Ingenious measures taken by the police to frustrate a suffragette demonstration on the occasion of the King's visit to Liverpool were ecounted in the Liverpool court yesterday, during the case in which lelen Jolley of the local branch of the Women's Social and Political Union, was charged with doing damage to property.

It is said that the head of the city detective force endeavored to get Miss Jolley to give an understanding that there should be no demonstration when the King drove through Liverpool. This effort was futile and as the suffragettes' offices were on the line of route, the night before the King's visit, policemen mounted a ladder and screwed down the windows of the offices. It is alleged that Miss Jolley was so annoyed at these tactics that she secured a poker and attacked the windows of the premises opposite.
