to it that the candidates for mayor and almost every aldermanic contestant pledged themselves beforehand to carry out the wish of the electorate whether it was for or against the change contemplated. They knew, and our contemporary should know, the difficulty that lay in having this question considered on its merits by any other course. Men are elected because of their local popularity, because of sectional interests

that they are supposed to represent, and

for a hundred and one other reasons, and if

the question settled by the plebiscite three

years ago had been left alone, as our con-

temporary argues, till these conflicting interests were reconciled, it would not

have been disposed of yet, and what was

proved to be the desire of the overwhelm-

ing majority of the electorate would have

been left unaccomplished.

Facts and Figures Relating to the Traffic in Intoxicants.

What Prohibition Means to

the Taxpayers. A Budget Specially Compiled for "Advertiser" Renders.

Now that the entire electorate has been egally called on to vote for liquor license or liquor prohibition, the people will do well to look the whole question fairly and many people seem inclined to think. It is not a matter of more indifference to these who never drink whether other people go on drinking or not. The whole community, abstainers included, is deeply interested in the fact that any considerable number of people continue to drink. The whole community, all abstainers included, is compelled to foot a good many of the bills imposed because even a tew go on drinking. The whole community shares in the revenue the country obtains from the licensed drink traffic, and it must also share in some of the financial losses imposed because of the same licensed drink traffic. There is not an individual in the whole community, total abstainer or not, but has a direct pecuniary interest in the continued existence of the licensed drink traffic, either for latter of mere indifference to these nce of the licensed drink traffic, either for oss or gain.

Let us look a little at the losses and ains to the community of the Province of contario, as a Province, from a purely cash point of view, arising cut of our present liquor license system. What are the gains from that business as a source of public

Of course this does not include the cus-oms duties and the excise, which go to the Dominion Government and not to the Pro-incial, but so far as I can find the ove amount is all that the Provincial overnment and the municipalities of Government and the municipalities of Ontario get as revenue from the existing liquor business. This amount was last year divided, as the law provides, between the Provincial Government and the munici-aplities where the licenses were granted as follows:

See what was left balance is struck. See what was left when these, even a part of these items were deducted. 
