DR. EVAN'S OPEN LETTER.

Carefully investigated by the Canada Farmer's Sun.

Miss Koester and her Parents Enquire the Statements Contained in the Open Letter—The Doctor's action in making the Facts Public Fully Justified.

Intemperance destroys health, weakens the morals and delates the individual and causes general demoralization in the community. The statistics of every state show that there are more crime and misery caused by the saloon than any other source. We have seen thousands of lives that were at one time shining lights ruined. We have seen fathers and mothers whose pride were their children grow gray and their lives shortened by this evil. If we visit the jails, the work-houses and the insane asylums, we will find that the greater portion of the inmates have come there through the effects of this cursed evil.—Bishop Kane.

'Tis the Idiotic Mistake.

TO GIVE 1,000,000 INHUMAN MEN THE BALLOT.

And Refuse it to the Intelligent, Highly Educated and Cultured Women of the Country.—Mrs S. A. Chesley's Vigorous Reply to Rev. Dr. Cuyler and Goldwin Smith on the Franchise Question.

We republish the following vigorous and breezy letter from the Dartmouth Atlantic Weekly. It presents the woman's side of a question that "will not down" and must be discussed whatever may be the solution ultimately arrived at. We believe that the initials are those of Mary (Russell) Chesley of Lunenburg, one of the most able and intelligent, as well as one of the most moderate, reasonable and argumentative champions of the movement.

A friend has lately sent me a copy of the Atlantic Weekly dated 27th, ult., which contains an article of Dr. Cuyler's entitled "Is legislation to Care All?" upon which I would like to make a few comments. I think no one will be inclined to dissent from Dr. Cuyler's remarks with regard to the necessity for sustained moral effort on the part of temperance people against the drinking habit even where a law has been enacted, but this fact does not make a prohibitory law any less desirable. Moral and educational effort is much more likely to be effectual when directed against an outlawed traffic than when directed against one which has the sanction of law. Dr. Cuyler is right too when he says that behind a prohibitory law, "must be a right public conscience." Indeed it is difficult to imagine the enactment of a prohibitory law where the public conscience had not been, at least, aroused on the subject of temperance. But just here is the weak place in Dr. Cuyler's argument.

WHAT DOES THE DOCTOR UNDERSTAND BY A "PUBLIC CONSCIENCE?" Is a "public conscience" necessarily only a masculine conscience? The complacency with which every man of Dr. Cuyler's stamp uses the word "public" and "people" as meaning only men people gives force to the remark of Henry Ward Beecher that "there is a large infusion of vulgar arrogance even in good men's." Nor is this much to be wondered at when considering that our government, called a representative government, have not advanced far enough in civilization and culture to recognize any "people" but men people—any public but a "public" of men. It is true that voteless public conscience does not count for a great deal either in the enactment or the enforcement of a prohibitory law. This truth the temperance women of the United States awakened to fifteen years ago and ever since they have considered women's enfranchisement an object worth working for, and the temperance women of Canada are awakening. Dr. Cuyler speaks of the prohibitory law of Maine, but Maine, though the first was thirty years ago but one of fourteen prohibitory states. E. J. Wheeler, the editor of the New York Voice says:

"In the contest for prohibition forty years ago it is a significant fact that the saloon as a political power was hardly mentioned or seemingly recognized. In our day the saloon has become an arrogant political power, an organized and arrogant political power with its grip on both old parties, giving orders in legislative and congressional halls, dominating in caucus and primaries, and selling special privileges to corrupt moneyed corporations and trusts."

This is largely the case with Iowa, the state which Dr. Cuyler cites as having, by reason of a lowered public sentiment, resulting from an increase of foreign population, practically annulled its prohibitory law. But supposing that our republican neighbors, instead of so generously enfranchising ignorant foreigners, within a twelvemonth of their landing, forty years ago, had the wisdom AND JUSTICE TO ENFRANCHISE THEIR OWN INTELLIGENT WOMEN, is it probable that Iowa and other prohibitory states would, "under the pressure of a changed public sentiment" have been compelled to amend their prohibitory laws, or that the saloon would ever have become an "arrogant political power" with its grip on both parties?

Francis Willard says: "Public opinion can only be gathered up, condensed, and brought to bear through the electric battery of the ballot box, along the surcharged wires of law. There is no other method known to a republic, the correlation of forces by means of which the individual opinion passes into the ordinance, and on to the enforcing officer behind the ordinance, has its combination in that urn where freemen manufacture destiny—the ballot box. When voters meet the side always wins which has most votes. And thus it comes about that the ten commandments and the sermon on the mount are voted up or down upon election day."

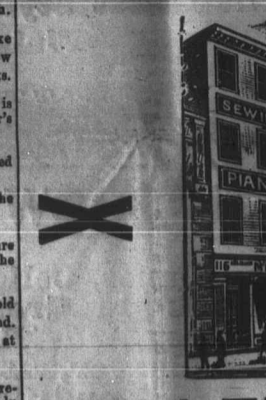

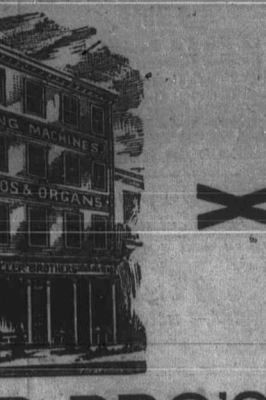
