The Pacific and Atlantic, though both depressions or flattenings of the earth are, as we shall find, different in age, character and conditions; and the Atlantic, though the smaller, is the older, and from the geological point of view in some respects the more important of the two. If our imaginary observer had the means of knowing anything of the rock formations of the continents he would notice that those bounding the North Atlantic are in general of great age, some belonging to the Laurentian system. On the other hand he would see that many of the mountain ranges along the Pacific are comparatively new, and that modern igneous action occurs in connection with them. Thus he might be led to believe that the Atlantic, though comparatively narrow, is an older feature of the earth's surface, while the Pacafic belongs to more modern times.
